

YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY

Tod Administration Building Friday, December 16, 1988

Pursuant to Resolution YR 1989-12 and to Notices mailed on the 1st day of December, 1988 by the Secretary to the Board to each Trustee, a copy of which precedes these Minutes (with copies to the President of the University, the President of the YSU Chapter of OEA, to Alan R. Kretzer, Special Counsel appointed by the Attorney General of Ohio, and to the Executive Director of YSU Alumni Association) a regular meeting (one-hundred and thirtieth) of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University convened in the Board Room in the Tod Administration Building.

Eight Trustees were present at the meeting, to-wit: Mrs. Elizabeth C. DeLuca, Edward A. Flask, Dr. John F. Geletka, William J. Lyden, Mrs. Emily P. Mackall, Richard P. McLaughlin, Martin J. O'Connell and Dr. Earnest Perry. Absent was Michael I. Monus.

Also present were Dr. Neil D. Humphrey, President, Dr. Bernard T. Gillis, Provost, Dr. Taylor Alderman, Vice-President Personnel Services, Dr. Lawrence E. Looby, Vice-President for Institutional Advancement, Dr. Charles A. McBriarty, Vice-President, Student Services, Edmund J. Salata, Executive Director of Facilities, Philip A. Snyder, Director, News Service, Franklin S. Bennett, Secretary to the Board of Trustees, and Patricia Martin, Secretary to the President. Also present were approximately 45 persons, including deans, members of the faculty, students and members of the news media.

Dr. Earnest Perry, Chairperson of the Board, presided.

ITEM I - Proof of Notice Meeting

Evidence was available to establish that due notice of the meeting had been mailed on December 1, 1988 by the Secretary, to each of the nine Trustees and to the President, and that copies had also been mailed to Dr. Paul Dalbec, President of the YSU Chapter of OEA, to Alan R. Kretzer, Special Counsel, Thomas Thompson, President YSU-ACE, and to Mrs. Patricia Tkacik Hanna,

Director YSU Alumni Association. Such evidence precedes these Minutes.

ITEM II - Minutes of Meeting Held on September 30, 1988.

Copies of the draft of the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees held on September 30, 1988 had been mailed to each Trustee, to the President, Provost, Vice-President Personnel Services, the Executive Director of Facilities, and the Special Counsel.

There being no additions or corrections, the minutes of the meeting were accepted as mailed.

ITEM III - Recommendations of the President of the University

Dr. Humphrey recommended that three Resolutions be adopted by the Trustees.

After a Motion which was made by Mrs. Mackall and seconded by Dr. Geletka, had received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson declared the following Resolution duly adopted:

a. Resolution to Ratify Faculty/Staff Appointments

WHEREAS, the <u>Policies of the Board of Trustees</u> direct the President to appoint such employees as are necessary to effectively carry out the operation of the University; and

WHEREAS, new appointments have been made subsequent to the September 30, 1988 regular meeting of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, such appointments are in accordance with the 1987-88 Budget and with the University policy on Equal Employment Opportunity;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby ratify and confirm the appointments as listed in Exhibit A attached hereto.

b. Resolution Accepting Gifts

After a Motion, which was made by Mrs. DeLuca and seconded by Mr. Flask, had received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson declared the following Resolution duly adopted:

YR 1989-14

WHEREAS, Resolution YR 1980-34 provides that the President shall compile a list of gifts to the University for each meeting of the Board of Trustees and present the list accompanied by his recommendation for action by the Board; and

WHEREAS, the President has reported that the gifts as listed in Exhibit B attached hereto are being held pending acceptance and he recommends their acceptance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby accept these gifts on behalf of Youngstown State University and instructs the President to acknowledge such acceptance to the donors and to express our gratitude for their generosity to the University.

After the Resolution was adopted, Dr. Humphrey called on Dr. Looby to highlight the gifts received and accepted.

Dr. Looby stated that as shown on the written report gifts totalling \$82,244 have been received since the last meeting of the Board.

In addition, Dr. Looby mentioned two substantial gifts received since the report was prepared.

The first gift is for \$15,000 and has been received from the Penquin Club.

The second gift is for \$10,000 and has been received from Attorney and Mrs. Irwin I. Kretzer to be added to the fund established by them in memory of their deceased son. This fund is now valued at \$35,500.00.

Total gifts received are therefore \$151,615.00.

