ACADEMIC SENATE MINUTES

September 7, 2011

Call to Order: Senate Chairperson Chet Cooper called the meeting to order at 4:04 p.m.

New business: Matt O'Mansky introduced the following resolution and moved that the Academic Senate adopt the resolution:

RESOLUTION TO REVISE THE MISSION OF YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY IN LIGHT OF A NEW SET OF COMPARABLE INSTITUTIONS

Presented to the Academic Senate September 7, 2011

WHEREAS: Youngstown State University was recently named an Urban Research University, and

WHEREAS: Youngstown State University's mission statement recently was revised to reflect this designation, and

WHEREAS: In contract negotiations with YSU-OEA, the negotiators representing Youngstown State University's Board of Trustees and administration presented a list of institutions that they asserted are comparable to Youngstown State University, and

WHEREAS: This list is comprised of ten universities, all of which are private, and

WHEREAS: Seven of the ten universities are religious universities, and

WHEREAS: These ten universities are institutions that the Board of Trustees and administration of Youngstown State University deem to be reasonable comparables to Youngstown State University,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Academic Senate of Youngstown State University determines that the mission statement of the University must be revised in order to be more consistent with the missions of the private institutions now determined to be comparable to our University.

(An attachment to the resolution as distributed at the meeting is contained in Attachment 3.)

Motion was seconded.

Shearle Furnish: This resolution is brand new today, and I do not have my notes with me right now from last summer. What happened is what happens when good faith negotiations are changed into negotiations that take place in public. My recollection is that these universities also use the same health care consultant as YSU. Their role in the process beyond that was very limited. It is a fact that the two sides have not agreed on a set of comparables, although both sides have presented ideas on comparables.

Nancy Wolfgang: Change the mission to what end? To change the mission to make a better environment for students or what? Dr. O'Mansky: Honestly I don't want to revise our mission statement, but I wanted to make a statement and make sure this list of universities was known.

Annette Burden: I am also a part of the negotiations. I respectfully disagree with Dr. Furnish.

Question from the Chair: In light of the discussion, do you still wish to proceed with the resolution? Dr. O'Mansky: I am torn about this, but I guess this is more of a statement. Dr. Cooper: Do you wish to proceed? Phil Munro moved to table and, Mark Vopat seconded. Motion to table the motion on the resolution passed.

YSU Academy Update on Senate September 7, 2011

HLC Academy:

YSU is completing its fourth and final year in the HLC's Academy for the Assessment of Student Learning¹. YSU continues to make progress on two university-wide projects: 1) Institute assessment of general education at all levels and 2) Engage all campus constituencies in analyzing teaching and learning at YSU. Two progress reports were prepared and sent to the HLC Assessment Academy mentors (in January and July 2011). The HLC mentors have provided positive feedback about YSU's progress. Key aspects of the projects are described below.

General Education:

Two initiatives are underway to improve assessment of general-education outcomes. The first is to create a Repository Of Assessment Documents (ROAD) to help assess students' attainment of learning outcomes listed in the University's General Education program. Under a proposal passed by the Academic Senate in February 2011, students are required to upload two examples of their writing prior to graduation, and the samples will be used in assessment of general education learning outcomes. Departments will also be able to use the ROAD documents for their own program assessment. In spring 2011, the first set of documents was uploaded to the repository by students in the second freshman composition course (ENGL 1551) and a committee of faculty representing all six colleges developed a writing and critical thinking rubric to evaluate the documents. Reviewers have scored a randomly selected sample of 200 essays. This data will become part of an ongoing program to evaluate the quality of student writing and critical thinking at YSU.

The second initiative called for a revision of the organizational structure of courses within the general education model. The Academic Senate voted to accept the revision at its April 2011 meeting. The committee is now preparing for the transition from the current model to the new one.

Assessment Reporting:

Academic Units: The data are promising and indicate that participation rates and the quality of reports are improving. For academic units, participation rates in 2010-11 were 93% (up from 77% in 2009-10), with 83% of good quality (up from 64% in 2009-10).

