YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Enrollment at Youngstown State University this Fall Quarter is 14,675, closely in line with the 14,730 projected by the University's Office of Budget and Institutional Studies.

A year ago YSU's enrollment was 15,015, and officials said this fall's figures reflect the Director of Budget and Institutional Studies' projection based on the population of area schools from which the University draws its students.

Approximately 7,500 YSU students are receiving an estimated \$4.5 million in scholarships and financial aid this fall.

Of these, 197 are freshmen who graduated in the upper 10 percent of their class, and 32 were high school valedictorians.

The University's Fall Quarter enrollment includes 13,521 undergraduates and 1,154 graduate students; 7,522 women and 7,153 men.

There are 5,188 freshmen, 2,901 sophomores, 2,487 juniors and 2,945 seniors.

The student body this fall includes 9,470 full-time and 5,205 part-time students. Full-time students are those taking 12 or more credit hours.

The Full-Time Equivalent for this quarter's enrollment is 10,918. (FTE is the student-credit hour formula used by the Ohio Board of Regents to measure both part-time and full-time students into a full-time equation.)

Enrollment this fall includes 13,501 Ohioians and 1,174 from other states.

The University received the money from the estate of the late Mahoning County Common Pleas Court Judge Sidney Rigelhaupt. It was presented by his brother, Atty. Bert Rigelhaupt.

The trustees said the gift will be designated the Judge Sidney Rigelhaupt Endowment Fund, and annual income be used to support the center, which was established to provide the community with resources which supplement and complement service planning and delivery by local health and human service agencies.

Judge Rigelhaupt was a Youngstown native and graduate of Rayen School. He earned a law degree in 1926 from the Youngstown Institute of Technology, now Youngstown State University. From 1926 to 1963 he was engaged in private practice of general law in Youngstown. In 1963 he was elected to the first of two successive, six-year terms as judge of the Mahoning County Common Pleas Court.

During his lifetime he was active in civic organizations and community projects and was the recipient of many honors and awards. In June 1975 Judge Rigelhaupt was the key speaker at YSU's Spring Commencement and received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.
