American Choral Directors Association. During the summer of 1982, the group completed a most successful concert tour of Europe.

In addition to the concerts on campus during the school year and numerous appearances for churches, schools, and community groups, the Chorale has established several valued traditions at YSU The November Chamber Choir Festival, during which they host a day of choral singing for 15 guest high school choirs; the December Carols and Cocoa program, presented with the Dana Trombone Ensembled and the yearly Madrigal Dinners, which occur just before the holiday break in December.

The group makes regular appearances with the Warren Chamber Orchestra of Warren, Ohio, having performed such works as Fauré's Requiem, Haydn's Lord Nelson Mass, Beethoven's Mass in C, Mozart's Requiem, and Mozart's Vesperae solennes de confessore. The work being prepared for this year is Haydn's Creation, which was presented on February 6, 1999.

The students in the Dana Chorale are all undergraduate students in music. Their purpose as an ensemble is to study, prepare, and perform the very finest in choral literature.

irector of the Dana Chorale, Dr. Wade Raridon, is Professor of Music and Coordinator of Vocal/Choral Studies at the Dana School of Music of Youngstown State University, Youngstown, Ohio, U.S.A. With BA, MA, and DMA degrees in vocal performance from the University of Iowa in Iowa City, he is now in his 42nd year of university and college teaching. In addition to his direction of the Chorale, his duties include directing the Dana Madrigal Singers and teaching voice and diction for singers.

Dr. Raridon has appeared often as lyric tenor soloist in oratorio, light opera and recital; he has often appeared in joint concert with his wife, lyric soprano Rosemary Raridon, who is also a member of the voice faculty of the Dana School of Music.

In 1984, Dr. Raridon received Youngstown State University's Distinguished Professor Award for excellence in teaching. He is in Who's Who Among America's Teachers.



DANIEL SHAPIRO

Daniel Shapiro, a native of southern California, began the study of piano at the age of six. His teachers have included Leon Fleisher, John Perry, Joanna Graudan, and Reginald Stewart. He earned his bachelor' degree, summa cum laude, from the University of Southern California and master's and doctoral degrees in piano performance from the Peabody Conservatory.

Dr. Shapiro has performed recitals across the United States, as well as in Brazil, Ireland, Spain, France, and at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, and has garnered a large and increasing reputation as an interpreter of the music of Beethoven, Schubert and Mozart. At the age of thirty-two, he performed the complete Beethoven Piano Sonata cycle at the University of Iowa over a four-week period. He continues to present Beethoven and Schubert cycles. He has performed with orchestras including the National Symphony, the São Paulo State Symphony Orchestra, the Academy of London Orchestra, the Colorado National Repertory Orchestra and the Los Angeles Debut Orchestra.

Dr. Shapiro received the top prize in the William Kapell International Piano Competition, in addition to winning the American Pianists' Association Beethoven Fellowship Award, the Joanna Hodges International Piano Competition, the Young Musician's Foundation Debut Competition, and the International Piano Recording Competition.

As a chamber musician, he continues to be highly active. He performs regularly with members of the Los Angeles Philharmonic in the orchestra's chamber series, and is currently in the process of performing the complete Beethoven violin sonatas. He is a member of the Brandeis-Bardin Trio, whose compact disc is released on the Harmonia Mundi label; as well as Duo Hebraique, whose compact disc is released on the ASV label. He has participated at the Marlboro Music Festival, the Ravinia Festival and the Fellowship Program at Tanglewood, and was a winner in the Coleman Chamber Music Competition.

As a conductor, Dr. Shapiro has studied with Daniel Lewis, Victor Yampolsky, Fritz Zweig, Gustav Meier and Sheldon Morgenstern. He made his conducting debut at Tanglewood at the age of sixteen, where, two summers later, he was given a special award for Outstanding Achievement in Piano, Chamber Music, and Conducting.

Dr. Shapiro has also had extensive experience as a vocal accompanist and coach. He studied with Gwendolyn Koldofsky and Natalie Limonick, and was an opera and art song coach at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Currently a full-time professor of piano at the Cleveland Institute of Music, he was previously on the piano faculty at the University of Iowa.



~About the Guest Artists~

Joanne Brackeen is one of jazz's most prized possessions: a virtuoso pianist and master composer who epitomizes the history and evolution of jazz from traditional to free, and everything in between. Joanne's unique sound was honed through a period or apprenticeship with some of the world's greatest names: Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, Joe Henderson, Stan Getz, and others. Since the mid-70s, Joanne has been at the forefront of new music, recording over twenty albums as a leader with some of the most respected musicians in jazz. Her playful and complex sense of time, rhythm, and mood permeates her original repertoire that now numbers close to 300 compositions.

