YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The first Schermer Scholar-in-Residence Program at Youngstown State University is expected to be offered to the public and the university community during this year.

Funded by grants from the Schermer family, former Youngstown residents, these new programs are to be presented each year "to identify and reveal contemporary Jewish thought through performing artists, individual speakers, symposia, or other means, and serve to better the relationship between the university's students and faculty and the Jewish community."

YSU President John J. Coffelt has appointed a committee consisting of faculty, administrative/professional staff, and a member of the university Board of Trustees that will develop a proposal and related budget for the first program.

The Schermer Charitable Trusts designated the Mahoning Lodge of B'nai B'rith and the Youngstown District of the Zionist Organization of America as trustees, and Atty. James L. Pazol and Dr. Saul S. Friedman were named representatives of these two trustee groups by the court.

Atty. Pazol, as representative of B'nai B'rith, and Dr. Friedman, as representative of the Zionist Organization, signed the memorandum of agreement recently approved by the university Board of Trustees. Under it, the YSU committee's proposed Scholarship-in-Residence Program will be submitted to these two trust representatives for approval. Dr. Friedman is professor of History at YSU and also serves as a member of the committee.

The amount received each year will depend upon the proposals developed. It is expected to average about \$10,000 a year for these major events.

Funding comes from two trusts, one created by the late Charles Schermer in memory of his mother, Frances, and the other established by his late sister, Lillian. Mr. Schermer, an attorney, practiced in Mahoning County before moving to California.

Purpose of the Schermer Charitable Trusts was to advance the Schermer's interests in education, young people, and charitable works. The Scholar-in-Residence Programs at Youngstown State University are one of the beneficiaries of these trust funds.

Appointed by President Coffelt to develop the proposal for the initial Schermer Program were Mrs. Ann Isroff, as representative of the YSU Board of Trustees; Dr. Bernard Yozwiak, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences; Dr. Leonard B. Speigel, professor of chemistry; and Dr. Friedman.

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Dr. Gebelein, 265 Meadowbrook Ave., Boardman, has been a member of YSU's faculty for 17 years. Recognized as one of the nation's leading specialists in polymer chemistry and organic chemistry, he was selected last fall as an American Chemical Society tour speaker, presenting lectures in three states.

He received his bachelor of arts degree, master's degree, and doctorate in chemistry from Temple University, Philadelphia, and is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and Sigma Xi, the Scientific Research Society. Dr. Gebelein is the author of many scientific publications.

The Chemistry Department is part of YSU's College of Arts and Sciences.

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YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Youngstown State University's Labor Studies Program is now accepting applications for spring quarter offerings.
