



#### Laura Melton, piano

A recent addition to the Piano Faculty at Bowling Green State University, Laura Melton has been a prizewinner in several major international competitions including the Mendelssohn Competition in Berlin, the New York Recital Division of the Joanna Hodges Competition in 1998. She has reached the Semi-Finals of the Orleans International Competition in France, the Concurso International de Ejecucion Musical in Vina del Mar, Chile, and was the only remaining American in the Semi-Final of the 1991 Clara Haskil Competition in Switzerland. After winning the National Symphony Orchestra's Young Artist competition, she has performed with the orchestra four times at he Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Other orchestral appearances include the Freidurg Musikhochschulorchester of Freiburg, Germany, the San Francisco Chamber Players and the International Chamber Orchestra of Idyllwild, California. Her numerous appearances on radio and television include recordings for Sudwestfunk Radio in Germany and an appearance on National Public Radio's 'Performance Today" in celebration of the birthday of composer, John Corigliano. She has also appeared in several summer festivals including Ravinia, Aspen, Sarasota, and festivals in Holland, Switzerland and Germany.

Laura received her DMA from Rice University in Houston where she vas a graduate fellow and teaching assistant to John Perry. As a student of Robert Levin, she spent three years in Germany as a Fulbright Scholar, earning the Solistendiplom while studying at the Staatliche Hochschule iur Musik in Freiburg, Germany. Her previous studies include a Masters Degree from USC under John Perry and a Bachelor of Music Degree from the University of Maryland at College Park as a student of Nelita True.

Laura joins the BGSU faculty from the Idyllwild Arts Academy, where he had been on the faculty since 1993. Her students have won numerous competitions and awards and have continued their studies at some of the finest conservatories and music programs in the country neluding the Curtis institute, Juilliard, Eastman, Oberlin, Peabody and he New England Conservatory.

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

#### American Overture for Band (1956)

Joseph Wilcox Jenkins

This American Overture for Band was written for the U.S. Army Field Band and dedicated to its conductor at the time, Chester E. Whiting. The piece is written in a neo-modal style being flavored strongly with both Lydian and Mixolydian modes. Its musical architecture is a very free adaptation of sonata form. The musical material borders on the folk tune idiom although there are no direct quotes from any folk tunes. The work calls for near-virtuoso playing by several sections, especially the French horns, and is a favorite of advanced high school and university concert bands/wind ensembles. Although American Overture was Jenkins' first band piece, it remains his most successful work, and in his words, he is "hard-pressed to duplicate its success."

**Candide Suite** 

Leonard Bernstein (1900-1990)

Arranged for the wind band by Clare Grundman

The Candide Suite for concert band is made up of five numbers from the musical Candide, which premiered on Broadway in 1956. The satiric novella Candide by Voltaire was the basis for a political and musical satire with a libretto by Lillian Hellman and music by Leonard Bernstein. Candide as a musical has since had many reincarnations, but the sections of this Suite utilize musical numbers that have remained virtually unchanged from the original Broadway production.

Salute to the Chief Concert March (1998)

Lee Brooks

Salute to the Chief was commissioned in 1998 by the Canton Concert Band, Canton, Ohio in honor of President William McKinley, who practiced law in Canton and is buried there in a magnificent park. Several musical devices are used to impart a "presidential" feel to the march, such as the opening trumpet fanfare and the use of melodic fragments from the ceremonial tunes, Hail to the Chief and Ruffles and Flourishes.

There is a more equitable division of labor in this march than in most others. The 2nd and 3rd trumpets function more as an independent section than mereharmonic subordinates to the 1st trumpet part. Horns and tubas are not relegated to their characteristic "oomph" parts, but instead play melodic

passages and challenging technical material. The tubas carry the melodic line iroughout the second strain, and the lyrical Trio melody is introduced by the lorns. A rich assortment of percussion instruments adds color to the music and provides the players with a musical dimension beyond mere rhythmic companiment.

In the tradition of marches by Fillmore, King, and others, the woodwinds lay a florid variation of the Trio melody. This obbligato is repeated in the nal 32 bars, pitted against the trumpets, horns, trombones, and euphonium in their upper registers, bringing the composition to a bold, majestic close.

