YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Enrollment at Youngstown State University this Spring Quarter totals 14,009, which includes 8,721 full-time and 5,288 part-time students.

This compares with an enrollment of 14,199 a year ago.

Full-time students are defined as those carrying 12 or more hours of credit work.

Fall Quarter enrollment at the University, traditionally the highest of the year, was 15,254, dropping to 14,468 in the Winter Quarter.

This spring's student body is composed of 7,324 men and 6,685 women. A total of 12,944 are undergraduates and 1,065 are taking graduate studies.

The freshmen class again leads enrollment with 4,041, followed by 3,139 sophomores, 3,113 seniors and 2,651 juniors.

Of those attending Spring Quarter classes, 12,869 are Ohioians and 1,140 are from other states and nations. In the Winter Quarter, students representing 51 other countries of the world were attending YSU.

The Full-Time Equivalent this Spring Quarter is 10,431. (FTE is the student-credit hour formula used by the state to measure both part-time and full-time students into a full-time equation).

Spring enrollment by schools and colleges shows 4,813 in the College of Applied Science and Technology; 4,203 in the College of Arts and Sciences; 1,356 in the Warren P. Williamson Jr. School of Business Administration; 1,065 in the Graduate School; 894 in the School of Education; 879 in the William Rayen School of Engineering; and 799 in the College of Fine and Performing Arts.

Current freshman class enrollment is 97.8 percent of last spring's figure; the sophomore class is 94.5 percent; the junior class, 101.4 percent, and the senior class, 101.8 percent compared to seniors in the spring of 1984.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Youngstown State University's College of Fine and Performing Arts and its Dana School of Music, in cooperation with the YSU Office of Continuing Education, will hold its annual Keith Stein Memorial National Woodwind Clinic May 10-11.

Members of several of the nation's top woodwind quintets, along with members of of the YSU Dana Woodwind Quintet, will conduct the clinic, which is in memory of the late Keith Stein, one of America's foremost clarinet performers and reknowned music teacher and author.

A professor at Michigan State University for 40 years, Stein also taught clarinet at the famous National Music Camp at Interlochen, Mich., for more than 20 years and was a long-time co-principal clarinetist with the Chicago Symphony. He received MSU's Distinguished Professor Award, and was author of The Art of Clarinet Playing, the clarinetists' "bible."

Although severe arthritis eventually halted his playing, his masterful teaching continued. One of his first students to gain national acclaim was Clark Brody, who recently retired as principal clarinetist with the Chicago Symphony.

Dr. John Alleman of Poland, Dana faculty member and one of the coordinators for this year's event, originated the concept for the clinic, based on his association with Stein. Alleman studied and taught with Stein at Michigan State and studied clarinet with him at Interlochen. Alleman was also chairman of the national tribute held in Stein's honor when Prof. Stein retired from Michigan State in 1975. He died in 1980.

Barbara Ludwig and Dr. John Loch, both of the YSU Continuing Education Office, are also assisting in coordination of the clinic.

Scheduled events include lecture sessions, exhibits and recitals.

On Friday, May 10, events will run from 8-10:15 a.m. Programs are scheduled from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, May 11. All sessions will be held in Bliss Hall on the YSU campus.

Members of the Richards Woodwind Quintet, which was co-founded by Stein at
Michigan State in 1948, will be among the clinicians. Its membership includes two
from the original quintet, Douglas Campbell, horn, and Edgar Kirk, bassoon.

Additional members include Israel Borouchoff, flute; Daniel Stolper, oboe; and
Frank Ell, clarinet. The group is recognized as one of the finest woodwind
ensembles in the U.S., and has toured several foreign countries, including a
recent visit to the People's Republic of China.

Clinicians will also include the New World Woodwind Quintet from the University of Wyoming. Its members are Katherine Kemler, flute; Julia Combs, oboe; Ralph Strouf, clarinet; William Stacy, horn; and Theodore Lapina, bassoon.

Members of the San Marcos Woodwind Quintet from Southwest Texas State University will also serve as clinicians. They are Adah Toland Moselle, flute; Beth Sanders, oboe; David Pino, clarinet; Stephen Hager, horn; and William Lewis, bassoon.

The Dana Woodwind Quintet is composed of Walter Mayhall, flute, and Loyal Mould, oboe, both of Youngstown; Lois Hopkins of New Wilmington, Pa., horn; Joseph Edwards of Poland, clarinet; and Donald Byo of Hubbard, bassoon. All are faculty members in the Dana School of Music.

In addition to lecture sessions on each instrument used in a woodwind ensemble, there will be performances by independent quintets chosen by a committee based on submitted information and taped previews.

Prior to May 3, the clinic fee schedule is: general registrations, \$40; full-time students, \$20. The fee includes participation in clinic sessions, materials and recitals. A \$10 late fee will be assessed registrations received after May. 3.
