According to Dr. Timothy J. Lyons of Austintown, dean of the College of Fine and Performing Arts who is directing this play, "Company" is about that real and essential aloneness possessed by each person, and what happens when love and sex and vows and a contract threaten painful independence.

"Company" will run Nov. 12-15 and 19-22 in Bliss Hall's Spotlight Arena Theatre.

"The Dining Room" by A.R. Gurney, Jr. will open Jan. 7. In this humorous theatrical tour de force, the actors change roles, personalities, and ages, as they depict the dying lifestyle of upper middle class WASPdom.
