FROM THE DESK OF THE EDITOR

*i*Want

While I am not personally much of a gadget kind of guy, I must say I am impressed with the progress in electronic technology, which seems to be accelerating exponentially, especially noticeable in the personal devices, typified by the iPhone. It does an amazing array of functions – "apps" – readily accessible through its direct link to the internet, ranging from silly video gimmicks through complex GPS functions. Ironically, the least of its functions is that where it acts as a phone.

I don't own an iPhone, but I do have an iPod, a first generation model, handed up to me by son #1, who is now on his third upgrade, in addition to his iMac computer, and his iTouch, which is apparently an iPhone, minus the phone. The screen on my iPod is barely readable, and the battery goes dead so I have to plug it in a lot – quaint – but it does play songs from iTunes, and holds more music by far than the two crates of vinyl I lugged around in college. Works for me.

Apple has obviously struck a chord with these ubiquitous devices, which are now parts of, and a reflection of, our culture. The prefix "i" is telling, as the function and purpose of them is centered on the individual's need, or perhaps more accurately desire and wants. Very few people can't get by perfectly well without such technological marvels, but very many have and will sacrifice time and a lot of money for the opportunity to play video games or search the internet on their phone, anywhere and anytime, usually because they want to, not because they have to. This is all well and good, since it's their money to spend, and that's what a free society and capitalism are all about. However, the emphasis on the "i" implies an importance on the self, which is an accurate reflection of the direction our culture has taken. This iCulture is ultimately concerned with immediate gratification, which has become an expectation – in entertainment, information, government, and of course health care. For instance, Emergency Departments are crammed with ultimately non-emergent problems, effectively having become the locus of all too much primary care. If iHave a sore throat or iJammed my thumb or iBumped my head or iHurt my knee, well then iWant an MRI or whatever other immediate test and intervention iCan have, and iWant it today, not when my real doctor can see me in 24 or 48 hours, because by then iMight feel better. And why not? After all, iHave the internet in my pocket and can watch viral videos on demand. The answer, of course, is that the iPhone user has chosen to spend *his* disposable income on *his* toy, and doesn't expect someone else to foot that particular bill.

Unfortunately, the delivery of health care here has become disconnected with the cost so that its users have come to expect the toy without the cost. This disconnection between what the individual wants and that for which he hasn't had to pay is one of the primary reasons our system has deteriorated to its current state, of inefficient and costly care, that despite its cost is ironically inadequate when it comes to the truly significant health issues facing our society today. To put it another way, if we spent half as much time and money on preventing obesity and its complications, for instance, as we do evaluating and treating aches and pains that are usually self-limited, not to mention the fortunes that are spent treating the other extreme of terminal illnesses that all of us will endure someday (in the hopefully distant future), I'd venture our populace would be a whole lot healthier, for a lot less cost.

It will be interesting to see if and how our affluent culture will respond to the new realities we will face in the worst economy in generations, and whether the global economic realignment will force us to actually accept that what iCan have and what iThink iNeed, may not always be what iWant. Mr. Obama, you have my prayers.
