



#### **EDITORIAL**

#### MARCH OF DIMES

The March of Dimes Campaign began on January 2, and ends January 31, 1959. This year it is an attack on arthritis, congenital defects as well as poliomyelitis. To the many victims of these diseases and defects and their parents, it means a hope for the future. Certainly, few of us, including our families and friends, during a lifetime escape all three of them.

Arthritis, as we all know, can be a crippling disease affecting young and old. The basic etiology of it is still unknown and the treatment unsatisfactory. Certainly it should be included in this campaign for there is much research to be done about prevention and or cure.

Birth defects are probably one of the major childhood medical problems. They are exceeded only by accident as a cause of "crippling" and "disability" in children. They are the cause of 34,000 infant deaths, or one fourth of all U.S. infants who are stillborn or die annually within the first month of life. Some result from inherent errors in heredity and are a difficult problem in prevention. The other main group lend themselves more readily for control i.e. those caused mainly by "environmental conditions." They include mishaps, injuries and infections that are often preventable. There is also much research to be done in this field.

Although victory over polio is in sight, research in the rehabilitation of polio victims will continue, as well as continued polio clinical inoculations and aid to those who contract the disease.

It is encouraging to see this great foundation with all its' experience now concentrating on other diseases which disable and cripple our children. All of us can aid when the March of Dimes Campaign needs funds. Remember . . . one of us or ours can be next.



#### St. Elizabeth Hospital



#### Twenty Years Ago-January, 1939

President Skipp said that the Society needed  $\alpha$  central office with an executive secretary. He said, "Publicity must be continued. Lay education is more important now than ever before. Scientific advancement cannot be sidetracked for any of these. They must all progress together if we are to keep our self respect and our place as a noble profession."

Dr. Robert Poling was President-Elect after serving four years as Secretary. John Noll was the new Secretary after two years on the Program Committee. Dr. H. E. Patrick was the Editor of the Bulletin and Elmer Nagel

was Treasurer.

At the annual banquet the main speaker was Dr. Jonothan Forman, Editor of the Ohio Medical Journal and instructor in allergy at Ohio State University. His subject was "Uncle Sam M.D." He warned the doctors about the creeping socialism of the New Deal and gave advice on methods to maintain the private practice of medicine by independent plans for sickness insurance.

The A.M.A. was under indictment in Washington, D.C. accused of being a combination in restraint of trade. It caused a great stir in medical circles because it was a criminal action, tried in a criminal court. The details cannot be given in small space but the outcome was that the A.M.A. and the Medical Society of Washington were found guilty and some of the officers heavily fined. It was a case of the United States vs. the A.M.A. As the gambler said when he heard the indictment against him as "The State of Ohio vs. Joe Blow," he thought a minute and said "not a chance at those odds."

The Medical Crier was taking stock and bragging about the wonderful age of planes flying across the continent; radio, assembly lines, Diesel engines, pneumonia serum and novocaine; spinal amesthesia, insulin, diathermy, fever therapy, vitamines and sulfanilamide. He never said a word about television and antibiotics, rockets or space ships. It makes one afraid to speak about how modern we are. The writer twenty years from now might laugh.


Dr. E. W. Coe died in November, one of the leading physicians of the day. Dr. W. J. Colbert passed away, still a young man full of promise.

There were 271 members: 211 active, 12 non-resident, 42 associate and 6 honorary.

Ten Years Ago—January, 1949

Dr. John McCann took office as President. C. A. Gustafson was the Editor. Other officers and committees were not named. There were 230 active members, 9 interne, 3 associate and 11 honorary.

At last the A.M.A. had decided to do something. For sixteen years the threat of socialized medicine had been growing until the situation was critical. The House of Delegates voted to assess each member \$25.00 to pay for a nationwide program directed by public relations experts to sell the advantages of the American system of medical practice to the public. Up to that time the A.M.A. had sidestepped the issue because it was political. The rising clamor of the doctors was finally heeded and the A.M.A. decided to use all its resources to fight the trend toward a system copied from Europe. What they accomplished is well known and makes a fine page in medical history. They are still waging the fight and will continue to do so as long as doctors refuse to be regimented into panels and their patients refuse to become numbers instead of persons with the power to choose their physicians.

Dr. Douglas Bond, psychiatrist from Cleveland, addressed the Society on "Doctor and Patient Relationship." His talk was down to earth and very practical. He told the doctors to listen to their patients, close the doors and not fiddle with things to distract attention; to keep quiet when the patient wants to talk and get other people out of the room so that the patient can unburden his troubles in confidence. Not to get offended if the patient with chronic illness complains about his treatment, for often the patient does better after such an outburst. To anticipate the need for consultation and suggest it before the patient in desperation asks for it or goes to someone else.

A recovery room was instituted at the North Side Unit for patients after surgery. Dr. A. J. Fisher advised the doctors to tell the anxious relatives that there would be a delay of several hours before the patient was returned to his room but in the meantime he would be receiving the closest attention.

New members that month were R. J. Scheetz, E. A. Shorten, Ben Brown, and D. M. Metcalf.

