Sir:

I have just received your letter of March 24, 1938, written in behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Solomon (Salamon) Hirschhorn of Rakoci ut 24, Budapest, who are desirous of obtaining immigration visas in order to join relatives in the United States.

The records indicate that Mr. Sirschhorn, who was registered at this office as a nonpreference intending immigrant chargeable to the quota of Rumania on March 9g 1938, is listed among several other aliens whose applications have been approved but to whom visas can not be issued at the present time because of the non-availability of nonpreference numbers from the Rumanian guota.

As you are doubtless aware, the quota allotted to Rumania is only 277 per annum, and under the provisions of the immigration law fifty per cent of the quota must be made available each year for the issuance of visas to applicants belonging in the first preference category. The law further provides that the second fifty per cent plus any unused portion of the first fifty per cent must be made available for applicants belonging in the second preference category. Whatever portion remains unused, if any, after the issuance of visas

to these two classes may then be made available for applicants belonging in the category in which Mr. Hirschhorn belongs.

According to information recently received from the American Consulate at Bucharest, which is the control office for the Rumanian quota, there has been for some time so large a demand for imigration visas under this quota by applicants who enjoy preference of primity status that it is impossible to state even approximately when numbers may become available for applicants whose cases are of as recent record as that of Mr. Hirschhorn.

it may be stated that because her birthoccurred in Hungary she is chargeable to the Hungarian quota, and therefore at the time Mr. Hirschhorn was registered in the Rumanian quota she was registered in the Rumanian quota. As she was also preceded on the waiting list by several hundred other nonpreference applicants, Mr. Hirschhorn had to be advised that she too would have to undergo a wait of several months before an appointment could be given her to appear for formal examination.

I wish to give you every assurance, however, that just as soon as quote numbers do become available for Mr. and Mrs. Hirschhorn, this office will not fail to promptly notify them in order that they may appear for final examination.

Although it is my wish to be of any possible assistance in matters in which you are interested, there is nothing which may properly be done under the law to expedite action on the visa applications of Mr. and Mrs. Hirschhorn. As nonpreference quota immigrants they must await their turns until consideration shall have been given to the cases of aliens entitled

entitled to preference and those in the nonpreference eategory whose cases were made of prior record. To allot numbers to the applicants out of their turn would have the effect of conferring upon them a special preference for which the law does not provide and moreover would be unfair to other applicants who are awaiting their turns in the regular manner.

You are assured, however, that Mr. and Mrs. Hirschhorn will be accorded every consideration as soon as the status of the quota permits.