Joanne was born Joanne Grogan in Southern California and learned to play the piano during her childhood. Her exposure to jazz began during this time with the recordings of bandleader and pianist, Frankie Carle, who she imitated as she taught herself to play and improvise. As her talent was realized, she was awarded a scholarship to the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music but after only three days, she dropped out to pursue jazz. By the late-50s at the age of only 20, Joanne had already played with heavyweights Dexter Gordon, Harold Land, and Charles Lloyd. Moving to New York in the mid-60s, she began to command the attention of the upper echelon of jazz players and played with Woody Shaw and Dave Leibman. She spent the next several years with the ultimate working band, the Jazz Messengers led by Art Blakey. She became one of the most lauded pianists of the day, working with Joe Henderson for six years and two more with saxophonist Stan Getz. By the late-70s, Joanne had established herself as a leading pianist through her performances around the world and began leading her own groups with such noted players as Eddie Gomez, Jack DeJohnette, Cecil McBee, Billy Hart, Sam Jones, and others. Her solo performances also cemented her reputation as one of the most innovative and dynamic pianists.

Joanne has been awarded two grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, Which have led to solo performances at Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center. In the mid-80s, the US State Department sponsored her tour of the Middle East and Europe. She has also served on the NEA grant panel and is currently a faculty member at the New School in New York City and a professor at the Berklee College of Music in Boston. Joanne has been commissioned to write compositions for large ensembles at Duke University, The New England Conservatory of Music, Rutgers University, Dickenson College, Cleveland's TRI-C Jazz Fest, and SUNY-Plattsburg.

Joanne recently participated in a tour of Japan as part of the 100 Golden Fingers Tour that also featured Hank Jones and Kenny Barron. Joanne tours Europe several times a year and recent gigs at New York's Blue Note, Avery Fisher Hall, and Town Hall as well as the Smithsonian Institute have been great successes. In addition, Joanne currently hosts her own television show called "Joanne Brackeen Presents Jazz."

Having recorded for many years with Concord Records, Joanne joined the exclusive recording ranks of New York's Arkadia Jazz in 1998. Her debut release "Pink Elephant Magic" features some of the top players in the world including Nicholas Payton, Kurt Elling, Dave Leibman, Chris Potter, John Patitucci, and Horacio "El Negro" Hernandez.

Maria Schneider, born in Windom, Minnesota, was studying music by age
ve. She earned a Bachelor of music degree in theory and composition at the University
f Minnesota, studied at the University of Miami, and received a Master's degree from
the Eastman School of Music. After moving to New York City, she received a National
Endowment for the Arts grant to study composition with Bob Brookmeyer.

In 1985 she became an assistant to Gil Evans. Her work with him included assistance for the movie The Color of Money, and Sting's 1987 European tour. At the 1993 poleto Music Festival and the 1996 JVC Jazz Festival (New York) Maria conducted the ill Evans orchestra in a concert of selections from Miles Ahead, Porgy and Bess, and Sketches of Spain.

1 1994 she was commissioned to write music for, and conduct concerts with Toots
Thielmans and the Norrbotten Big Band (Sweden). She and Thielmans continue to
work together with various orchestras in Europe. She has also conducted the
tockholm Jazz Orchestra, Buhuselan Big Band (Sweden), the UMO Orchestra
Tinland), the Espoo Big Band (Finland), the Blechschaden Big Band (Germany), the
Sunday Night Orchestra (Nurnberg), the Danish Radio Big Band, The Metropole
Orchestra (Holland), Orchestre National de Jazz (Paris), Jazz Baltica (Germany), and the
ologne and Frankfurt Radio Orchestras in concerts of her music as well as for various
selevision and radio broadcasts.

n 1994 Maria conducted the Carnegie Hall Jazz Orchestra at Carnegie Hall in the ommissioned premier of El Viento. She was commissioned to compose Scenes from Childhood premiered by her own orchestra at the 1995 Monterey Jazz Festival. Her orchestra has given televised performances at the opening of the 1995 Macau iternational Music Festival and the 1996 Berlin Jazz Festival. Maria was the recipient f a Doris Duke award to compose a dance work for the Pilobolus dance group. The project was premiered at the American Dance Festival in June of 1998.

laria has placed in several of the DOWNBEAT and JAZZTIMES Critics and Readers Folls. The 1997 Critics Poll placed her seven times including first place Arranger and first place TDWR in Composer and Arranger categories. her orchestra placed second, and her album Coming About placed amongst the best jazz albums of the year.