Dr. Looby also noted that WYSU-FM continued to improve on its fund raising efforts. There was an increase of \$3,700.00 in the amount raised from contributors and an increase of \$3,400.00 in underwriting fees.

ITEM IV - Report of the President of the University

1. <u>Dr. Gillis, Provost, reported concerning the following</u> matters.

a. <u>Accreditations and Reaccreditations</u>.

Visitation teams were on campus for the reaccreditation of the Dental Hygiene program and the Medical Laboratory Technology program. The final actions on these evaluations will be reported during the summer of 1989.

b. Program in Hospitality Management.

The Advisory Committee for this program continues to provide information for a final phase II proposal, to be reviewed by the University Academic Senate, and if approval voted, to the Board of Trustees.

c. Program Name Modification.

The Business Education and Technology faculty had proposed changing the name of the Marketing Technology program to Marketing Management Technology because the name more clearly reflects the intent of the program and the employment obtained by the graduates, and 25% of the course work is in Business Management Technology. The name conforms to the Ohio Board of Regents program definition and the University Academic Senate has approved the name change. The Provost and President concur on this minor modification.

d. New Program Status

Dr. Gillis shared with the Board the matrix which illustrated in part the status of a number of new programs that are in various stages of review and development. He stated that of particular importance are those which move the University toward Doctoral granting status.

e. Change in University Patent Policy.

A needed change in the University Patent Policy as reflected in the Board of Trustees Policies will be processed through the Personnel Committee of the Board.

f. Limited Service Faculty Limitations.

Because of implementation of Sec 89 of the Tax Reform Act of 1986, procedures have been put into place to limit the number of Limited-Service Faculty teaching over 5 Work Load Hours to 20% of all such faculty minus one in order not to invoke penalties on the University.

g. Faculty Publication.

A book was recently published by a faculty member in our Political Science department, Dr. Keith J. Lepak, entitled "Prelude to Solidarity: Poland and the Politics of the Gierek Regime", pp. 270, Columbia University Press, 1988.

Mr. Salata, Executive Director of Facilities, reported concerning the following matters:

a. <u>Chilled Water System \$1,400,000.</u>

This project was bid in December of 1988 and came in \$61,550 over budget. It will be rebid on December 20, 1988. It is important that every effort be made to expidite this facility so that it will be in operation by July of 1989 in order to receive maximum operating benefit.

b. John J. McDonough Museum of Art \$1,450,000.

The Building and Property Committee approved the design development drawings for this project at its most recent meeting. The architects are now proceeding with working drawings. Construction is expected to begin in June of 1989 with completion anticipated in the Spring of 1990.

c. Ward Beecher Hall - Phase III \$1,400,000.

This project is now 20% complete with completion of entire project anticipated by April of 1989.

d. <u>Bliss Hall Renovations \$2,600,000</u>.

This project is 80% complete with completion of entire project anticipated by mid-February, 1989. Occupancy of this building is expected during week of spring break.

e. Arnold D. Stambaugh Stadium - leaks.

Phase I of this project in the amount of \$200,000 has been completed and we are pleased with the results.

Phase II drawings were sent to the State for approval December 14, 1988. We expect to begin construction in early spring of 1989.

<u>ITEM V - Reports of the Committees of the Board</u>

1. Personnel Relations

Mrs. Mackall reported that the Personnel Relations Committee was recommending three Resolutions for adoption by the Board. She then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

a. Resolution Concerning Staff Excluded from Collective Bargaining.

WHEREAS classified civil service staff excluded from collective bargaining because of supervisory or confidential status are not entitled to benefits established by the Agreement negotiated with the exclusive representative for eligible classified employees;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University that full-time classified civil service employees of the University are hereby granted the benefits pertaining to insurance coverage during medical leave without pay established by Article 15.14 of the 1987-90 Agreement between the University and the University Association of Classified Employees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the minimum "call out pay" of five hours established by Article 12.4 of said Agreement also be extended to

excluded full-time classified civil service employees.

The Motion was seconded by Mr. McLaughlin and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the Motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mrs. Mackall next read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

b. Resolution to Revise Policy on Patents.

