SENATE BILL 140 POST-SECONDARY ENROLLMENT PROGRAM

Intent

The bill as developed extends to eleventh and twelfth grade high school students an additional opportunity to attend post-secondary institutions.

Youngstown State University recognizes the value of encouraging and promoting an opportunity for academically talented students to attend post-secondary institutions in pursuit of courses not offered at their high school through an early admission policy. The current policy permits high school seniors with letters of recommendation and permission from the high school principal or guidance counselor to attend YSU.

This policy has served the special needs of this type of student adequately. The present bill includes the eleventh grade students as being eligible to participate in post-secondary experiences. The bill does not specify qualitative requirements but does provide the latitude for higher education to apply standards.

The Ohio Board of Regents recommends that higher education institutions should strictly limit participation to course work that is clearly at a collegiate level. These courses should be more demanding than normal high school course work in content and in pace. Additionally, the standards for admission should be reasonable so as not to exclude students who might benefit from such a program.

Youngstown State University will comply with the legislation and include the eleventh grade students as candidates for admission. Therefore, our proposal will be to expand the current practice. The University will consider for admission eleventh and twelfth grade students with above average capability and their high school principal or guidance counselor's acknowledgment of participation.

Students will be admitted to the University under option A or B (See Appendix A). Those admitted under Option B should be counseled to enroll for those courses deemed appropriate to fulfill credits at their high school. In general under option A, the University requires the completion of pre-college units and other requirements for admission to University level courses (See Appendix C). Individual circumstances will be considered.

Attached are several documents intended to provide a framework for discussion and for guidance counselors' use for counseling into select courses.

Admission Requirements for Post-Secondary Enrollment Program Participants Entering YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY

Modified 4.1.6. EARLY ADMISSION POLICY (OAC 3356:6-1-07)

A. Eligibility

- 1. Student must have completed at least the sophomore year of high school and be of junior status as locally defined by the school district.
- Student must not have completed high school.
- B. Requirements to be Considered for Admission
 - 1. Application for admission must be submitted by May 1 for the following academic year.
 - 2. Twenty dollar (\$20.00) non-refundable application fee.
 - 3. High school transcript indicating courses taken and must rank in the top 20% of the class.
 - 4. Counselor verification form indicating parental consent and verification of counseling session with high school guidance counselor.
 - 5. English Placement exam is required.
 - 6. Clear and definite indication from student which Option (See Appendix A) is desired for each course.
 - 7. Personal interview with the designated counselor in the YSU Admissions Office after which the admissions committee will make a decision.
 - 8. Appropriate waivers must be signed by parent/guardian and student concerning release of information.
- C. Acceptance Notification, Advisement Requirements, & Reporting
 - In accordance with the law, ten days after completing the application process, the following individuals will be notified regarding admission status: the student, the student's parents, the high school counselor, the district superintendent and the state superintendent.
 - 2. Participants will be advised by professional academic advisors employed by the university. Students must secure the signature of their university advisor each quarter they are enrolled through this program.
 - 3. Course enrollment will be on the basis of space available and only after regularly matriculated students have registered. Approval for more than 12 quarter hours must be granted by the YSU academic advisor.

- 4. A suggested course list will be made available to high school counselors (Appendix B). These will generally consist of undergraduate courses that meet articulation requirements as well as basic survey courses. Students must meet prerequisites for advanced and technical courses.
- In accordance with the law, ten days after enrollment, the following individuals will be notified regarding the student's schedule: the student's parents, the high school counselor, the district superintendent, and the state superintendent. The student will be informed immediately of his/her schedule upon registration.

D. Validation of Credit

- Grades will be reported to the student.
- 2. For students who have chosen to have courses used to complete high school requirements, the University will supply a copy of the grade report to the students' high school principal.

E. Continuance in the Post-Secondary Enrollment Program

- 1. The student must be academically eligible to continue to participate in the program at Youngstown State University.
- 2. While the University's policy on academic standing applies to post-secondary students, the advisability of their continued participation in the program will also be reviewed on a quarterly basis by their academic advisor.
- 3. Grades and/or credits earned will be recorded on a Youngstown State University transcript.
- 4. Each quarter the student will have to designate which Option (See Appendix A) is desired for each course.
- 5. The student need not submit a new application for admission if he/she is eligible to participate in the Post-Secondary Program for a second academic year while still enrolled in high school.
- 6. Transcripts for credits may be obtained:
 - a. After the completion of the quarter for students who have chosen Option A.
 - After tuition/fees are received for students who have chosen Option B.

Post-Secondary Enrollment Options

Option A: The student may elect at the time of enrollment to receive ONLY college CREDIT for the course. The college shall notify the student about payment of tuition and fees in the customary manner followed by the college, and the student shall be responsible for payment of all tuition, AND THE COST OF ALL textbooks, materials, and fees associated with the course. IF THE STUDENT SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETES THE COURSE, THE COLLEGE SHALL AWARD HIM FULL CREDIT FOR THE COURSE, BUT THE BOARD OF EDUCATION SHALL NOT AWARD HIM HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT.

