Community Organizing for King Boston, a nonprofit organization dedicated to honoring the legacy of King and his wife, Coretta Scott King, and their time and work together in Boston. The initiative includes a memorial called "The Embrace," expected to be unveiled in Boston Common in 2023.

member of the Trauma Informed Committee of Trumbull County and the board for COMPASS Family and Community Services.



team is a lot like a broken record - success after success after success after success after success.

This past year, for the sixth consecutive year, the YSU Ethics Bowl team won the Central State Regional Ethics Bowl, and with the victory advances to the national contest in February 2022 in Cincinnati for a seventh consecutive year.

"Outstanding," Provost Brien Smith said. "Absolutely amazing," added Bruce Waller, professor and former chair of Philosophy and Religious Studies.

The winning streak is among dozens of

accomplishments of YSU students over the past few months, from building canoes made out of concrete to capturing six yes, six - Horizon League conference titles.

With the half dozen Horizon titles, including men's and women's outdoor track and field, women's golf and softball (regular season), YSU won the McCafferty Trophy, given to the school with the best performance across the conference's 19 championship sports. It was the first time YSU won the award in its two decades in the Horizon.

Other notable student successes include:

Taylor Tomb, a senior Primary and Special Education major, won the Outstanding Senior Award from Alpha Xi Delta, the sorority's most prestigious award to a collegiate member. She was the first YSU student to ever receive the national award.

Cole Sexton, a senior Chemical

Five Mathematics students presented research at the annual national MathFest, taking home four awards for excellence. The YSU team has historically been one of the most successful at the annual event,

winning its first awards in 1989.

Machine learning, Latin jazz and autism were among the topics featured as six graduate students were honored at the annual YSU Diversity of Scholarship event. The event highlights the diverse scholarly pursuits of YSU graduate students.

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PREPARATION, PATIENCE, PERSISTENCE AND PRAYER

YSU completed its first on-campus semester of the pandemic this past Fall, culminating with commencement in December in Beeghly Center, where more than 600 students received diplomas.

When COVID-19 hit in March 2020, YSU transitioned all oncampus classes to remote offerings. The online classes continued for the Fall 2020 and Spring 2021 semesters, with a socially-distanced and masked outdoor commencement ceremony in May 2021. The university returned to on-campus classes for Fall 2021, and commencement was held as usual in Beeghly.

"We're so proud of this graduating class," President Jim Tressel said at commencement. "They've done an extraordinary job. These past two years have been challenging. They've cared for one another, and they've looked out for one another."

Lekeila Houser, who graduated with a bachelor's degree in Social Work, was the student speaker for the ceremony.

"We were all resilient," she told her follow graduates. "Look at me, I'm a young black woman, who just turned 21 a month ago, who was born and raised in Youngstown, and I'm the speaker here today, at this predominantly white institution

graduating with my bachelor's degree in Social Work with honors.

"I want to encourage anyone like me – you can grow up with the entire world against you, and still come out stronger than ever. You can still be successful. As long as you're hopeful, optimistic and you continue to fight for yourself, you can do anything you put your mind to."

Aliyah Sabree, who earned a bachelor's degree in Biology from YSU and is now a judge at the 36th District Court in Detroit, provided similar advice as she gave the commencement keynote address and received an honorary Doctor of Law degrees.

Sabree, who left YSU and to earn a law degree at Michigan State University, reflected on first setting foot on the YSU campus 19 years ago, on a basketball scholarship, knowing she someday wanted to be a judge. She accomplished that goal by following the four P's – Preparation, Patience, Persistence and Prayer.

"Coming out of college can be stressful," she said. "Coming out of college during a pandemic can cause anxiety. When I need to center, I always come back to the four Ps."

FUND-RAISING CAMPAIGN HITS HISTORIC HIGH

\$126,187,126

That was the final tally of YSU's historic "We See Tomorrow" fundraising campaign when it closed out last Fall. The initiative, which funds scholarships, enhanced instruction, increased classroom technology and much more, is the largest fundraising campaign in YSU history and believed to be the largest philanthropic effort ever in the Mahoning Valley.

The total included 32,581 gifts, 40 of at least \$1 million.

"The level of support we experienced through this campaign is nothing short of remarkable," said Paul McFadden, president of the YSU Foundation. "It is a reflection of the hard work and dedication of so many students, alumni, faculty, staff and others over the course of more than 100 years to make YSU the special place it is in our region."