WHEREAS, the University's current policy on patents is viewed by local manufacturing firms as too restrictive on their rights related to product design or manufacture; and

WHEREAS, said policy does not delegate the authority to make specific decisions related to assignable rights related to research that may involve patentable discoveries;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University that Article IV, Section 3 of the Policies of the Board of Trustees be and is hereby amended, as specified on Exhibit C attached hereto.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Flask and, after discussion, received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mrs. Mackall next read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

c. Resolution Concerning Smoking Policy.

WHEREAS, thee has been considerable interest on campus concerning development of a better understanding concerning smoking and no-smoking areas; and

WHEREAS, the University's Holistic Health Program has had a Tobacco Use and Abuse YR 1989-16

Committee which has studied this matter for several months and contacted a majority of faculty and staff; and

WHEREAS, the Tobacco Use and Abuse Committee has presented a proposed "smoking policy" set forth in Exhibit D attached hereto which it recommends be adopted by the University;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby declare its intent to consider this proposed policy at the March 24, 1989 Board meeting and directs the President to disseminate the Committee's recommendation and report among the University community prior to that meeting and invite written comment to be submitted sufficiently early so that it can be considered by the Board's Personnel Relations Committee on or before March 16, 1989.

The Motion was seconded by Mr. McLaughlin and, after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the Motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

2. Building and Property Committee

Mr. Lyden reported that the Building and Property Committee was recommending three Resolutions for adoption by the Board. He then read and moved for adoption:

a. Resolution Concerning Clingan-Waddell Hall

WHEREAS, Youngstown State University has utilized Clingan-Waddell Hall only on a limited basis since the College of Fine and Performing Arts occupied Bliss Hall beginning in 1976; and

WHEREAS, the ceramics and sculpture studios of the Department of Art are slated to be relocated from Clingan-Waddell Hall to an addition to Bliss Hall after completion of a

current renovation/addition project expected to be completed by Spring 1989; and

WHEREAS, the University will have no further use for Clingan-Waddell Hall after the ceramics and sculpture studios are relocated to Bliss Hall; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the benefits incurring to the University in maintaining this property will no longer justify the investment in this property and the associated maintenance costs;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the NOW, Board of Trustees of Youngstown State hereby University does instruct President, following the relocation of the ceramics and sculpture studios, to have the real property known as Clingan-Waddell Hall, Rayen Avenue, Youngstown, Ohio, appraised by two qualified appraisers and to do all things necessary to sell this real property as soon reasonably prudent thereafter accordance with the laws of the State of Ohio pertaining to the sale of state owned land. It is desired that the sale of this real property be made to the highest acceptable bidder, not limited to a sale for not less than the appraised value, that the sale be for cash, and that the proceeds of sale be designated as a fund functioning endowment.

The Motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca and, after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the Motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. Lyden next read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

b. <u>Resolution to Authorize Land Appro-</u> priation Procedure

YR 1989-19

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University adopted along range Facility Master Plan on June 7, 1985; and

the Facility WHEREAS, Master Plan developed to project land and facility needs the next decade, and allow to University to meet its mission objectives by completing a physical environment which is aesthetically pleasing, responsive to the University's changing functional needs, and efficient and cost-effective in its operation; and

WHEREAS, the Facility Master Plan, as a dynamic document has from time to time been modified by Board resolution to reflect evolving changes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has authorized the administration to negotiate the purchase of certain parcels of real estate, located within the realm of approved University development, on a willing-seller, willing-buyer basis at the property's appraised value; and

WHEREAS, negotiations for the purchase of City Lots 3260, 3259, 1001, and 1004 located on Grant Street, City Lots 1005 (party 397 only), 5140, 5141, and 5142 located on Fifth Avenue and City Lots 55506 and part 268 of 5134 located on Iona Street, all within the realm of approved University development, are apparently at impasse; and

WHEREAS, negotiations for the purchase of City Lot 4671 (north part) located on Iona Street, City Lot 55951 located on Ford Avenue, and City Lots 4676, 4675, 4672, 4671 (south part), and 4667, all within the realm of approved University development, will by January 16, 1989 have resulted in a negotiated purchase agreement or a conclusion that negotiations are at impasse;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Trustees of Youngstown of State University does hereby authorize administration, upon reaching a conclusion that negotiations are at impasse, to request Ohio Department of Administrative the Services to appropriate the above enumerated City Lots located in the City of Youngstown, County of Mahoning, State of Ohio.