Option B: The student may elect at the time of enrollment for each course to receive BOTH COLLEGE credit AND HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT. IF THE STUDENT SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETES THE COURSE, THE COLLEGE SHALL AWARD HIM FULL CREDIT FOR THE COURSE, AND THE BOARD OF EDUCATION SHALL AWARD HIM HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT. If the student elects this option, the college shall be reimbursed in accordance with section 3365.07 of the Revised Code.

SELECTED COURSES APPROPRIATE FOR EARLY ADMISSION STUDENTS

The following courses may be taken by a high school junior or senior under the Early Admission program. In general, the courses are collegiate level and meet specific associate or baccalaureate degree requirements. Interpretation and/or assignment of carnegie unit equivalency is left up to the individual boards of education. For working purposes, one carnegie unit is equal to 7 1/2 quarter hours of credit. The following list is provided as a working document and is not intended to be exhaustive.

Those students graduating from high school after September, 1985, desiring to pursue a baccalaureate program at Youngstown State University will be granted admission on an unconditional basis upon satisfactory completion of a course of study at the secondary level that includes the following courses:

4 units of English; with emphasis on composition 3 units of Mathematics (Algebra I, Algebra II and Plane Geometry) 1 unit of Laboratory Science (Biology, Chemistry, Earth Science or Physics) 1 unit of any other Science 1 unit of U.S. History 1/2 unit of U.S. Government 1/2 unit of any other Social Science 1 unit of an additional Science or Social Science 1 unit of Fine or Performing Arts 2 units of one Foreign Language

Admission to certain programs may require specific levels of performance in the above areas.

Ohio residents who have graduated from high school without completing all of the above program will be admitted on the condition that their course of study includes prescribed courses aimed at correcting any deficiencies. Non-Ohio residents admitted, but without completing all of the above program, will likewise be expected to correct any deficiencies. Students admitted with deficiencies should realize that such courses will not count as credit toward fulfilling the baccalaureate requirements. They will be required to enroll in at least one course each quarter aimed at removing their deficiency and must have the deficiency completely removed before the beginning of the junior year (90 q.h.)

AND, BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that the President of Youngstown State University or his designee shall have the authority to approve:

- fees of noncredit courses, institutes, and workshops offered or coordinated through the Department of Continuing Education;
- ticket prices for admission of the public to intercollegiate athletic games and to student music or dramatic productions;
- 3. service charges for loans to students;
- 4. charges for use of University facilities by non-University groups or organizations; and,
- 5. special fees for 1) a "Mall Management Institute"; 2) International student training programs under contract; 3) an "Executive Sequence--Masters of Business Administration" program. It shall be understood that such special fees, if authorized, shall provide for all related costs of the program and that the budget for such programs shall be subject to approval in the same manner as are other University operating budgets.
- 6. to authorize the expenditure of funds that may be granted by the Ohio Board of Regents under the Selective Excellence Programs.

In all cases, the revenue generated by such fees and charges shall be expended in conformity with appropriately approved budgets. It shall be understood that: (a) prices of books and other items for sale in the Bookstore, Kilcawley Center, and

through vending machnies shalll be established in conformity with good business practices by the managers of those units; (b) charges for unreturned or damaged equipment checked out to a student shall be established by the cognizant department head to cover the depreciated value of the equipment and the processing cost; (c) for such charges as noted in (a) and (b) above, the approval of neither the President nor the Board of Trustees shall be required; and (d) the President or his designees shall have the authority to designate parking facilities by location or by time which may be utilized either without charge or for a reduced charge.

Fines which are authorized in this resolution may be assessed against nonstudents who are authorized to use University services as well as against students; and, the rates detailed in this resolution shall replace the rates adopted in Resolution YR 1989-64 and in any other resolution in conflict, and it shall continue to be the policy of this Board to review and adopt all fees, service charges, and fines annually, usually in the Spring, in order that students and others are informed as to rates for the coming year and budgets may be finalized.

It is understood that charges, fines, penalties, and assessments to students and non-students will not be waived except as specifically authorized by proper authority.

If a student is permitted to withdraw from the University or if a student reduces his or her academic load, a refund of the tuition (i.e., the instructional fee and the general fee), of the nonresident tuition surcharge, and the performance music fee, where applicable, shall be made in conformity with the following schedule; however, for those withdrawing from the university, the registration withdrawal fee shall be assessed and paid and the student identification card shall be surrendered before the refund is paid.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY

Tod Hall Friday, March 30, 1990

Pursuant to Resolution YR 1990-29 and to Notices mailed on the fifteenth day of March, 1990 by the President of the University to each Trustee, a copy of which precedes these Minutes (with copies to the President of the YSU Chapter of OEA; to Alan R. Kretzer, Special Counsel appointed by the Attorney General of Ohio; and to the Executive Director of YSU Alumni Association) a regular meeting (one-hundred and thirty-eighth) of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University convened at 3:00 p.m. in the Board Room in Tod Hall.

