MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY

Tod Administration Building Friday, January 17, 1992

Pursuant to Notice duly given, a Regular Meeting (the one hundred and fiftieth) of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University convened at 3:00 P.M., Friday, January 17, 1992, in the Board Room in Tod Administration Building.

Seven Trustees were present at the meeting, to-wit: Dr. Earnest Perry, Mrs. Elizabeth DeLuca, Mr. Martin J. O'Connell, Mr. Richard P. McLaughlin, Mr. Edward A. Flask, Mr. Mark E. Lyden, and Dr. Y. T. Chiu. Absent were Dr. John F. Geletka and Mr. Michael I. Monus. Also present was Student Trustee Scott P. Smith. Student Trustee James Dull was absent.

Also present were Dr. Neil D. Humphrey, President; Dr. Sally M. Hotchkiss, Acting Provost; Dr. Lawrence E. Looby, Vice President - Institutional Advancement; Dr. Charles A. McBriarty, Vice President - Student Services; Ms. Carpenter, Executive Director of Personnel Services; Ms. Shirley A. Mr. Rocco Mr. Richard L. Mediate, Acting Executive Director of Facilities; Glunt, Executive Director of Finance; Mr. James D. Miller, Executive Director of Administrative Services; Dr. G. L. Mears, Executive Director of Budget and Institutional Studies; Mr. Dennis A. Clouse, Director of Classified Personnel; Mr. James E. McCollum, Assistant to the President for Legal Services; and Franklin S. Bennett, Jr., Secretary to the Board of Trustees. Also present were approximately 60 persons, including deans, members of the faculty, students, and members of the news media.

In the absence of Dr. John F. Geletka, Chairperson of the Board, and Mr. Michael I. Monus, Vice Chairperson of the Board, the meeting was called to order by the Secretary to the Board. Thereupon, Mr. McLaughlin moved that Mr. Lyden be elected as Acting Chairperson of the meeting. The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell, and thereafter received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present. Mr. Lyden took the seat of the Chairperson and presided over the meeting.

ITEM I: PROOF OF NOTICE OF MEETING.

Evidence was available to establish that on the 2nd day of January, 1992, the Secretary duly mailed Notice of the Meeting to each of the nine Trustees, the two student Trustees, and to the President. Copies of the Notice were also mailed to the Presidents of the YSU-OEA and YSU-ACE, to the Director of the YSU

Alumni Association, and to Atty. Alan R. Kretzer, Deputy Attorney General and Legal Counsel to the University.

ITEM II: DISPOSITION OF MINUTES FOR MEETINGS HELD OCTOBER 4, 1991, AND OCTOBER 23, 1991.

Copies of the drafts of the Minutes of the Meetings of the Board of Trustees held on October 4, 1991, and October 23, 1991, had been mailed to each Trustee, the two Student Trustees, and to the President. Upon motion made by Mr. O'Connell, seconded by Dr. Chiu, the Board unanimously adopted the Minutes of the Meetings of October 4, 1991, and October 23, 1991, as mailed.

ITEM III: RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

Dr. Humphrey recommended that one Resolution be adopted by the Trustees. After a motion made by Mrs. DeLuca, seconded by Mrs. O'Connell, had received the unanimous vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson declared the following Resolution duly adopted:

Resolution Accepting Gifts

YR 1992-23

WHEREAS, Resolution YR 1980-34 provides that the President shall compile a list of gifts to the University for each meeting of the Board of Trustees and present the list accompanied by his recommendation for action by the Board; and

WHEREAS, the President has reported that the gifts as listed in Exhibit A attached hereto are being held pending acceptance and he recommends their acceptance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby accept these gifts on behalf of Youngstown State University and instructs the President to acknowledge such acceptance to the donors and to express our gratitude for their generosity to the University.

ITEM IV: REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

A. Staff Reports.

Dr. Hotchkiss, Acting Provost, reported on the following matters:

1. Winter Commencement Exercises - March 28, 1992.

Dr. Hotchkiss reported that a Resolution would be recommended by the Academic Affairs Committee authorizing the conferral of an Honorary Degree at the Winter Commencement exercises on March 28, 1992.

2. New Program Status.

- a. Master of Science Degree in Computer Science. Dr. Hotchkiss reported that the Provost's office has submitted for approval by the Ohio Board of Regents (OBOR) a program development plan for a Master of Science degree in Computer Science.
- b. ED.D. Program in Educational Leadership. Dr. Hotchkiss reported that YSU's response documents to comments and criticisms of the Regents Advisory Committee on Graduate Studies (RACGS) institutions were mailed on January 17, 1992.
- c. Change In The Admissions Policy for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Dr. Hotchkiss reported that the President and Provost have approved changes in the admissions policy for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program. The changes in policy were recommended by the Department of Nursing with concurrence of the Dean of the College of Applied Science and Technology.
- d. Reorganization of the College of Applied Science and Technology (CAST). Dr. Hotchkiss provided an historical overview of matters regarding the reorganization of CAST. On June 5, 1991, the University Academic Senate adopted the report entitled "Recommendations Toward a Strategic Plan." The Strategic Plan, filed with the Board of Trustees at its meeting of June 14, 1991, included the following recommendation:

The College of Applied Science and Technology will be restructured to form two new colleges (or schools) each administered by a dean. The college (or schools) will be a College of Health and Human Services and a College of Applied Science and Technology.

Dr. Hotchkiss stated that the Academic Affairs Committee was recommending to the Board a Resolution which would provide the following: (1) the reorganization of the College of Applied Science and Technology into two colleges, effective July 1, 1992, and setting forth the departments of the respective colleges; (2) the appointment of Dr. John J. Yemma as Dean of the College of Health and Human Services, effective July 1, 1992; and (3) that the three departments in the residual College (Business Education and Technology, Criminal Justice, and Engineering Technology) be consulted regarding their recommendation toward a change of name from the College of Applied Science and Technology, and that their

recommendation be returned to the Board of Trustees through the Strategic Planning Committee.

