

Should You Financial Aid? Apply For Financial Aid?

For all students who will be considering Youngstown State University, the answer is **yes**. Studies show that financial aid is likely to be an important consideration in the final selection of a college for many students. In fact, half of all college students nationwide are receiving some form of financial help.

Although students from families of modest means usually receive more need-based aid than those from affluent backgrounds, there are other determinants of financial aid eligibility besides income. At YSU, the annual family income of students receiving aid ranges from less than \$5,000 to over \$35,000.

Eligibility for financial aid is based upon a determination of your financial need, which is the difference between the total cost of your education and what you and your family can contribute toward that cost from your own financial resources.

Financial aid at YSU takes many forms. Student musicians earn loot while they toot at special events and athletic competitions.

Since gross family income is often not an accurate indication of a family's true financial situation, you should never assume that you will not qualify for aid on the basis of your parents' income . However, in order to determine your eligibility, YOU MUST APPLY. Only the thorough review of your family's income, assets, expenses and other financial circumstances can reveal your true need.

Because of funding limitations and award processes, you will need to apply early (February 15) for optimal consideration. Be sure to complete both the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and Youngstown State University's Institutional Aid Application. In order for us to process your financial aid in a timely manner, the FAFSA should be sent to the federal government between January 1, 2001 and February 15, 2001.

University Scholars

The University Scholarship is YSU's most prestigious scholarship. Fortyfive of these full-cost scholarships are awarded to first-year students coming directly from high school. Ten more are given to students transferring from two-year institutions. Recipients become part of the University Scholars Program, which includes:

- Admittance into the Honors Program
- Honors housing
- Participation in specially planned on- and off- campus speakers, concerts, plays, and athletic events
- Community service projects planned and coordinated by University Scholars
- Early registration

The program is uniquely designed to combine the pursuit of academic excellence within an intensive cultural and social environment. (Students enrolled in YSU's jointly sponsored medical program, Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine, are not eligible for the University Scholarship.)

Value: All fees and tuition*, on-campus room and board fees, and a \$360 academic-year allowance for books and supplies Testimated at \$9,000). If renewed for the full four years of study, the estimated value is approximately \$36,000.

Renewal: This scholarship is renewable each year up to a maximum of four years if the recipient maintains a 3.5 cumulative GPA and completes a minimum of 24 credit hours per academic year. Students must maintain a full-time on-campus enrollment status of at least 12 credit hours per term.

Application: If you are applying as a high school candidate, all application materials must be submitted by February 15 and must be certified by your high school administration. Applications from candidates for two-year scholarships are taken on an ongoing basis. A completed application will include both an Application for Admission/Financial Aid to YSU and the University Scholar Award Application. This procedure applies only to those applying for the University Scholar awards.

High School Scholars Criteria For Award Eligibility**

- a. 30 ACT/1300 SAT
- b. Be recognized as a National Merit or Achievement Finalist or rank in the upper 15 percent of high school class pursuing a college preparatory curriculum (4 units of English, 3 units of math, 3 units of social studies, and 3 units of science), and have achieved a minimum Enhanced ACT score of 30 or SAT score of 1340.


Minimum Criteria For Award Consideration***

- a. 28 ACT/1220 SAT.
- b. Be recognized as a National Merit or Achievement Semifinalist or rank in the upper 15 percent of high school class pursuing a college preparatory curriculum (4 units of English, 3 units of math, 3 units of social studies, and 3 units of science), and have achieved a minimum Enhanced ACT score of 28 or SAT score of 1260.
- c. Be recommended by the University Scholars Committee.

Two-Year Scholars

Criteria For Award Eligibility

- a. Minimum 3.8 GPA
- b. Currently enrolled in a two-year institution.
- c. Must have completed an associate degree or at least 60 semester hours before entering YSU.
- * Tuition granted up to 38 hours per academic year, 2 hours of which may exceed the bulk rate.
- ** Once the application deadline has passed, the selection process will begin. From the pool of applicants, forty-five new students will become University Scholars.
- *** In special cases, students with outstanding academic credentials along with some other distinguished achievement (in the arts, humanities, or sciences, for example) will be considered for an award



Almost threequarters of YSU students receive some form of financial aid.

Trustees' Scholarships

The Trustees' Scholarships recognize the academic achievement of high school valedictorians. The scholarships are awarded to beginning first-year students who have been admitted to the University.

Criteria: Graduate as valedictorian of the high school graduating class.

Value: \$3,000 academic-year award. If renewed for the full four years of study, the value is \$12,000.

Renewal: This scholarship will be automatically renewed each year up to a maximum of four years if the recipient maintains a 3.5 cumulative GPA and completes a minimum of 24 credit hours per academic year. Students must maintain full-time YSU enrollment status of at least 12 credit hours per term.

Application: To be considered for this award, you must apply for admission to Youngstown State University by February 15.

President's Scholarships

The President's Scholarships recognize outstanding academic ability and accomplishment. These scholarships are awarded to beginning first-year students who have been admitted to the University.

