YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Psychology Department at Youngstown State University will present two lectures featuring Dr. Nancy M. Henley, psychology professor and editor of Psychology of Women Quarterly.

At 8 p.m. Thursday, April 30, Dr. Henley will discuss "Body Politics: Men, Women, Power, and Nonverbal Communication," in Room 132 of DeBartolo Hall, Spring Street.

She will also speak on "Sex Bias in Language: Effects on Cognitive Processes and Beliefs," at 1 p.m. Friday, May 1 in Room 132 of DeBartolo Hall.

The lectures, which are part of the Mental Health Public Lecture Series, are free and open to the public.

Henley, a social psychologist, has received national and international honors, including designation as a "Foremother" by the Association for Women in Psychology, and the Carolyn Wood Sherif Memorial Award from the American Psychological Association.

The Mental Health Public Lecture Series has been made possible by a bequest from the Mahoning Valley Mental Health Association. When the association disbanded, the assets of the group were donated for public lectures in mental health.