#### Aspen Jubilee (1988)

nnected Aspen Jubilee is loosely programmatic. Nelson stated: "I was minking of the stupendous beauty of the Rockies in general, of blinding sunlight on snow-covered peaks; of the frontier spirit of Aspen with its brash, inny, dynamism, its corny ragtag Fourth of July parades and fireworks asplays. I was also thinking about indescribably beautiful nights under star-filled skies (the middle section is titled 'Nightsong'). There is only a passing od to the Aspen which has now become a playground for the rich and mous." Aspen Jubilee was commissioned in 1984 by the Manatee High School Band in Bradenton, Florida. When asked about the distance and "sparity between

lorida and Colorado. Nelson commented, "I spent 13 of the most memorable summers of my life at the Aspen music festival. I was able to immerse myself in music, meet fascinating people, and recharge my batteries. ach year it became progressively more expensive and sophisticated, but I still associate it with wonderful music making."

Rhapsody in Blue

George Gershwin (1898-1937)

Theater orchestra arrangement by Ferde Grofe Dr. Caroline Oltmanns, Piano

hapsody in Blue was first performed by the Paul Whiteman orchestra at a concert in New York's Aeolian Hall on February 19, 1924. Gershwin had rritten the score several weeks previously (at Whiteman's request), and the mous arranger Ferde Grofe had orchestrated it page-by-page as it came from the pen of the composer. It was written for piano and jazz orchestra and at the concert Gershwin played the piano part himself. He had not as yet

scored the music for piano and played, as he said, "from the music in my mind." The work scored such a success that it has been performed repeatedly ever since. Critics have often pointed to structural flaws in the *Rhapsody*; and the work has not benefited from having been *manhandled* in arrangements for everything from accordion to xylophone. "But", as Leonard Bernstein pointed out, "what's important is not what's wrong with the *Rhapsody*, but what's right with it. Each of these inefficiently episodes is in itself melodically inspired, harmonically truthful and rhythmically authentic."

Shenandoah

**Traditional Folk Song** 

Arranges for the wind band by Frank Ticheli

Ticheli's beautiful setting of the folk song, *Shenandoah* was commissioned by the Hill Country, Texas Concert Band in memory of their beloved friend, Jonathan Cosentino. Timbral combinations are explored and the work superimposes the main theme from the *Battle Hymn of the Republic* with the *Shenandoah* melody. Canonic compositional devices and slightly altered melodic lines make this a wonderful new addition to the wind band repertoire.

Stars and Stripes Forever March

John Philip

Thomas A. Groth, Guest Conductor

Of the genesis of the Stars and Stripes Forever March, which is considered to be his greatest, Sousa tells us in his autobiography, Marching Along: "Aboard the Teutonic, as it steamed out of the harbor on my return from Europe in 1896, came one of the most vivid incidents of my career. As I paced the deck, absorbed in thought, suddenly I began to sense the rhythmic beat of a band playing within my brain. It kept on ceaselessly, playing, playing, and playing. Throughout the whole tense voyage, that imaginary band continued to unfold the same themes, echoing and reechoing the most distinct melody. I did not transfer a note of that music to paper while I was on the steamer, but when we reached shore, I set down the measures that my brain-band had been playing for me, and not a note of it has ever changed. The composition is known the world over as "Stars and Stripes forever" and is probable my most popular march.

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands, Instrumental Music Coordinator, and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned a doctorate at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, a nasters degree at the Eastman School of Music, and a bachelors degree and Performer's Certificate in Percussion at the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and he was the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and assists with the Marching Pride; he also teaches graduate and indergraduate conducting.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has been published in the *Kansas Music Review Journal*; in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, *TRIAD*; and in the *National Band Association (NBA) Journal* and in the NBA *Newsletter*. He has been a member of the NBA School Reform Committee and currently serves as the Chair of the NBA North Central Division. His many professional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all-state, sectional, regional, and district concert bands and orchestras throughout the United States and Canada. Dr. Gage has also guest conducted the U.S. Army Band: *Pershing's Own* and the U.S. Army Field Band.

Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra performed at the 1998 and 2000 Dhio Music Educators Convention. In 1996 the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble was a feature performer at the College Band Directors National Association Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The Symphonic Wind Ensemble released its first produced compact disc, Lions and Jesters and Dragons, Oh My! in the fall of 1998, The ensemble is currently in production for a second CD, Star Wars and Other Scores! which will be eleased in the November of 2000. 

#### ~About the Guest Artists~

Joanne Brackeen is one of jazz's most prized possessions: a virtuoso pianist and master composer who epitomizes the history and evolution of jazz from traditional to free, and everything in between. Joanne's unique sound was honed through a period of apprenticeship with some of the world's greatest names: Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, Joe Henderson, Stan Getz, and others. Since the mid-70s, Joanne has been at the forefront of new music, recording over twenty albums as a leader with some of the most respected musicians in jazz. Her playful and complex sense of time, rhythm, and mood permeates her original repertoire that now numbers close to 300 compositions.

Joanne was born Joanne Grogan in Southern California and learned to play the piano during her childhood. Her exposure to jazz began during this time with the recordings of bandleader and pianist, Frankie Carle, who she imitated as she taught herself to play and improvise. As her talent was realized, she was awarded a scholarship to the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music but after only three days, she dropped out to pursue jazz. By the late-50s at the age of only 20, Joanne had already played with heavyweights Dexter Gordon, Harold Land, and Charles Lloyd. Moving to New York in the mid-60s. she began to command the attention of the upper echelon of jazz players and played with Woody Shaw and Dave Leibman. She spent the next several years with the ultimate working band, the Jazz Messengers led by Art Blakey. She became one of the most lauded pianists of the day, working with Joe Henderson for six years and two more with saxophonist Stan Getz. By the late-70s, Joanne had established herself as a leading pianist through her performances around the world and began leading her own groups with such noted players as Eddie Gomez, Jack DeJohnette, Cecil McBee, Billy Hart, Sam Jones, and others. Her solo performances also cemented her reputation as one of the most innovative and dynamic pianists.

Joanne has been awarded two grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, Which have led to solo performances at Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center. In the mid-80s, the US State Department sponsored her tour of the Middle East and Europe. She has also served on the NEA grant panel and is currently a faculty member at the New School in New York City and a professor at the Berklee College of Music in Boston. Joanne has been commissioned to write compositions for large ensembles at Duke University, The New England Conservatory of Music, Rutgers University, Dickenson College, Cleveland's TRI-C Jazz Fest, and SUNY-Plattsburg.

Joanne recently participated in a tour of Japan as part of the 100 Golden Fingers Tour that also featured Hank Jones and Kenny Barron. Joanne tours Europe several times a year and recent gigs at New York's Blue Note, Avery Fisher Hall, and Town Hall as well as the Smithsonian Institute have been great successes. In addition, Joanne currently hosts her own television show called "Joanne Brackeen Presents Jazz."

Having recorded for many years with Concord Records, Joanne joined the exclusive recording ranks of New York's Arkadia Jazz in 1998. Her debut release "Pink Elephant Magic" features some of the top players in the world including Nicholas Payton, Kurt Elling, Dave Leibman, Chris Potter, John Patitucci, and Horacio "El Negro" Hernandez.

Maria Schneider, born in Windom, Minnesota, was studying music by age

e. She earned a Bachelor of music degree in theory and composition at the University
Minnesota, studied at the University of Miami, and received a Master's degree from
the Eastman School of Music. After moving to New York City, she received a National
Endowment for the Arts grant to study composition with Bob Brookmeyer.

In 1985 she became an assistant to Gil Evans. Her work with him included assistance for the movie The Color of Money, and Sting's 1987 European tour. At the 1993 oleto Music Festival and the 1996 JVC Jazz Festival (New York) Maria conducted the 1 Evans orchestra in a concert of selections from Miles Ahead, Porgy and Bess, and Sketches of Spain.