The Motion was seconded by Dr. Geletka and, after discussion, received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the Motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. Lyden announced that the Building and Property Committee had a resolution which it recommended for passage but that would be held in abeyance until alternative resolutions were introduced. This was the resolution for the Student Housing. Dr. Perry then stated that Ms. Amy McFarland, President of the YSU Student Government had requested in writing the opportunity to speak to the Board on the issue of Student Residential Housing. He pointed out that the policy of the Board is to require a three week advance notice in writing but that since the Board was interested in letting Ms. McFarland speak he suggested that the Board suspend its rules and allow Ms. McFarland to speak. It was moved by Mrs. DeLuca and seconded by Mrs. Mackall that the Board suspend the rules and permit Ms. Amy McFarland to address the Board.

Ms. McFarland spoke as follows:

"I wish to thank the Board for the opportunity to speak to it and for suspending the rules allowing this. At the September 30, 1988 meeting of the Student Affairs Committee I was delighted to hear the final preparation for plans for student housing in Wick Oval. Dr. McBriarty and Mr. Salata spoke to us at that time and described the proposed housing in Wick Oval. Finally we were off dead center on student housing. It was my understanding that the Wick Oval area was chosen for the reason that it was presently owned by the University and had been proposed as the proper site for many years.

Then suddenly it became apparent that certain Board members felt that the Wick Oval site was not the appropriate one and the Student Government for the first time had concern as to the actual progress to be made in student housing.

It was obvious to the Student Government that the Wick Oval property was already owned by the University, that there was sufficient land available immediately to build an appropriate number of residence buildings and that recreational area was also available in the Hollow. We in Student Government understand that if the construction is started as soon as possible that the buildings could be ready in 1990. It is our position that the Madison Avenue property is not large enough and that the Fifth Avenue property is also not large enough at the present time and that acquisition of property in that area would have to be by appropriation.

It is my opinion that if this is not approved today for Wick Oval it will be at least three more years before any action will be taken. It is the position of the Student Government that we not compromise the Master Plan.

Student housing is needed now and we recommend the passage of the resolution proposed by the Building and Property Committee. September 30, 1988 was a great day and our belief in the future of student housing was greatly increased at that meeting of the Student Affairs Committee.

It is the official request of the Student Government that the Board of Trustees approve the resolution proposed by the Building and Property Committee."

Mr. McLaughlin then distributed a proposed Alternate Resolution which he discussed with the Board. He moved for the adoption of his Resolution and it failed for lack of a second.

Dr. Geletka then introduced and moved for adoption an Alternate Resolution which was seconded by Mr. Flask.

Mr. Lyden immediately introduced an amendment to Dr. Geletka's Resolution stating that:

"no property shall be appropriated from any residentowner other than under the willing/seller willing/buyer theory". The motion to amend the Resolution was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca.

Dr. Geletka stated that in his opinion such a limitation on purchase of resident-owner real estate had always been Board policy and that he had no objection to this amendment.

The motion to amend the Resolution was passed immediately.

Mr. Lyden then spoke against Dr. Geletka's Resolution and urged that it be defeated. He gave a brief history of student housing at the University since 1968 and noted that all of the efforts have been directed towards construction of such housing in the Wick Oval and Smokey Hollow area. Substantial property has been acquired in these two contiguous areas by prior actions of the Board and these acquisitions will now be of little use to the University.

Mr. Lyden further stated that in his opinion it will be at least twenty years before residence buildings can be completed west of Fifth Avenue.

Mrs. DeLuca asked Mr. Salata if the property presently owned by the University in Wick Oval was of sufficient size to build a 200 bed residence hall. Mr. Salata stated that in his opinion it was large enough and pointed out that the original proposal from Associated Estates to build apartments of similar capacity in the area was approved although never carried out.

Mr. Salata stated that there was about 2 1/2 acres available in Wick Oval and approximately 1 1/2 acres on Madison Mrs. DeLuca then asked if there weren't residents Avenue. presently living in Wick Oval that did not wish to sell and Mr. Salata stated that was correct. The acquisition of property was not necessary to go forward with the present plans. Various Trustees had questions about parking should the building be placed in Wick Oval. Mr. Salata said there was more than adequate parking in the present lots and parking structures that are in that area. Dr. Perry stated that he had concern about the utilization of present parking lots in Wick Oval and felt that the students were not using them. Mr. O'Connell pointed out that a Master Plan done in 1968 should be subject to change since the community has changed radically in those twenty years. He stated that he felt the area of future expansion should be to the north of the campus and that we shouldn't hide the residence buildings in Wick Oval. Mr. Lyden pointed out that the Master Plan had been upgraded in 1985 and that the Board should move and build buildings at this time. Mr. Flask then seconded resolution of Dr. Geletka.