ITEM V - REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. <u>Personnel Relations</u>

Dr. Perry stated that the Personnel Relations Committee was recommending seven Resolutions for adoption by the Board. Dr. Perry stated that six Resolutions would be recommended during the Committee's report, and requested the Chairperson's permission to present the seventh recommended Resolution following the report of the Academic Affairs Committee. There being no objections to Dr. Perry's request, it was granted by the Chairperson. Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Extension of Benefits for Classified Civil Service Employees Excluded from Collective Bargaining

YR 1992-24

WHEREAS, supervisory and confidential classified civil service employees of the University, including Law Enforcement Supervisors (Sergeants), are excluded from collective bargaining and negotiated provisions of ratified Agreements between the University and the classified employee bargaining units; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees wishes to extend the benefits of the YSU-ACE <u>Agreement</u> to excluded full-time and permanent part-time classified staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University that these employees are hereby granted the benefits pertaining to sick leave and vacation leave under Articles 15.3, 15.15C, 15.15D, 15.15E, and Article 17.1 of the Agreement;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all compensatory time not taken as of December 31 of each year be paid off to the accruing employee at the employee's current rate of pay established by Article 12.1 of said <u>Agreement</u> also be extended;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all full-time excluded classified civil service employees be

granted sick leave bonus identical to the benefit established by Article 17.8 of said Agreement;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all excluded classified civil service staff be granted comprehensive health and life insurance coverage identical to those provided in Article 22 of the YSU YSU-ACE Agreement.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Chiu, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Fee Remission

YR 1992-25

WHEREAS, the University provides financial assistance, through the form of remission of general and/or instructional fees, to employees and former employees on retirement who enroll as students of the University; and

WHEREAS, employees, together with their spouses and dependent children, are also granted fee remission for Continuing Education Courses,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby extend these benefits to those employees who hold permanent or contract positions that have an annual FTE of .5 or greater and who are excluded from collective bargaining;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby amend Sections 2.6 and 4 of Article VII of the Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, as included in Exhibit C.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Retirement

YR 1992-26

WHEREAS, University policy provides that "All full-service employees shall be eligible for participation in the various University retirement programs permitted by law."; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio General Assembly enacted and the Governor signed into law House Bill 382, which requires participation of virtually all employees, part-time or otherwise, in one of the state retirement systems; and

WHEREAS, the University as a public institution is covered by this law,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby amend Section 4 of Article III, Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, as included in Exhibit D.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Terms and Conditions of Employment for Certain Professional/Administrative Positions

YR 1992-27

WHEREAS, it is deemed advisable to modify employment conditions and terms of contracts for certain professional/administrative positions in order to improve the University's ability to attract and retain highly qualified persons.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby amend Sections 17.3 and 17.4 of Article III, Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, as included in Exhibit E.

(Dr. Perry stated, as part of his motion, that the Exhibit E which had been distributed to the Trustees prior to the meeting shall be amended to delete the last sentence of paragraph 17.3A., and paragraph 17.3D in its entirety).

The motion on the Resolution and amended Exhibit E was seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Resolution Concerning Early Retirement Incentive Program

YR 1992-28

WHEREAS, the 1991-93 Agreement between the University and the YSU-OEA provides that, in accordance with the provisions of Ohio Revised Code Section 3307.35, the administration shall implement an "Early Retirement Incentive Program" (ERIP) for calendar year 1992; and

WHEREAS, eligible faculty and staff include those contributing members of the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) who are age 50 or older on or before June 30, 1992, and who are eligible for STRS service retirement under ORC Sec. 3307.38, or who will become eligible for STRS service retirement under that section as a result of receiving additional service credit under the ERIP; and

WHEREAS, the University is obligated by the Agreement and in conformity with state law, to provide ERIP benefits by purchase of one-fifth of the individual participant's total accumulated service credit up to a maximum of five years of additional service credit (rounded down to the next whole number) for a number of faculty or staff equal to five percent of the total number of University employees who are STRS members on January 1, 1992; and

WHEREAS, that resulting number of participants under the formula equals 50, and 53 faculty and staff applied;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve and direct that the ERIP benefit for 1992 be extended to include the other three eligible faculty and staff who applied.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning a Personnel Contract

YR 1992-29

RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University that the contract for James Tressel as Head Football Coach be extended to June 30, 2000, and that upon the retirement of Joseph F. Malmisur, or on July 1, 1995, whichever is first, James Tressel shall also be designated Executive Director of Athletics and shall hold both positions simultaneously.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that whereas Coach Tressel's current contract is for the period February 1, 1991, through January 30, 1992, and he has to date received no increase in salary over 1990-91 pending determination of other personnel increases, the Board of Trustees directs that he shall receive a 2 per cent increase for his 1991-92 contract, or a salary of \$66,300, and a 3 percent increase for his 1992-93 contract, or a salary of \$68,289.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Chiu, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

2. Building and Property

Mr. Flask stated that the Building and Property Committee was recommending three Resolutions for adoption by the Board. Mr. Flask then read and moved the following Resolution:

Resolution to Name a Building

YR 1992-30

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby direct that the University buildings in the city block bounded by Rayen Avenue, Elm Street, Wood Street, and Fifth Avenue which include offices, shops, and storage for the University's facilities and grounds maintenance operations shall be named THE SALATA FACILITIES COMPLEX in honor of Edmund J. Salata who served the University so effectively as Executive Director of Facilities until his untimely death October 15, 1991.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Chiu, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. Flask then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Agreement with City of Youngstown

YR 1992-31

WHEREAS, the University wishes to perform police functions on the city streets of Spring Street east of Elm Street to Wick Oval (inclusive), Bryson Street from Spring Street north to the deadend, and Elm Street north to Eastbound Service Road, where these streets are within or adjacent to University boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.041 authorizes the Board of Trustees of a state university and a municipal corporation to enter into an agreement to allow the University to perform such police functions on behalf of the municipal corporation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Youngstown and Youngstown State University have previously been parties to such an agreement and the City has by Ordinance Number 91-766 adopted December 4, 1991, authorized such an agreement for the period December 16, 1991 through December 16, 1995.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve the <u>Agreement</u> attached as Exhibit F and directs President Humphrey to sign it on behalf of the University.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. Flask then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Demolition of Eagles/DeMichaels Properties

YR 1992-32

WHEREAS, the City of Youngstown has agreed to purchase the Eagles Building; and

WHEREAS, the University and the City of Youngstown have agreed to share in the demolition of the Eagles/DeMichaels properties; and

WHEREAS, the University will purchase the two lots (1833 and 3387) north of the Eagles Building fronting on Fifth Avenue and transfer to the City the area required for the widening of Fifth Avenue.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve and authorize the administration to enter into a final agreement attached hereto as Exhibit G with the City to complete the project.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

3. Budget and Finance Committee

Mr. O'Connell stated that the Budget and Finance Committee was recommending four Resolutions for adoption by the Board. He then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution to Establish a Provost Recruitment Account