1994 she was commissioned to write music for, and conduct concerts with Toots nielmans and the Norrbotten Big Band (Sweden). She and Thielmans continue to work together with various orchestras in Europe. She has also conducted the ockholm Jazz Orchestra, Buhuselan Big Band (Sweden), the UMO Orchestra inland), the Espoo Big Band (Finland), the Blechschaden Big Band (Germany), the Sunday Night Orchestra (Nurnberg), the Danish Radio Big Band, The Metropole Orchestra (Holland), Orchestre National de Jazz (Paris), Jazz Baltica (Germany), and the plogne and Frankfurt Radio Orchestras in concerts of her music as well as for various evision and radio broadcasts.

1994 Maria conducted the Carnegie Hall Jazz Orchestra at Carnegie Hall in the mmissioned premier of El Viento. She was commissioned to compose Scenes from childhood premiered by her own orchestra at the 1995 Monterey Jazz Festival. Her orchestra has given televised performances at the opening of the 1995 Macau ternational Music Festival and the 1996 Berlin Jazz Festival. Maria was the recipient a Doris Duke award to compose a dance work for the Pilobolus dance group. The project was premiered at the American Dance Festival in June of 1998.

aria has placed in several of the DOWNBEAT and JAZZTIMES Critics and Readers colls. The 1997 Critics Poll placed her seven times including first place Arranger and first place TDWR in Composer and Arranger categories. her orchestra placed second, dher album Coming About placed amongst the best jazz albums of the year.

The Maria Schneider Jazz Orchestra performed at Visiones in Greenwich Village every Monday night for five years (1993-1998). They have also performed in Macau, Brazil, d extensively in Europe. Maria's debut recording Evanescence on the Enja label, was a minated for two 1995 Grammy Awards: Best Large jazz Ensemble Performance, and for its title piece, Best Instrumental Composition. She was a nominee for Copenhagen's ZZPAR Prize in 1995. Her second recording Coming About, released in June of 96, received "five stars" from DOWNBEAT and was also nominated for a Grammy Award. Maria received the Critics' Choice - Best Composer award at the 1998 New York Jazz Awards at Lincoln Center.



#### SYMPHONY NO. 2 IN D MAJOR, OP. 36

#### LUDWIG VAN BEETHOVEN

Born Bonn, December 1770; Died Vienna, March 26, 1827

Both Strauss and Beethoven were concerned about death in their youth and made bold statements about its power. Strauss did so with his tone poem Death and Transfiguration and Beethoven in a letter referred to as The Heiligenstadt Testament. This letter was written before the completion of his 2nd symphony in 1802. In this letter, the torment of his increasing deafness and heart-ache are evident as he writes that, "With joy I hasten to meet death face to face. . . . Come when thou wilt, I shall face thee with courage."

To the delight of subsequent generations, death would not come for Beethoven for many years, and symphonies later. Despite his condition at the time, this symphony is high-spirited, graceful, and humorous. Beethoven once wrote, "I live only in my music." How true this is, and he still lives there today.

"It was six years ago when the idea came to me to write a tone poem describing the last hours of a man who had striven for the highest ideals . . . The fatal hour arrives. The soul leaves his body, to discover in the eternal cosmos the magnificent realization of the ideal which could not be fulfilled here below."

#### DEATH AND TRANSFIGURATION

(TOD UND VERKLÄRUNG)

TONE POEM, OPUS 24

RICHARD STRAUSS

Born Munich, June 11, 1864; Died Garmisch, September 8, 1949

After Strauss completed Death and Transfiguration in November of 1889, his friend Alexander von Ritter wrote an explanatory poem to this tone poem, which was printed in the program of its premiere. There are four distinct movements, although they are played without pause. Ritter's poem is condensed below as found in Downes' Guide to Symphonic Music.

I. Largo. "In a small bare room, dimly lit by a candle stump, a sick man lies on is pallet. Exhausted by a violent struggle with death, he lies asleep. In the chastly stillness of the room, like a portent of impending death, only the quiet ticking of a clock is heard. A melancholy smile lights the invalid's pale face: does the dream of golden childhood as he lingers on the border of life?"

II. Allegro molto agitato. "But death grants him little sleep or time for dreams. He shakes his prey brutally to begin the battle afresh. The drive to live, the night of death! What a terrifying contest! Neither wins the victory and once more silence reigns."

