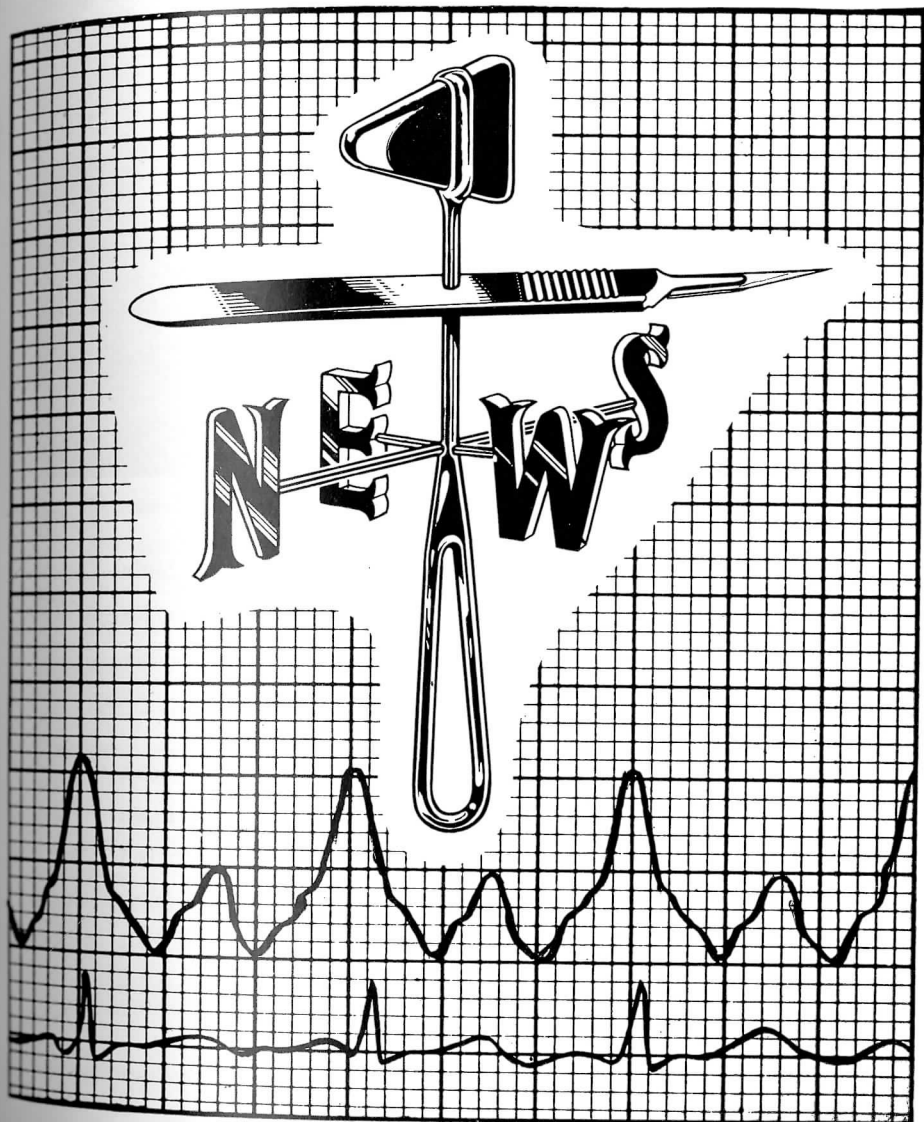

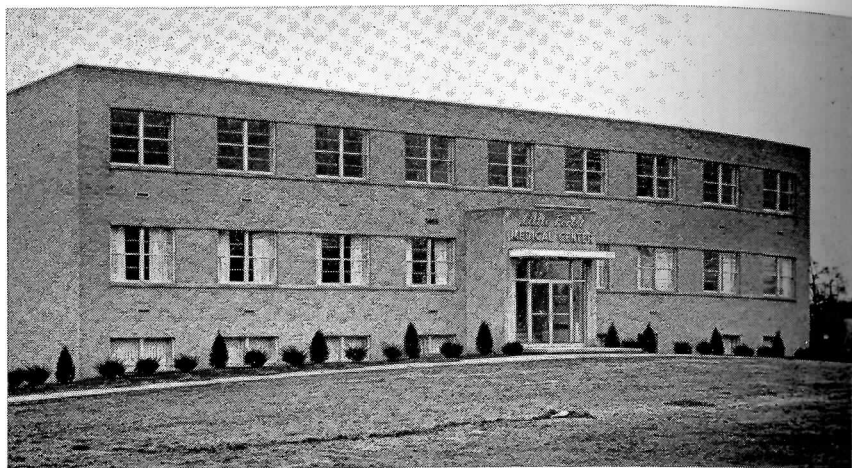
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## *From the Desk of the President*

Ambitious ideas and programs are fine, but it takes interested people to make them work. We hope you will come back and take a look at the "new" Medical Society for only through new blood can an old organization prosper.