Criteria: Rank in the upper 10 percent of your high school graduating class with an Enhanced ACT score of at least 27 or SAT score of 1220.

Value: \$2,500 academic-year award. If renewed for the full four years of study, the value is \$10,000.

Renewal: This scholarship will be automatically renewed each year up to a maximum of four years if the recipient maintains a 3.5 cumulative GPA and completes a minimum of 24 credit hours per academic year. Students must maintain a full-time YSU enrollment status of at least 12 credit hours per term.

Application: To be considered for this award, you must apply for admission to Youngstown State University by February 15.

Deans' Scholarships

The Deans' Scholarships recognize potential academic achievement and are awarded to beginning first-year students who have been admitted to the University.

Criteria: Rank in the upper 15 percent of the high school graduating class with an Enhanced ACT score of at least 25 or SAT score of 1140.

Value: \$2,000 academic year award. If renewed for the full four years of study, the value is \$8,000.

Renewal: This scholarship will be automatically renewed each year up to a maximum of four years if the recipient maintains a 3.5 cumulative GPA and completes a minimum of 24 credit hours per academic year. Students must maintain a full-time YSU enrollment status of at least 12 credit hours per term.

Application: To be considered for this award, you must apply for admission to Youngstown State University by February 15.

Leadership Scholarships

The Leadership Scholarships are designed for students who have demonstrated leadership and academic abilities. These scholarships are awarded to beginning first-year students who have been admitted to the University.

Criteria: Must have demonstrated academic achievement and leadership in high school and have

- A minimum Enhanced ACT score of at least 23 or an SAT score of 1070: OR
- 2. A 3.0 high school cumulative GPA and rank in the upper 15% of your high school graduating class.

Awards are available for part-time students (at least 6 hours per term) on a pro-rated basis.

Value: \$1,000 for the first year. See Department Scholarship thereafter.

Renewal: One-year award. See Department Scholarship thereafter.

Application: To be considered for this award, you must apply for admission to Youngstown State University by February 15.

Department Scholarships

Each academic department on campus awards Department Scholarships to students who have demonstrated outstanding academic scholarship. To be eligible, you may not be receiving any other Scholarships for Excellence or be a prior recipient whose eligibility is exhausted. If you previously received a Leadership Scholarship, however, you are eligible to apply for the Department Scholarship. Continuing students must meet the following criteria:

Criteria: At a minimum, you must have 24 degree-applicable credits at YSU with a 3.5 GPA. Additional criteria may apply due to limited funding.

Value: \$1,500 per academic year. If renewed for the full three years of study, value is \$4,500.

Renewal: This scholarship will be automatically renewed each year up to a maximum of three years (sophomore, junior, senior) if the recipient maintains a 3.5 cumulative GPA and completes a minimum of 12 credit hours per academic year. Awards are available for part-time students (at least 6 hours per term) on a pro-rated basis.

Application: To be considered for this award, the Institutional Aid Application must be submitted by February 15, but you are encouraged to apply as early as possible, as funds may be limited.

Community College Scholarships

Community College Scholarships are available to students who are transferring from a branch campus or a community college, or who are pursuing a campus-based associate program. Students must be accepted to the University.

Criteria: Must have completed at least 24 transferable credit hours with a minimum of a 3.5 GPA.

Value: \$1,500 academic-year award. If renewed for the full three years of study, value is \$4,500.

Renewal: This scholarship will be automatically renewed each year up to a maximum of three years (sophomore, junior, senior) if the recipient maintains a 3.5 cumulative GPA and completes a minimum of 12 credit hours per academic year. Awards are available for part-time students (at least 6 hours per term) on a pro-rated basis.

Application: To be considered for this award, you must apply for admission to Youngstown State University. You are encouraged to apply as early as possible, as funds may be limited.

Scholarships

Ohio Academic Scholarships*

This program provides a \$2,000 scholarship to 1,000 Ohio students every year. The scholarship is renewable for four years and may be used at any Ohio public or private institution

Each Ohio high school receives one scholarship every year for its top student. Additional scholarships are awarded based on GPA and ACT scores from among the top five students of each high school.



Recognizing the legislative cap on Pennsylvania grants to Pennsylvania residents attending Ohio universities, Youngstown State University has initiated a supplemental grant program funded by the YSU Foundation. This grant is automatically awarded to YSU students who are awarded a PHEAA grant. The supplemental grant will be awarded in amounts up to 100% of the PHEAA grant, subject to availability of funds.

YSU Foundation Graduate Scholarships and Grants-in-Aid

The YSU Foundation provides scholarships and grants to graduate students. Awards cover tuition and are available for both full-time students and those partitime students registered for at least six credits. Apply in the School of Graduate Studies.