YR 1992-33

WHEREAS, the FY 1991-92 budget document adopted by the Board of Trustees requires that all transfers from the Educational and Associated Operations Fund (Fund One) shall be approved by the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, certain expenses will be necessary in the recruitment of a Provost which were not budgeted for in the FY 1991-92 budget as initially adopted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees does hereby approve and direct the transfer of \$10,000 from the Unallocated Reserve, Educational and Associated Operations Fund to the Provost Search Account as shown on the attached Exhibit H.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Flask, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. O'Connell then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution to Authorize an Interfund Loan to the Center for Quality and Productivity

YR 1992-34

WHEREAS, the Ohio Board of Regents funding for the Center for Quality and Productivity has been assured, but has been delayed; and

WHEREAS, the Center for Quality and Productivity has established programs to assist in the enhancement of efficiency of area businesses.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees does hereby authorize and direct

an interfund loan of \$18,310 from the Continuing Education Contingency Reserve to the Center for Quality and Productivity; and

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees directs that the repayment of the loan shall be the first priority on receipt of the Ohio Board of Regents grant.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Flask, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. O'Connell then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution to Authorize Transfer from Educational and Associated Operations Unallocated Reserve

YR 1992-35

WHEREAS, the FY 1991-92 budget adopted by the Board of Trustees requires the prior approval of the Board of Trustees for all transfers from the Educational and Associated Operations (Fund One) Unallocated Reserve; and

WHEREAS, the appointment of an Acting Dean for the College of Arts and Sciences causes additional expenses to be incurred which are, however, off-set by a reduction in the payment of the Dean's compensation which automatically transfers each month to the Unallocated Reserve.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees does hereby approve and direct the transfer of \$25,388 from the Educational and Associated Operations Fund Unallocated Reserve to the Office of the Dean, College of Arts and Sciences for the purposes enumerated on the attached Exhibit I.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Flask, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Mr. O'Connell then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning State Instructional Subsidy Reduction

YR 1992-36

WHEREAS, Governor Voinovich has found it necessary to order a rescission of four percent in the 1991-92 state instructional subsidy for higher education institutions in Ohio and this results in a \$1,731,127 reduction to Youngstown State University.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby order the combination of reductions in budget credits and non-mandatory transfers to Fund One as recommended by President Humphrey, as described in Exhibit J.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Flask, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

4. Academic Affairs

Dr. Perry reported that the Academic Affairs Committee was recommending three Resolutions for adoption by the Board. He then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution to Authorize Conferral of Honorary Degree

YR 1992-37

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize the conferral of a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) degree, honoriscausa, upon Dr. Bernard J. Yozwiak, with all the rights and privileges attendant thereto.

The motion was seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution Concerning Reorganization of a College

WHEREAS, the Academic Senate has recommended that the existing College of Applied Science and Technology be reorganized into two colleges; and

WHEREAS, the University administration concurs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve the establishment of a College of Health and Human Services effective July 1, 1992, and such college shall include three departments: (1) Allied Health, (2) Home Economics, and (3) Nursing and amends Section 1, Article II, of the Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University as included in Exhibit K.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees approves of the continuation of the College of Applied Science and Technology which includes three departments: (1) Business Education and Technology, (2) Criminal Justice, and (3) Engineering Technology.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees directs the administration to consult with the faculty of the three departments included in the College of Applied Science and Technology as to their recommendation concerning the name of the College and report their advice back to the Board through the Strategic Planning Committee.

The motion was seconded by Mr. McLaughlin. The Chairperson then recognized Mrs. DeLuca who spoke to the motion. Mrs. DeLuca stated that she had the utmost respect for the Academic Senate and that she supported the concept of the proposed reorganization of the College of Applied Science and Technology. Mrs. DeLuca questioned the justification of the additional expense which the reorganization would create in light of current state subsidy cutbacks and flat enrollment statistics.

Thereupon, Mrs. DeLuca moved to lay the motion under consideration on the table, which motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell. The Chairperson called for a voice vote on the motion to lay on the table. The motion to lay on the table carried unanimously, and the Chairperson declared the motion on the Resolution Concerning Reorganization of a College tabled.

Dr. Perry then read and moved for adoption the following Resolution:

Resolution to Amend Provost Position Description

YR 1992-38

WHEREAS, Section 3, Article I, of the <u>Policies</u> of the board of <u>Trustees of Youngstown State</u> <u>University</u> designates the Provost as the liaison officer to the Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine; and

WHEREAS, it is considered advisable that this designation be made by the President based upon the educational background, experience, interest, and availability of the University's top staff.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the <u>Policies</u> are hereby amended effective January 1, 1992, as included in Exhibit L.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

Upon Dr. Perry's request, the Chairperson recognized Dr. Perry who read and moved the following Resolution from the Academic Affairs Committee:

Resolution to Ratify Faculty/Staff Appointments

YR 1992-39

WHEREAS, the <u>Policies of the Board of Trustees</u> direct the President to appoint such employees as are necessary to effectively carry out the operation of the University; and

WHEREAS, new appointments have been made subsequent to the October 4, 1991 special meeting of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, such appointments are in accordance with the 1990-91 Budget and with the University policy on Equal Employment Opportunity;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University

does hereby ratify and confirm the appointments as listed in Exhibit B attached hereto.

(Dr. Perry stated, as part of his motion, that in light of the Board's action to table the preceding Resolution Concerning Reorganization of a College, the Exhibit B which had been distributed to the Trustees prior to the meeting shall be amended to delete the reference therein to the appointment of a Dean of the College of Health and Human Services).

The motion on the Resolution and amended Exhibit B was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

5. Student Services

Mrs. DeLuca stated that the Student Services Committee was recommending one Resolution for adoption by the Board. She then read and moved the following Resolution:

Resolution to Amend Alcoholic Beverage Policy

YR 1992-40

WHEREAS, the McDonough Museum of Art building was recently completed; and

WHEREAS, the Dean of Fine and Performing Arts has indicated that the facility has attracted community interest, and he has received inquiries about events scheduled in the facility; and

WHEREAS, the Dean has recommended that the utilization of the facility would be enhanced if wine and/or liquor were permitted to be served during designated programs held in the facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Section 6, Article IX of the <u>Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University</u> be revised as appended at Exhibit M.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'Connell, and after discussion received the affirmative vote of all Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

6. Public Services

Mr. McLaughlin stated that the Public Services Committee had no report.

7. Athletics Committee

Mr. Lyden stated that although the Athletics Committee had no formal report or recommended Resolutions, he wished to move the following Resolution:

YR 1992-41

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University extends its congratulations and commendations to the players, Football Coach James Tressel, and all of the coaches and staff of the Youngstown State University Football Team for their achievements in winning the 1991 NCAA Division I-AA National Championship.

