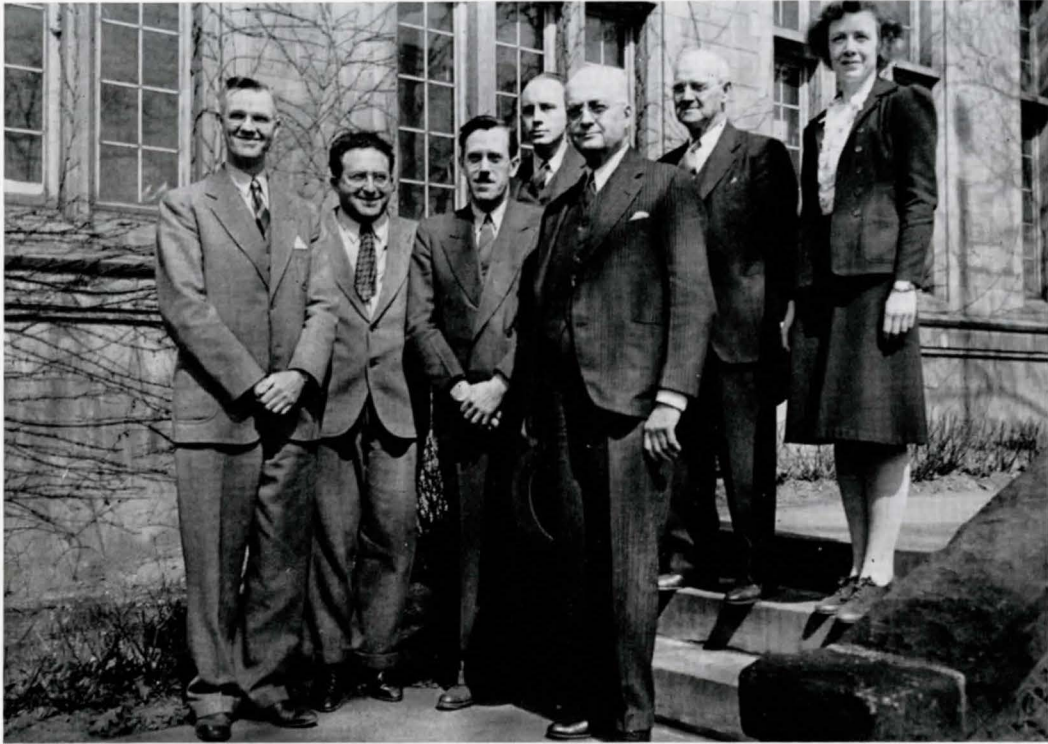

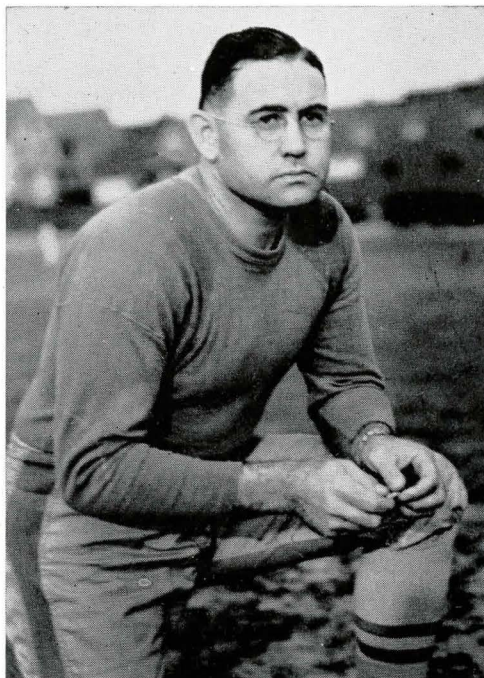


FOOTBALL

RALPH WOLF—Assistant Coach

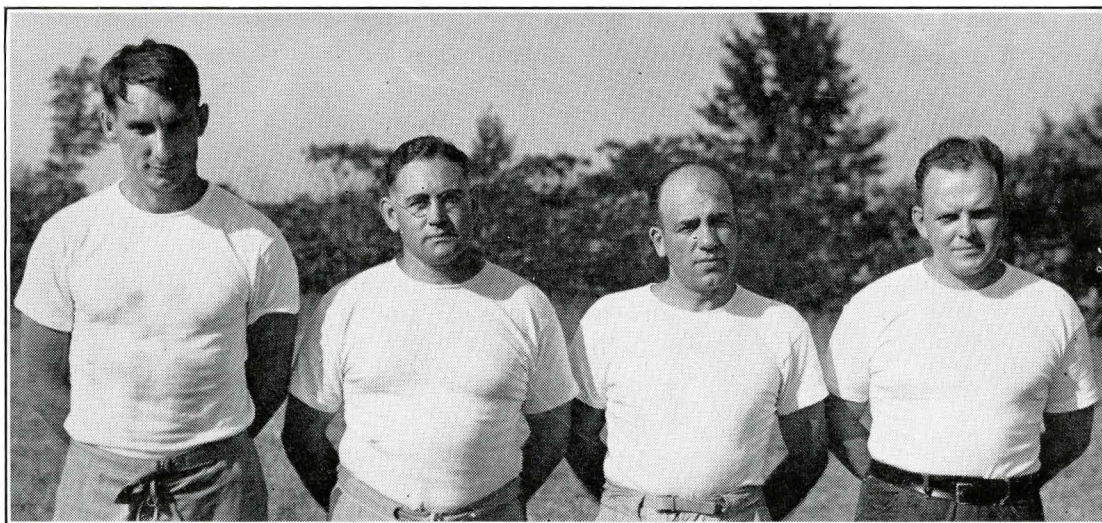

Trainer Webster came to Youngstown College in 1938 from Geneva College. He is a graduate of Geneva, and served there as trainer before coming to Youngstown.

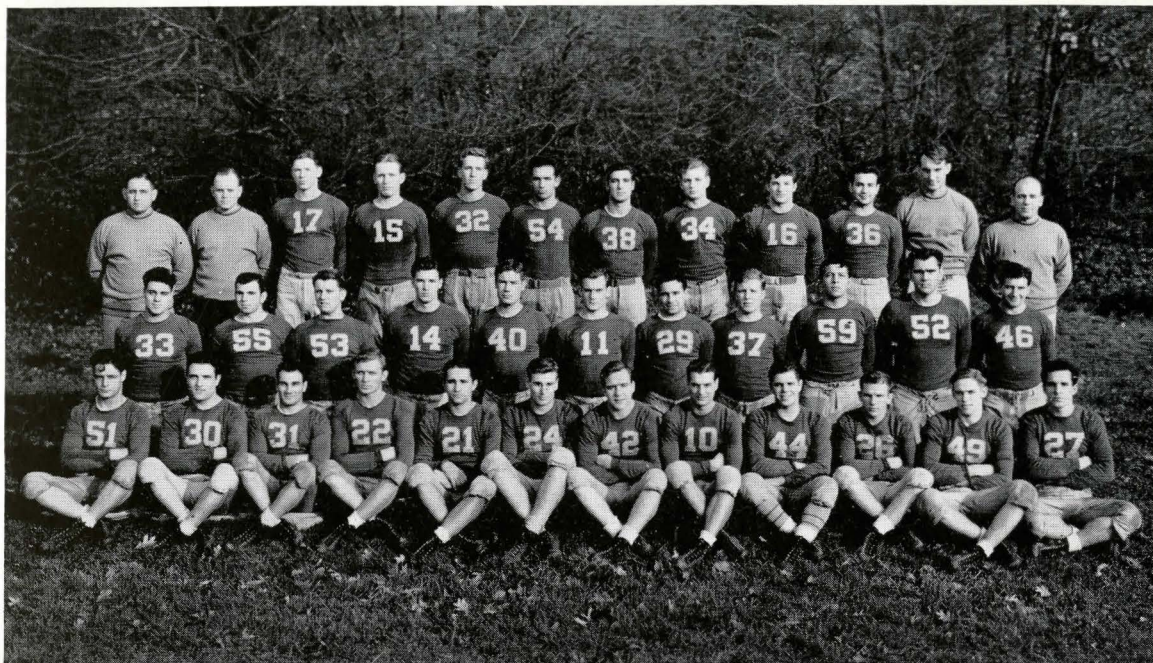

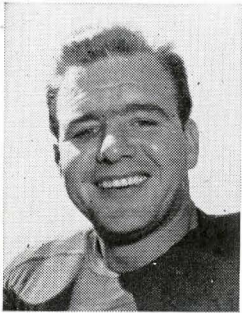
YOUNGSTOWN 40

Paced by Leo Mogus and his sharpshooting, the Penguins were seldom on the losing side of the book. They opened the season with a string of triumphs over Kent State, Hiram, Geneva, and Grove City. Then along came Toledo, Muskingum, and Mt. Union to whittle their record to 4 wins and 3 losses. The Penguins bounced back in a streak of brilliance to record seven straight triumphs: Geneva, Bowling Green, St. Vincent (twice), Kent State, Grove City, and Juniata were the victims of high-scoring Mogus & Co. The Penguins fell prey to Washington & Jefferson, and Toledo again, due largely to the absence of Mogus because of illness.