Martin Luther King Inner-City Achievement Award*+

Funded by the YSU Foundation, this award is available to graduates of Youngstown/Warren inner-city schools (Calvary Christian Academy, Cardinal Mooney, Chaney, East, Rayen, South, Ursuline, Wilson, Youngstown Christian School, John F. Kennedy, Warren G. Harding, and Warren Western Reserve.) Need-based awards of up to \$750 per academic year are available to students who have financial need. Students must be admitted to the University in good standing or, if currently enrolled at YSU, must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5 and be registered for at least 6 credit hours. Early completion of the FAFSA is encouraged, as funds are limited. You must have completed FAFSA results to be considered.

Other Private Donor Scholarships

Other scholarships funded by the YSU Foundation or other donors are administered by the Financial Aid and Scholarships Office in conformity with established criteria. See the *Undergraduate Bulletin* for a listing of available scholarships.

- *These awards are restricted to students who have not attained a first bachelor's degree.
- *You must file a free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for 2001-02 to be considered for these programs.



Federal Pell Grants*†

This is a federal grant intended to provide financial assistance to eligible students. The current award range is \$400 to \$3,300 Eligibility is need-based and available to *undergraduates* who are U.S. citizens or eligible non-citizens.

Ohio Instructional Grants*†

This program provides grants to Ohio residents attending YSU on a full-time basis as *undergraduates*. Other Ohio awards are available for part-time attendance.

Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Awards*†

This program provides grants to Pennsylvania residents who are YSU students. Students may be full-time or half-time *undergraduates* enrolled in an approved program of study requiring at least two years to complete. See opposite page for information on the PHEAA Supplemental Grant program.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants*†

The FSEOG is for students with exceptional financial need. First consideration will be given to those students with maximum Pell Grant eligibility. To qualify, an *undergraduate* student must be registered for at least six credit hours, be maintaining satisfactory academic progress, and not be in default on any Title IV aid. The current award range is \$300 to \$1,000.

Federal Perkins Loans†

A Federal Perkins Loan is a low-interest (5%) educational loan for *undergraduate* at and graduate students with financial need as determined by the Student Aid Report issued when you apply for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). You must indicate on the FAFSA that you are interested in this program.

Federal Work-Study

Federal work-study is need-based employment on a part-time, non-civil service, hourly basis. The rate of pay for such jobs is regulated by the federal minimum wage law. To qualify for federal work-study, you must be enrolled, be in good academic standing, and have a demonstrated financial need from your Student Aid Report (SAR), issued when you apply for federal student aid. This program is available to both *undergraduate* and *graduate* students. You must indicate on the FAFSA that you are interested in this program.

Federal Loan Programs[†]

Youngstown State University offers loan assistance from the Federal Family Education Loan Program (FFELP). These are low-interest loans made to students attending school at least half time. YSU participates in the FFELP, where loans are made by a lender such as a bank, credit union, or savings and loan association. These loans are insured by a guaranty agency and reinsured by the federal government. You must repay this loan.

The subsidized Federal Stafford Loan is based on financial need as determined in your ISIR, the result of applying for federal student aid. The unsubsidized Federal Stafford Loan is awarded on the basis of your dependency status and cost of your education, minus other financial aid. The interest rate is variable, but not higher than 8.25 percent. Repayment of these loans begins after you graduate, leave school, or drop below half time for six months. Eligible students must maintain satisfactory academic progress and cannot be in default on any Title IV aid.

Federal PLUS loans enable parents with good credit histories to borrow for each child who is enrolled at least half time and is considered dependent by federal standards. These loans, like Federal Stafford loans, are made by a lender such as a bank, credit union, or savings and loan, and are awarded on the basis of the cost of your education minus other financial aid. The interest rate is variable, but not higher than 9%. You must indicate on the FAFSA that you are interested in this program and must file each year.

Other Loan Programs

There are other loan programs designed to bridge the funding gap when savings, grants, federal loans, and other resources are not enough or simply not available. Contact one of our financial aid counselors for more information

Veterans Administration Education Assistance

The Department of Veterans Affairs provides education assistance to veterans or current armed services personnel. Programs include contributory plans, rehabilitation benefits, work-study, and dependent/spousal benefits. Contact the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships for more information. Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation Awards

These two programs, funded by the BVR in Ohio and the OVR in Pennsylvania, provide grants for tuition, fees, and books for residents with disabilities. Eligibility is determined by each state's Bureau.

Ohio War Orphans Grants*

Children of disabled or deceased U.S. Armed Forces veterans are assisted by this program. There is a needs test and the student must be between 16 and 20 upon application for a grant. The grant is for tuition and fees. Phone 614-466-7420.

Ohio National Guard Grants

The Ohio National Guard provides grants for tuition to members who are full-time undergraduates. Apply through the National Guard, and pay close attention to deadlines. Phone 614-336-7032

Sponsored Programs

Graduate Assistant Fee Remission

Graduate assistants are graduate students working toward a degree who are employed by the University through the School of Graduate Studies. The stipend, or salary, starts at \$6,000 per year. Graduate assistants are also entitled to remission of tuition, including, where applicable, the non-resident tuition surcharge. Contact the School of Graduate Studies at 330-742-3091 for application.