## TWENTY YEARS AGO — JULY 1948

The *Bulletin* took notice of the sad event in a factual, obituary-like article.

Take to the courtroom the same high standards of responsibility you apply in your practice.

Establish the court's confidence in you by the dignity and modesty of your dress and bearing.

Strive to present your testimony in terms that are clear to everyone.

Testify only on matters you are qualified to discuss.

Inform the court of all pertinent facts, whether favorable to the patient or not.

Maintain an attitude of impartiality no matter what direction the trial is taking.

Observe the inviolability of your patient's confidential disclosures whenever possible.

Never engage in acrimony during cross-examination.

Yield to the judge's superior knowledge and wider experience regarding legal questions.

## TWO HOSPITALS NAME MEDICAL DIRECTORS

Two announcements made within the same week named Dr. S. V. Squicquero as medical director of St. Elizabeth Hospital and Dr. Robert Wiltsie as medical director of Youngstown Hospital Association. Dr. Wiltsie will assume his position on August 1, and Dr. Squicquero on September 1.

Dr. Squicquero has been medical education director on a part-time basis since 1963. Dr. Wiltsie is currently president of the medical staff and has been chief of pediatrics since 1965. Dr. Wiltsie will succeed Dr. Barry Decker, who resigned to become program director and chief executive officer of the Northeast Ohio Regional Medical Program. St. Elizabeth Hospital has not had a full-time medical director for the past several years.

Both physicians will discontinue their private practices in order to take over the new positions.

## BULLETIN BOARD

Dr. J. N. McCann, chairman of the Youngstown State University Board of Trustees, has been appointed to a seven-member committee of university officials which will study the implementation of an Ohio state law defining the authority of university boards of trustees.

Dr. M. M. Szucs, trustee of Central State University, has been awarded an honorary doctor of science degree by that school for his research work in nuclear medicine. He has done study on the subject at Oak Ridge, Tenn., Ohio State University, University of Wake Forest and the University of California.

Dr. James L. Fisher was honored with a 50-year certificate at the reunion of the class of 1918 of Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia.

Dr. Robert E. Hamlich has resigned as director of the Adult Mental Health Clinic to join the staff of the Fort Logan Mental Health Center in Denver. Dr. Hamlich was also coordinator for the new Child and Adult Mental Health Center.

Dr. A. E. Rappoport has completed a 19-day tour of Europe, where he spoke at medical schools and colleges on the continent, England and Scandinavia. His talks, under the auspices of IBM Corp., were on automation and computers in clinical laboratories.

Dr. Robert Gilliland recently was the speaker at a meeting of the Youngstown Area Association for Children with Learning Disabilities. Dr. Gilliland discussed functions, uses and methods of a neurological diagnosis.

Dr. Frank Gelbman was the June speaker for the monthly continuing education program of the Mahoning County Bar Association. He discussed psychiatric diagnoses in relation to people lawyers see in their offices and other psychiatric problems encountered in everyday practice of law.

Dr. and Mrs. Sidney Franklin attended the Annual Meeting of the AMA and its Auxiliary, respectively, in San Francisco. He is a Fellow and Governor of the American College of Legal Medicine and was elected its Treasurer. He will serve on the Executive Committee.





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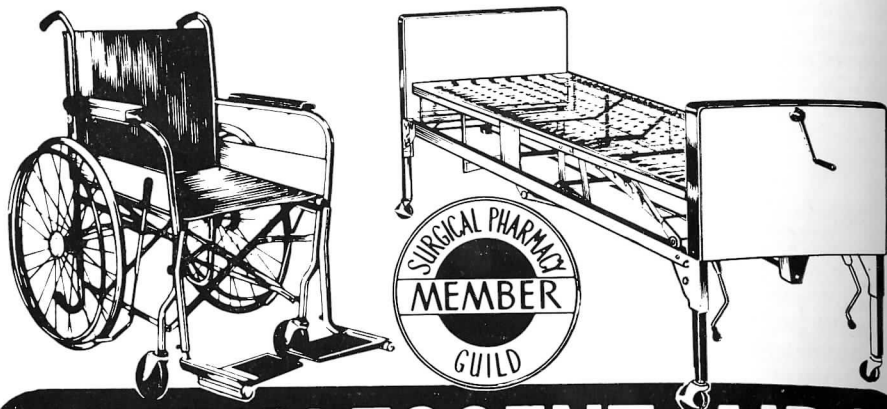

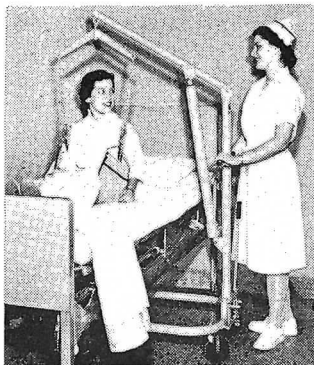
The Invocation was given by Dr. Fisher and the Benediction by Dr. Calder.

