This second offering of the University Theatre season is a witty comedy about the wife of a stuffy parson who finds herself in a romantic triangle with an 18-year-old poet.

"Candida" is set in late 19th century London, and playwright-philosopher Shaw uses it to poke fun at the traditional values of domestic tranquility and the stability of marriage.