Intercollegiate Athletics Grants-In-Aid

Monies appropriated by the Board of Trustees from the general fee revenue are available for grants-in-aid to student athletes. Grants may include tuition, room and board, and books. The athletic director, in consultation with the team coach, has the primary responsibility for determining the recipient and amount of award. Contact the Office of Intercollegiate Athletics at 330-742-7208 for information.

Student On-Campus Employment

Over 2,000 students are employed on campus each year. Youngstown State University students are given absolute priority for employment in all part-time, non-civil-service, hourly-wage jobs.

The rate of pay for such jobs is governed by minimum-wage law, and students are usually limited to 20 hours of work per week. To qualify for employment, a student must normally be enrolled full time (12 credit hours or more per semester) and be in good academic standing.

If you are interested in applying for any financial aid, you must first complete one of two forms:

- 1) Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- 2) Renewal Application which will be mailed to any student who completed the FAFSA in the prior school year

Once this form is completed and mailed to the processing center, you will receive an Institutional Student Information Record (SAR or ISIR). The ISIR determines your eligibility for a Federal Pell Grant and Ohio Instructional or Pennsylvania state grant. The Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships also uses the ISIR to determine your need for other types of campus-based aid such as Federal Perkins Loans, Federal Work-Study, and FSEOG to determine your eligibility for any of the Federal Family Education Loans (subsidized and unsubsidized Federal Stafford and PLUS loans).

You must complete the YSU Institutional Aid Application (part of Admission Application for new YSU students) to be considered for some need-based aid or other miscellaneous scholarships. Applications are available in the Office of Undergraduate Recruirment and Admissions and are due February 15.

Students who would like to be considered for Federal Work-Study, Federal Perkins Loans, or Federal Stafford Loans should so indicate on the FAFSA. All available on-campus student employment positions are posted in the Office of Student Life, located in Kilcawley Center.

Transfer Students

When you transfer from another college or university to YSU, your financial aid does not automatically go with you. Whether or not you received financial aid from your previous institution, you will need to send a Financial Aid Transcript to YSU if you attend another college during the same academic year you will enroll at YSU. This means a student enrolled at another school the summer before fall term begins will be required to submit a transcript from that school, as would a student enrolled at another school for fall or winter terms. Without transcript information, you will not receive aid from federal Title IV programs. If you have a Federal Pell Grant or federal loan, YSU's six-digit college code, 003145, must be listed as one of your college choices on the FAFSA in order to have to your aid transferred. If YSU is not currently listed, we can add it to your FAFSA information by request with your Personal Identification Number (PIN). If you had a Stafford or PLUS loan, you'll have to reapply. Please note: You will need to cancel

the loan you had at your previous school by contacting your lender (FFELP loans) or your previous school's financial aid office (federal direct loans). If you had a Federal Perkins Loan, a Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, or a Federal Work-Study job, check with the YSU Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships to find out if funds from these programs are available. If you received an Ohio Instructional Grant, you must complete a Student Transfer Form and submit it to State Grants and Scholarships.

Be sure to apply for financial aid as soon as possible after January 1. It is important to remember that you will need your own and your family's income tax returns to complete the FAFSA. The Institutional Aid Application should also be filed early to ensure optimum consideration, but no later than February 15.

Notification of Award

If you have been accepted for admission and have completed your applications by the appropriate deadlines, you will receive notification of your financial aid award status as soon as possible. If you are eligible to receive financial aid, the award notice will include a summary of your financial aid package specifying the type and amount of each award.

If your family's financial situation has changed dramatically since you filled out your original application, you may request a review of your award. To do so, contact the YSU Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships.

NOTE: Males 18 to 26 years old must be registered with the Selective Service before any aid can be disbursed.

Estimating College Costs

How much does college cost? When you begin comparing the expenses you will incur at different public and private colleges and universities, include the indirect as well as the direct costs in your calculations.

Tuition, fees, room and board are direct costs for which you will be billed. Equally important, although often overlooked, are the indirect costs of college, such as books, supplies, personal expenses, and travel. When you apply for financial aid, it is important to find out which of these costs your aid will cover.

At YSU, the budget we use in determining the amount of your financial aid includes both direct and indirect costs.

What Will You And Your Family Be Expected To Pay?

The cost of a YSU education can be met using a variety of resources—your own, your family's, private grants or scholarships, etc. Few students are able to pay the full cost of their education from family resources. Most receive some type of financial aid—grants, scholarships, loans and/or employment—to make up the difference.

The amount you are expected to pay will be based on what it is determined you and your family can afford to pay, i.e., Expected Family Contribution.

Because the definition of "family" will vary for different readers, some clarification may be helpful

If you are just graduating from high school and living with your parents, "family contribution" means that amount of money you and your parents should be able to contribute to your education. If, on the other hand, you are considered an independent student (based on the criteria listed below), "family contribution" means the amount you (and your spouse, if you are married) will be able to provide for your education.