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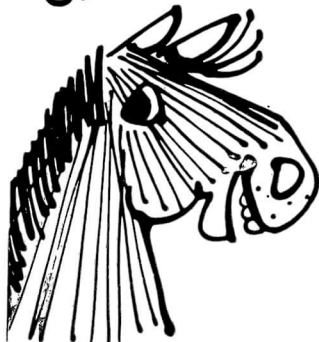
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## LETTER

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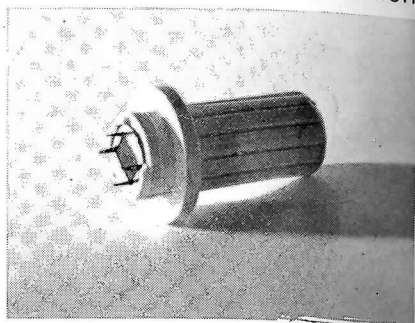
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## DR. BURROWES ON YSU BOARD

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## DOCTORS IN SAFETY SEMINAR

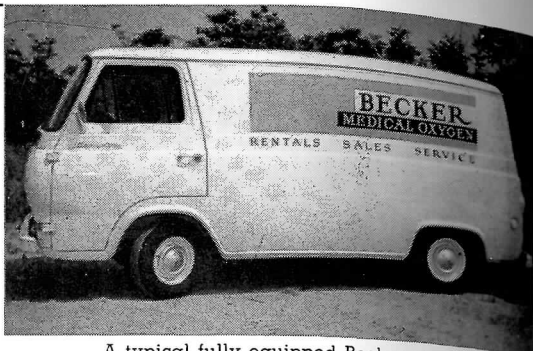
Dr. James N. Gordon and Dr. Robert L. Gilliland presented educational material at the 13th Seminar on Emergency Care, arranged by the Safety Council of Greater Youngstown last month.

Dr. Gordon demonstrated closed chest heart massage and simultaneous mouth to mouth resuscitation to some fifty ambulance and rescue squad personnel. Dr. Gilliland diagrammed head, neck and back injury immediate first aid and precautions to be taken in transport.

In addition, Lewis H. Reed, Director of First Aid and Water Safety Services of the local Red Cross outlined first aid courses offered by his group. Joseph Pitts, New Middletown Rescue Squad and member of the Sheriff's Water Patrol, demonstrated grappling gear, and techniques used in water search and rescue. Charles A. Vimmerstedt, Manager of the Safety Council is in charge of the seminars.

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## PROCEEDINGS OF COUNCIL

JUNE 11, 1968

The regular meeting of the council of the Mahoning County Medical Society was held on Tuesday, June 11, 1968, at the Mural Room, Youngstown, Ohio.

The following physicians were present: R. R. Fisher, president, presiding; J. J. Anderson, J. J. Buckley, C. A. Hixson, Henry Holden, W. D. Loeser, R. D. Murray, J. V. Newsome, C. E. Pichette, H. J. Reese, E. T. Saadi, F. L. Schellhase, Jack Schreiber, J. W. Tandatnick, and Kurt Wegner. Absent were: Drs. Louis Bloomberg, L. P. Caccamo, G. E. DeCicco, F. A. Friedrich, R. L. Jenkins, M. C. Raupple, and R. G. Warnock. Also present were Drs. M. J. Vuksta and R. W. Fenton.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Fisher introduced Mr. Stillson and Mr. Peck of Stillson and Donahay, who reviewed three insurance programs which they administrate for the Mahoning County Medical Society.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Bills were read. The motion was made, seconded and duly passed that each bill be paid. The following applications were presented by the censors:

### ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP

The applications were approved. The above applicants will become active members of the Mahoning County Medical Society within fifteen days after publication in the *Bulletin*, unless objection is filed in writing with the secretary during that time.

The Medical Dental Bureau "any doctor call" report was passed around for every member to see.

The executive secretary reported on disposition of business accruing from the previous council meeting.

Discussion ensued regarding the Mahoning Valley Health Planning Association. The motion was made by Dr. Reese, and properly seconded, that the 1968 contribution to the Association be withheld until we receive information concerning their budget, their financial report, who made original contributions and related subjects. Motion passed.