Mrs. Mackall stated that she was opposing Dr. Geletka's resolution and that she agreed with Mr. Lyden that if we don't build in Wick Oval it will probably be in the next century before building construction is finally started. Things move very slowly in the University community and that she has been working on this for over six years. She stated it was obvious the

students wanted it and that Fifth Avenue property is not available at the present time. She felt that right now we should approve the Wick Oval project and get on with it. Dr. Humphrey pointed out that the resolution as presented by Dr. Geletka had deleted any mention of 75 beds being the appropriate number to be built. He stated further the assumption is that the first unit will now be 200 beds. Dr. Perry asked Mr. Salata if there was sufficient property presently owned by the University in Wick Oval to support a 200 bed dormitory. Mr. Salata said it depended upon the configuration of the building but that he felt it could be built there. Mrs. DeLuca asked what had happened to the apartment complexes that were planned and dropped and Mr. Salata stated that the student body had not shown sufficient support for that type of building.

Mr. McLaughlin asked Mr. Salata if he had had opportunity to examine land west of Fifth Avenue and Mr. Salata stated that he had and stated that the area is blighted and that there are 36 parcels we are still trying to buy with a half a dozen of them owner occupied. Dr. Geletka asked what the time span would be to acquire enough property to build west of fifth Avenue. Mr. Lyden stated that one or two owners could block the entire area. Mr. Salata then described in general the status of negotiations with all property owners in the Wick Oval area and the Fifth Avenue area.

Mr. McLaughlin stated that he was sensitive to the need of the University to expand in areas north and west of the campus but that he had been persuaded by Mr. Lyden that a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush and that we don't have the land available in the Fifth Avenue area to go forward.

After further discussion, the secretary was instructed to call the roll of Trustees on the Resolution introduced by Dr. Geletka and seconded by Mr. Flask, as amended.

The Secretary called the roll and the vote was as follows:

The Chairperson declared the Motion carried and the Resolution as amended adopted.

c. Resolution Concerning Residence Hall Improvement

YR 1989-20

WHEREAS, the Student Services Committee, the Building and Property Committee, and the Athletics committee of the Board of Trustees have reviewed the administration's plans for development of a comprehensive residence hall/efficiency apartment complex in Wick Oval; and

WHEREAS, these committees have received a report from the Executive director of Athletics concerning the status of planning for an Athletics Residence Hall on Madison Avenue, owned and operated by the Penquin Club; and

WHEREAS, it is concluded by the Board that YSU owned and operated student residence facilities should not be constructed in Wick Oval nor on Walnut Street but rather should be constructed either west of the campus between Fifth Avenue and Belmont, or north of the campus on Madison Avenue; and

WHEREAS, money is required to provide for site surveys, soil testing, fees for architects, engineers, and special consultants and other up-front costs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown University does hereby authorize an interfund loan of \$250,000 from the Educational and Associated Operations Contingency Reserve to Student the Residence Development Fund, instructs the administration to prepare a budget for this new fund and submit it to the Building and Property Committee, authorizes expenditure to be made against such fund with a report to be made at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the administration is directed to continue the further planning of residence halls on

Madison Avenue and/or west of Fifth Avenue a University auxiliary enterprise, and to prepare the necessary amendments to the previously adopted YSU Long Range Facilities Development Plan for consideration by this board and submission to the Ohio Board of Regents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that no property shall be appropriated from any resident-owner other than under the willing/seller, willing/buyer theory.

Budget and Finance Committee

In the absence of Mr. Monus Dr. Geletka reported that the Budget and Finance Committee was recommending five Resolutions for adoption by the Board. He then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

a. Resolution to authorize Transfer from the Unallocated Reserve - Educational and Associated Operations (Fund One), FY 1988-89

WHEREAS, the FY 1988-89 budget adopted by the Board of Trustees requires approval by the Board of Trustees of all transfers from the Unallocated Reserve; and

WHEREAS, the summer, 1988 drought caused unusual expenditures to be necessary to maintain the University landscaping; and

WHEREAS, it is the best interests of the University to provide the Forensics team with a \$23,900 budget; and

WHEREAS, need for additional instructional supplies has been demonstrated by the Allied Health Department;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve and authorize the transfer of \$25,783 from the Unallocated

Reserve-Educational and Associated Operations as follows:

\$6,218 to the Care of Grounds Department;

\$6,000 to the Executive Director of Facilities;

\$8,565 to the Forensics budget; and

\$5,000 to the Allied Health Department,

as shown on the attached Exhibits E, F, G, and H.