Any one of the following criteria (simplified here) may qualify you to apply for financial aid as an independent student. You are:

- At least 24 years old
- A veteran of the U.S. armed forces
- A graduate/professional student enrolled beyond a bachelor's degree
- A married student
- A ward of the court, or both parents are deceased
- A student with legal dependents other than a spouse

Expected Family Contribution—What Is It? How Is It Determined?

The expected Family Contribution is the amount of money you and your family should be able to contribute to your education. It is determined by the U.S. Department of Education based on information you supply in the Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

To calculate your expected family contribution, the Department of Education looks at your family's total financial situation. They consider such factors as family size, the number of family members attending college, as well as your and your parents' income and assets. Such non-taxable income or benefits as Social Security, veteran's benefits, welfare payments, unemployment compensation, and financial aid awards you may have received from other sources are also included in their calculations.

Standards of Satisfactory Academic Progress

Satisfactory academic progress is reviewed annually during the spring term. An appeals process is in place. The standards of satisfactory academic progress for the continuance of federal financial aid is as follows:

Federal regulations require that financial aid recipients maintain satisfactory academic progress to remain eligible for federal financial assistance. Federal programs subject to these requirements include Federal Pell Grants, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, Federal Perkins Loans, Federal College Work Study, and all Federal Stafford Loan Programs.

Youngstown State University's satisfactory academic progress requirements include three components: 1) minimum grade point average; 2) maximum time frame to earn the degree sought; and 3) percentage completion rates. Youngstown State University's Office of Financial Aid & Scholarships assesses compliance with these requirements annually during the spring term. Students not in compliance with these requirements are suspended from federal financial aid eligibility, effective with the start of the next term.

Grade Point Average

Graduate programs: Students must be maintaining a cumulative YSU GPA of 3.00 at the time of the annual assessment.

Undergraduate programs: At the time of the annual assessment, students must have a cumulative YSU GPA of 1.75 if 32 to 49 credit hours have been attempted, and a cumulative YSU GPA of 2.00 if 50 or more credit hours have been attempted. Attempted hours include accepted transfer hours plus all hours attempted as of the last day to add a class.

Students academically suspended cannot receive federal financial aid during the period of suspension.

Time Frame

When a student's attempted hours, as defined above, reach 150% of the maximum hours needed to obtain an associate or bachelor's degree, federal financial aid eligibility will be suspended as part of the next annual assessment of satisfactory academic progress.

Percentage Completion

At the time of the annual assessment, completed hours as a percentage of attempted hours, as defined above, must meet the following minimum requirements:

Freshmen 65%
Sophomores 70%
Juniors 75%
Seniors and above 80%

Rank is also calculated based on attempted hours

Credit Hours Not Accepted

For federal financial aid satisfactory academic progress purposes, **attempted hours** exclude audited hours and withdrawals made by the last date to add a class. **Completed hours** exclude the following grades: F-failed; NC-no credit; AU-audit; I-incomplete; W-withdrawal. For Incompletes, note that the credit hours apply to the term in which the student was enrolled in the course, not the term the student was making up the Incomplete.

Reinstatement of Federal Aid

To reinstate your federal aid eligibility, you must meet the minimum GPA and percentage completion requirements or go through the appeals process. The time limit can be extended only with an appeal and an academic advisor's evaluation. Credits transferable from other institutions will be included in any recalculations for percentage completion purposes but only YSU grades enter into the GPA calculation.

Students must attend school without federal financial assistance while clearing their satisfactory academic progress unless an appeal is granted. Appeals must be made to the Office of Financial Aid & Scholarships, and supporting documentation may be required. When reinstatement is granted, a student may only be considered for those financial aid funds available at that time. Contact the Office of Financial Aid & Scholarships for an appeal form and for additional information on deadlines and conditions.

Financial Aid Refund Policy

The refunding of financial aid funds corresponds to federal regulations and YSU's refund policy regarding withdrawal from class(es). This policy is explained in greater detail in the *Undergraduate Bulletin*.

Financial Aid Time Line

February 15 Priority deadline for filling out Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and submitting YSU's Institutional Aid Application.

March 15 YSU starts awarding need-based aid. To be considered, your 2001-2002 FAFSA must be complete.

April 13 Your FAFSA results must be complete and accurate. If you are selected for verification, this process must be finalized before need-based aid can be awarded.

May 1 Most need-based aid funding is exhausted.

July 13 Submit YSU loan-request/confirmation form to the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships by this date to ensure fall semester funds arrive on time. To be processed, your 2001-2002 results must be complete.

What happens when you do not meet deadlines?

Failure to submit your FAFSA and YSU's Institutional Aid Application on time may result in lost opportunities for need-based campus aid, as well as delays in processing. Financial need cannot be determined without complete and accurate FAFSA results. If you are selected for verification, this process must be finalized before need-based aid can be awarded. Funding for need-based campus aid is limited; by May 1 most of this aid is already committed for the upcoming academic year. To avoid delays in receiving you loan money for next year, make sure your FAFSA is complete and your YSU loan request/confirmation form is submitted to YSU's financial aid office by July 13.

