YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Youngstown State University's Mathematical and Computer Sciences Department, in cooperation with the XSU student chapter of the Association for Computing Machinery and the University's Computer Center is sponsoring a computer programming contest in Meshel Hall from 8:15 a.m. -2 p.mos Saturday, May 17.

Students from 16 area high schools will compete in 21 teams of four members.

Activities will include a large screen demonstration of terminal usage, practice time on the terminals, and the contest itself.

The contest consists of five programming problems to be solved by using the VS BASIC programming language (a version of the most common programming language for micro-computers.)

First, second and third place trophies will be awarded to the winners in ceremonies about $1: 50 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. in Meshel Hall. In the event of a tie, winners will be chosen on the basis of the time required to obtain the solution and the number of tatal runs.

Faculty from the YSU Mathematical and Computer Sciences Department will judge the contest.