Looby, Vice President--Institutional Advancement; Dr. Charles A. McBriarty, Vice President--Student Services; Mr. Edmund J. Salata, Executive Director of Facilities; Mr. James D. Miller, Executive Director of Administrative Services; Mr. Richard L. Glunt, Executive Director of Finance; Mr. James E. McCollum, Assistant to the President for Legal Services; Mr. G. L. Mears, Director of Budget and Institutional Services; Mr. Phil Snyder, Director of News Service; Patricia D. Martin, Acting Secretary to the Board of Trustees; and Rose M. Butler, Acting Secretary to the Board of Trustees. Also present were approximately 50 persons, including deans, members of the faculty, students and members of the news media.

ITEM II - Minutes of Meeting Held December 15, 1989

Provost, Vice President--Personnel Services, the Executive Director of Facilities and the Special Counsel. The Minutes of such meeting were approved on motion by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. O'Connell, and duly carried, and were signed by the Chairperson and attested by the Acting Secretary.

ITEM III - Recommendations of the President of the University

Dr. Humphrey recommended that three Resolutions be adopted by the Trustees.

1. Resolution to Ratify Faculty/Staff Appointments

After a motion which was made by Dr. Perry and seconded by Mrs. DeLuca had received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson declared the following Resolution duly adopted:

WHEREAS, the <u>Policies of the Board of Trustees</u> direct the President to appoint such employees as are necessary to effectively carry out the operation of the University; and

YR 1990-30

WHEREAS, new appointments have been made subsequent to the December 15, 1989 regular meeting of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, such appointments are in accordance with the 1989-90 Budget and with the University policy on Equal Employment Opportunity;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby ratify and confirm the appointments as listed in Exhibit A attached hereto.

2. Resolution Accepting Gifts

After a motion which was made by Mr. O'Connell and seconded by Mrs. DeLuca had received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson, after expressing her thanks to all contributors, declared the following Resolution duly adopted:

WHEREAS, Resolution 1980-34 provides that the President shall compile a list of gifts to the University for each meeting of the Board of Trustees and present the list accompanied by his recommendation for action by the Board; and

YR 1990-31

WHEREAS, the President has reported that the gifts as listed in Exhibit B attached hereto are being held pending acceptance, and he recommends their acceptance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby accept these gifts on behalf of Youngstown State University and instructs the President to acknowledge such acceptance to the donors and to express our gratitude for their generosity to the University.

3. Resolution on Early Admission

Dr. Humphrey explained that this would normally go through the Academic Affairs Committee but did not arrive in time to be included on the Committee's agenda.

Dr. Gillis then explained that this Resolution is the result of Post-secondary enrollment provisions of Senate Bill 140 which provides an opportunity for eleventh and twelfth grade high school students to attend post-secondary institutions.

Dr. Humphrey continued, explaining that a great deal of work has been done on this, and that our Enrollment Management staff has met with the superintendents of area high schools and others as appropriate to formulate the program.

After a motion which was made by Mrs. DeLuca and seconded by Mr. O'Connell had received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson declared the following Resolution duly adopted:

WHEREAS, the Article VIII, Section 1 of the Board of Trustees Policies calls for recommendations concerning rules and regulations governing the requirements for admission be referred to the Board after review and recommendation by the Academic Senate, the Provost and the President; and

YR 1990-32

WHEREAS, it is necessary to comply with the spirit and and intent of the Post-secondary Enrollment provisions of Senate Bill 140; and

WHEREAS, a Post-secondary Enrollment Program has been formulated after broad consultation with school superintendents, deans, administrators, and other State universities, and it is has been shared with the University Academic Senate and bears the recommendation of the Provost and the President;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve of the new Post-secondary Enrollment Program shown as Exhibit C

which provides additional opportunities for eleventh and twelfth grade high school students to attend Youngstown State University, subject to review after one year's experience.

