YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - An academic procession, dramatic readings, orchestral and choral selections, and an address by famed author/editor Norman Cousins are scheduled for the community's biggest anniversary party!

The 200-year-old honoree is the United States Constitution, and everyone is invited to attend this free, public event.

The "party" arranged by Youngstown State University will be the Constitution Bicentennial Convocation at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 17, in Powers Auditorium in downtown Youngstown.

The following evening, Nov. 18, there will be an address by U.S. Judge
Nathaniel R. Jones at YSU, culminating the month-long observance of the
anniversary of the Constitution and the Northwest Ordinance, which enabled Ohio
and other Northwest Territories to become states.

The convocation on Nov. 17 will open with an academic procession that will include the University's ROTC Color Guard, administrators and faculty, members of the Mahoning County bench, the YSU Board of Trustees, and YSU Student Government leaders all in academic regalia.

There will be processional music by the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble, as well as special selections by the Dana Chorale, YSU Chorus and the ensemble.

Grand marshals will be Atty. James C. Evans, president of the Mahoning County Bar Association, and Dr. Duane F. Rost, chairman of the University's Academic Senate.

University President Neil D. Humphrey will give the welcome and Dr. Earnest Perry, chairman of the YSU Board of Trustees, will introduce the main speaker, Dr. Cousins, who will give the main address.

Attorney Mary Beth Houser will recognize special constituents at the convocation.

Two dramatic pieces will be read by students in YSU's Department of Speech Communication and Theatre.

All audience members will receive a copy of the Constitution with their program. Free parking for the convocation in Powers Auditorium will be available in the former Strouss Parking Deck at Commerce Street and Wick Avenue, and a free shuttle service will take persons to and from the auditorium and the deck.

Dr. Cousins is currently adjunct professor in Medical Humanities on the faculty of the Department of Psychiatry and Biobehavioral Sciences of the School of Medicine at the University of California, Los Angeles. He is also advisory editor of the journal, Man and Medicine. For 35 years he was the editor of the Saturday Review magazine.

Dr. Cousins is the author of 17 books, including the best sellers <u>Human</u>

<u>Options</u> and <u>Anatomy of an Illness</u>, the later recently made into a television movie starring Ed Asner.

He was named Author of the Year by the Society of Authors and Journalists in 1980, and is the recipient of numerous other awards.

Dr. Cousins is a trustee of the American Institute of Stress, the Kettering Foundation, and the Ruth Mott Fund. He is also a member of the Special Medical Advisory Group of the Veterans Administration, the International Commission of the National Academy of Sciences, and has been chairman of the Pulitzer Prize jury on literature.

He was head of the New York City commission that designed the Environmental Protection Administration for that city, and headed a Connecticut commission that reorganized public education in that state.

Dr. Cousins holds honorary degrees in literature, science and law from 53 colleges and universities.

His many other honors and awards include the United Nations' Peace Medal, the American Peace Award, and the Gold Medal for Literature.

The following evening, Nov. 18, will be the final event of the University-community celebration of the Constitution birthday.

"Reflections on the Constitution" will take place at 8 p.m. in YSU's
Kilcawley Center Chestnut Room and will feature an address by Judge Jones, judge
of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit and a Youngstown native.
This, too, is free and open to the public.

The welcome will be given by YSU President Humphrey and Judge Jones' introduction will be by the chairman of the University Board of Trustees, Dr. Perry.

Judge Jones was appointed to the Sixth Circuit Court in 1979. He is a member of the American Bar Association and was co-chairman of the Constitutional Rights Committee.

He has been active in the Youngstown Area Development Corporation, the Buckeye Elks Lodge and the Urban League.

Judge Jones graduated from YSU with an A.B. degree in 1951 and an LL.B. in 1956. He was admitted to the Ohio Bar Association in 1957 and from 1959-61 was in private practice in Youngstown. In 1970 he received an honorary Doctor of Law degree from YSU and in 1972 from Syracuse University.

There will be a pre-game Bicentennial theme for YSU's home football game on Nov. 14. A special Bicentennial display at Maag Library will continue through November.

There will be press conferences for BOTH Dr. Cousins and Judge Jones.

The conference with Dr. Cousins will be held promptly at 7:20 p.m. Nov. 17 in the Spanish Patio, an area on the right side of Powers Auditorium lobby next to the stairs.

The conference with Judge Jones will be at 7:40 p.m. Nov. 18 in the Buckeye Reception Room of Kilcawley Center, prior to his 8 p.m. address.

NOTE: Due to the solemnity of this program, it is requested that NO floodlights be used once the house lights dim and the program gets under way. The house lights will remain on for the procession and while the platform party assembles on stage. After the "Star Spangled Banner" (to be sung by all), the lights will be dimmed and the program will begin. Some stage lights will be on during the program.



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YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Scholars from Ohio University, Kent State University and YSU will participate in the fifth annual Conference on the History and Politics of Socialism on Friday, Nov. 6, in Kilcawley Center 2036.

The conferences were initiated by Dr. Louis Patras of Kent State and Dr. Morris Slavin, emeritus professor of history at YSU.

Several papers from previous conferences have been published in The Crucibles of Socialism, edited by Patras.

The conference will begin at 9:30 a.m. with Patras' presentation of Simone Weil's views of totalitarianism. Last year Patras presented a paper on the philosophy of Weil, a French writer.

The next address, by Verena Botzenhart-Viehe of YSU, will review the careers of three German Social Democrats in Munich after World War II.

At 10:45 Dr. Jeffrey Orenstein, an associate professor of political science at Kent State, will examine nationalism and transportation. Dr. Orenstein is currently working on a study of Conrail.

After Dr. Orenstein's presentation, Dr. Fred Viehe, assistant professor of history at YSU, will present "Whatever Happened to Municipal Socialism?" drawing on his research of Los Angeles city government.

Dr. Slavin, who is spending this year at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, will present the luncheon address on "Soviet-German Policy on the Eve of Hitler's Rise." During the final session, Dr. Robert H. Whealey of Ohio University will speak on "Oil and Imperialism: The Case of Spain, 1927-31." The final paper, "Marx and His Mother," will be presented by Dr. James G. Chastain of Ohio University, who spoke last year on Marx's relationship with his father.

The conference is sponsored by the YSU History Department, History Club, Phi Alpha Theta, the history honorary society, and the YSU Chapter of American Professors for Peace in the Middle East. Dr. Lowell Satre and Dr. Martin Berger of YSU and Dr. Louis Patras of Kent State University are co-chairmen of the conference.