Non-Academic Units: For non-academic units in 2010-11, participation rates were 80% (up from 77% in 2009-10), with 65% of good quality (65% were also of good quality in 2009-10).

Assessment Report Strengths: The improvements in quality for academic units and non-academic units reflect more focused and realistic approaches to assessment, increased connection between data collection/analysis and learning outcomes, inclusion of more data in reports, more shared responsibility for assessment processes, and increased discussion of findings with constituents.

Assessment Report Challenges: Targeted areas for improvement in future reporting include expanding active student involvement in assessment and documenting whether prior action steps have worked to improve programs. A number of units are also refining or sharpening their learning outcomes for future reporting.

We thank the 17 volunteer reviewers² who assisted the University-wide Assessment Council to achieve timely feedback on assessment reports to the university in 2010-11. Because the Council was able to finish reviews by April 2011, the deans for each college as well as chairs of the college-wide committees obtained copies of all reports/plans and feedback for each program in their own college. The college-wide committees also met during spring 2011 to review the

feedback provided to each program and to share with the Office of Assessment what was helpful and what was not helpful.

Appreciation Luncheon:

YSU's Academy Team hosted an Appreciation Luncheon with over 70 participants on April 20, 2011, to publically recognize individuals and groups who have made valuable contributions to YSU's ongoing work and improvement on the assessment of student learning/student experiences. Seven programs and/or departments who consistently submitted exemplary assessment plans/reports for several years were acknowledged (Academic Advisors, Accounting and Finance, Communication Studies, Dental Hygiene, Mathematics, Professional Writing and Editing, and the Bachelor Degree program in Teacher Education). In addition, members and volunteers of the Assessment Council, the General Education Committee and the Council on Teaching and Learning were thanked for their ongoing significant work to improve assessment processes on campus. During the luncheon, recipients of prior 2009 mini-grant awards from the Office of Assessment shared summaries of their innovative work on assessment and student learning (available upon request).

Mini-Grant Projects:

The University-wide Assessment Council reviewed new mini-grant proposals in spring 2011. As a result, the Office of Assessment is awarding a total of \$6,145 to 6 Departments (list departments?) during FY12 for mini-grant projects. The mini-grant proposals support projects that are related to the enhancement of teaching and learning. Mini-grant recipients will have opportunities to present their projects to faculty, staff, and students during fall 2012.

Voluntary System of Accountability:

During spring and early summer of 2011, the Office of Assessment and Institutional Research and Policy Analyses successfully hosted a series of workshops and discussion groups on the 2010 NSSE results for faculty, staff, and students. The purpose of the sessions was to share and discuss results with the YSU campus at both an overview level on the NSSE and to examine specific benchmarks. The sessions were well attended, with a total of 59 participants.

Using Data to Discuss Student Writing at YSU

Faculty, staff, & students are invited to attend the 5th Round Table Session hosted by YSU's Assessment Academy Team on Wednesday, September 21st from 3:15 to 4:30 pm in Williamson Hall, Room 3422. Light refreshments will be served.

The purpose of this Round Table session will be to examine multiple measures of student writing at YSU and their potential policy implications.

Faculty and staff have all encountered student writing through our work at the university, whether through coursework or written communication. Most of us, through our interactions, may have formed conclusions about students' strengths and challenges in this area, as well as what might be done to improve student writing. Join us to combine your experience and insight with additional assessment undertaken on campus to foster a meaningful dialogue about the quality of writing on the YSU campus and what, if any, changes should be made to improve quality.

To support discussion, there will be three brief data presentations. The presentations will include:

- The initial score results from the writing samples stored in the Repository of Assessment Documents (ROAD) will be discussed by Tod Porter. Over the past summer approximately 200 student essays were evaluated using a rubric developed by YSU faculty. The essays were written by students enrolled in Writing 2 (ENGL 1551).
- The reviewers of the essays were also asked to comment on the quality of the writing, providing a qualitative measure. Angela Messenger will discuss the reviewer's comments and their implication for ENGL 1551.
- Selected YSU data on the subject of student writing from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) will be shared by Hillary Fuhrman and Steve Taraszewski.
