YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Bids will be received in Columbus the week of Dec. 14 for the Historical Center of Industry and Labor (Industrial History Museum), and construction could begin some 60 days later.

The \$4.3 million museum in downtown Youngstown, first of its kind in Ohio, is to be a cultural and educational mirror depicting the iron and steel making history of the City and the Mahoning Valley. It will also recall the history of other area industries and labor.

Funds for the project were approved by the Ohio Legislature and the museum will be maintained and operated by the Ohio Historical Society.

Youngstown State University is administering the project locally because of the nature of the state appropriation (funding).

Edmund J. Salata, YSU's executive director of facilities, announced when the bids for the project will be accepted in Columbus by the Department of Administrative Services and Public Works.

Salata also said the three-story structure could be completed in the fall of 1989.

The three-acre site is at the southwest corner of N. Hazel and Wood Streets, opposite St. Columba Cathedral.

The museum's three levels will follow the sloping site as it drops toward West Commerce Street and the downtown area.

Planners said the location will create an educational/cultural "avenue" from the University and Butler Institute of American Art to the cathedral, museum and Powers Auditorium.

The Youngstown firm of Raymond J. Jaminet & Partners, selected as principal architect for the building, will oversee the entire project in association with Michael Graves, internationally known architect from Princeton, N.J., as principal designer.

Dr. Donna M. DeBlasio was named as local coordinator and program supervisor for the Ohio Historical Society and is continuing to gather photos, film, reference books, papers and artifacts for the museum.

She is being assisted by Carol Buckley, who was named education coordinator for the museum several months ago.

Their office is located in Renaissance Square, the former Realty Building, in downtown Youngstown.

Dr. DeBlasio said the society continues to welcome historical materials for the museum. Her telephone is 743-5934.

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YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - An article co-authored by a Youngstown State University professor and graduate of the School of Engineering has been published in the October 1987 issue of the American Society of Civil Engineer's Journal of Professional Issues in Engineering.

Dr. Jack D. Bakos of Boardman, professor and Chairman of the Civil Engineering Department, wrote the 19-page article entitled "Professional Liability Exposure of Casual Consultants" with Randall J. Hake, 1986 Civil Engineering graduate and current vice-president of Dezcon, Inc., in Niles.

The article informs engineers of their potential liability if they fail to meet standards of professional conduct which protect others from unreasonable risks, and directly points out the potential liability of the engineer who "moonlights" on occasion or gives casual but professional advice to friends and acquaintances.

The authors hope the article will be used as a handbook by all engineers to lessen their exposure to liability.

Dr. Bakos has published two college-level textbooks on structural engineering and has also conducted several research projects for the Ohio Department of Transportation in conjunction with the Federal Highway Administration.

He joined the YSU faculty in 1969 after serving as a captain in the Army Corps of Engineers. He was named chairman of Civil Engineering in 1979. He is the recipient of several awards, including the Army Commendation Medal, YSU's Distinguished Professor Award, the Watson Merit Award and the Society of Automotive Engineers' Outstanding Educator Award. In 1985 he received the Outstanding Civil Engineer of the Year Award from the Youngstown Branch of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

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
