YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - A Youngstown State University Faculty Forum and tree planting ceremony on campus will continue the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the writing and signing of the U.S. Constitution and adoption of the Northwest Ordinance.

The Faculty Forum will take place at 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 12, in YSU's College of Arts and Sciences' DeBartolo Hall.

Dr. Frederick Blue of Youngstown, professor of History; Larry Esterly of Poland, professor of Political Science and Social Science; and Dr. Anthony Stocks of Youngstown, chairman of the Economics Department, will take part in the forum. Dr. Jane E. Kestner of Youngstown, associate professor of Psychology will act as moderator.

During the forum, Dr. Blue will speak on the Northwest Ordinance, which set up procedures for establishing Ohio and four other states from the Northwest Territory.

Professor Esterly will speak on how the courts have interpreted the Constitution in the 20th century, and Dr. Stocks will discuss the Constitution and the American economy. A reception will follow.

The following day, Nov. 13, a tree planting ceremony will take place on the YSU campus just north of the Lincoln Parking Deck and south of DeBartolo Hall. A buckeye tree representing the state of Ohio will be planted.

Four other trees, each representing a state in the Northwest Territory, will be planted at a later date. The other states and their trees are:

Indiana, tulip poplar; Illinois, white oak; Michigan, white pine; and Wisconsin, sugar maple.

Participating in the ceremony will be members of the Bicentennial Committee, faculty of YSU's Department of Biological Sciences, and others.

Two major public events will culminate activities celebrating the anniversary:

A Northwest Ordinance Observation will take place on Monday, Nov. 16 at 2 p.m. in YSU's Kilcawley Center Ohio Room. Dr. Phillip Shriver, chairman of the Ohio Bicentennial Commission, will be the main speaker.

A U.S. Constitution Bicentennial Convocation will be held at 8 o'clock the following evening, Nov. 17, in Powers Auditorium in downtown Youngstown.

Noted author Norman Cousins will be the main speaker at this regal event.

The next night, Nov. 18, there will be a concluding program titled "Reflections on the Constitution." The main speaker will be Nathaniel Jones, judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. Judge Jones, a Youngstown native, will speak at 8 p.m. in the Kilcawley Center Chestnut Room.

Related activities include a Bicentennial display at YSU's Maag Library through October and November, and pre-game Bicentennial theme for the YSU home football game on Nov. 14.

The Faculty Forum will take place at 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 12, in YSU's College of Arts and Sciences' DeBartolo Hall.

Dr. Frederick Blue of Youngstown, professor of History; Larry Esterly of Poland, professor of Political Science and Social Science; and Dr. Anthony Stocks of Youngstown, chairman of the Economics Department, will take part in the forum. Dr. Jane E. Kestner of Youngstown, associate professor of Psychology will act as moderator.

During the forum, Dr. Blue will speak on the Northwest Ordinance, which set up procedures for establishing Ohio and four other states from the Northwest Territory.

Cisneros also served as assistant to the executive vice president of the National League of Cities and administrative assistant to the city managers of San Antonio and Bryan, Texas.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Department of Urban Studies and