II. Meno mosso, ma sempre alla breve. "Exhausted from the battle, sleepless, as in delirium, the sick man now sees his life pass before him, step by step, scene by scene. First the rosy dawn of childhood, radiant, innocent; then the boy's ggressive games, testing, building his strength - and so maturing for the battles of manhood, to strive with burning passion for the highest goals of life: to transfigure all that seems to him most noble, giving it still more exalted form is alone has been the high aim of his whole existence. Coldly, scornfully, the rorld set obstacle upon obstacle in his way. When he believed himself near his goal, a thunderous voice cried: 'Hold!' But a voice within him still urged him on, crying: 'Make each hindrance a new rung in your upward climb.' Undaunted he ollowed the exalted quest. Still in his death agony he seeks the unreached goal of his ceaseless striving, seeks it, but alas, still in vain. Though it grows closer, clearer, grander, it never can be grasped entire or perfected in his soul. The final on hammer-blow of death rings out, breaks his earthly frame, covers his eyes with eternal night."

V. Moderato. "But from the endless realms of heavenly space a mighty sonance returns to him bearing what he longed for here below and sought in vain: redemption, transfiguration."

While in Denver, he was a member of the Aries Brass Quintet in residence at the University of Denver-Lamont School of Music and the lenver Brass. At Lamont he was instructor of Trumpet and also performed in the Faculty Jazz Quintet.



Normandy Beach - 1944

On June 6, 1944, at dawn, British and American forces landed on the beaches of Normandy in an elaborate amphibious operation. A total of 425,000 American, British, and German men lost their lives in the ensuing conflict. Normandy Beach - 1944 was composed in commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of this important, yet tragic day that changed the course of World War II.

The work is cast in three sections. The first is dark and mysterious characterizing the preparation and eve of D-Day. The bowed marimbas allude to distant bugle calls. Gathering momentum, the second section depicts the tragic conflict on D-Day including references to the "Star Spangled Banner" and "America, the Beautiful". All motion ceases and the final section or epilogue suggests the aftermath of this tragic day.

Normandy Beach was commissioned by James Coviak and the North Farmington Hills High School Percussion Ensemble and was premiered at the 1994 Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, 1994.

The percussion curriculum encourages musical and cultural versatility and includes private lessons, group lesson classes, ercussion seminar class, percussion methods courses, percussion ensemble, and independent study courses. The percussion faculty also includes Craig Yarger graduate teaching assistant, and Aaron Smith - graduate assistant in marching ercussion. Each percussion major may choose a degree specialization track from mong the comprehensive, symphonic, jazz and commercial drum set, jazz vibraphone, keyboard percussion, ethnic percussion, contemporary music, and marching percussion tracks.

### The Artists

Anthony Alipio has studied Afro-Caribbean dance at George Mason University with Jim Lepore, in Santiago de Cuba with Folkloric dance masters Conjunto Folklorico Cutumba, and in Havana with Yennyselt Falataand Nachito. At George Mason University he majored in Psychology with a minor in Dance. With dance partner Mary Reder, Anthony teaches dance in the Washington DC area, and co-directs DC Mambo, an organization dedicated to the dissemination of Afro-Cuban social dance forms and their respective root traditions.

Ruben Alvarez a drummer, Latin percussionist, and educator based in Chicago, has performed in every major city in the U.S., Canada, and Europe including numerous appearances at the Chicago Jazz Festival, and Viva Chicago Latin music festival, and has also appeared at the Montreux and North Sea Jazz Festivals. Mr. Alvarez has also been a featured clinician, and performer at the 1982, 1994, and 1999 Percussive Arts Society International Conventions, the 1994 Western Illinois University Jazz Festival, he 1995 Purdue University Jazz Festival, the 1999 and the year 2000 International Association of Jazz Educators International Conference, and the Jazz Institute of Chicago's 20th Annual Jazz Fair.