ITEM IV - Report of the President of the University

1. <u>Dr. Gillis, Provost, reported concerning the following matters.</u>

a. Program Reaccreditation

Continuing accreditation to the Respiratory Therapist program in the College of Applied Science and Technology was awarded for a period of five years.

b. Spring Commencement Speaker

The spring commencement speaker will be Mr. Warren P. Williamson, Jr. who has also been selected to receive the YSU Alumni Distinguished Citizen Award for 1990. Mr. Williams will be awarded an honorary doctorate degree at the commencement ceremonies June 16, 1990.

c. Policy on Scientific Misconduct

Such a policy is required by federal granting agencies before grant funds can be released. The Academic Affairs Committee will present a resolution to effect such a policy.

d. Monus Professor of Entrepreneurship Status

A national search is still in process for the position Professorship in Entrepreneurship.

e. University Research External Funding

There has been a dramatic increase in the amount of monies requested through grants from external funding agencies. The number of grants funded, however, has remained constant.

f. Ohio Infrastructure Institute

YSU has recently joined this institute which is formed of engineering deans throughout Ohio. Its purpose is to aid the State in solving its problems with highways, bridges, sewers, etc.

g. Proposal for a Ph.D. Degree Program in Chemistry

The Academic Affairs Committee of the Board of Trustees has approved the Phase I planning proposal which was advanced by the Department of Chemistry.

h. Sabbatical and Faculty Improvement Leaves

As provided in the YSU/YSU-OEA <u>Agreement</u>, a number of faculty have been granted sabbaticals and faculty improvement leaves beginning in September, 1990.

I. Faculty Publications and Honors

A book entitled "Teaching Team Sports - A Coeducational Approach", written by Dr. Joan Philipp, Department of Health and Physical Education and Jerry Wilkerson, has been published.

The book "Reading and Writing Women's Lives: A study of the Novel of Manners", was edited by Dr. Bege Bowers and Dr. Barbara Brothers of the English Department.

A book entitled "Sfocial Psychology Readings: A Century of Research", written by Dr. Steven L. Ellyson of the Department of Psychology and Amy C. Halberstadt of North Carolina State University, has been published.

The Ohio Outstanding English Language Arts Educator Award was presented to Dr. Gratia Murphy of the English Department on March 3, 1990.

2. Mr. Salata, Executive Director of Facilities, reported on the following matters:

- a. McDonough Museum--preparation for the demolition of the motel is now underway.
- b. Housing Projects--construction on the Weller house and the Lyden house is progressing. Electrical work on the Lyden House is 95% complete; brick has been selected. Occupancy for both dorms is still planned for this Fall.

3. <u>Dr. McBriarty, Vice President--Student Services, reported</u> on the following:

Dr. McBriarty made note of the brochures concerning the residence hall and a report on Student Retention that were made available to the Trustees. He then summarized in detail his report on Student Retention.

ITEM V - Reports of the Committees of the Board

1. Personnel Relations

Mr. McLaughlin recommended adoption of the following Resolution:

a. Resolution to Ratify Administrative Leave of Absence

WHEREAS, it was necessary in January, 1990, to direct the YR 1990-33 absence of a classified civil service employee in the Bursar's Office, pending review of specific fiscal records; and

WHEREAS, the University administration mandated the individual's absence on "Administrative Leave With Pay" because there was no other means available to accomplish the immediate removal of the employee from her presence on campus;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees, that this leave of absence be and is hereby ratified for the period January 22, 1990, at 8:00 a.m. through February 7, 1990, at 9:00 a.m.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Lyden and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

2. Building and Property Committee

Mr. Flask reported that the Committee had three Resolutions for Board consideration. He then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

a. Resolution to Authorize Land Appropriation Procedure

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University adopted a long range Facility Master Plan on June 7, 1985; and

YR 1990-34

WHEREAS, the Facility Master Plan was developed to project land and facility needs over the next decade, and to allow the University to meet its mission objectives by completing a physical environment which is aesthetically pleasing, responsive to the University's changing functional needs, and efficient and cost-effective in its operation; and

WHEREAS, the Facility Master Plan, as a dynamic document has from time to time been modifed by Board resolution to reflect evolving changes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has authorized the administration to negotiate the purchase of certain parcels of real estate, located within the realm of approved University development, on willing-buyer basis at the property's appraised value; and

WHEREAS, although negotiations for the purchase of City Lot 4666 located on Arlington Street, and City Lot

10343 located on Custer Street, both within the real of approved University development, were completed; the owners failed to finalize the sale by closing; and

WHEREAS, negotiations for the purchase of the south part of City Lot 1005 (part 398 and 399) located on Fifth Avenue, within the realm of approved University development, will by March 31, 1990, have resulted in a negotiated purchase agreement or a conclusion that negotiations are at an impasse;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize the administration to request the Ohio Department of Administrative Services to appropriate the above enumerated City lots located in the City of Youngstown, County of Mahoning, State of Ohio.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell and received the affirmative vote of the Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. Flask then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

b. Resolution to Authorize Land Appropriation Procedure

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University adopted a long range Facility Master Plan on June 7, 1985; and

YR 1990-35

WHEREAS, the Facility Master Plan was developed to project land and facility needs over the next decade, and to allow the University to meet its mission objectives by completing a physical environment which is aesthetically pleasing, responsive to the University's changing functional needs, and efficient and cost-effective in its operation; and