The Motion was seconded by Mrs. Mackall and, after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present.

The Chairperson declared the Motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Geletka next read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

b. Resolution to Authorize an Increase in the General Fee Fund Group Budgets FY 1988-89

WHEREAS, Youngstown State University and the YSU-ACE have entered into a collective bargaining agreement which provides for compensation increases; and

WHEREAS, additional funds are required to implement the YSU/YSU-ACE Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize and direct the transfer of a total of \$55,425 including: \$43,000 from the General Fee Fund reserve; and \$12,425 from the Noninstructional Services Reserve as shown on the attached Exhibit I for the purpose of funding compensation increases as provided for in the YSU/YSU-ACE Agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an increase in the total budgets of the General Fee Fund

group of \$12,425 to a total amount of \$6,801,568 is hereby authorized.

Policies of the Board of Trustees

ARTICLE IV: UNIVERSITY RESEARCH, COPYRIGHT AND PATENT POLICY Section 3. Patents

As provided in Section 3345.14 of the Ohio Revised Code, all rights to and interests in discoveries or inventions, including patents thereon, which result from research of investigations conducted in laboratories or facilities operated by Youngstown State University shall be the sole property of the University. No person, firm, association or governmental agency using the facilities of Youngstown State University shall have any rights to or interests in such discoveries or inventions, including income therefrom unless assigned, licensed, transferred, or paid to such person or entity pursuant to an arrangement specifically approved by the Board of Trustees. AUTHORITY TO APPROVE AGREEMENTS DEFINING UNIVERSITY-SPONSORED RESEARCH PROJECTS AND THE ASSIGNMENT OF RIGHTS TO OR INTERESTS IN THE RESULTS OF SUCH RESEARCH IS DELEGATED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO THE PRESIDENT. AGREEMENTS INVOLVING UNIVERSITY-SPONSORED RESEARCH TO BE CONDUCTED BY MEMBERS OF THE FULL-SERVICE FACULTY SHALL CONFORM TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY AND THE EXCLUSIVE REPRESENTATIVE OF THE FACULTY, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS · OF OHIO REVISED CODE 4117.

If an employee believes that a discovery or invention resulting from a University sponsored research project is -patentable, he shall present the matter to the Associate-Provost-and Dean of Graduate Studies for his recommendation to the President. The President shall-report-each-such-alleged--discovery-or-invention-to-the-Board-of-Trustees,-together-with the recommendations as to what, if any, disposition or use-thereof should be made by the University. If required by the Board of Trustees, the inventor shall apply for a patent and -cooperate with the University in procuring a patent and making -such-use or dispositon thereof as may be determined from time to time by the Board of Trustees. Should the Board of Trustees-fail-*to authorize applying for a patent within one year after the date the matter was first reported to the Associate Provost and Dean--of-Graudate-Studies, it-shall-be-deemed-to-have-released-its -rights therein and the person who made the discovery or invention may thereafter apply for a patent in his own name. The University shall, nevertheless, retain all rights which it may otherwise have in such discovery or invention, and may publish any data which has been developed in connection with such discovery or invention.

WITH RESPECT TO AGREEMENTS IN WHICH THE UNIVERSITY CONTRACTS WITH EXTERNAL FIRMS FOR TESTING PRODUCTS, THE AGREEMENT MAY PROVIDE THAT THE FIRM (CLIENT) SHALL HAVE ALL RIGHTS, TITLE, AND INTEREST IN AND TO INVENTIONS AND OTHER PROPERTY RIGHTS RELATED TO PRODUCT DESIGN OR MANUFACTURE. SUCH AGREEMENTS SHALL PROVIDE THAT THE UNIVERSITY SHALL HAVE ALL RIGHTS, TITLE, AND INTEREST IN AND TO INVENTIONS AND OTHER PROPERTY RIGHTS MADE OR CONCEIVED IN THE COURSE OF PROJECTS CARRIED OUT BY THE UNIVERSITY RELATED TO PRODUCT MEHTODOLOGY.

YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY SMOKING POLICY

PHILOSOPHY

Youngstown State University is dedicated to providing a healthy, comfortable, productive work and study environment for all students, faculty, and staff.

Smoking and passive/secondhand smoke have been shown to adversely affect our health, safety, and welfare. The University has the right and responsibility to promote the health and well-being of the entire University community. All University employees, students, faculty, and visitors are expected to comply with the smoking regulations detailed in this policy.

RATIONALE

Section 3791.03 of the Ohio Revised Code regulates smoking in places of public assembly (all buildings owned by the state, theatres, auditoriums, elevators, classrooms, restrooms, stairwells).

Effective ________, 1988, smoking is prohibited at Youngstown State University except in designated smoking areas identified by "Smoking Permitted" signs.

SMOKING PERMITTED AREAS

- (1) A. Private offices with floor to ceiling walls may be designated smoking or nonsmoking by the occupant.
 - B. Shared Work Environments: Occupancy Rule (If someone objects, no smoking.)
 In offices where smokers and nonsmokers work together an effort will be made toward cooperation. If cooperation does not work, it will be necessary to prohibit smoking in these areas.
- (2) Designated areas in each building.
- (3) Lobbies of arenas, concert halls, etc. if physically separated from spectator and participation areas.
- (4) Meeting and conference rooms when all agree.
- (5) Sections of cafeterias and other food service areas.

PROHIBITED SMOKING AREAS

- (1) Classrooms, laboratory and lecture halls.
- (2) Common areas of frequest usage including elevators, stairwells, reception areas, customer and student service areas, bookstore, mail rooms, copier rooms, and restrooms.
- (3) The Maag Library and library rooms in other buildings.
- (4) Indoor facilities serving as places of public assembly, such as: concert halls or theaters, areas for exhibiting motion pictures, stage, drama, musical recitals, dance, conferences, lectures, or similar performances.
- (5) Indoor sports areas, providing that smoking may be permitted by the University Fire Marshall in areas commonly referred to as lobbies if physically separated from the spectator and participation areas.

ENFORCEMENT

The success of this policy will depend upon the thoughtfulness, consideration, and cooperation of smokers and nonsmokers. All employees share in the responsibility of adhering to and enforcing the policy. In all cases the right of the nonsmoker to protect his or her health will take precedence over another person's desire to smoke.

ARTICLE II. BOARD OF TRUSTEES - MEETINGS

Section 1. Regular Meetings

The Board shall meet at least four times each year, and at such other times as are necessary for the best interest of the University. Meetings shall be called at such times as the Board prescribes; provided, however, that meetings will usually be held September, December, March, and June of each academic year. At the time of adjournment of each meeting, the Board shall provide, by resolution, the time and place for the holding of the next regular meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall give written notice of said meeting to the residence or business address of each member of the Board at least fifteen (15) days prior thereto.

Section 2. Special Meetings

Special meetings of the Board may be called by or at the written request of the Chairman of the Board, the President of the University, or upon the written request of three members of the Board. A call for a special meeting shall specify the time and purposes thereof, although other business than that specified in the call may be considered at any such meeting. The person or persons calling said special meeting or on request made to the secretary by such person or persons, the secretary shall give written notice thereof, at least three(3) days, or as otherwise required in these Bylaws, delivered personally or sent by certified mail or telegram with return receipt requested to the residence or business address of each member of the Board. Any Board member may waive notice of any such meeting. The attendance of a Board member at such meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting.

Section 3. Place of Meeting

All regular and special meetings of the Board, unless the Board otherwise specifies, shall be held on University property, and the place of the meeting shall be specified in the call for that meeting.

Section 4. Quorum

A majority of the members of the Board, when duly convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board; if less than a majority of the members of the Board are present at said meeting, a majority of the members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice. At any such adjourned meeting at which a quorum shall be present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified. At any meeting where a quorum is present, a majority vote of those present shall be required for any official action of the Board, except as otherwise required by law or by these Bylaws. IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 3356.01(B) OF THE OHIO REVISED CODE THE STUDENT MEMBERS OF THE BOARD SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED AS MEMBERS OF THE BOARD IN DETERMINING WHETHER A QUORUM OF THE BOARD IS PRESENT.