The Maria Schneider Jazz Orchestra performed at Visiones in Greenwich Village every Monday night for five years (1993-1998). They have also performed in Macau, Brazil, id extensively in Europe. Maria's debut recording Evanescence on the Enja label, was nominated for two 1995 Grammy Awards: Best Large jazz Ensemble Performance, and for its title piece, Best Instrumental Composition. She was a nominee for Copenhagen's AZZPAR Prize in 1995. Her second recording Coming About, released in June of 1996, received "five stars" from DOWNBEAT and was also nominated for a Grammy Award. Maria received the Critics' Choice - Best Composer award at the 1998 New York Jazz Awards at Lincoln Center.







The music of Palestrina, Lassus, and Victoria, among others, is characterized by long beautiful lines intertwining in elaborate ways to form a seamless unity. They achieved a wonderful harmonic balance that was particularly appropriate to express religious faith. These masters excelled in setting the words of the Mass, and also wrote literally thousands of motets, shorter religious works for four, five, or six voices on Latin texts.

Victoria was a Spanish composer who spent many years in Rome, where he probably studied with Palestrina, the greatest church composer of the time. The present motet is from his first printed book of motets, published in 1572, when the composer was only 24 years old.

Franz Joseph Haydn (1732-1809)

Haydn wrote this short "madrigal" as he called it, for chorus and orchestra during his stay in England in 1792. When he first arrived there from his native Austria a year earlier, he spoke no English at all; however, he soon learned enough not only to converse with his hosts but also to write music to English words. The poet he honored with his choice was one John Wolcot, who used the pen name Peter Pindar. The contrast of the raging storm and the wished-for calm weather gave Haydn an attractive compositional task. He evoked the high winds and the flashes of lightning by using harsh dissonances, sudden accents and syncopated rhythms. Then, for the calm sections, he switched from minor to major and slowed down the tempo for a wonderfully lyrical, soothing melody.

Epitaph For Moonlight

R. Murray Schafer
Canadian composer, R. Murray Schafer, wrote Epitaph for Moonlight, in 1968 as
a study piece for youth choir. The listener might think of the calm following
Haydn's storm as the choir takes you on a contemporary musical journey to
express the beauty of the moonlight.

The text of the composition includes synonyms for the word "moonlight" that were invented by one of Mr. Schafer's grade 7 music classes. You will hear their "moonlight" synonyms throughout the performance.

Las Agachadas (The Shake-down Song)

Aaron Copland (1900-1990)

American composer, Aaron Copland wrote Las Agachadas in 1942 as a posthumous tribute to renowned ethnomusicologist Kurt Schindler. The simple strains of this song offer a humorous glimpse into the religious life of Spanish monks, comparing the pious act of genuflection to a folkdance. The accompanying chorus emulates the percussive strumming of a Flamenco guitar, capturing the atmosphere and rhythmic drive of a Spanish dance.

Festive Overture

Dimitri Shostakovich (1906-75)

transcribed for the wind band by Donald Hunsberger

Shostakovich's Festive Overture was completed in 1954, in the period between his Symphony No. 10 and the Violin Concerto. Arranged for the Russian Military Band by the composer in 1958, it has been scored for the American band by Donald Hunsberger. The Festive Overture demonstrates one of Shostakovich's distinctive talents--the ability to write a long sustained melodic line combined with a pulsating rhythmic drive. In addition to the flowing melodic passages, examples of staccato rhythmic sections set off the flowing line and the variant fanfares. It is truly a "festive" overture!

American Knights!-"Time To Take Back The Knights!": The Chosen

Stephen Melillo (1999)

Time to Take Back the Knights (alternate title-The Chosen) was commissioned by the Rancho Buena Vista High School Wind Ensemble, Mr. Larry R. White, Conductor. It is dedicated "to those parents, family and friends, who in the noble support and promotion of school Music programs throughout this country and the world, inspire the next generation of Heroes. . . . by being Heroes themselves. Time to Take Back the Knights! is but one part of American Knights, a series of pieces written to inspire the next generation of Heroes. . . and American Knights is but one part of a personal mission called STORMWORKS. Within its musical boundary of 8:18, thematic ideas which date back to the 1970's connect it to many of its other parts, wherein lies the greater, single message. That message is for you to discover and enjoy! Thank you so much for championing this and all STORM works. . . and for helping to inspire the next generation of Heroes."