Ruben has appeared with Latin jazz artists, flautist David Valentin Cuban trumpet virtuoso Arturo Sandoval, Brazilian pianist Manfredo Fest, British blues-rock legends John Mayall, and Dave Mason, Rhythm and Blues ivas Anita Baker, and Nell Carter, Chicago blues legend Junior Wells, the Illinois Philharmonic Orchestra, the Seattle Philharmonic, the Chicago Sinfonietta and the Icarus string quartet of the Chicago Symphony. Ruben an also be seen performing locally with Chicago based Latin jazz groups, Chevere, Blue Note recording artist Patricia Barber, and Polish jazz vocalist Grazyna Augscik. Ruben is also the musical director of the Raices atin percussion ensemble. He has performed as co-composer, Instrumentalist and vocalist for the soundtrack of the motion picture, A Perfect Murder, starring Michael Douglas, and Gwyneth Paltrow. He has also erformed, written and produced local, national, and international radio and elevision spots. Ruben's work has aired on over 200 radio stations throughout the United States and Latin America. As a composer, and roducer he has won the prestigious bronze medal in the 10th and 11th unnual International Radio Festival of New York in 1992 and 1993.

As an educator Ruben has taught privately for over 15 years and conducts workshops at the elementary, high school, university, and rofessional levels. He is a faculty member of Eastern Illinois University's

U.S. Percussion Camp, the Birch Creek Percussion Camp, The Las Vegas Percussion camp, and the Bands of America program. He is currently teaching Afro-Cuban and Brazilian rhythms and percussion techniques at Northwestern University and Roosevelt University. He is on the educational advisory board for the L P Music Group, and is a member of the International Association of Jazz Educators educational resource team. In addition, he develops educational musical presentations, for over 5,000 students and teachers yearly, as a touring artist, residency artist, and a teacher workshop facilitator, under the auspices of Urban Gateways the Center for Arts in Education.

He also teaches at ten high schools through the jazz mentors program, a Ravinia Festivals educational outreach program. He has also conducted master classes for the Bands of America program, the Percussive Arts Society, the Afro-Caribbean Arts Society, Baldwin-Wallace College, Columbia College, Triton College, Chicago State University, Eastern Illinois University, Western Illinois University, Northern Illinois University, Lawrence University, Purdue University, the University of North Dakota, VanderCook College of Music, the Guitar Centers of Chicago, Drum Corps International, Latin Percussion, Inc., Ludwig Drum Company, Slingerland Drum Company, and the Zildjian Cymbal Company. He is sponsored by LP Percussion, Zildjian Cymbals, Remo Percussion, and Vic Firth sticks and mallets.

James Boyce earned his Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in classical guitar performance at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. While at Duquesne, he placed first in the Graduate Concerto Competition and performed as a soloist with the Dickinson University Orchestra.

Mr. Boyce recently completed his Doctor of Music Arts studies at Florida State University under the direction of Bruce Hozman. He also studied with Eliot Fisk and Pepe Romero at the annual Festival Internacional de la Guitarra in Cordoba, Spain. Mr. Boyce is currently professor of classical guitar at Youngstown State University and Duquesne University.

Mr. Boyce has presented various solo concerts and workshops throughout the United States. His guest artist appearances include the Pittsburgh Classical Guitar Society, the Three Rivers Arts Festival, and the Alliance Community Concert Series. Mr. Boyce premiered a piece at the Florida New Music Festival and has worked with the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble. WQED FM radio broadcast an interview and live performance by Mr. Boyce. He has also performed as a concerto soloist with the Dana Symphony Orchestra, and the Dana Chamber Orchestra.

Mr. Boyce will be returning as a lecturer and soloist at the upcoming annual Summer Guitar Camp at Duquesne University and will be performing recitals in conjunction with faculty members at the Dana School of Music during 2001.

Daniela DaRoacha is a senior at George Mason University working towards a B.S in Biology with a minor in Dance. She has studied Afro-Cuban dance at George Mason University and in Santiago de Cuba with Conjunto Folklorico Cutumba.

David Gabel holds a B.S. in Physics from the University of Virginia, and is currently a graduate student in Education at George Mason University. He also studies dance at GMU where he has performed with the George Mason University Dance Company.