If you do not meet these timelines, you may need to make








Heart of the

Even in the age of computers and video, YSU faculty continue to demonstrate that technology can enhance—but not replace—person-to-person learning and teaching. Our full-time tenured faculty—many of them noted researchers and scholars—are right there in the undergraduate classrooms, one instructor for every 20 students. That means you get the opportunity to ask questions and get the time you need from professors. Large lecture sessions often found at larger universities are the exception at YSU—not the usual fate of undergraduates.

Tutoring


don't know where all her strength comes from."

think about nothing else but my sorority and making Homecoming court. There


was a time for all those

To Tamica, her sorority is very much like family—and that is what's best about it. "The sisterhood is really important to me. I was the only girl in my family, and growing up, I didn't have a lot of friends. I always had my head in a book or something. Now I have the sisterhood—the common kinship. My sorority sisters and I can finish each other's sentences—we are that close. Like with my sorority sister Shannon—I know I can depend on her for whatever. 

"My advice to new students is, Don't think you can't qualify for aid. You probably can. But you have to apply, and do it early—in winter of your senior year in high school. The forms aren't too bad, and the financial aid counselors will help you. They'll be able to tell you even before you enroll what kind of money you can get. The people here are always willing to work with you."

Apply yourself!

You can qualify for some really solid scholarships and awards, and you don't have to be a genius to meet the criteria. Some things you could try for:

- Trustees' Scholarships, President's Scholarships, Deans' Scholarships—reward you if you've done outstanding work in high school
- Leadership Scholarships—reward you if you've demonstrated leadership and academic achievement in high school
- Martin Luther King Inner-City Achievement Award—for graduates of area city schools, based on need
- Ohio Academic Scholarships—for outstanding graduates of Ohio high schools who go to universities in the state

Lots of other private-donor scholarships exist to help YSU students, some based on need, some on academics, some on both.



Noelle Hudak, Canfield, Ohio YSU Nursing major





Dance instructor Noelle Hudak and a hundred of her young students wait backstage for their entrance cues at their annual recital. The twelve hundred-seat auditorium is nearly filled with family and friends. "Miss Noelle, what if I forget my routine?" asks an anxious performer in a polka-dot costume. The teacher fully understands the anxiety—Noelle has danced in recitals and competitions since she was two and a half. "You've rehearsed this same piece so many times—you'll do great. And if you do make a mistake, just keep on dancing," she says.

Noelle is proud of her students' performance. She says, "When you see that they've come such a long way over the last year, that's such a good feeling."

Noelle has been teaching tap and jazz dance since she was sixteen. Her students and fellow instructors are like family to her, so when it was time to choose a college, she wasn't about to go far from them. Why should she? "YSU is close to home. I didn't have to leave the things that were important to me behind when I have all the conveniences of a large

university right here," says Noelle.

Lives for "ER"

YSU's nursing curriculum had Noelle enrolled in general courses for the first year—psychology, English, etc. But she was anxious to get on with what she came to YSU for. "I can't wait to get into my major, have all those nursing labs and that fun stuff you get to do."

The doctors and nurses of television drama add to the anticipation. "Oh, I live for 'ER'! My boyfriend knows that he shouldn't call between ten and eleven on Thursday nights. I'll watch it and think, 'I can't do this.' Then I'll think, 'OK, it's just a TV show, and it's not really like that.'" Noelle didn't wait long to find out. She spent the summer after her freshman year volunteering at a local hospital's emergency room, preparing herself for what's ahead.

Noelle's Visewords

"Make your own decisions. Live how you want to live, and don't be afraid to make the little mistakes that everyone's going to make. Maybe you'll change your major five times—or move away then move back home. Let that happen."



A Different Way to Learn

Like many first-year college students, Noelle has noticed a difference in the way that classes are taught, and she has had to adjust her studying regime to match. "I'm more into studying now. I have to make myself sit down. In high school, I didn't have to do that too much," says Noelle. "But I have noticed that there is less busy work than there was in high school."

Dr. Karen Becker, coordinator of the Reading and Study Skills Center, has heard these comments many times. She teaches YSU courses that help students make the transition to college successfully. She explains the differences this way. "A lot of kids didn't have to study in high school. But remember, as a high school student, you spend thirty hours of structured time in the classroom. In college you spend only twelve to fifteen hours of structured time. The fact that you are given less busy work is a switching of responsibility from the teacher to the student. Students have to create their own homework. You may not have to hand it in, but you still need to do it—to create ways to practice, organize, and absorb the material on your own."

A Commitment of Time

Becker says that most college instructors expect students to spend about two to three hours reading and studying outside the classroom for every one hour spent in the classroom. "If you are taking a twelve-hour course load," says Becker, "that means you are studying twenty-four hours on your own. Going to school is a thirty-six-hour-a-week job!"