Mr. Lyden's motion was seconded by Mrs. DeLuca, and upon discussion received the affirmative vote of all of the Trustees present. The Chairperson declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted.

8. Executive Committee

Dr. Perry stated that the Executive Committee had no report.

ITEM VI - COMMUNICATIONS, MEMORIALS

There were no communications or memorials considered by the Board.

ITEM VII - UNFINISHED BUSINESS

There was no unfinished business considered by the Board.

ITEM VIII - NEW BUSINESS

There was no new business considered by the Board.

ITEM IX - TIME AND PLACE OF NEXT REGULAR MEETING

Upon motion made by Dr. Perry, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, which received the affirmative vote of each Trustee present, the Chairperson declared the following Resolution adopted:

RESOLVED, that the next regular meetings of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University be held in the Board Room in Tod Administration Building at 3:00 P.M., on Friday, March 27, 1992, and at 3:00 P.M., on Friday, June 26, 1992.

ITEM X - ADJOURNMENT

Upon motion made and seconded, the meeting was duly adjourned by unanimous vote of the Trustees at approximately 4:05 P.M.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING EXTENSION OF BENEFITS FOR CLASSIFIED CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES EXCLUDED FROM COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

WHEREAS, supervisory and confidential classified civil service employees of the University, including Law Enforcement Supervisors (Sergeants), are excluded from collective bargaining and negotiated provisions of ratified Agreements between the University and the classified employee bargaining units; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees wishes to extend the benefits of the YSU-ACE <u>Agreement</u> to excluded full-time and permanent part-time classified staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University that these employees are hereby granted the benefits pertaining to sick leave and vacation leave under Articles 15.3, 15.15C, 15.15D, 15.15E, and Article 17.1 of the <u>Agreement</u>;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all compensatory time not taken as of December 31 of each year be paid off to the accruing employee at the employee's current rate of pay established by Article 12.1 of said <u>Agreement</u> also be extended;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all full-time excluded classified civil service employees be granted sick leave bonus identical to the benefit established by Article 17.8 of said <u>Agreement</u>;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all excluded classified civil service staff be granted comprehensive health and life insurance coverage identical to those provided in Article 22 of the YSU YSU-ACE Agreement.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING FEE REMISSION

WHEREAS, the University provides financial assistance, through the form of remission of general and/or instructional fees, to employees and former employees on retirement who enroll as students of the University; and

WHEREAS, employees, together with their spouses and dependent children, are also granted fee remission for Continuing Education Courses,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby extend these benefits to those employees who hold permanent or contract positions that have an annual FTE of .5 or greater and who are excluded from collective bargaining;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby amend Sections 2.6 and 4 of Article VIII of the Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, as included in Exhibit <u>C</u>.

ARTICLE VIII

Section 2. Rules for Assessing Tuition and Fee

2.6 Full-service employees and former employees on retirement status are themselves eligible to enroll as students and to receive remission of the instructional fees and the non-resident tuition surcharge for such courses, provided that the time such courses are taken shall not interfere with the normal working hours of the employed individual. For all full-time classified Civil Service employees who are not members of a recognized collective bargaining unit AND HOLD PERMANENT PART-TIME POSITIONS OF .5 OR GREATER, the University shall extend the maximum fee remission granted under any bargaining Agreement covering classified Civil Service employees at the University. For unclassified administrative staff, remission of the instructional and general fees shall be granted for up to six (6) credit hours during any quarter. These individuals may take additional credit hours per quarter if they pay the appropriate fees. Limitedservice faculty are eligible for remission of the instructional fee in accordance with the provisions of Article III of the Policies of the Board of Trustees.

Part-time professional/administrative staff members shall be eligible for remission of 50% of the University's instructional fee for up to eight (8) quarter hours during any academic year provided that the time such courses are taken shall not interfere with the normal working hours of the employed individual.

Section 4. Fee Remission for Continuing Education Courses

Members of the full-time staff who are excluded from collective bargaining AND WHO HOLD POSITIONS THAT HAVE AN FTE OF .5 OR GREATER, together with their spouses and dependent children, shall be entitled to fee remission once annually for a course offered by the Department of Continuing Education. Fee remission shall not apply to materials charges, facilities charges, or other non-instructional charges, and shall be provided when spaces are available above the minimum paid enrollment level identified by the Department of Continuing Education to permit offering the course. CLASSIFIED CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES, TOGETHER WITH THEIR SPOUSES AND DEPENDENT CHILDREN, SHALL BE ENTITLED TO FEE REMISSION TWICE ANNUALLY.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING RETIREMENT

WHEREAS, University policy provides that "All full-service employees shall be eligible for participation in the various University retirement programs permitted by law."; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio General Assembly enacted and the Governor signed into law House Bill 382, which requires participation of virtually all employees, part-time or otherwise, in one of the state retirement systems; and

WHEREAS, the University as a public institution is covered by this law,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby amend Section 4 of Article III, Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, as included in Exhibit __D.

ARTICLE III

Section 4. Retirement

4.1 Retirement Allowances, Pensions, Insurance Benefits

All full service employees, PART-TIME OR OTHERWISE, shall be eligible for participation PARTICIPATE in the various University retirement programs STATE RETIREMENT SYSTEMS, AS REQUIRED BY LAW. ELIGIBLE STUDENTS WHO FILE A REQUEST FOR OPTIONAL EXEMPTION AS A STUDENT (F-3) ARE EXEMPT FROM THIS POLICY.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT FOR CERTAIN PROFESSIONAL/ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

WHEREAS, it is deemed advisable to modify employment conditions and terms of contracts for certain professional/administrative positions in order to improve the University's ability to attract and retain highly qualified persons.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby amend Sections 17.3 and 17.4 of Article III, <u>Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University</u>, as included in Exhibit \underline{E} .