Jim Lepore, a native of Youngstown, Ohio, is an associate professor of dance at George Mason University, and has served on the faculties of the College of William and Mary and the University of Washington (Seattle). He nas danced with the Jose Limon Company (NYC), Carolyn Carlson's LaFenice Dance/Theater (Venice), and teaches annually at the White Mountain Summer Dance Festival. He is certified in Laban Movement Analysis, and received his MFA from Temple University. Jim's early training in Latin dance idioms was in New York City with mambo master, iddie Torres. Since 1991 he has been designing and teaching courses in Afro-Caribbean Dance that recognize the traditional music/dance cultures from which the contemporary styles emerged. Currently, he is the faculty irector of annual Afro-Cuban dance workshops held in Santiago, Cuba, and aught by Conjunto Folklorico Cutumba. He and his wife, Lisa Lierheimer, are frequent guest instructors for DC Mambo in Washington D.C.

Lisa Jade Lierheimer holds a M.S. in oceanography from the University of Washington and a B.A. in biology from Mount Holyoke College. She has studied Afro-Cuban dance for the past ten years with naster teachers in North America and Cuba. With her husband, Jim Lepore, she has taught Afro-Cuban dance traditions at George Mason University and James Madison University, and is a guest instructor for DC Mambo. In 1999 ne was recognized as "Female Mambo Dancer of the Year" by Latin-Dance.com.

Mary Reder received her B.F.A. in Dance from George Mason Iniversity, where she studied contemporary modern dance and ballet. Her knowledge of Folkloric Cuban dance stems from studies in Havana, Cuba, ith Yennyselt Galata and Nachito, and in Santiago de Cuba with Cutumba. Iary currently teaches Cuban social dance in the Washington Metropolitan Area, and directs DC Mambo with dance partner Anthony Alipio.

Dr. Glenn Schaft is assistant professor and director of Percussion Studies at Youngstown State University. He directs the YSU Percussion

Ensemble, Latin Percussion Group, and Latin Jazz Combo. He has performed with the World Percussion Group Battu, Colorado Music Festival, Cleveland Chamber Symphony, Cleveland Ballet, Cleveland Opera, Youngstown Symphony, Akron Symphony, Ohio Chamber Orchestra, Chip Stephens Trio, Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Chuck Berry, Englebert Humperdink, Marvin Stamm, John Fedchock, and numerous other jazz and popular artists. He also teaches at the Richland Arts Academy Summer Jazz Camp in Mansfield, Ohio. Dr. Schaft earned three percussion performance degrees including the Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, the Master of Arts from Eastern Illinois University, and the Bachelor of Music from the Baldwin-Wallace College Conservatory of Music. He has studied Afro-Cuban percussion at the Escuela Nacional de Arte in Havana, Cuba through a grant from the Ohio Arts Council and at the Berklee World Percussion Festival with Giovanni Hidalgo. Dr. Schaft is supported by Zildjian Cymbals, GMS Drums, Remo Percussion, and ProMark sticks.

The YSU Guitar Program consists of fifteen degree seeking students in the areas of performance, education, theory and composition. The guitar program offers both bachelor and masters degrees. Courses that students participate in include private lessons, guitar ensemble, guitar class, seminar and independent study. A wide range of repertoire is explored covering the renaissance, baroque, classical, romantic and modern time periods. The faculty consists of James Boyce who has recently been granted a temporary full-time appointment.

The YSU Guitar Ensemble Program offers experience in performance and recording. They perform frequently on campus and for public events. Performances include compositions and arrangements for two, three, and four guitars.

YSU Jazz Studies Program features an extensive and challenging program of jazz studies. Classes in jazz fundamentals, beginning improvisation, advanced improvisation, jazz keyboard, jazz arranging, and jazz history are offered, as well as outstanding jazz ensembles and jazz combos.

The YSU Jazz Ensemble Program at Youngstown State University began its tradition of excellence in 1969. Under the direction of Tony Leonardi, coordinator of Jazz Studies, the YSU Jazz Ensemble gained national recognition. They earned numerous honors including "Most Outstanding Band" at the Wichita Jazz Festival in 1976 and at the Central Ohio Jazz Festival in 1980, 1982 and 1984. The YSU Jazz Ensemble was the first to win both the Big Band and Small Group competitions during the

same year in the history of the Wichita Jazz Festival. They have also performed at such prestigious events as the International Association of Jazz Educators Convention, the Notre Dame Jazz Festival, the TRI-C Jazz Fest in Eleveland, Ohio, and the Central New York Jazz Festival in Syracuse, New York. In June of 2000, the YSU Jazz Ensemble won the "College Dutstanding Performance Award" in the 23rd Annual Student Music wards in Down Beat magazine for their latest recording entitled Biddle de Bop.

