YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - A total of \$36,000 has been awarded to 24 graduating high school seniors, under Youngstown State University's second annual Dean's Scholarships, in recognition of their academic achievement.

In addition to the \$1,500 scholarships for each of these incoming freshmen for the 1987-88 school year, another \$36,000 in Dean's Scholarships has been renewed for the first recipients, who will become sophomores next fall.