Article III. Personnel

17.3 Eligibility for Multiple-Year Contracts

- New professional administrative staff members hired from outside the University are not eligible for earned faculty rank or tenure EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION. In lieu thereof, persons appointed as vice president, provost, associate or assistant vice president, academic dean, associate or assistant academic dean, and others as approved by the Board of Trustees, shall MAY receive three-year contracts of employment, renewable at two-year or three-year intervals, following performance evaluation and review. Full-time Head Athletic Coaches shall receive initial contracts of three-year duration, and thereafter, following performance review and evaluation, shall receive contracts with term length as determined by the Board of Trustees.
- B. THE PRESIDENT, PROVOST, VICE PRESIDENTS, ASSOCIATE AND ASSISTANT VICE PRESIDENTS, DEANS, ASSOCIATE AND ASSISTANT DEANS SHALL BE APPOINTED WITH EARNED FACULTY RANK APPROPRIATE TO THEIR EXPERIENCE AND POSITION, WITH TENURE UPON INITIAL APPOINTMENT, OR DESIGNATED AS ELIGIBLE FOR TENURE UPON REAPPOINTMENT AFTER THREE YEARS OF SERVICE, AS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES. IF APPOINTMENT OR REAPPOINTMENT IS TO BE WITH TENURE THE ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT IN WHICH TENURE IS TO RESIDE AND THE COGNIZANT DEAN SHALL RECEIVE A CURRICULUM VITAE OF THE PERSON OR PERSONS BEING CONSIDERED AND SHALL BE PROVIDED AN OPPORTUNITY TO COMMENT IN WRITING ON THE COMPATIBILITY OF THE APPOINTMENT WITH THE PRESENT OR FUTURE NEEDS OF THE DEPARTMENT; HOWEVER, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL NOT HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO VETO A PROPOSED APPOINTMENT.
- C. VICE PRESIDENTS, DEANS, AND ASSISTANT DEANS WHOSE MULTIPLE YEAR CONTRACTS EXPIRE JUNE 30, 1992, OR JUNE 30, 1993, SHALL BE CONSIDERED PRIOR TO THAT DATE FOR APPOINTMENT WITH EARNED RANK AND TENURE IN CONFORMITY WITH THE PROCEDURE IN 17.3 B.
- D. EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORTING DIRECTLY TO THE PRESIDENT AS IDENTIFIED ONTHE CURRENT ORGANIZATION CHART APPROVED ANNUALLY BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
 SHALL RECEIVE THREE-YEAR CONTRACTS OF EMPLOYMENT, RENEWABLE AT TWO-YEAROR THREE-YEAR INTERVALS, FOLLOWING PERFORMANCE EVALUATION BY THE
 PRESIDENT AND REVIEW BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OR THE BOARD'S PERSONNEL
 RELATIONS COMMITTEE:
- E. FULL-TIME HEAD ATHLETIC COACHES SHALL RECEIVE INITIAL CONTRACTS OF THREE-YEAR DURATION; THEREAFTER, FOLLOWING PERFORMANCE EVALUATION BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS AND THE PRESIDENT AND REVIEW BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OR THE BOARD'S ATHLETIC COMMITTEE, HEAD ATHLETIC COACHES SHALL RECEIVE CONTRACTS WITH TERM LENGTH DETERMINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES. ASSISTANT COACHES SHALL RECEIVE CONTRACTS OF UP TO ONE-YEAR UPON RECOMMENDATION OF THE HEAD COACH AND THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS AND APPROVAL BY THE PRESIDENT.

17.4 Relinquishment of Tenure

University faculty members with earned rank and tenure eligibility who accept appointments to professional administrative positions OTHER THAN PRESIDENT, PROVOST, VICE PRESIDENT, ASSOCIATE AND ASSISTANT VICE PRESIDENT, DEANS, ASSOCIATE AND ASSISTANT DEANS shall have a grace period in which to decide if they wish to remain in their professional administrative positions or if they wish to revert to regular faculty status in the academic department in which they held earned faculty rank. For faculty appointed to an academic deanship, the grace period shall be two (2) years from the effective date of the appointment as dean for faculty appointed to other administrative positions OTHER THAN THOSE LISTED ABOVE, the grace period shall be one year from the effective date of the appointment. During the grace period, the individual may be returned to faculty status without prejudice at his or her request or at the request of his or her administrative superior. If, at the end of the grace period, the individual chooses to remain in the administrative position, he or she shall as a condition of reappointment to the administrative position relinquish earned faculty rank and tenure or eligibility for tenure.

Resolution Concerning Early Retirement Incentive Program

WHEREAS, the 1991-93 Agreement between the University and the YSU-OEA provides that, in accordance with the provisions of ORC Sec. 3307.35, the administration shall implement an "Early Retirement Incentive Program" (ERIP) for calendar year 1992; and

WHEREAS, eligible faculty and staff include those contributing members of the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) who are age 50 or older on or before June 30, 1992, and who are eligible for STRS service retirement under ORC Sec. 3307.38, or who will become eligible for STRS service retirement under that section as a result of receiving additional service credit under the ERIP; and

WHEREAS, the University is obligated by the <u>Agreement</u> and in conformity with state law, to provide ERIP benefits by purchase of one-fifth of the individual participant's total accumulated service credit up to a maximum of five years of additional service credit (rounded down to the next whole number) for a number of faculty or staff equal to five percent of the total number of University employees who are STRS members on January 1, 1992; and

WHEREAS, that resulting number of participants under the formula equals 50, and 53 faculty and staff applied;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve and direct that the ERIP benefit for 1992 be extended to include the other three eligible faculty and staff who applied.

Resolution Concerning a Personnel Contract

RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University that the contract for James Tressel as Head Football Coach be extended to June 30, 2000, and that upon the retirement of Joseph F. Malmisur, or on July 1, 1995, whichever is first, James Tressel shall also be designated Executive Director of Athletics and shall hold both positions simultaneously.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that whereas Coach Tressel's current contract is for the period February 1, 1991, through January 30, 1992, and he has to date received no increase in salary over 1990-91 pending determination of other personnel increases, the Board of Trustees directs that he shall receive a 2 per cent increase for his 1991-92 contract, or a salary of \$66,300, and a 3 percent increase for his 1992-93 contract, or a salary of \$68,289.

YR 1992-

Resolution to Name a Building

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby direct that the University buildings in the city block bounded by Rayen Avenue, Elm Street, Wood Street, and Fifth Avenue which include offices, shops, and storage for the University's facilities and grounds maintenance operations shall be named THE SALATA FACILITIES COMPLEX in honor of Edmund J. Salata who served the University so effectively as Executive Director of Facilities until his untimely death October 15, 1991.

Resolution Concerning Agreement with City of Youngstown

WHEREAS, the University wishes to perform police functions on the city streets of Spring Street east of Elm Street to Wick Oval (inclusive), Bryson Street from Spring Street north to the deadend, and Elm Street north to Eastbound Scrvice Road, where these streets are within or adjacent to University boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code, Section 3345.041 authorizes the Board of Trustees of a state university and a municipal corporation to enter into an agreement to allow the University to perform such police functions on behalf of the municipal corporation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Youngstown and Youngstown State University have previously been parties to such an agreement and the City has by Ordinance Number 91-766 adopted December 4, 1991, authorized such an agreement for the period December 16, 1991 through December 16, 1995.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve the <u>Agreement</u> attached as Exhibit <u>F</u> and directs President Humphrey to sign it on behalf of the University.

AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code, Section 3345.041, authorizes the board of trustees of a state university and a municipal corporation to enter into an agreement upon such terms as are agreed to by them to allow the use of state university law enforcement officers designated under Section 3345.04 of the Ohio Revised Code to perform any police function, exercise any police power or render any police service on behalf of the municipal corporation that it may perform, exercise or render;

WHEREAS, the City and University have previously been parties to an agreement under which the University's law enforcement officers have performed functions, exercised police powers and rendered police services on behalf of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City and University recognize that it is mutually beneficial to the parties to enter into an agreement providing for the University rendered police functions, exercising police powers and rendering police services on behalf of the City subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter described.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and obligations which are hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The police officers of the University designated under Ohio Revised Code, Section 3345.04, are hereby granted, under City Ordinance Number 91-766, and pursuant to the authority of Ohio Revised Code, Section 3345.041, the authority to perform police functions, exercise any police powers or render any police services on behalf of the City that it may perform, exercise or render with respect to the enforcement of parking and traffic ordinances, issuance of citations, towing of vehicles, directing of traffic and police functions related and incidental to the preceding including making arrests. The police functions, police powers and police services defined above shall be limited to Spring Street east of Elm Street to Wick Oval (inclusive); Bryson Street from Spring Street to the deadend; Elm Street north to the Eastbound Service Road; where these streets are within or adjacent to University boundaries.

- 2. University police officers shall be provided with official traffic citation forms of the City for issuance by them and they shall issue citations, tow vehicles, direct traffic and make arrests as may be incidental to performance of these functions in accordance with the ordinances, procedures and practices of the City and the laws of the State of Ohio, under the supervision of the City's Chief of Police.
- 3. University police shall utilize such authority at such times as the University deems and determines that doing so is reasonable, appropriate and/or necessary; and, in the sole judgment of the University, adequate personnel are available.
- 4. It is agreed that no liability shall arise against the University for failing to assist with the performance, exercise or rendering of services in the area herein described.
- 5. No charge shall be made or levied for the services furnished by either party pursuant to this Agreement. Each party shall assume the expense of loss or damage to equipment, person or property that may offer from the acts of their employees and agents under this Agreement. Each party expressly waives any and all claims against the other for compensation for a loss, damage, personal injury or death as a result of or in connection with the performance of this Agreement.

- 6. The City will not indemnify and hold harmless the University for any damages awarded by the court of claims in any civil action arising from any action or omission of the University's law enforcement officer acting pursuant to this Agreement.
- 7. All personnel of the University, while acting under the terms and authority of this Agreement, shall be acting within the scope of their employment while going to, coming from and while acting within the territory of the City.
- 8. Police officers of the University who are acting under the terms and authority of this Agreement shall be entitled to all rights and benefits of their employment with the University including the Workers' Compensation Act and their pension funds, as may be applicable, to the same extent as when performing services within the ordinary course of employment.
- 9. The City shall not be liable for damages to the University or any third party for any cause arising out of the use of equipment or performance of duties by the University related to this Agreement; nor shall the City be liable in any manner or event for damages for personal injury or property damage suffered by any member of the University's police department or third parties for injuries sustained in the performance of this Agreement.

10. The Agreement shall be effective from https://docs.org/, provided, however, that either party may terminate this Agreement upon giving the other party at least thirty (30) days prior written notice to such effect.

Resolution Concerning Demolition of Eagles/DeMichaels Properties

WHEREAS, the City of Youngstown has agreed to purchase the Eagles Building; and

WHEREAS the University and the City of Youngstown have agreed to share in the demolition of the Eagles/DeMichaels properties; and

WHEREAS, the University will purchase the two lots (1833 and 3387) north of the Eagles Building fronting on Fifth Avenue and transfer to the City the area required for the widening of Fifth Avenue;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve and authorize the administration to enter into a final agreement attached hereto as Exhibit \underline{G} with the City to complete the project.

WORKING DRAFT EAGLES/DeMICHAELS PROPERTY

THIS AGREEMENT is made this day of	
1991, by and between the CITY OF YOUNGSTOWN, OHIO (herein	"CITY")
as authorized by Youngstown City Ordinance No	and
YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY (herein "UNIVERSITY").	

WHEREAS, the UNIVERSITY and the CITY believes it is in their mutual interests to share in the cost of acquisition, asbestos removal, and demolition of City Lots 665 and 1496, and the cost of acquisition of City Lot 666 (more commonly known as the Eagles and DeMichaels properties); and the acquisition of City Lots 1833 and 3387.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements set forth herein the UNIVERSITY and CITY agree as follows:

The UNIVERSITY agrees to:

- Acquire City Lots 1496 and 666 (The DeMichaels properties).
- 2. Provide for the asbestos removal and demolition of City Lot 665 (Eagles property) and the demolition and asbestos removal of City Lots 1496 and 666 (DeMichaels Properties).
- 3. Purchase of City Lots 3387 and 1833.
- 4. To provide for the removal of fuel storage tanks from City Lot 666 (DeMichaels property).

The CITY agrees to:

- Acquire City Lot 665 (Eagles property).
- 2. Transfer title (after demolition of structures) to the UNIVERSITY parts of City Lot 665, as set out and described in attached Exhibit "A".
- 3. Provide approximately \$103,500 or 45% of actual costs to cover the CITY's estimated share of the contingency and for the total project cost for the asbestos removal and demolition of City Lots 665 and 1496 (Eagles and DeMichaels structures).

The UNIVERSITY and the CITY mutually agree that this Agreement is expressly conditioned upon the approval of the Ohio Board of Regents, the Ohio Department of Administrative Services, The Office of Budget Management for the State of Ohio, and State of Ohio Controlling Board, and passage of an enabling ordinance by Youngstown City Council.

The City of Youngstown shall follow the appropriate provisions of the Ohio Revised Code and the Youngstown Home Rule Charter in planning, bidding, and execution of all contracts and work.

The plans and specifications for the demolition and asbestos removal from City Lots 665 and 1496 and the removal of the fuel storage tanks from City Lot(s) 666 shall be approved by the Department of Administrative Services/Division of Public Works.

The final share of costs for both the CITY and UNIVERSITY shall be established based on the actual costs for demolition and asbestos removal and costs not to exceed the appraised values for acquisition as described above. Project costs are indicated in Exhibit "B".

It is understood and agreed that the parties to this Agreement may revise or modify this Agreement only upon their written mutual agreement.

