From the Desk of the President

At the start of a new year, there are the usual hopes and expectations resulting from the feeling that one can now begin with a "clean slate." All the distasteful, discouraging things of the past year are somehow wiped away. We "start afresh" as it were. New resolutions to do better and avoid quagmires and pitfalls of the year gone by, emerge and there is "new (or renewed) hope."

Personally, I see nothing to be optimistic about. There is no "clean slate". Our society's "albatross", — the law suit — continues to rear its ugly head. Long, drawn out legal maneuvers, at a most significant cost to the Society, threaten the very solvency of our organization. A long, costly hospital strike at Y.H.A., even when finally settled, will have a devastating effect on physician morale and resolve. The damage to the health care delivery in our area is obvious. This strike is merely a prognostication of bigger and better strikes to come. The sense of obligation on the part of workers to serve the common good is long gone when policemen, firemen, teachers, hospital workers, etc. can abrogate their responsibilities by withholding service. Will this concept rub off and undermine the dedication of our profession?

Proponents of solutions to the present debacles show sharp divisions amongst themselves. In one word, "divisiveness" continues to plague our medical community. The old, trite, but nonetheless valid phrase "divide and conquer" seems to be particularly appropriate, as our antagonists both from within and outside our government buffet our profession from all sides.

Unfortunately, I must continue to greet the new year with abject pessimism. Erosions of our freedom to practice medicine as our forebears did continues unabated. Our own inability to form some unified consensus lies more at the root of our problem than any other single factor. I must, for the sake of completeness and continuity, exhort our membership to become more active and involved in the affairs of our organization. I do not believe, however, that this year will be any different from the previous ones, so my exhortations are more "lip service" than substance.

Perhaps, the multiplicity of points of view in our profession should be valued as our strength, since this supports the concept of the importance of the individual, and we in medicine are indeed individualists. On the contrary I view it as our "Achilles heel" and feel it will add to our eventual demise as a viable force in the "free enterprise system."

As restrictions, controls, regulations, and the like, continue to engulf us, should we adopt the attitude that we implement the controls? The rationale for this is that we will have a "voice". Or, on the other hand, should we ignore the call to assist in implementation and allow our antagonists to call the shots? A reason given for this approach is that the ultimate blame will fall upon another group rather than our own.

I don't pretend to know the answers to these perplexing questions. Somewhere down the line, when we get to use our retrospectoscope, one of the two sides may or may not be vindicated. Perhaps there is a third alternative. My personal position, at the present time is one of extreme ambivalence.

Editorial

As we enter the year 1978 let us all resolve, as physicians, to maintain our professionalism.

We are a distinct profession because of our calling, ethics, conduct and aims. Let our contribution to humanity consist in the proper emphasis in care of the body as exemplified by our well run and modern medical clinics and hospitals.

Let us maintain excellence in our schools and universities and let us all strive for fuller justice and sustinance for all our people. As part of our tradition of 2500 years, the medical profession has followed the Hippocratic oath which is properly restated at this time:

"I swear by Apollo, the physician, by Esculapius, by Hygeia, by Panacea, and by all the gods and goddesses, calling them to witness that according to my ability and judgment I will in every particular keep this, my oath and covenant: to regard him who teaches this art equally with my parents, to share my substance and, if he be in need, to relieve his necessities, to regard his offspring equally with my brethren and to teach his art if they shall wish to learn it, without fee or stipulation; to impart a knowledge by precept, by lecture and by every other mode of instruction to my sons, to the sons of my teacher and to pupils who are bound by stipulation and oath, according to the law of medicine, but to no other. I will use that regimen which, according to my ability and judgment, shall be for the welfare of the sick, and I will refrain from that which shall be baneful and injurious, if any shall ask of me a drug to produce death, I will not give it, nor will I suggest such counsel. In like manner I will not give to a woman a destructive pessary. With purity and holiness will I watch closely my life and my art. I will not cut a person who is suffering from a stone, but will give way to those who are practitioners in this work. Into whatever houses I shall enter, I will go to aid the sick, abstaining from every voluntary act of injustice and corruption, and from lasciviousness with women or men . . . free or slaves. Whatever in the life of men shall I see or hear, in my practice or without my practice, which should not be made public, this will I hold in silence, believing that such things

shoud not be spoken. While I keep this, my oath, inviolate and unbroken, may it be granted to me to enjoy life and my art, forever honored by all men; but should I by transgression violate it, be mine the reverse."

Those of us who disagree with part or all of this oath should bear the burden of giving good cause for altering or amending the principles embodied in this oath.

In closing may I quote Albert Einstein: "Not until the creation and maintainence of decent conditions of life for all men are recognized and accepted as a common obligation of all men shall we be able to speak of mankind as civilized."

__Jn Memoriam

W. STANLEY CURTIS, M.D. 1890 - 1977

Dr. W. Stanley Curtis, 87, died on Tuesday, Nov. 22, of a heart attack at Menands, N.Y., where he has made his home for a number of years.

Dr. Curtis was born in Blackhead, Newfoundland. He received his early schooling at St. John's Methodist College, Newfoundland, attended Canadian universities and was awarded his medical degree at Harvard Medical School in 1925.

In 1926 he entered the practice of medicine at Boston, and, in 1930, he came to Youngstown and opened an office for the practice of Internal Medicine at 292 W. Madison Ave. He was a member of the medical staff of Youngstown Hospital Association.

In 1975, Dr. Curtis received the 50-year award from the Ohio State Medical Associaion. He had retired in 1969.

GEORGE T. SZABOKY, M.D. 1928 - 1977

Dr. George T. Szaboky, 49, died on Tuesday, Dec. 20, of cancer at his home after a long illness.

Dr. Szaboky was born in Budapest, Hungary. He received his medical degree from the University of Medical Science of Budapest in 1954. He served rotating internships at University Hospital of Budapest and, coming to America in 1954, at E. J. Meyer Memorial Hospital, Buffalo. He took a residency in pathology and in orthopedic surgery at Youngstown Hospital Association.

He also schooled briefly at the Graduate School of Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, then served in the orthopedics departments at Akron Children's Hospital and Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. He followed this with a fellowship at the Pennsylvania Hospital in Philadelphia.

In 1965, he came to Youngstown and joined in association with Dr. S. G. Patton, Jr., later opening his own office at Hitchcock Center. He was a member of the International College of Surgeons, and a fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

DRUG SAMPLE COLLECTION HALTED


The collection of drug samples for World Medical Relief, as scheduled by the Woman's Auxiliary for October, 1977, has officially been cancelled. The wisdom and legality of distributing drug samples has been questioned by the Ohio State Board of Pharmacy. Legal opinion developed by the Assistant Attorney General, and forwarded to the OSMA Auxiliary, makes it inadvisable for any county Auxiliary to continue the program.

NEOUCOM WOMEN'S CLUB ORGANIZED