Dr. R. M. Morrison died Nov. 19th. He was one of Youngstown's outstanding physicians for 54 years. While conducting a large practice he was active in civic affairs and was the leading figure in the construction of the North Side Unit and the rebuilding of the South Unit of the Youngstown Hospital.



#### DR. T. K. GOLDEN 1903-1958

The death of a friend or acquaintance always produces much comment. The remark, "He never said an unkind word to anyone" seemed to epitomize T. K. Golden.

The passing of this quiet man evoked regret in those who only knew him, genuine sorrow in those who knew him well and a sense of wrenching loss in his family group.

One of the Almighty's favorites, he lived as His servant and suffered as

a saint.

A social evening with T. K. Golden was a low key pleasant event. In discussion, the exactness of recall was noted as Kernan quietly stated the missing facts. Leavened with an impish, sly wit, talks with him were always most enjoyable.

As a surgeon, T. K. Golden was possessed of a depth of knowledge of his specialty—Orthopedic Surgery—which permitted him to use the bold approach confidently in trying situations; the much sought "good result"

seemed almost the perogative of his patients.

Kernan's family who survive him are his wife, Anita, devoted and uncomplaining in her care of him, his children, Thomas, Peter, James and Katey, one brother, Jerome and his sisters, Margaret Golden and Helen Colbert—the latter assisted him greatly in his work.

T. K. Golden was born in Duncansville, Pa. on Oct. 23, 1903. He came to Youngstown with his family and attended St. Columba and Rayen Schools. He graduated from Georgetown in 1928. He served one year internship at St. Elizabeth Hospital followed by three years Residency in Orthopedics at Bellevue Hospital in New York City. He began his practice in Youngstown in 1934.





# MEDICAL GLEANINGS DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT OF STROKES

Irving S. Wright, M.D., F.A.C.P. New York, N.Y.

The study and treatment of cerebral vascular diseases can no longer be compartmentalized within one specialty such as neurology. In fact, strokes are not primarily lesions of the brain, but usually represent a localized manifestation of a generalized condition, most commonly either atherosclerosis, hypertension, or a disorder of the clotting mechanism. Many specialties have a legitimate interest, including lipid chemists and other biochemists, ophthalmologists, roentgenologists, those studying atherosclerosis, hypertension and blood coagulation, vascular and neurosurgeons and many others.

The relation of the amount of saturated fats ingested to the development of strokes is not established, and much further work needs to be carried out in this area. It is doubtful that a high fat meal increases in any significant measure the risk of intravascular thrombosis.

The use of anticoagulants constitutes an important contribution to the treatment of transient or "little" strokes due to partial occlusion of the carotid or basilar arteries. They appear to influence favorably the long-term outlook for patients after the first stroke. Additional studies are being carried out to refine the diagnosis further and to evaluate the risks of this treatment, especially when used during the acute phases of a stroke involving the cerebral arteries and other branches passing through the brain substance. Venous thrombosis should also be considered more frequently in analyzing the pathogenesis of strokes. New surgical technics are being used for the treatment of massive brain hemorrhage, and for prosthetic by-passing of seg-



ments of the carotid arteries when they have developed occlusion. These and other surgical approaches are pioneering but important forerunners of the future. Rehabilitation and psychiatric care are being subjected to more critical scrutiny and evaluation but, pending the results, it seems justified to apply the principles of both very early in the treatment of the patient.

Comprehensive and cooperative studies are now under way which

should produce answers to many of the problems which remain unsolved.

# HYPERTENSIVE CEREBROVASCULAR DISEASE: A Clinical and Pathologic Review of 100 Cases

Arthur J. Hudson and Herbert H. Hyland

A series of 100 cases of hypertension with autopsy has been reviewed,

mainly with regard to neurologic features.

The initial symptoms were found to provide some indication with regard to the subsequent course of hypertension. The actual cause of death was of course not predictable, except that those with a stroke as the initial symptom most often died of a cerebrovascular accident.

About half of the patients had strokes due to vascular insufficiency or occlusion, and about half of these had more than one such episode. It is emphasized that in hypertension considerable damage to the brain may exist without its being apparent in the history or on the clinical examination.

The mortality from intracranial hemorrhage was 31%. Ten per cent of the series survived a cerebral hemorrhage (1 to 3.5 cm. in size), although in most instances death occurred later from another hemorrhage elsewhere in the brain. Blood was present in the cerebrospinal fluid in only half of these cases, and there may therefore be difficulty in distinguishing nonfatal

Mental deterioration occurred in 18% of the series, and was observed most often in association with strokes, but it sometimes existed in the absence of recognizable clinical episodes. This was usually found to be associated with multiple small softenings both old and recent, throughout the brain.

Papilledema, when present, was usually accompanied by hemorrhages and exudates. No consistent correlation was found between the presence of papilledema and increased cerebrospinal fluid pressure, or between papilledema and the presence of cerebral edema at autopsy. In those cases showing cerebral edema at autopsy, uremia had frequently existed.

Convulsions occurred in 20% of the series, most often in the few days prior to death, in association with uremia, cerebral hemorrhage of thrombosis, and shock.