Liebestod from Tristan und Isolde

Richard Wagner (1813-83)

Both the music of this transcription and the opera from which it is extracted are too well known to need description. In this arrangement the sophisticated listener may miss the voices of the celli and other strings, but remaining are the tonal sequences which sing of desire and the avowing of love. The *Love-Death* is concerned with the indomitable determination to follow into nothingness the thing that makes life-Life. In Wagner's own words: ". . .it does not express the passion, love, or longing of such-and-such an occasion, but passion, love, and longing in itself."

Dr. Christopher Krummel, Trumpet

In this aptly named new work (written for Master Sergeant Gregory A. Brown and the United States Air Force Band), Mr. Broughton explores the diverse technical and expressive capabilities of the trumpet. He comments:

"Although not literally a programmatic piece, Excursions is based upon a tune that wanders in and out of various musical situations. After a short introduction by the soloist, the main theme is presented over a lightly ambling accompaniment. The theme travels this way and that, running into some interesting diversions along the way and eventually meeting itself where it began - at the introduction."

Angular melodies and driving rhythms characterize the piece, permeating the "various musical situations" through which the solo trumpet leads the band. Mr. Broughton masterfully uses fragments of the opening thematic material - including wide leaps, syncopations, and a rising 16th note figure - in countless new combinations.

Bruce Broughton is one of today's most versatile composers and has established himself as one of the country's premiere film and television writers. He has received 16 Emmy nominations and seven Emmy awards.

Mars from The Planets

Gustav Holst (1874-1934)

The Planets, composed for orchestra in 1915, is a suite of seven tone poems, each describing symbolically a different planet. The work has insistent odd meters of five and seven beats, thick streams of parallel triads, and an opulent instrumentation. The entire suite was first performed for a private audience in 1918 and in public, without Venus and Neptune, in 1919.

Mars-The Bringer of War was complete in the composer's mind in the early summer of 1914, when the First World War was but an emerging threat. The work is dominated by a relentless hammering out of a 5/4 rhythm which suggests the imposing destruction of war. The opposition of harmony and rhythm is skillfully used to produce a startling aural and emotional effect. This movement was transcribed for band by the composer in 1924.

Around the turn of the 20th century, the wind band was the primary medium for average Americans to hear music performed live. Bands were everywhere. Millions flocked to the amusement parks, state and industrial expositions and to local theaters to hear professional ensembles--directed by such luminaries as John Philip Sousa, Patrick S. Gilmore, Frederick Innes, and Arthur Pryor-performing programs of marches, orchestral and operatic transcriptions, light-hearted incidental music, and especially, to hear the numerous soloists featured on each concert.

The distinguished lineage of concert band cornet soloists performing throughout America from the end of the Civil War through the 1920's included Herbert L. Clarke, Patrick S. Gilmore, Mathew Arbuckle, Jules Levy, and many others. These cornet soloists would perform encores that dazzled the audience with technical proficiency or lulled them into a sense of rapture through the sheer simplicity and beauty of a lovely slow melody presented in a warm singing manner. Sometimes I Feel Like A Motherless Child, a solo cornet and band work of the latter style, was written for the Eastman Wind Ensemble and Wynton Marsalis and was recorded on the critically-acclaimed CD, Carnaval (CBS Records, 1987).

The phenomenal success twenty years ago of STAR WARS and its two companion films, RETURN OF THE JEDI and THE EMPIRE STRIKES BACK, renewed interest in movies as huge spectacles. Although set in futuristic terms for we earthbound travelers, the three films are in many ways actually historical in nature. Frequently described as the morality plays of film, the stories in the TRILOGY share a common theme of the primary struggle between good and evil and the eventual success of love conquering all.

Created originally to be part of a nine-part series, each film is complete within itself while remaining open-ended for its eventual position in the nine tales. The characters obviously grow older and the production technology develops more and more as each year goes by. The recent re-release of the films in the United States and the opening of a new Star Wars film this past summer have generated massive

interest and box-office success for the shows.

Of musical interest, the STAR WARS project brought to international prominence the talents of John Williams, one of the most gifted composers for film and television. Williams worked in a totally different compositional style for the late 1970's in that he did not write short "cue music" for individual scenes, but rather composed large free-standing compositions that accompanied large segments of the film.

The five excerpts gathered in the TRILOGY are each capable of individual contrast, excitement, and beauty. The themes for Leia and Yoda have received recognition, and the "Darth Vader Death March" and "The Main Title Music" are some of the best known film music performed today. The hidden gem in this set is the third movement, "The Battle in the Forest," from RETURN OF THE JEDI, an extremely humorous Prokofiev-esque vivace which supports the little Ewoks in their fight with the huge metallic giants.