WHEREAS, the Facility Master Plan, as a dynamic document has from time to time been modified by Board resolution to reflect evolving changes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has authorized the administration to negotiate the purchase of certain parcels of real estate, located within the realm of approved University development, on a willing-seller, willing-buyer basis at the property's appraised value; and

WHEREAS, although negotiations for the purchase of City Lot 36322 located on 805 N. Walnut Street, and City Lot 1429 located on 614 Audubon Street, both within the realm of approved University development,

were completed; the owners failed to finalize the sale by closing;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize the administration to request the Ohio Department of Administrative Services to appropriate the above enumerated City lots located in the City of Youngstown, County of Mahoning, State of Ohio.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. Flask then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

c. <u>Resolution to Modify</u> Facilities Rental Fees

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University recognizes that under generally accepted business practices, volume purchasers of goods or services qualify for discounts on those purchases;

YR 1990-36

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby modify the University's facilities rental fees schedule to provide for a multiple user fee in accordance with the revised Section 6.3.10 of the Youngstown State University Administrative Manual, attached as Exhibit D.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

3. Budget and Finance Committee

Dr. Geletka reported that the Committee was recommending two Resolutions for adoption by the Board of Trustees. He then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

a. Resolution to Transfer Funds From the Unallocated Reserve, Educational and Associated Operations Fund

WHEREAS, the FY 1989-90 budget document adopted by the Board of Trustees requires the approval of the Board of Trustees for all transfers from the Unallocated Reserve, Educational and Associated Operations, (Fund One); and

YR 1990-37

WHEREAS, the collective bargaining Agreement between YSU and YSU/OEA provides for additional faculty staffing in

the Dana School of Music; and

WHEREAS, the appropriate University officers have reviewed the operations of the Electronic Maintenance Services and have determined that there is a need for additional staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize and direct the transfer of \$56,253 from the Unallocated Reserve, Educational and Associated Operations Fund as follows:

\$42,668 to the Instructional and Departmental Research Reserve for overload payments and limited service faculty in the Dana School of Music; and

\$13,585 to the Electronics Maintenance Services department for compensation for a one-half time clerical person and a one-half time electronics technician.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson then declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Geletka then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

b. Resolution Concerning Tuition and Other Student Fees and Charges

WHEREAS, Ohio law provides that Boards of Trustees of state-assisted institutions of higher education shall supplement state subsidies by income from charges to students, including an "instructional fee" for educational and associated operational support of the institution and a "general fee" for noninstructional services, and that these two fees shall encompass all charges for services assessed

uniformly to all enrolled students and shall be identified as "tuition"; and

WHEREAS, the law also provides that each Board may establish special purpose fees, service charges, and fines, and that a tuition surcharge shall be paid by all students who are not residents of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, the current appropriation act for higher education provides that the University shall separately identify the Instructional Fee, the General Fee, the Tuition Charge, and the Tuition Surcharge which shall be paid by all students who are not residents of Ohio; and

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WHEREAS, the Ohio General Assembly uses an assumption as to what the Instructional Fee will be at each instructional level in order to subtract proceeds of that assumed fee from the appropriations that would otherwise be needed as generated by the formula as applied to each university; and

WHEREAS, the Instructional Fee for all undergraduate programs at YSU in 1989-90 was \$1,530 for the academic year but the appropriations bill (Amended Substitute Bill 111) assumed an Instructional Fee of \$2,094 for all undergraduate programs used by YSU, except Technical I and III which were assumed to be \$2,044; and

WHEREAS, the Instructional Fee assumption used by the Ohio General Assembly in its 1990-91 formula is \$2,203 for all undergraduate instructional programs except Technical I and III which were assumed to be \$2,153; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio General Assembly enacted legislation which limits 1990-91 Instructional Fee increases to \$120 or 6 percent for the academic year of three quarters; and

WHEREAS, an increase of \$120 per academic year results in an Instructional Fee of \$550 per quarter or \$1,650 per academic year, and it is noted that this amount is \$553 or 25.1 percent less than the amount assumed by the General Assembly in the formula for determining the appropriation for YSU;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby declare the "tuition charge" shall be the sum of the Instructional Fee and the General Fee and does hereby establish the tuition, fees, fines and other charges included in Exhibit E to become effective Summer Term, 1990, and to remain in effect until changed by the Board of Trustees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President of Youngstown State University or his designee shall have the authority to approve:

1. fees of noncredit courses, institutes, and workshops offered or coordinated through the Department of Continuing Education;

- ticket prices for admission of the public to intercollegiate athletic games and to student music or dramatic productions;
- service charges for loans to students;
- 4. charges for use of University facilities by non-University groups or organizations;
- 5. special fees for 1) a "Mall Management Institute";
 2) International student training programs under contract; 3) an "Executive Sequence--Masters of Business Administration" program. It shall be understood that such special fees, if authorized, shall provide for all related costs of the program, and that the budget for such programs shall be subject to approval in the same manner as are other University budgets; and
- 6. expenditure of funds that may be granted by the Ohio Board of Regents under the Selective Excellence programs.