Football is a big deal in northeastern Ohio, with loyal fans and talented players on all levels—high school, college, and professional. In fact, in a recent NCAA study, it was pointed out that this is one of the most tradition-rich areas in the entire country for producing talented football players who pursue both their athletic and academic careers beyond high school. YSU Mechanical Engineering major Mike Latessa played at Youngstown's Cardinal Mooney High School. "It was a tough program—a good program. We had a lot of winning years there," he says. Mike was not only a player, but a fan as well. He followed Coach Jim Tressel's successful YSU Penguins as they captured three national championships in 1991, 1993, and 1994. So it seems fitting that during his first year, Mike participated in YSU's football program as the team gained their fourth national

NCAA Division I AA title-

Mike deserves a lot of credit for his participation, considering that he received no athletic scholarship, and he didn't even suit up for games, since he was red-shirted. His status was that of a walk-on—one who works every day with the team, plays against his teammates during practices, and takes all the hits, bumps, and bruises that any other player might. Walk-ons are just as important as scholarship players—just ask former walk-on Harry Deligianis, who became a YSU All-American in 1997 and who was later drafted by the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars.

Offensive coordinator John Klacik says, "It takes a special person to be a student athlete at YSU; the demands are tough.

But Mike has got things he's trying to accomplish, and he's going about them in the right way. He's very self-motivated."

Financing an Education

When Mike began planning for college, he was concerned about how it would all get paid for. He consulted friends, family members, and a YSU financial aid counselor to help him locate resources. Mike receives a Dean's Scholarship of \$2,000 and Pell Grants to cover most of his costs. For the expenses beyond what these cover, Mike works summer jobs—busing tables and selling kitchen knives. Whatever it takes. Mike's parents help him out in a pinch as well.

'A Pleasure to Help'

Financial Aid and Scholarships Associate Director Elaine Ruse, who assisted Mike, says, "It was a pleasure to help Mike as he was entering YSU. He took the initiative and found out what he could about the financial aid process and application time lines, and because of that, he was able to get the financial aid he needed. I advise all high school students to make an appointment and come into the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships during January or February before high school graduation. Meeting deadlines is the most important thing you can do to be considered for the aid you are qualified for."

When Dreams Come

When Mike was a kid, he was really into Hotwheels and Matchbox cars—and trucks. He was amazed at the big rigs and thought he might drive them one day. But the career goals of a seven-year-old are likely to evolve, as did Mike's.

In junior high and high school, Mike discovered his aptitude for mathematics. It was never something he had to put a lot of time into, but nevertheless he excelled where numbers were concerned. "I guess it's just something I'm naturally good at," he says.

Mechanical engineering became his career of choice. It's a profession that

career of choice. It's a profession that he associates with doing things people can use. "I don't know, maybe I'll do something in the automotive industry. It looks like I'm going back to the truck thing again."



Getting Here

From the northwest (Cleveland, Toledo): Ohio Turnpike to Exit 218 (15). Follow I-80 East to I-680, Youngstown. Exit at 422 East and proceed to Wick Avenue exit. Turn right onto Wick Avenue. Turn right again at the first light (University Plaza). Go to Bryson Street, turn right, and enter the M-8 visitor's parking lot.

From the north: Take Rt.11 south to I-80 East. Take the first exit off I-80—Rt. 193 South, Belmont Avenue. Make a right on Belmont and proceed south about 1.5 miles to the light at Gypsy Lane. Make a left on Gypsy; at the third traffic light, make a right onto Fifth Avenue. Go about 1.6 miles on Fifth until you cross the overpass for Rt. 422. Go over the bridge and make the next left on the eastbound access road. Bear **right** past the YSU stadium. At the stop

sign, go straight ahead to Wick Avenue and turn right on Wick. Make a right at the next light on University Plaza. Then, turn right on Bryson Street and enter the M-8 visitor's lot.

From the east: Take I-80 West to Rt. 193 South, Belmont Avenue. Make a left on Belmont and proceed south about 1.5 miles to the light at Gypsy Lane. Make a left on Gypsy; at the third traffic light, make a right onto Fifth Avenue. Go about 1.6 miles on Fifth until you cross the overpass for Rt. 422. Go over the bridge and make the next left on the eastbound




access road. Bear **right** past the YSU stadium. At the stop sign, go straight ahead to Wick Avenue, and turn right onto Wick. Make a right at the next light on University Plaza. Then, turn right on Bryson Street and enter the M-8 visitor's lot.


From Pittsburgh: Take the PA Turnpike to Exit 234 (16A) on the Ohio Turnpike. From there, take I-680 approximately 10 miles to Exit 6B (Rt. 62 and Hubbard). Follow signs for YSU and take Rt. 422 West. Take the first exit (Wick Avenue) and turn left on Wick. At the next light, make a right on University Plaza. Go to Bryson Street, turn right, and enter the M-8 visitor's lot.

From the south: Take Ohio Rt.11 North to I-680 East. Then take exit 4A, Rt. 422 East. Exit the freeway at Wick Avenue and turn right on Wick. Turn

right again on University Plaza. Go one block to Bryson Street, turn right, and enter the M-8 visitor's lot.