ABOUT THE SOLOIST

CHRISTOPHER R. KRUMMEL holds a Bachelor of Music cum laude from Miami University and a Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. His major teachers include University of Illinois professors Ray Sasaki and Michael Ewald and James Olcott of Miami University. Dr. Krummel has also studied with Arnold Jacobs (Chicago Symphony), Charles Schlueter (Boston Symphony), Marie Speziale (Cincinnati Symphony) and Dr. Daniel D'Addio (1st place, Geneva International Solo Competition).

Dr. Krummel has held positions with numerous orchestras including the Canton Symphony, the Champaign-Urbana Symphony, the Danville Symphony, Orquestra Sinfonica del Estado de Mexico, the Orquesta del Palacio de Mineria, and the Middletown Symphony. Additionally, he has performed with the Wheeling Symphony, Sinfonia da Camera, the Springfield Symphony, the Kankakee Symphony, the Orquesta Filarmonica de la Ciudad de Mexico, the Orquesta Filarmonica de la UNAM, the Orquesta Sinfonica del ISSTE, the Hamilton Symphony, the Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, and the Richmond Symphony. Dr. Krummel has also served as first trumpet of the U.S. Air Force Band of the Midwest.

As an active soloist, Dr. Krummel has been finalist and award winner in solo competitions on the national and international level including Ellsworth Smith International Solo Competitions in Bad Sackingen, Germany and Tallahassee, Florida. In the fall of 1993, he presented premiere performances of electroacoustic compositions with the Contemporary Chamber Players in Chicago, Atlanta, Seoul and Taejon, South Korea. As a commercial musician, Dr. Krummel has performed

in numerous big bands, shows, and musicals. He has worked with entertainers such as Maureen McGovern, the Temptations, Carol Channing, Joel Gray, Shari Lewis (and Lambchop), Julius La Rosa and Frankie Valli. Dr. Krummel currently performs as principal trumpet of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands, Instrumental Music Coordinator, and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned the Doctor of Music Education at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion from the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) for three years. From 1980-89 he was the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YS he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and he co-directs the Marching Pride and Concert Band. He also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstow Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has been published in the Kansas Music Review Journal; in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, TRIAD; and in the National Band Association (NBA) Journal and in the NBA Newsletter. He is a member of the NB School Reform Committee and also serves as the Chair of the NBA North Central Division. His many professional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all-state, sectional, regional, and district concert bands and orchestras throughout the United States and Canada. Dr. Gage was the conductor of the 1998 West Virginia All State Symphony Orchestra.

Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra performed at the 1998 Ohio Music Educators Convention in Columbus. In 1996 the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble was a feature performer at the College Band Directors National Association Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The Symphonic Wind Ensemble recently released its first compact disc, Lions and Jesters and Dragons, Oh My! His bands have also performed at all-state music education festivals in New York and Kansas. Dr. Gage serves on the Board of Advisors for the St. Patricks Day Band Festival in Dublin, Ireland. In May 1999 he was selected as Distinguished Professor at YSU.

Dr. Gage's biography was listed in the 1996 and 1998 Who's Who Among America' Teachers. In addition to his teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL) the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra

additionally, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter.

His professional affiliations include a March 1999 induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association. Dr. Gage also is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, National Band Association, Ohio Music Educators Association/MENC, Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu National Band Fraternity, and Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society. Dr. Gage lives in Poland, Ohio with his wife Stephanie, daughter, Claudia, and sons, Matthew and Brendan.







We are talking now of summer evenings in Knoxville Tennessee in the time that I lived there so successfully disguised to myself as a child.

...It has become that time of evening when people sit on their porches, rocking gently and talking gently and watching the street and the standing up into their sphere of possession of the trees, of birds' hung havens, hangars. People go by; things go by. A horse, drawing a buggy, breaking his hollow iron music on the asphalt: a loud auto: a quiet auto: people in pairs, not in a hurry, scuffling, switching their weight of aestival body, talking casually, the taste hovering over them of vanilla, strawberry, pasteboard, and starched milk, the image upon them of lovers and horsemen, squared with clowns in hueless amber. A streetcar raising its iron moan; stopping; belling and starting, stertorous; rousing and raising again its iron increasing moan and swimming its gold windows and straw seats on past and past and past, the bleak spark crackling and cursing above it like a small malignant spirit set to dog its tracks; the iron whine rises on rising speed; still risen, faints, halts; the faint stinging bell, rises again, still fainter; fainting, lifting, lifts, faints foregone: forgotten. Now is the night one blue dew.

Now is the night one blue dew, my father has drained, he has coiled the hose.

Low on the length of lawns, a frailing of fire who breathes...Parents on porches: rock and rock. From damp strings morning glories hang their ancient faces.