Each party shall hold harmless and indemnify the other party for the acts or omissions of each party's agents, employees, or offices. This Agreement shall be effective when all the approvals noted above are secured and when executed by both parties.

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws and the constitution of the State of Ohio.

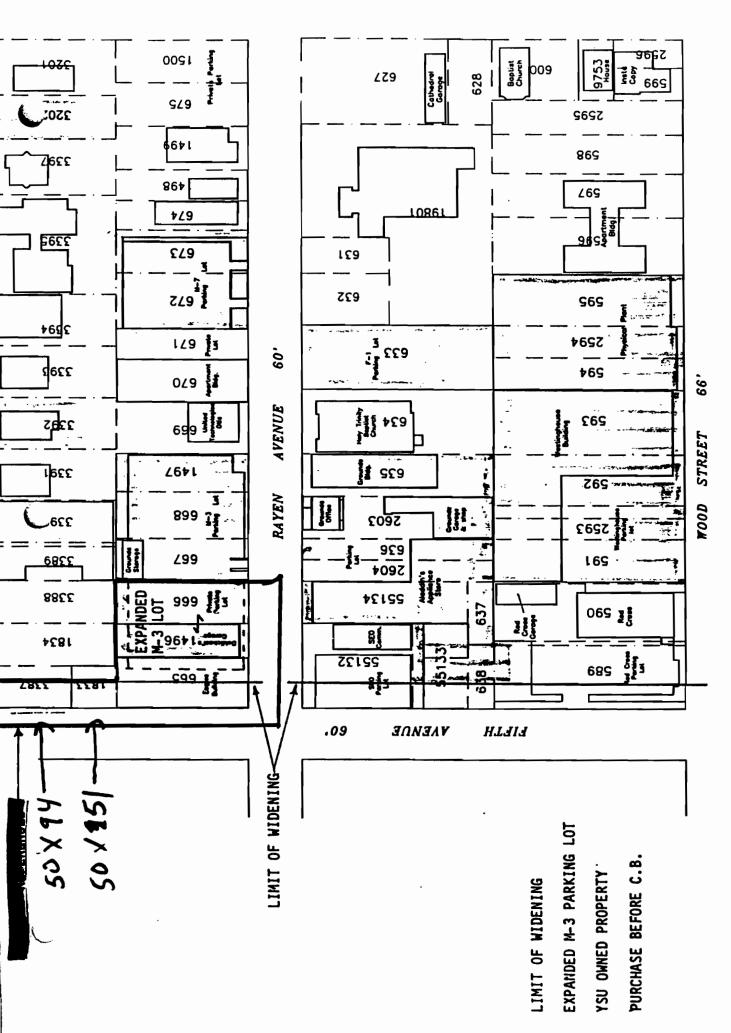

On December 30, 1991, Governor Voinovich ordered a rescission of four percent in the 1991-92 state instructional subsidy for higher education institutions. Since we are already half-way through the fiscal year this amounts to an eight percent cut in the undistributed balance. YSU will receive \$41,547,044, or \$1,731,127 less than budgeted.

The University community has been kept advised of the probability of a rescission and their cooperation solicited. Specific reductions in operating expenses and continuation of the vacant position freeze has been presented as probable partial solutions.

I propose that the reduction of \$1,731,127 in the instructional subsidy in Fund One be off-set by the following combination of reductions of budget credits and non-mandatory transfers to Fund One:

- \$ 350,000 Continuation in the freeze on vacant positions in Fund One for the remainder of the year, net of credits transferred earlier in fiscal year to Fund One Unallocated Reserve.
 - 440,000 Reduction in operating expenses in Fund One accounts.
 - 250,000 Reduction in use of Limited Service Faculty.
 - 155,000 Reduction in health care and life insurance costs (made feasible by new OEA and ACE contracts).
 - 100,000 Reduction in operating/personnel expenses in General Fee Fund Group accounts and a non-mandatory transfer of a like amount to Fund One.
 - 50,000 Reduction in the Life and Major Medical Insurance Reserve and transfer of a like amount to Fund One.
 - 386,127 Transfer from the Unallocated Reserve within Fund One.

Resolution to Authorize Conferral of Honorary Degree

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize the conferral of a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) degree, honoris causa, upon Dr. Bernard J. Yozwiak, with all the rights and privileges attendant thereto.

Resolution Concerning Reorganization of a College

WHEREAS, the Academic Senate has recommended that the existing College of Applied Science and Technology be reorganized into two colleges; and

WHEREAS, the University administration concurs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby approve the establishment of a College of Health and Human Services effective July 1, 1992, and such college shall include three departments: (1) Allied Health, (2) Home Economics, and (3) Nursing and amends Section 1, Article II, of the Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University as included in Exhibit __K_.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees approves of the continuation of the College of Applied Science and Technology which includes three departments: (1) Business Education and Technology, (2) Criminal Justice, and (3) Engineering Technology.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees directs the administration to consult with the faculty of the three departments included in the College of Applied Science and Technology as to their recommendation concerning the name of the College and report their advice back to the Board through the Strategic Planning Committee.

ARTICLE II. ORGANIZATION OF THE UNIVERSITY

Section 1. Organization of Instruction

Youngstown State University is a state university operating under the laws of the State of Ohio and consists of the following colleges, schools, and divisions of instruction:

The College of Arts and Sciences
Warren P. Williamson, Jr. School of Business Administration
The William Rayen School of Engineering
The School of Education
The College of Fine and Performing Arts
The Dana School of Music
The Graduate School
The College of Applied Science and Technology
THE COLLEGE OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Colleges, schools, and divisions may be established, altered or abolished upon the recommendation of the President and approval of the Board of Trustees.

Recommendations for the establishment, alteration and abolition of administrative units shall be made by the President and approved by the Board of Trustees.

Resolution to Amend Provost Position Description

WHEREAS, Section 3, Article I, of the <u>Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University</u> designates the Provost as the liaison officer to the Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine; and

WHEREAS, it is considered advisable that this designation be made by the President based upon the educational background, experience, interest, and availability of the University's top staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the <u>Policies</u> are hereby amended effective January 1, 1992, as included in Exhibit L.

Article I.

Section 3. Provost

The Provost shall be employed by the Board upon recommendation of the President and shall serve at the discretion of the President. He/she shall hold a professional/administrative appointment subject to the stated terms of a contract of employment.

