YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Ensemble Company of Cincinnati Opera will present "Sweet Betsy From Pike" at 11 a.m. Saturday, March 30, in Ford Auditorium of Bliss Hall on the Youngstown State University campus.

The one-act American opera, set in the time of the Gold Rush, will be presented as part of the YSU College of Fine and Performing Arts' "Family Entertainment Series," a variety of programs designed for the entire family.

The humorous musical tells the tale of Betsy and her husband Ike's journey to California during the Gold Rush era of the 1850's and covers many aspects of that adventurous period, including desperadoes, Indians, storms and other dangers of the journey.

ECCO's performance will be preceded by an educational introduction and followed by a question and answer period. The show is made possible with the support of the Cincinnati Opera Guild and the Ohio Arts Council, which offers a wide variety of assistance in the arts to community groups, individual artists, and organizations throughout the state.

Admission to the "Family Entertainment Series" is by reserved seat ticket only. Tickets may be reserved by phoning the YSU Theatre Box Office at (216) 742-3105. Box Office hours for these programs are 1-5 p.m. weekdays, except holidays, two weeks prior to each performance and from 9:30-11 a.m. on performance days.

Price for tickets is \$1 per child, 12 years and under, for each performance, and \$2 for each adult per performance. All children must be accompanied by an adult.

Free parking is available in any surface lot on campus, including the Wick Avenue deck adjacent to Bliss Hall.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - A seminar designed expressly for teenagers has been scheduled by the Parkview Counseling Center, the Eastern Mental Health Center of Youngstown, and the Office of Continuing Education at Youngstown State University.

"Survival Kit for Today's Times: A Workshop for Teenagers" will be held from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Thursday, March 21, on the YSU campus.

Four high school students from each school in Mahoning, Columbiana and
Trumbull counties are being selected by their principals to attend the seminar.

The cost of this third annual teenage seminar is being underwritten by the Mental Health Board 648 of the three counties.

"Survival Kit" will provide the students with an opportunity to address the numerous mental health issues, to prepare them to provide peer support, and to increase their personal coping skills.

Each of the three sessions will be conducted by trained social workers and/or instructors. Presenters will also include concerned students who will share their views with their fellow students.

Among the many topics offered will be: "Sexual Abuse-The Broken Taboo";
"Teenage Suicide-Helping Each Other Survive"; "You Made Me Love You-Self Esteem
and Drugs"; "Physical Fitness and Emotional Wellness"; and "Drinking and
Driving-A Socially Acceptable Form of Homicide."

The idea for a program for teenagers grew out of a mental health seminar in Columbus two years ago. That seminar, which included teenagers and adult

participants, pointed out that young people respond better to these areas of education when they are included in the program planning.

Moreover, leaders said, young people welcomed programs that counseled "with them," rather than "to them."

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Private Police Basic Training Course for special police, security and private police will be offered by Youngstown State University's Office of Continuing Education, Criminal Justice Department and Campus Security Department March 30 through May 25 on the YSU campus.

The course has been approved by the Ohio Peace Officers Training Council.

Certificates will be presented to those successfully completing the work, which includes 20 hours of firearms training and 107 hours of classroom instruction.

Participants will also become certified in First Aid and CPR through the American Red Cross.

Class sessions will be from 6 to 10 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays, and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays. The \$240 fee includes instruction, textbooks and ammunition. For those providing their own ammunition and required textbooks, the fee is \$220. A special parking permit for the 25 sessions will be available for an additional \$12.50.

Firearms training will include weapons safety and range firing of sidearms and shotguns. Firearms will be provided.

Classroom instruction will include criminal law and procedures, report writing, search and seizure, court testimony, motor vehicle laws and control, juvenile procedures, mental illness, drug and alcohol abuse, first aid, surveillance, crowd/mob control, and other basic principles of law enforcement.

Instructors will be persons approved by the Ohio Peace Officers Training Council and law enforcement agencies.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The first annual Youngstown State University Clergy/Religious