Alumni have performed in the bands of Count Basie, Tommy Dorsey onducted by Buddy Morrow, Maynard Ferguson, Lionel Hampton, Woody Herman, Illinois Jacquet, Thad Jones/Mel Lewis, Glenn Miller, Buddy Rich, and Max Roach, as well as the U.S.A.F. Airmen of Note and the U.S. Navy Commodores.

In addition to performing concerts on campus and at jazz festivals, the YSU Jazz Ensembles tour Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York. Campus oncerts regularly feature well-known jazz greats. Artists most recently performing with the YSU Jazz Ensembles include Michael Abene, Joanne Brackeen, Kenny Burrell, Eddie Daniels, Conrad Herwig, Chuck Mangione, lob Mintzer, James Moody, Jimmy Owens, Bill Pierce, Maria Schneider, Jobby Shew, Marvin Stamm, Mark Vinci, Bill Watrous, and Phil Woods.

The success of the YSU Jazz Studies program and its students is well ocumented on ten recordings, three LPS and seven CDs. *Burnin'* with the 'SU Jazz Ensembles was released in December of 1997 and features Jazz Ensemble 1 and Jazz Ensemble 2. Our seventh CD entitled *Biddle de Bop* are released in November of 1999 features Jazz Ensemble 1 and Jazz Insemble 2.

YSU Percussion Studies Program includes 15-20 majors in various erformance and education degree programs. The percussion curriculum encourages musical and cultural versatility and includes private lessons, group lesson classes, percussion seminar class, percussion methods courses, ercussion ensemble, and independent study courses. The percussion faculty also includes Craig Yarger, graduate teaching assistant, and Aaron Smith, graduate assistant in marching percussion. Each percussion major may hoose a degree specialization track from among the comprehensive, symphonic, jazz and commercial drum set, jazz vibraphone, keyboard percussion, ethnic percussion, contemporary music, and marching percussion acks.

The YSU Percussion Ensemble Program includes performance, touring, and recording experiences in contemporary percussion chamber rusic, marimba ensemble repertoire, various Latin and World Percussion roups, and student compositions.

Recent guest artists include Robert Van Sice, marimba; Evelyn Plennie, international soloist; Michael Spiro, Afro-Cuban; John Riley,

jazz drum set; Sam Denov, orchestral percussion; Michael Burritt, marimba; Dr. Larry Snider, mind-body learning techniques; Ted Rounds, marimba; Tom Freer, orchestral percussion; Doug Walter, marimba and jazz vibraphone; Battu World Percussion Group; Random Access Percussion Quartet; Rob Ferguson, marimba; Scott Ney, Venezuelan maraca music; Kevin Downs, percussion education and retail.

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### Program Notes

R mba

Yambu is an African-style partner dance which is performed "open," or without contact. This dance emphasizes the physical sensuality of both the new learner and its relatively slow tempo gives it a nickname that loosely translates into "rumba for the old folks."

aguanco is an up tempo dance performed in the partner style of a Yambu, with the important addition of the "vacunao" (vaccination) –a vestige of the fertility dances brought to Cuba by the Congolese slaves that often it tated "rooster and hen" actions.

Columbia is a men's solo dance that emphasizes physical virtuosity. The vement vocabulary is often derivative of non-secular Afro-Cuban dance tiditions.

**P**-mbe

ese religious dances of Santeria are of Yoruba origin, and reflect the physical qualities and personalities of the "orishas," or saints, who are being honored.

Conga/Cumparsa

Conga, originating in Eastern Cuba, is part of the tradition of possional street dances that implored all comers to join in the festivities. These dances are particularly popular during the carnaval season.

ambo

ambo refers to the up tempo permutation of a Cuban social dance, "son," that was embraced and popularized by New York City Latinos in the 40's and 50's.


#### Cha Cha Cha