Provost is the principal academic officer of University and reports to the President. 'He/she shall be responsible for supervision of all instructional activities and faculty matters in conformity with the policies of the Board or directives of the President. He/she shall be a member of the University faculty and an ex-officio member of each school or college faculty. He/she may call meetings of the University faculty, and school or college faculties and preside at such He/she shall be responsible for leadership in meetings. maintenance of academic standards; development and coordination of instructional, scholarships, and research activities, and selection, promotion, professional development, tenure, termination of faculty members. He/she shall serve as liaison officer to the Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine:

The Associate Provost and Dean of Graduate Studies, the deans of the schools and colleges, the University Librarian, the Director of the Computer Center, and such other persons as the President shall specify shall be included in the Provost's area of responsibilities.

The Provost shall attend all meetings of the Board of Trustees and of the Academic Affairs Committee of the Board and may attend meetings of other committees of the Board unless specifically excused by the President or a majority of the Board or committee, in which case that fact shall be noted in the minutes of the Board or committee.

Resolution to Amend Alcoholic Beverage Policy

WHEREAS, the McDonough Museum of Art building was recently completed; and

WHEREAS, the Dean of Fine and Performing Arts has indicated that the facility has attracted community interest, and he has received inquiries about events scheduled in the facility; and

WHEREAS, the Dean has recommended that the 'utilization of the facility would be enhanced if wine and/or liquor were permitted to be served during designated programs held in the facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Section 6, Article IX of the Policies of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University be revised as appended at Exhibit M.

POLICIES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY

ARTICLE IX. MISCELLANEOUS

Section 6. Sale and Use of Alcoholic Beverages on University Property

The Board of Trustees delegates to the President the final authority to enforce all policies and to promulgate procedures pertaining to the control, sale and the consumption of beer and the use of other alcoholic beverages on designated premises of the University in conformity with the policies adopted by the Board of Trustees. The Director of Kilcawley Center STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND AUXILIARY SERVICES shall be the designated administrative officer responsible to the President for carrying out the following rules and regulations concerning alcohol.

6.1 Beer Policy

- 6.1.1 The consumption of beer in Kilcawley Center shall be governed by the following rules:
 - a. The University shall be authorized to annually purchase a D-1 permit from the State Department of Liquor Control.
 - b. The ground floor of Kilcawley Center (exclusive of the Bookstore Annex and Kilcawley Residence-Hall HOUSE) is hereby designated as the permit premises.
 - c. The Director of Kileawley-Center STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND AUXILIARY SERVICES, after consulting the Kilcawley Center Board, shall recommend procedures for the control of the sale and consumption of beer on the designated premises. Such procedures shall include, but not be limited to: hours for opening and closing; procedures for checking the age of purchasers; requirements for bartenders; and other procedures as appropriate to assure conformity to State law and University policy. Procedures thus recommended shall be submitted to the President of the University for review, revision (if necessary), and approval.
- 6.1.2 The consumption of beer in Beeghly Center shall be governed by the following rules:
 - a. The concessions contractor is authorized to purchase a D-1 permit from the State Department of Liquor Control.
 - b. Room 119 in Beeghly Center is hereby designated as the permit premises.
 - c. Beer may be sold and consumed on the permit premises only, and admission to these premises shall be limited to holders of season tickets for the Youngstown Pride.

- d. Beer shall not be sold or consumed on the permit premises except for a period of one hour before game time and during game time. Service and consumption shall stop when the game is over.
- Nonalcoholic beverages and food must also be sold on the permit premises when beer is being sold.
- f. When beer is being sold on the permit premises, a YSU Police Department officer shall be stationed at the door of the permit premises to assure that only holders of season tickets to the Youngstown Pride are admitted and that order is maintained.
- g. The contract between the University and the Youngstown Pride shall provide a specific indemnification and hold harmless clause protecting the University from all causes of action arising out of the serving of beer during Pride games. The contract shall also require the Pride to obtain Dram Shop insurance in the amount of \$1 million primary coverage and \$3 million excess coverage, with the University named as an "additional insured."

6.2 Liquor and Wine Policy

- 6.2.1 The University may permit the consumption of liquor and/or wine at programs, seminars, meetings, or workshops of an educational nature that are sponsored by principal administrative officers, deans, or department heads; and at employee or alumni on-campus social events in accordance with the following conditions:
 - a. The possession and consumption of liquor and/or wine at oncampus events shall be in accord with State and local law and University policy.
 - b. Permission for groups to serve liquor and/or wine at oncampus events must be obtained in written form from the President of the University at least two weeks in advance of the events.
 - c. Such permission shall be restricted to designated rooms on the second floor of Kilcawley Center, THE MCDONOUGH MUSEUM OF ART, and rooms on the first floor of the Alumni House. The rooms shall be designated by the President of the University.
 - d. Liquor and/or wine may not be sold at an on-campus event.
 - e. The sponsoring group of an event in Kilcawley Center OR THE MCDONOUGH MUSEUM OF ART at which liquor and/or wine is to be served must employ a bartender and purchase set-ups for drinks through the Director of Kilcawley-Center STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND AUXILIARY SERVICES.

- f. Liquor and/or wine to be served at events in Kilcawley Center OR THE MCDONOUGH MUSEUM OF ART must be delivered in bulk form to the bartender through the Director of Kilcawley Center STUDENT ACTIVIITES AND AUXILIARY SERVICES. Any remainder will be removed in bulk form.
- g. Upon approval by the President of service of alcoholic beverages at an event in the Alumni House, the Executive Director of the Alumni Association shall be responsible for all arrangements including assurance that all applicable laws and regulations are followed.
- h. Individuals attending such events shall not possess individual bottles of liquor and/or wine.
- i. Nonalcoholic beverages and food must be served at any oncampus event at which liquor and/or wine is served.
- j. Liquor and/or wine may not be purchased with State funds.
- 6.2.2 The University prohibits the sale or use of alcoholic beverages in all public areas of the Arnold Stambaugh Stadium. Consumption of liquor is permitted in designated private areas under the following conditions:
 - a. The possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages shall be in accord with State and local law and University policy.
 - b. The President of the University shall annually designate the rooms of the Stadium and the "tailgate" parking lot where the consumption of alcoholic beverages is permitted.
 - c. The rooms and "tailgate" parking lot designated by the President are restricted to the fall football season and to those days when an intercollegiate contest or comparable nonscholastic activity is scheduled.
 - d. Nonalcoholic beverages and food must be served at any event at which alcoholic beverages are served.

6.3 Amendments to Alcoholic Beverage Policy

The President is empowered to adopt and publish additional rules and regulations for the administration and enforcement of policies relating to the possession, sale, consumption and appropriate time of service of alcoholic beverages at on-campus events.