In all cases, the revenue generated by such fees and charges shall be expended in conformity with appropriately approved budgets. It shall be understood that: (a) prices of books and other items for sale in the Bookstore, Kilcawley Center, and through vending machines shall be established in conformity with good business practices by the managers of those units; (b) charges for unreturned or damaged equipment checked out to a student shall be established by the cognizant department head to cover the depreciated value of the equipment and the processing cost; (c) for such charges as noted in (a) and (b) above, the approval of neither the President nor the Board of Trustees shall be required; and (d) the President or his designees shall have the authority to designate parking facilities by location or by time which may be utilized either without charge or for a reduced charge.

Fines which are authorized in this Resolution may be assessed against nonstudents who are authorized to use University services as well as against students; and, the rates detailed in this Resolution shall replace the rates adopted in Resolution YR 1989-64 and in any other Resolution in conflict, and it shall continue to be the policy of this Board to review and adopt all fees, service charges, and fines annually, usually in the spring, in order that students and others are informed as to rates for the coming year and budgets may be finalized.

It is understood that charges, fines, penalties, and assessments to students and nonstudents will not be waived except as specifically authorized by proper authority.

If a student is permitted to withdraw from the University or if a student reduces his or her academic lead, a refund of the tuition i.e., the noninstructional fee and the general fee), of the nonresident tuition surcharge, and the performance music fee, where applicable, shall be made in conformity with the following schedule; however, for those withdrawing from the University, the registration withdrawal fee shall be assessed and paid and the student identification card shall be surrendered before the refund is paid.

Dr. Mears stated that there are few changes; namely, a slight increase in tuition (9.4%), with no change in the nonresident surcharge; 13.5% increase in room and board in Kilcawley House and the Lyden House; a decrease in the voluntary lunch plan; and all other special charges, fines, etc. remain the same.

3. Academic Affairs Committee

Mrs. DeLuca reported that the Academic Affairs Committee had three Resolutions to bring before the Board of Trustees for adoption. She then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

a. <u>Resolution Concerning Policy on Scientific Misconduct</u>

WHEREAS, the National Institutes of Health and other Federal granting agencies require that a policy governing scientific misconduct be officially adopted by a university before grant funds can be released to it; and

YR 1990-39

WHEREAS, a proposed policy has been developed and recommended by the Provost and President;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve of the added Section 35 of Article III of the Board of Trustees <u>Policies</u> as shown as Exhibit F which complies with the requirement.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Lyden and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mrs. DeLuca then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

b. Resolution to Ratify Conferral of Honorary Degree

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby ratify the conferral of a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) degree, honoris causa, upon Mr. C. Gilbert James, Jr., with all rights and privileges attendant thereto.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Flask and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mrs. DeLuca then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

a. Resolution Concerning Student Health Services Staffing

WHEREAS, Youngstown State University contracted with the American College Health Association to review the operation of the student health services and recommend improvements; and YR 1990-42

WHEREAS, the recommendations of the American College Health Association consultants have been reviewed with the Student Services Committee of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, the appropriate University officers have reviewed and concur with the recommendations to add a Nurse Practitioner to the full service staff in the Student Health Services office, and to employ a physician for on-campus services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby accept the recommendations of the consultants report and the University's officers regarding the Nurse Practitioner position and the on-campus physician services, and directs the implementation effective with the FY 1990-91 budget.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca and received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Public Services Committee

The Public Services Committee had no report.

6. Athletics Committee

The Athletics Committee had no report.

7. Executive Committee

The Executive Committee had no report.

8. Nominating Committee

Mrs. DeLuca then gave the report of the nominating committee stating that Mrs. Emily Mackall had been nominated as Chairperson of the Board of Trustees and Dr. John Geletka as Vice Chairperson.

The Chairperson asked for other nominations and, there being none, stated that the nominations were closed.

Mrs. DeLuca then read for adoption by the Board of Trustees, the following Resolution:

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SECTION 35. SCIENTIFIC MISCONDUCT

In accordance with the requirements of 42 CFR Part 50, Subpart A. "Responsibilities of Awardee and Applicant Institutions for Dealing With and Reporting Possible Misconduct in Science," the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby establish the following interim policy respecting scientific misconduct:

- Among the basic principles of Youngstown State University are the pursuit of truth and the responsible exercise of academic freedom. From these principles derive such ideals and values as the freedom and openness of inquiry, academic honesty, and integrity in scholarship and teaching. The University affirms and honors the preservation, growth, and flourishing of these values throughout all its activities, including teaching and learning, research, scholarly inquiry, and creative scholarly endeavor. Accordingly, scientific misconduct is inimical to the concept of academic freedom and its responsible exercise. It is from this background that the Board of Trustees implements this policy for handling allegations of misconduct in research.
- "Scientific misconduct" for purposes of this policy means
 (a) fabrication, falsification, plagiarism or other
 practices that violate accepted standards of honesty within
 the academic and scientific communities for proposing,
 conducting, presenting, or reporting the results of research,
 scholarly inquiry, or creative scholarly endeavors;
 (b) material failure to comply with Federal, State, or local
 laws or regulations for protection of researchers, human
 subjects, or the public, or for ensuring the welfare of
 laboratory animals; or (c) failure to comply with other
 material legal requirements governing research.