The dry and exalted noise of the locusts from all the air at once enchants my eardrums.

On the rough wet grass of the back yard my father and mother have spread quilts. We all lie there, my mother, my father, my uncle, my aunt, and I too am lying there.... They are not talking much, and the talk is quiet, of nothing in particular, of nothing at all in particular, of nothing at all. The stars are wide and alive, they seem each like a smile of great sweetness, and they seem very near. All my people are larger bodies than mine,...with voices gentle and meaningless like the voices of sleeping birds. One is an artist, he is living at home. One is a musician, she is living at home. One is my mother who is good to me. One is my father who is of being on this earth, lying, on quilts, on the grass, in a summer evening, among the sounds of the night. May God bless my people, my uncle, my aunt, my mother, my good father, oh, remember them kindly in their time of trouble; and in the hour of their taking away.

After a little I am taken in and put to bed. Sleep, soft smiling, draws me unto her: and those receive me, who quietly treat me, as one familiar and well-beloved in that home: but will not, oh, will not, not now, not ever; but will not ever tell me who I am.



Fanfare for a New Era was written as a celebration Lt. Col. Lowell E. Graham's appointment as Commander of the United States Air Force Band. The composer states, "As I envisioned the piece, I knew that I heard something energetic and vibrant, highlighting the talents of this fine ensemble. The work derives its framework from the opening trumpet motif. The motif is expanded and developed through a variety of musical techniques including chorale, fugue, augmentation, polychordal techniques, and minimalism.

Symphony in B-Flat

Paul Hindemith (1895-1963)

The Symphony for Concert Band was composed at the request of Lt. Col. Hugh Curry, leader of the United States Army Band, and was premiered in Washington, D.C. on April 5, 1951, with the composer conducting. The three-movement symphony shows Hindemith's great contrapuntal skill, and the organized logic of his thematic material. His melodies develop ever-expanding lines, and his skill in the organization and utilization of complex rhythmic variation adds spice and zest to the strength of his melodies.

The first movement is in sonata allegro form in three sections, with the recapitulation economically utilizing both themes together in strong counterpoint. The second and third movements develop and expand their thematic material in some of the most memorable contrapuntal writing for winds. The second movement opens with an imitative duet between alto saxophone and cornet, accompanied by a repeated chord figure. The duet theme, along with thematic material from the opening movement, provides of the third movement utilizes the combined themes while the woodwinds amplify the incessant chattering of the first movement. The brass and percussion adamantly declare a halt with a powerful final cadence.

The Symphony in B-Flat rivals any orchestra composition in length, breadth, and content, and served to convince other first-rank composers--including Giannini, Persichetti, Creston, and Hovhanness--that the band was a legitimate medium for serious music.

Gordon Jacob, native of London, was educated at the Royal College of Music here he later taught counterpoint, orchestration, and composition. As a composer his orchestral and choral works include a ballet, a concert overture, two symphonies, numerous concertos for wind and string instruments, many edagogic works for piano and for chorus, a variety of chamber works, songs, and film music. Jacob ranks as one of the foremost contributors to the expanding repertoire of original works for band.

his chamber music gem is written for two flutes, two oboes, two clarinets in B-flat, 2 bassoons, double bassoon (ad lib), and 2 horns in F. This 12-minute work is delightfully orchestrated and explores a number of timbral ombinations and inverted wind voicings previously used by Mozart, Strauss, and other composers. The omnipresence of the English folk song and the compositional influences of Holst and Vaughan Williams make this a special ork, indeed!

n Puszta, 4 Gypsy Dances, the young and talented Belgian composer Jan Van der Roost has constructed an exciting set of dances in the style of Hungarian lik music. The character and sounds are reminiscent of the Hungarian and avonic dances of Brahms and Dvorak. However, the tunes are newly composed, and not actually based on existing folk melodies.

Karl King (1891-1971)

King wrote this march for the Barnum and Bailey Circus Band in 1913 at the request of its director, Ned Brill. King was 22 at the time and was preparing to join the band as a euphonium player. The euphonium part in this march (and most of King's other marches) shows his love for the instrument—he liked to hear the euphonium "romping around." His use of the word "favorite" in the title was a good choice. It is still one of the most popular marches played—in quot of the circus.

If the major impetus given to the establishment of the Romantic movement in music can be credited to one composer, that man was Carl Maria (Friederich Ernst) von Weber. He brought genius to the musical scene at the time most propitious for its fulfillment, and though his life was to be cut tragically short I was to influence the whole course of music: his operas paved the way for Wagner, while piano music led just as surely to the subsequent stylistic developments of Chopin, Liszt, and Schumann.