GRANT ACTIVITY HITS 12-YEAR HIGH

The last time YSU earned this much in grants, President Obama was in his first year in office, the Pittsburgh Steelers won their sixth Super Bowl and Modern Family, starring YSU's own Ed O'Neill, made its TV debut.

It's been a while.

YSU faculty and staff received 96 research and service grants totaling nearly \$11 million in fiscal year 2021, the most since 2009.

"Getting this kind of funding is not easy – it's competitive, and it takes a lot of work, imagination and determination," YSU Provost Brien Smith said. "Most importantly, the impact that these funds have on our region and our students is significant and widespread."

Among the awards was \$1 million from the National Science Foundation to Cory Brozina, assistant professor and director of First-Year Engineering in the YSU Rayen School of Engineering,

the largest grant YSU has ever received from the NSF. Also among the largest awards was \$2.2 million from the Air Force Research Lab to Pedro Cortes, associate professor of Civil, Environmental and Chemical Engineering, as part of the Air Force's Microelectronics Workforce Development Program.

Dozens of federal, state and local political and education leaders attended a ribbon-cutting ceremony last summer for the new \$12 million, 54,000-square-foot Excellence Training Center at YSU.

The Center, funded via \$7 million in state capital dollars and \$5 million in federal funds, is the centerpiece of the Mahoning Valley region's continued efforts to create a workforce development ecosystem to ensure skilled workers are available to meet the region's growing advanced manufacturing needs.

"A project of this magnitude does not happen without the support and commitment of literally dozens of people across a wide spectrum of government, industry and education leaders," YSU President Jim Tressel said. "Our collective vision to create a place where we can research, teach, train and prepare the workers of the future culminates in this wonderful facility."

YSU GETS PRESIDENT'S "E" AWARD FOR INTERNATIONAL EFFORTS

International and Global Initiatives, made his way to the nation's capital this Fall to receive the 2021 President's "E" Award for YSU's ongoing international enrollment efforts.

YSU was among only 32 U.S. companies and organizations nationwide, and only two in all of Ohio, receiving awards for 2021. YSU also was the only university in the nation to earn the recognition.

Between Fall 2016 and Summer 2021, YSU enrollment of international students increased from 316 to 455, including big increases in students from Nepal, Kuwait, Vietnam and South Korea. In 2019, the Institute of International Education reported that the rate of growth of YSU's international student population was the second fastest among public universities in the United States.

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before passing away in 2013.


"Our heartfelt thanks to J.J. and Jan for their continued strong support," YSU President Jim Tressel said.



"WE SEE TOMORROW" CAMPAIGN CONCLUDES

Kohlis' \$5M gift matches largest in YSU history

There's busy, and then there's - BUSY!

It's fair to say that YSU

philanthropy was BUSY this past summer and fall.

In a 14-week period between July and October 2021, YSU announced several millions of dollars in gifts from prominent donors, including a gift matching the largest ever for YSU from Dr. Chander Kohli and Karen Kohli.

The gifts created endowed professorships, renamed buildings and infused funds into academic programs ranging from Nursing to English.

In the midst of it all, dozens of donors from throughout the region gathered on the lawn of the Pollock House on campus to celebrate the conclusion of the university's historic "We See Tomorrow" campaign that raised a record \$126 million for YSU.

"We are simply overwhelmed by the generosity of the Mahoning Valley and alumni and friends across the nation," Campaign Chair Jocelyne Kollay Linsalata said about the seven-year fundraising effort.

The campaign, by far the largest in the YSU's history and believed to be the largest philanthropic effort ever across the Mahoning Valley, attracted 32,581 gifts, including 40 gifts of at least \$1 million.

"Everywhere we went, when we spoke to people, their love for YSU was always at the center of every conversation," YSU President Jim Tressel said.

The campaign, led by the YSU Foundation, started in 2014 with a goal of \$100 million. By January 2020, the goal was reached, and

then increased to \$125 million – three times the size of the university's last fund-raising campaign nearly 15 years ago. In fiscal years 2020 and 2021 alone – even in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic – the campaign raised \$32.4 million in donations.

The final tally: \$126,187,126.

The money will be used in a variety of ways to help alleviate the financial burdens of students, improve faculty scholarly pursuits, bring state-of-the-art technology to classrooms and make YSU a hub of workforce development.

