ACADEMIC SENATE MEETING MINUTES

Wednesday, October 1, 2014, 4:00 P.M. Room 132, DeBartolo Hall

- 1. Call to Order: Senate Vice-Chairperson Mike Crist called the meeting to order at 4:01 p.m. It was noted that Chairperson Chet Cooper would not be present at this meeting.

- 3. Senate Composition Mike Crist introduced President Tressel
 - a. President Tressel went over the process of searching for a provost. He reminded the Senate that the search committee had reviewed many applicants, interviewed ten via Skype, and narrowed the pool to four, who were brought to the campus. Of that four, there was no clear consensus as to who should be hired for the provost position. President Tressel felt that the candidates were all good, but none were exactly what we were looking for. He did not feel that this was a failed search; he felt it helped us to learn a lot about ourselves and what we needed in this position. He then reflected on what the campus had told him, through interviews, surveys, and informal conversations, we needed in a provost. He identified ten key points (see attachment 1). Based on this, he felt that Martin Abraham would be a good fit. Additionally, Martin Abraham could take over the position immediately. He consulted the Board and offered the position to Martin Abraham. President Tressel stated that though he hoped that it would become a permanent placement, Martin Abraham's current position was Interim Provost.

The discussion that followed President Tressel's discussion of the provost search largely centered on the issue of shared governance. Several faculty members questioned the appropriateness of appointing a person to this position who had not been vetted by the faculty, who had not gone through the candidacy process, and who had not applied to the position. President Tressel stated that in making this decision, he relied on the information and feedback given to him by the faculty and others on campus about what we needed in a provost. He felt that in gathering and applying this information, he was honoring shared governance. Tim Francisco was troubled by the fact that President Tressel replaced an Interim Provost with another Interim Provost. He questioned how this is helping us to move forward. He also was concerned about calling Abraham's position "Interim Provost," given that President Tressel mentioned in the Vindicator that he wanted this to become a permanent placement. Lastly, he stated that there was minimal faculty involvement in the search for President; now for the second most important position, the faculty again had minimal input. President Tressel said that he did utilize faculty input in his decision. He then explained that the position is an interim position; he hopes that Abraham will demonstrate effectiveness in the position and it will become permanent, but he felt that a permanent placement would not be appropriate at that time. President Tressel then noted that he, and hopefully Martin Abraham, is not viewing this as temporary. Loren Lease asked if President Tressel shared the criteria he went over with the search committee. He said that he did not, that at that point in time he had not gotten that far. Diane Barnes expressed that many faculty are

concerned about the role of shared governance in the university and the lack of input they have had regarding decisions. She asked President Tressel whether he planned on instituting more shared governance and if so, how. President Tressel stated that he felt like he honored shared governance in this process. He expressed that he sometimes did not know what shared governance is, as it seems like people feel that shared governance is violated when decisions are made that are not in their favor. He stated that he certainly wants as much collaboration as possible and be open to ideas and have an open mind, but at the end of the day a decision still has to be made. Diane Barnes then stated that faculty are often frustrated that they receive information about the university from The Vindicator, rather than from administration. When that happens, faculty feels demoralized. President Tressel said that this is a difficult time regarding the flow of information. Suzanne Diamond asked if he would have hired in accordance with faculty recommendations if there had been consensus. President Tressel stated that had there been consensus on a candidate, he would have offered the position to that candidate. She also stated that the concern is that an email or a buzz in the community can override the input members of the search committee, who have invested a significant amount of time, is demoralizing. President Tressel stated that it depends on what community. He said that if it is an academic community, we should listen. The reality in this case is that the people who backed a candidate who was not selected were going to feel demoralized, but people aren't promised that the decisions made will turn out in their favor when they serve on a search committee. Ellen Jones asked if President Tressel was concerned that hiring someone who wasn't part of the applicant pool and not hiring from the candidates who came in put their time into this process will discourage future applicants. President Tressel stated that he didn't think about that. He was thinking about what we needed in a very important position. He said this is a great place; we are going to get people to apply to various positions. That fear cannot drive decisions. Matt O'Mansky asked if the faculty would have an opportunity to give feedback on Martin Abraham as a Provost candidate. President Tressel said that he hopes people will give feedback and that Martin Abraham will ask for feedback. Matt O'Mansky then asked what process would take place to remove the "Interim" from his title. President Tressel said that it wasn't a Board decision, that he would assume that it would be his decision, but he wasn't sure if there was a governance policy regarding this. Jane Kestner then asked that the Senate recognize Teri Riley for her service as Interim Provost. She also stated that she felt bad that Dr. Riley was removed as Interim Provost, that the paper stated that she was removed. President Tressel stated that the paper should have said Teri Riley no longer had to do two jobs. Susan Clutter then asked where the Board stood on this. President Tressel stated that the Board agreed with his decision.

President Tressel then went over retention and recruitment (see <u>attachment 1</u>). He discussed the progress we made and what we need to do to move forward. He specifically stated that we need to increase our student body by widening our footprint beyond the five surrounding counties that we have been relying on (currently 86% of our students come from this area). He said that the goal is to increase student population by recruiting into all of Pennsylvania up to West Chester, NY and through 2/3 of Ohio. He also said that we need to increase international student enrollment, both to increase student body and to become a

more global and multicultural institution. He explained that we have improved retention. But that for every 1% of students lost, we lose one million dollars. We want retention to improve so that students can succeed at achieving their goals and it dramatically impacts revenue. He then explained how Akron improved retention. He stated that they did this by raising admission standards and by deciding that retention was everyone's responsibility. As a result, there was a dramatic increase.

Michael Jerryson stated that University of Akron gave tremendous incentives to their faculty and that we are going into our second month without a contract. He pointed out that retention of faculty should be a part of this plan. President Tressel stated that this can happen if the retention and recruitment plan works. He explained that there is no doubt that a full time faculty member has more impact than a faculty member that teaches here and in other places. However, he pointed out that we have a 10 million dollar structural problem. He explained that if we can get that under control, we can begin reaching other goals

 - i. Courses have been approved by the UCC and reviewed by university personnel. An objection to ART 3770 Interactive Application Design, UCC# 15-027, has been received from the Department of Computer Science and Information System. Therefore, ART 3770 has been removed from Senate approval at this time. The objection is being reviewed.

- 9. Mike Crist explained that we had run out of time and that we could move to adjourn, moving the remaining items to next month's agenda, we could reconvene next week, or we could continue the meeting. Ellen Jones moved to adjourn until next month. That motion was seconded, but not voted upon at this point.
- 10. New Business- Michael Jerryson stated that he was concerned about the Academic Standards Committee being chaired by students rather than a faculty member. This concern was echoed by Bill Buckler. Mike Crist stated that we should hold off on this discussion until Chet could speak to this issue. Adam Earnhardt explained that the students were co-chairing the committee because no faculty volunteered to do so. Michael Slavens, Co-Chair of the Academic Standards Committee, stated that as chair, he had no power and did not understand why this was problematic as he would only be setting meeting times and reporting back to the Senate on the committee's activities. He also explained that he spoke with Chet Cooper, who checked the Charter and Bylaws, and was fine with the decision. Michael Jerryson asked Michael Slavens to explain what the Academic Standards Committee was and what they did. He felt that a faculty member should be in this position. Mike Crist again asked that we wait until Chet Cooper could return to discuss this. Kevin Burns explained that he felt that this was a policy issue, that the current policy allowed for students to be committee chairs and that students can do a good job in this capacity. At this point Mike Crist asked that we adjourn. That was voted upon and passed.