35.3 Definitions

- (A) "Fabrication" means the creation of nonexistent or fictitious data or results.
- (B) "Falsification" means the manipulation or alteration of data for the creation or reporting of false results.
- (C) "Plagiarism" means representing the words. ideas, or methods of another person as one's own.

- (D) "Other Practices" that violate accepted standards of honesty include but are not limited to:
 - Selective reporting or omission of conflicting data;
 - Gross negligence in collecting or analyzing data;
 - 3) Improper use or release of ideas or data that have been received with the expectation that confidentiality will be preserved in accordance with applicable law;
 - 4) Stealing, destroying, or taking or using without permission the property of others or products or research produced by others, such as data, equipment, supplies, computer programs, notes and records, manuscripts, or specimen collections.

Nothing in these definitions shall be deemed to include honest error, honest omission or oversight, or honest differences in interpretations or judgments of data.

35.4 Regulations

- (A) It is a violation of this policy for any member of the faculty, professional administrative staff, classified staff, individual working under an independent contract for services, or a student to engage in scientific misconduct, to retaliate against anyone making a good faith allegation of misconduct, to obstruct the inquiry into or investigation of allegations of scientific misconduct, or to make other than in good faith allegations of scientific misconduct.
- (B) Except as otherwise required by this policy or by Federal, State, or local law or regulation, it is a violation of this policy for any member of the faculty, administration, classified staff, providing services pursuant to an independent contract, or student body to violate the confidentiality of an proceeding under this policy.

35.5 Procedures

(A) Allegations

- 1) Any person, upon observing or having evidence of suspected scientific misconduct or believing specific actions, activities, or conduct constitutes scientific misconduct (as defined in section 34.2 above) may make an allegation. Such person contemplating making an allegation may, and is encouraged to, first discuss the contemplated allegation in absolute confidence and privacy with the Associate Provost, who will advise the person(s) contemplating the allegation about the appropriate written form for the allegation and the procedures that must be followed under this policy once an allegation is made.
- An allegation of scientific misconduct is not made unless and until it is received in writing by the Associate Provost.

(B) Inquiries

- (1) Upon receiving a formal allegation of scientific misconduct, the Associate Provost will notify the person(s) against whom an allegation is made about the allegation. The person(s) about whom an allegation is made may have at their expense a representative of their choice present during any subsequent proceeding in which they may be asked or required to be involved.
- Upon notifying the person(s) against whom an allegation is made, the Associate Provost will conduct an inquiry in order to determine whether or not an allegation or apparent instance of scientific misconduct warrants an investigation. In conducting this inquiry, the Associate Provost shall be responsible for gathering information and conducting initial fact finding to justify his/her decision about the need for a formal investigation. The Associate Provost is responsible for preparing a written report that states what evidence was reviewed, summarizes interviews conducted, and includes the conclusions of the inquiry. They may respond in writing with comments about any part of the inquiry report within ten (10) days of receipt of the inquiry report, and if they choose to make written comments, those comments shall be made part of the formal inquiry.

- (3) An inquiry must be completed within sixty (60) calendar days of its initiation unless circumstances warrant a longer period. If the inquiry takes longer than sixty (60) days to complete, the record of the inquiry shall include documentation of the reasons for exceeding such period.
- (4) The Associate Provost shall maintain sufficiently detailed documentation of inquiries to permit later assessment of the reasons for determining that an investigation was not warranted. Such records shall be maintained in a secure manner for a period of at least three (3) years after the termination of the inquiry, and shall, upon request, be provided to authorized Federal personnel having a valid reason to review the records.

(C) Investigation

- (1) If the inquiry provides sufficient evidence that an investigation is warranted, the Associate Provost shall commence an investigation within thirty (30) days of the completion of the inquiry.
- (2) The Associate Provost shall appoint an ad hoc committee of not less than three and not more than five tenured University faculty having appropriate substantive expertise to carry out a thorough and authoritative evaluation of the evidence bearing on alleged scientific misconduct. The Associate Provost shall also be responsible for obtaining individuals from outside the University community having appropriate substantive expertise to thoroughly and authoritatively evaluate evidence if such expertise is clearly not present within the University community or if a conflict of interest could arise from using a member of the University community to evaluate the evidence.
- (3) The investigation shall include examination of all documentation, including but not necessarily limited to relevant research data and proposals, laboratory or field notes, manuscripts, publications, correspondence, and memoranda of telephone calls. Whenever possible, interviews should be conducted with not only individuals involved in making the allegation and individuals against whom the allegation is made, but also any other individuals

who might have information regarding key aspects of the allegation. Complete summaries of these interviews should be prepared, provided to the interviewed party for comment and suggested revision, and included as part of the investigation record. Persons being interviewed pursuant to an investigation may have a representative of their choice present to advise them.

