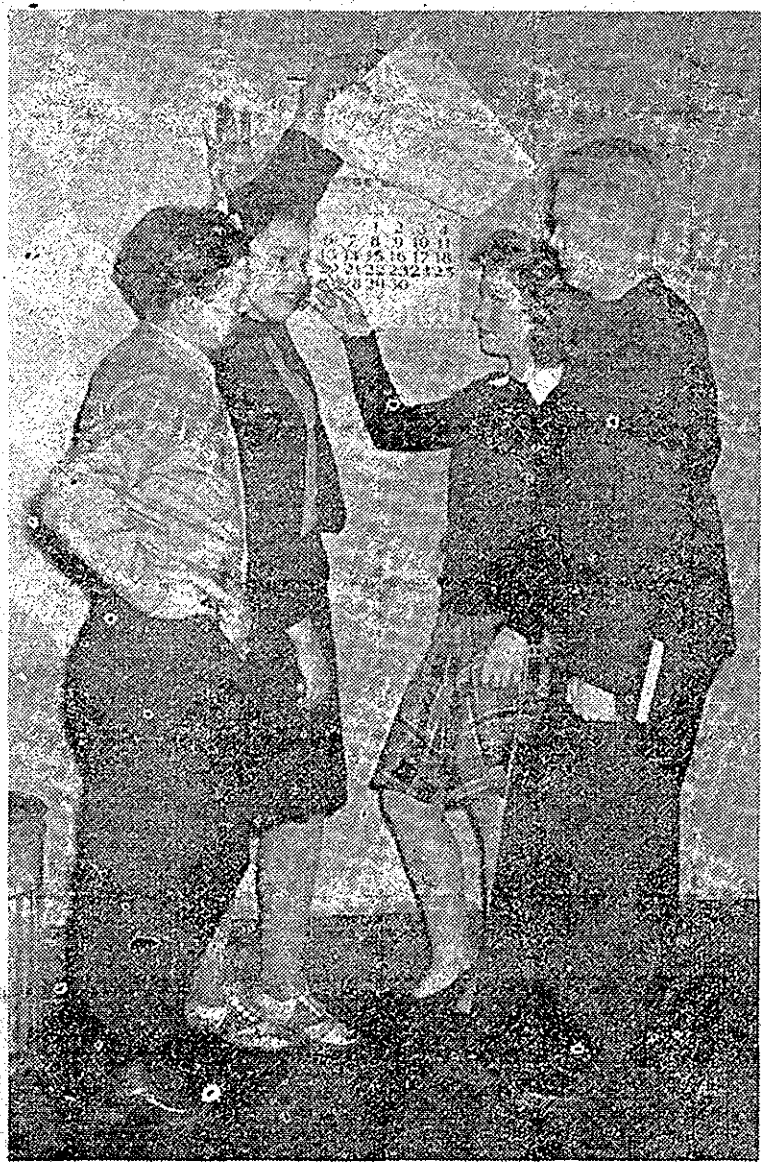
The series began Sunday evening, January 4, when Dr. George M. Wilcox spoke on "Youngstown College and National Defense."

Dr. Wilcox cited the types of training offered at Youngstown College which may be used either directly or indirectly, to aid in national defense.

Dr. C. W. Foard presented an address, entitled "Civilian Pilot Training", Sunday, January 11, in which he gave an account of the work being done by the CTP at YOCO and of the support which is given to the United States Government in training civilian pilots for flying cadets in the U. S. Air Corps.

Next Sunday at 7 o'clock, Dr. Eugene Scudder will speak on another phase of national defense.

The second semester, according to President Jones, will be completed one week earlier. The summer course will begin immediately with a full freshman schedule being offered. A full schedule is also available for freshmen beginning school at the second semester, February 2.

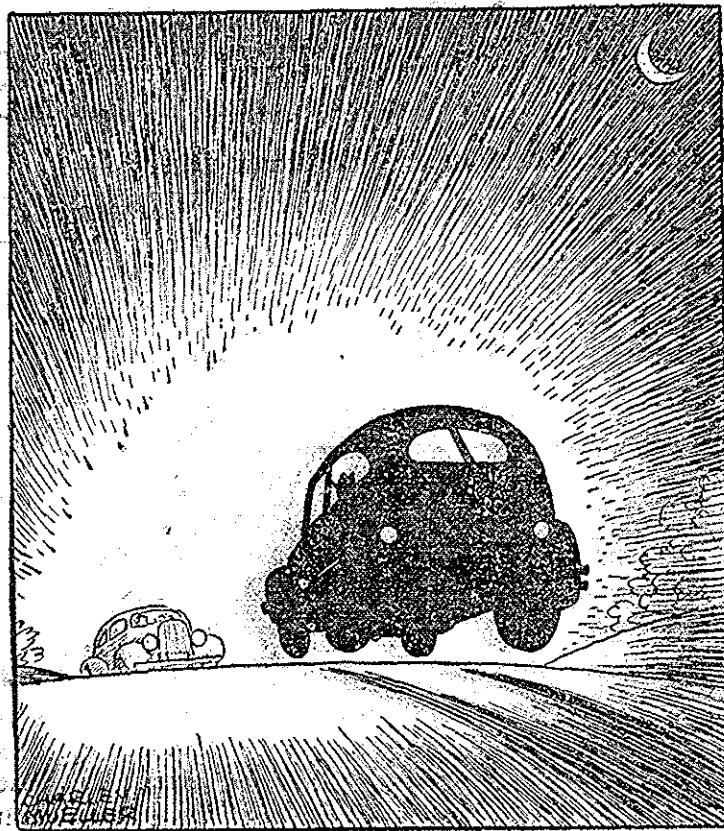

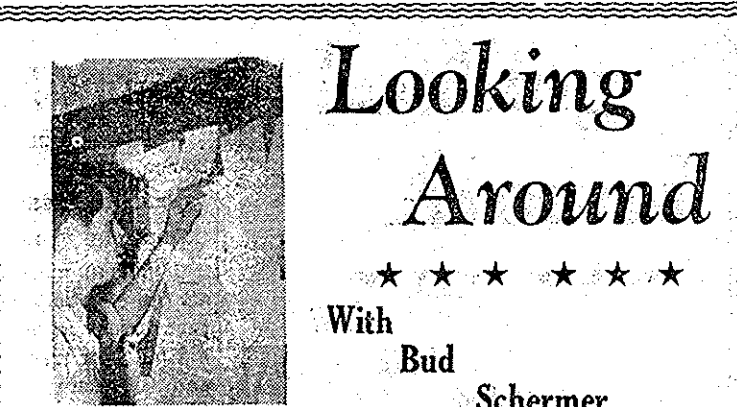