A close look at Weber's symphonies and concertos makes it clear that traditional sonata form had no great appeal for him. He appreciated that other composers had found it provided an inner drama of its own in the development of contrasted themes and its exploration of key relationships. It was a form, however, which he neither mastered nor apparently wished to conquer. This through-composed work, a staple of the solo clarinet repertoire, demonstrates theme and variations approach to composition.

Dr. Lee Brooks, President of Concert Masters Recording (and the recording engineer of the SWE's CD projects!) has masterfully captured the orchestration setting by von Weber within the confines of the chamber wind ensemble. This work is available from *Brooks Music Publishing*--PO Box 9455--Canton, Ohio 44711--(330) 456-3916. Our soloist for this performance is Professor Joseph Edwards, Director of YSU's Dana School of Music.

John E. Veneskey, Guest Conductor

During Sousa's lifetime, Manhattan Beach was a highly fashionable New York summer resort. In 1893 he and his band began a long string of engagements there. With 19 former members of Gilmore's Band, a dozen or so very capable players from Europe, and some of the most outstanding artists from other bands in his group, Sousa knew the musical and entertaining potential of his band. However, his first business manager, David Blakely, was skeptical, and it was at the first Manhattan Beach concert series that he invited the most prominent critics and musicians in New York to hear the band and offer their criticism. Their comments were so flattering that Blakely was convinced that Sousa was correct in his judgment. Sousa composed Manhattan Beach March during that first summer and several other important works during subsequent summers at the resort.

The composer writes:

The Third Symphony was commissioned by the United States Air Force Band in Washington, D.C. The conductor of the band at that time, Col. Alan Bonner, told me that he wanted a major work for the wind band. He said that he didn't care about style, length, difficulty, or anything else -- I was given complete freedom to write whatever I wanted to. I began to work on it in earnest at a very difficult time in my life, right after our baby daughter, Natalie, died. This symphony is the most emotionally draining work that I have ever composed. If it were to be given a nickname, I believe that "Tragic" would be appropriate.

The work progresses from the deepest darkness of despair all the way to the brightness of fulfillment and joy. . . The third movement is a fantasia about what my world would have been like if Natalie had lived. It is a farewell to her. The all. The second melody of the last movement is based on an old Lutheran children's hymn called "I am Jesus' Little Lamb." This hymn was sung at Natalie's funeral. The last stanza of the song reads:

Who so happy as I am
Even now the Shepherd's lamb?
And when my short life is ended,
By his angel host attended,
He shall fold me to His breast,
There within His arms to rest.

Three days after I completed this symphony, on June 25, 1994, our son Billy Barnes was born. If the third movement is for Natalie, then the *Finale* is really for Billy, and our joy with him after the tragic death of his sister.

"The Gum-Suckers "March from In a Nutshell

Percy Grainger (1882-1961)

edited by R. Mark Rogers (1996)

"Gum-sucker" is an Australian nickname for Australians born in Victoria, the home state of the composer. The eucalyptus trees that abound in Victoria are called "gums," and the young shoots at the bottom of the trunk are called "suckers;" so "gum-sucker" came to mean a young native son of Victoria, just as Ohioans are nicknamed "Buckeyes." In the march Grainger has used his ow "Australian Up-Country-Song" melody, written by him to typify Australia, which melody he also employed in his "Colonial Song" for two voices and orchestra (root form), or for military band. The march was worked out in the summer of 1914 (at Evergood Cottage, Coudhurst, Kent, England), and scored for orchestra late the same year in New York City. It was sketched for military band late in the decade, but not finished until the summer of 1942. Originally the fourth movement of the orchestral suite, In a Nutshell, Grainger reworked the piece for the wind band and R. Mark Rogers has contemporized it and brought it to prominence in the performances of the concert band.

ABOUT THE SOLOIST

JOSEPH EDWARDS, Director of the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University, joined the faculty in 1969 after his tenure at Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa. Since his appointment to the Dana School of Music, his responsibilities have included the teaching of clarinet and saxophone and directing the symphonic, concert, and marching bands.

Professor Edwards received a Bachelor of Music Education from YSU, a Master of Music Performance as a Woodwind Specialist from Michigan State University, and pursued doctoral studies at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

Having appeared frequently as guest soloist and clinician with high school and college ensembles, Professor Edwards has also performed with the American

Wind Symphony, Sioux City Symphony, Youngstown Symphony, Detroit Concert Band, Blossom Festival Band, and the Cleveland Symphonic Winds. He was awarded the Distinguished Professor of Music Award at YSU in 1988 and the prestigious Watson Award at YSU in 1996. Currently, he performs with the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra and the Dana Woodwind Quintet.