- (4) The ad hoc committee shall participate in the interviews of all parties involved in the investigation and shall report its findings concerning evaluation and assessment of the evidence to the Associate Provost in a written report.
- (5) Using all available information, the Associate Provost shall prepare a written report of the investigation, which shall include an assessment of the extent to which the allegation of misconduct is substantiated by the evidence. If an allegation of misconduct is substantiated in whole or in part, the Associate Provost shall include in the written investigation report a recommendation concerning, without limitation, the following matters;
 - (a) Removal from involvement or activity on a particular project;
 - (b) Orderly termination of the entire research project;
 - (c) Suspension of privileges to submit external proposals for research support;
 - (d) Suspension of privileges to submit proposals for University Research Council support;
 - (e) Special monitoring of future work.

The Associate Provost shall provide copies of this report to the individual(s) against whom the allegations are made for comment and to the principal administrative officer of the area in which these individuals are employed. If they can be identified, the persons who raised the allegations should be provided with those portions of the report which address their role and opinions in the investigation. The Associate Provost shall maintain all documentation to substantiate the investigation's findings.

(6) The investigation should be conducted and completed within one-hundred-twenty (120) calendar days of its initiation, including report preparation, review and comment by subjects of the investigation, and submission of the report to required University and Federal officials. If the report cannot be completed within (120) days, and the report must be submitted to a cognizant Federal funding agency, then the Associate Provost shall submit a written request for extension of the (120) days to the cognizant Federal agency that includes an explanation of the delay, an interim progress report on the investigation, and an estimated completion date of the report and other necessary steps.

(D) Resolution

(1) Misconduct

Upon receiving a Scientific Misconduct Investigation Report from the Associate Provost in which the allegation of misconduct is in whole or in part substantiated, the appropriate principal administrative officer shall be responsible for initiating applicable disciplinary proceedings in accordance with Board policy and/or provisions of an applicable collective bargaining agreement as appropriate.

(2) Absence of Misconduct

If the results of the inquiry and/or investigation reveal that allegations of misconduct are not supported, then any party making an allegation or against whom an allegation is made and previously notified about the possibility of misconduct or the need to conduct an investigation should be informed of those findings in writing. In announcing a finding that the allegations are not supported, the Associate Provost should consult with the person(s) who were the subject of the allegations to determine (a) whether the announcement should be a public announcement and (b) what organizations beyond those initially informed should receive the information about the findings of no misconduct as a means to restore, repair, or reassure the reputation of those involved. The Associate Provost should normally be guided by whether or not a public announcement will

be helpful or cause further harm in restoring the reputations of those against whom the allegations were made and should give weight to their views in determining which additional organizations, if any, should be notified.

35.5 Notification to Federal Agencies

- (A) The Associate Provost shall notify the cognizant Federal funding agency if at any time during an inquiry or investigation conducted under this policy it is determined that any of the following conditions exist:
 - (1) There is an immediate health hazard involved;
 - (2) There is an immediate need to protect Federal funds or equipment;
 - (3) There is an immediate need to protect the interests of the person(s) making the allegations or of the individual(s) who is the subject of the allegations as well as his/her co-investigators and associates, if any;
 - (4) It is probable that the alleged incident is going to be reported publicly;
 - (5) There is a reasonable indication of possible criminal violation. In that instance, notification of the cognizant Federal agency must occur within twenty-four (24) hours of obtaining that information.
- (B) When alleged misconduct involves employees or students conducting research supported by Federal agency sponsors, additional agency notification requirements apply, as follows:
 - (1) When, on the basis of an inquiry, it is determined that an investigation is warranted, the Associate Provost shall notify the cognizant Federal funding agency in writing on or before the date the investigation begins that an investigation is being commenced. The notification should inform the cognizant Federal agency at a minimum of the name of the person(s) against whom the allegation(s) have been made, the general nature of the allegation(s), and the Federal grant application(s) or award(s) involved.

(2) The Associate Provost must submit the final report of an investigation to the cognizant Federal funding agency if the investigation concerns research being supported by Federal funds. This report to the cognizant Federal agency must describe the policies and procedures under which the investigation was conducted, how and from whom information relevant to the investigation was obtained, the findings, and the basis for the findings. It must include the actual text or an accurate summary of the views of any individual(s) found to have engaged in misconduct, as well as a description of any sanctions or corrective actions taken by the University.
