YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Occasionally, something innovative and stimulating comes along.

On March 18, Youngstown State University's first live, interactive teleconference will be held on campus.

The audience here, and those at some 100 other colleges and universities, will listen to, see and question Victor Kiam, internationally known business leader who, among other things, masterminded the Remington Products turnaround.

He will offer new insights and positive ideas into successful leadership as well as answering questions during the program, which is being created for management and supervisory personnel as well as entrepreneurs.

The live video presentation from New York City is being sponsored by YSU's Office of Continuing Education in cooperation with the National University Teleconference Network. It will be viewed by participants at YSU on a large screen television projection system via satellite.

Kiam, who holds a master's degree in Business Administration from Harvard, is known for his leadership and ingenuity. In addition to Remington, he achieved success at Lever Brothers, International Latex, Benrus and other firms. Numerous organizations, including General Motors, have sent teams to Remington headquarters to get pointers from him.

Now deluged with requests for speaking engagements on business and personal success, Kiam agreed to take part in this new medium of live teleconferencing through American universities.

Dr. John R. Loch, director of the YSU Office of Continuing Education, said that, based on the number of universities already signed up to present the program across the U.S. and Canada, this may become the largest fee-based teleconference ever presented.

The registration fee of \$85 per person includes instructional materials and a copy of the \$16.95 hardback copy of Kiam's new book, "Going for It."

Participating in the program at YSU will be Dr. Loch and Dr. Ernest R. Nordtvedt acting dean of the University's Williamson School of Business Administration.

Before and after Kiam's presentation, Dr. Nordtvedt will discuss his experiences with small business development, management and entrepreheurship, and will also discuss local applications to some of Kiam's points.

Dr. Nordtvedt is on leave as chairman of the Department of Management, Marketing and Legal Studies at Loyola University, New Orleans, where he established the Small Business Development Center and worked with the U.S. Small Business Administration and Louisiana Department of Commerce.

In addition to Kiam's live presentation, there will be paper-and-pencil exercises and the spontaneity of telephone questions and answers between Kiam and receiving sites.

Dr. Loch said, "The video teleconference with Victor Kiam is an example of today's high technology. It is satellite delivery of learning presented in a highly efficient, cost-saving manner. In the future, education of adults will be closely linked with new video technologies."