From the west (Akron, Columbus): Take 1-71 or 1-77
North to 1-76 East. Where 1-80 and 1-76 divide, follow 1-80 until it intersects with 1-680 East to Youngstown. Follow 1-680 to Exit 4A, Rt. 422 East. Exit the 422 freeway at Wick Avenue and turn right. Turn right again on University Plaza. Go one block to Bryson Street, turn right, and enter the M-8 visitor's lot.



An Open Letter to the Parents of Prospective Music Majors

e are now approaching the time of year when many high school seniors will make decisions about their college education. With a society that is putting more and more emphasis on financially rewarding careers, students are tending to choose majors such as engineering, computer science, and business, that they believe will help them successfully enter the job market. Despite the emphasis on studies that are considered more job-relevant, many high school seniors have expressed a strong interest in the field of music on their S.A.T. exams.

Many people believe that a degree in music gives a student an extremely narrow focus, which in turn makes employment more difficult. To lay education in music has greatly expanded, allowing students to incorporate numerous electives from other disciplines into their music curriculum. In this way, graduates gain the skills necessary to enter a variety of occupations. Successful music students tend to possess the qualities and skills that are generally considered essential to employers in business, education, and service organizations, as well as to performing groups.

Successful musicians have undoubtedly spent long hours in the practice rooms and the music library and have benefited from the opportunities available at a professional school of music. In addition to the obvious enhancement of music talent, the courses in music history, theory, and education help students improve their writing, communication, and analytical skills. Furthermore, music demands a high sense of self-discipline. A successful performer rarely resorts to cramming the night before a recital, but has devoted many months of consistent practice before performing. It is the musician's self-discipline and dedication that make music majors especially popular among professors in other academic subjects. In fact, as entering freshmen, music majors often have the highest S.A.T. scores in all areas.

Successful musicians usually do not limit their education to the field of music. They often couple a strong foundation in the liberal arts with their music courses, allowing them to gain a

much broader perspective on the discipline of music and on life in general. These same liberal arts courses also give music students additional experience in comprehending written material, writing effectively, making effective speeches and presentations, identifying problems and their solutions, analyzing and evaluating ideas and presentations, using the library and research facilities. dealing with the public, working on long-term projects, organizing time effectively, and working independently. The skills in communication, analysis, and synthesis gained from liberal arts courses can only add to the credibility and experience of a student applying for any music-related position. In addition, if a musician should decide to change careers, these same skills can help ease the entry into a new

Most important, the field of music is not just for those interested in teaching or performing professionally. For example, music alumni have held the following positions: music therapists, record company presidents, violin makers, performing artists' agents, piano store owners, church music directors, sheet music store owners, plano technicians. symphony personnel managers, radio station presidents, music publishing house presidents, music engravers and typesetters, and music arrangers for Broadway and television. The National Endowment for the Arts also has numerous positions available particularly for performers. In 1965 the United States had 58 orchestras, 27 opera companies, 22 professional theatres, and 37 dance companies. There were also only seven state arts agencies. Today, there are 192 orchestras, 102 opera companies, 389 theatres, and 213 dance companies. In addition, there are now 50 full-time state arts agencies. Campus career planning and placement offices are filled with reference books that provide details on hundreds of occupations. including the ones mentioned above. In addition, these offices often have information on various alumni who are willing to talk about their own occupation with any student who contacts them.

A music degree does not require a narrow curriculum. Many musicians do find jobs. These successful musicians usually have developed a variety of skills (in addition to their musical talent) through courses and programs both in and outside the music school, and they have also made good use of their school's career planning office. Successful musicians have become active and important members of the larger society now places on science and industry makes the need for musicians more crucial than ever.

For example, music alumni have held the following positions: music therapists, record company presidents, violin makers, performing artists' agents, piano store owners, church music directors, sheet music store owners, piano technicians. symphony personnel managers, radio station presidents, music publishing house presidents, music engravers and typesetters, and music arrangers for Broadway and television. The National Endowment for the Arts also has numerous positions available particularly for performers. In 1965 the United States had 58 orchestras, 27 opera companies, 22 professional theatres, and 37 dance companies. There were also only seven state arts agencies. Today, there are 192 orchestras, 102 opera companies, 389 theatres, and 213 dance companies. In addition, there are now 50 full-time state arts agencies. Campus career planning and placement offices are filled with reference books that provide details on hundreds of occupations. including the ones mentioned above. In addition, these offices often have information on various alumni who are willing to talk about their own occupation with any student who contacts them.

A music degree does not require a narrow curriculum. Many musicians do find jobs. These successful musicians usually have developed a variety of skills (in addition to their musical talent) through courses and programs both in and outside the music school, and they have also made good use of their school's career planning office. Successful musicians have become active and important members of the larger society. Indeed, the emphasis our society now places on science and industry makes the need for musicians more crucial than ever.