The Kohlis made the largest donation in the campaign, matching the largest donation in YSU history - \$5 million. Dr. Kohli is a local neurosurgeon and former chair of the YSU Board of Trustees. In turn, the new building housing the YSU Excellence Training Center was named Kohli Hall.

"YSU represents the Mahoning Valley's best hope for the future," Kohli said. President Tressel added, "This historic gift and the naming ensures that the Kohlis' legacy will live forever."

Other recent major gift announcements:

- John J. and Janet Cafaro and their daughters, Capri Silvestri Cafaro and Renee Lynne Cafaro, donated \$1.75 million. In turn, YSU renamed the Lincoln Building on campus as the J.J. and Janet Cafaro Hall, and also the adjacent Phelps Building as the Ronald G. Silvestri Hall, Janet Cafaro's brother, a YSU alum and successful businessman who passed away in 2013. Cafaro is founder and president of the J.J. Cafaro Investment Trust and the retired executive vice president of the Cafaro Co. Mrs. Cafaro is the president of Silcor Oilfield Services and of Parkway Holdings, which owns commercial real estate.
- Nancy Wagner, whose leadership of YSU's Centofanti
 School of Nursing has resulted in increased enrollment,

- expanded community outreach, additional programming and enhanced fundraising, was named the first President James P. Tressel Endowed Chair in Leadership. The position was created through a \$1.6 million gift from a group of YSU Foundation trustees in recognition of Tressel and his 35 years of leadership.
- Richard Sokolov, vice chairman and a member of the board of directors of Simon Property Group, and his wife, Susan, made a major donation to rename the Sokolov Honors College and create a new community fellows program. Mr. Sokolov joined the Edward J. Debartolo Corp. as senior vice president, Development and General Counsel, in 1982, and later became chief executive of DeBartolo Realty Corp. and then president and chief operating officer when DeBartolo merged with Simon Property Group
- Gwendolyn Thomas Watson and Janet Thomas Shanklin, daughters of the late Mahoning Valley businessman Paul J. Thomas and Marguerite Kauffman Thomas, donated \$500,000 to create the Marguerite Kauffman Thomas Scholarship for women pursuing STEM degrees. The daughters also made a \$1.5 million contribution to YSU in 2018 to create the Paul J. Thomas Chair in Economics.
- Patrick Durrell, professor of Astronomy, was named the inaugural Dr. Warren M. Young Chair in Physics and Astronomy. The position is named after Warren Young, retired YSU Physics and Astronomy professor and department chair and long-time director of the Ward Beecher Planetarium at YSU. Young's son, George, established the academic chair through a \$1.5 million endowment.
- Laura Beadling, associate professor of English and Film Studies, was named the inaugural Grace Ruth Memorial Endowed Professor of English. Robert Reeder III, a 1981

YSU graduate and now a partner in a New York law firm, donated \$1 million to create the professorship in honor of his grandmother, Grace Ruth, and a second professorship in honor of his grandfather, Robert W. Reeder I. "Endowed professors have a lasting impact, increasing the institution's academic excellence and providing educational and scholarly opportunities," Tressel said.

Amy Weaver, an associate professor in the Centofanti School of Nursing, was designated the inaugural Patricia McGovern Sweeney Professor in Nursing. The professorship was established by way of a \$500,000 gift from Douglas Sweeney and his daughters - Carolyn Sweeney Berry, Andrea Sweeney Wagner and Alexa Sweeney Blackann - in honor of his wife and their mother Patricia's lifelong career in the Nursing profession. The professorship is the latest of a long Sweeney family tradition of philanthropic support of YSU, amounting to more than \$1 million.



A picture might actually be even better than a thousand words.

That's the upshot of a new article by a group of YSU researchers, "A Picture is Worth 1,000 Words: Retention of Material Through Use of Image Only Slides," in *Criminal Justice Perspectives*.

The team includes, pictured from left, **Dana Davis**, chair and associate professor of Social Work; **Joe Sanson**, associate professor of Computer Science, Information and



Engineering Technology; **John M. Hazy**, chair and associate professor of Criminal Justice and Consumer Sciences; **Monica Merrill**, assistant professor of Criminal Justice; and **Katie Allen** (seated), social worker at Akron Children's Hospital and a former graduate assistant of Social Work at YSU.

In the study, about 90 undergraduate students completed a pre-test right after viewing PPT slides, and a post-test two weeks later. Results suggest students retain more information viewing the image-only slides. "This is important," Davis said, "because students may be better able to retain information and apply those concepts to their future jobs with image-only learning materials."
