## Perspective on increase

Despite a supposed "commitment to keeping student fees as low as feasible," YSU administrators recommended and the Board of Trustees approved a $\$ 20$ per quarter tuition hike for next year.
While this 8.6 per cent increase will make few students happy, when one puts it in the perspective of the overall economy, and when one notes the accompanying wage and salary increases at the University for 1980-81, expected rage becomes less justified, and is subdued.
The new budget, allocating 8.7 per cent more money than this year, contains few surprises, with increases in major funds comparable to those established for 1979-80

## Editorial

## Lid on Athletics

General Fee disbursements for 1980-81 are, on the whole, comparable to the recommendations made by the student and administrative members of the Budget Subcom mittee on the General Fee. However, members of the University Budget Committee, President Coffelt, and the Board of Trustees increased the subcommittee recommendation for intercollegiate athletics by some $\$ 59,000$.
Intercollegiate athletics continues to be one of the largest budgeted funds, absorbing more student general fee money than any other.
It is unjust to require that all YSU students pay nearly half of every general fee dollar to support athletic activities which are of little benefit to most, and of questionable indirect benefit.
While it is unrealistic to expect the fund to be decreased immediately, the administration should have made more of an effort to limit the intercollegiate athletic budget.
Granted, much of the the 1980-81 increase will be used to accommodate fixed raises in salaries and wages. Con sidering student sentiment on the matter, however, it would not have been unreasonable to request that the intercollegiate department "tighten its belt" and absorb more of the increase.
Intercollegiate athletics at YSU has become an everexpanding demon, devouring student fees at a rapid rate While the need for the program is recognized, as is the need for some growth, beyond certain proportions, it must be limited.