A letter was read from the Ohio State Medical Association stating that the request for closer meetings of the House of Delegates would be brought before the OSMA Council.

A letter was read from Dr. Howard Jones acknowledging receipt of \$2,000 for a feasibility study for a medical school.

A letter was read from the Health and Welfare Council concerning delegates for next year. Dr. Fisher will appoint delegates.

An attending physicians form for the City Water Department was passed around. The motion was made by Dr. Newsome, and properly seconded, that a letter be sent to the Water Department informing them that the current form is unnecessary, that it should be a short form, and for not less than 3 days illness. Motion passed.

Dr. Tandatnick reported on a meeting of the Mahoning County Medical Society Foundation. He submitted the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that Paragraph 11 of the Trust Agreement dated July 8, 1966, between the MAHONING COUNTY MEDICAL SOCIETY and the DOLLAR SAVINGS AND TRUST COMPANY which agreement created the MAHONING COUNTY MEDICAL SOCIETY FOUNDATION, be, and it hereby is, amended to read as follows:

"11. This agreement shall be irrevocable but may be terminated at any time by action of the Trustor. Upon any such termination the Trustee shall promptly distribute the entire trust fund as an unre-

stricted gift to such educational and charitable organizations in the City of Youngstown, Ohio, or vicinity, qualifying as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the local division, branches or affiliates of such organizations as the Appointing Committee shall then select. If not so terminated, the Trust shall continue perpetually or until all of its property shall have been distributed for the charitable and educational purposes hereinabove set forth."

Further resolved, that the President and Secretary of the Mahoning County Medical Society be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute such an amendment to said agreement in writing on behalf of the Society.

The motion was seconded and passed.

Dr. Fenton discussed the pre-school immunizations of the Mahoning County Board of Health. During the discussion, council agreed that certain standards of good medicine should be brought to the attention of the Board of Health and that a letter be sent suggesting that the appeal be addressed to those who could not afford a private physician, that an adequate record be sent to the physician, and that all persons be informed of the possible medical reactions. The motion was made by Dr. Wegner, and properly seconded that the letter be sent.

Dr. Vuksta made a report for the Trauma Committee and for the Athletic Injuries Committee, of which he is chairman.

Dr. Saadi made a report for the Regional Medical Program Committee, announcing the appointment of Dr. Barry Decker as director, and informing council of the current work of the local committee.

Dr. Fisher made a report on a recent meeting of the Medical School Committee with representatives of the Sixth District and representatives of Youngstown State University.

Dr. Fisher reported on a letter of commendation written to Dr. Sidney Franklin, former Health Commissioner. Council approved the letter.

Dr. Fisher announced that the September meeting would be with the Corydon Palmer Dental Society, at Coalburg Lake, would be an afternoon and evening outing and would cost \$6.50.

Meeting was adjourned.

## DR. FOSTER RETURNS FROM VIETNAM

Want to know what it's like in Vietnam? Ask Dr. R. M. Foster — he was there! Dr. Foster has resumed his practice after a two-month tour of duty as a physician under the AMA Vietnam program.

He reports that the work he did there was similar to that which he is doing in Youngstown, except that the causes for broken bones are different, being mostly a result of shells and gunfire.

He was stationed at a 450-bed state hospital located in Rach Gia in the Mekong Delta. The hospital treated mostly civilians, and some South Vietnamese casualties. He reported that medical supplies were available and that the hospital was not overfilled.

Although the general area in which the hospital was situated was often infiltrated by Viet Cong, and American physicians were urged to remain inside their building on many instances, Dr. Foster was only fired upon once, and that was when he was on a river trip to treat patients.

Dr. Foster reports that he felt that he was of help in Vietnam, where there is a shortage of physicians, but that he is still unsure as to what the war is all about.

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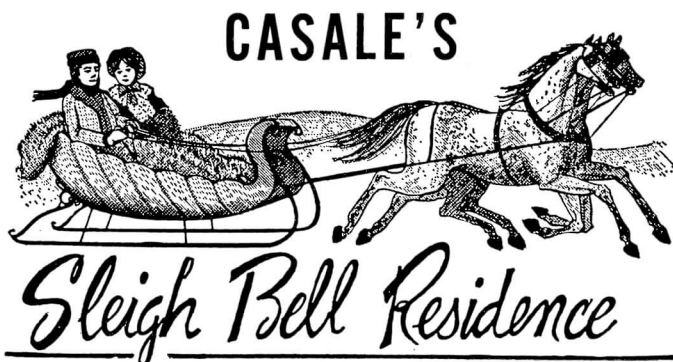
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