He makes his home in Poland with his wife, Karen, a music educator, his son, Justin, a fifth grade saxophonist, and his golf clubs!

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

JOHN E. VENESKEY joins the Dana School of Music as a full-time faculty member after 10 years of teaching experience in the public schools. His responsibilities at Dana include serving as Associate Director of Bands, directing the Marching Pride and Penguin Review Basketball Band, conducting the Concert Band and Fall Symphonic Band, teaching instrumental music education courses, supervising student teachers, and teaching studio trumpet.

Mr. Veneskey holds a Master of Music degree from the Dana School of Music, a Bachelor of Music degree from Bowling Green State University, and a teacher's certification from YSU. He is currently pursuing the PhD. in Music Education at Kent State University. His professional affiliations include The International Association of Jazz Educators, College Band Directors National Conference, National Band Association, Music Educator's National Conference/OMEA, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Kappa Psi, and the International Trumpet Guild.

In addition to his teaching duties, Mr. Veneskey maintains a professional performing schedule. He is currently associated with Special Productions in Cleveland, First Class Productions in Youngstown, as well as the Western Reserve Brass Quintet. His other performance credits include: The Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, The Ohio Chamber Brass, WD Packard Band, Toledo Opera Orchestra, Toledo Jazz Orchestra, The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus, Shrine Circus, Clark Terry, Phil Woods, Zoot Sims, Henry Mancini, and Maureen McGovern, among others. Mr. Veneskey resides in North Lima with his wife, Dana, and sons, Matthew and Michael.

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands, Instrumental Music Coordinator, and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned a doctorate at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, a masters degree at the Eastman School of Music, and a bachelors degree and Performer's Certificate in Percussion at the State University of New York at Fredonia.

Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and he was the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and assists with the Marching Pride; he also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has been published in the Kansa Music Review Journal, in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, TRLAD; and in the National Band Association (NBA) Journal and in the NBA Newsletter. He is a member of the NBA School Reform Committee and currently serves as the Chair of the NBA North Central Division. His many professional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all-state, sectional, regional, and district concert bands and orchestras throughout the United States and Canada.

Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra performed at the 1998 and 2000 Ohio Music Educators Convention. In 1996 the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble was a feature performer at the College Band Directors National Association Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The Symphonic Wind Ensemble recently released its first compact disc, Lions and Jesters and Dragons, Oh Myl, The Symphonic Wind Ensemble is currently in production for a second CD which will be released late in the fall of 2000. His bands have also performed at all-state music education festivals in New York and Kansas. Dr. Gage serves on the Board of Advisors for the St. Patrick's Day Band Festival in Dublin, Ireland. In May 1999 he was selected as Distinguished Professor at YSU.

Dr. Gage's biography was listed in the 1996 and 1998 Who's Who Among America's Teachers. In addition to his teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; additionally, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter.

His professional affiliations include a March 1999 induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association. Dr. Gage also is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, National Band Association, Ohio Music Educators Association/MENC, Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu National Band Fraternity, and Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society. Dr. Gage lives in Poland, Ohio with his wife Stephanie, daughter, Claudia, and sons, Matthew and Brendan.

Program Notes

Dorven Dalai is an arrangement of an Eastern Inner Mongolian folk song which exhorts everyone from the four Seas (the four corners of the earch) to fill their wine bowls with the best of wine, to rejoice and sing, and enjoy a moment of happiness together

As clear as the water of the West Sea, as gentle as the areca leaves With happiness and good fortune we have met.

Let's drink the best of wine, rejoice and sing,

And enjoy this joyful moment together.

As pristine as the water of the East Sea, as gentle as the fruit tree leaves
With good wishes and luck we have met.
Let's raise our wine cups, rejoice and sing,
And enjoy this happy moment together

Te Quiro is an original song from the Argentinean composer of popular music, Alberto Favero. He sets to music a moving poem of Mario Benedetti (b. 1920), one of the best known poets from Uruguay. The tex expresses the feelings of an oppressed country screaming rebellion.

Praise The Lord is a processional song used by women in Cameroon, West Africa. The song was collected by Elaine Hanson, a missionary of the Evangelical Lutheran church in America who spent 11 years in Cameroon, and was a member of Femmes Pour Christ (Women for Christ). This particular group used French as their common language, hence the rench verse. Traditionally, it was used as a processional for communion Sunday.

Ernani Aguiar (b. 1949) is one of the best known of the younger generation of Brazillian composers. This *Psalmo 150* is characteristic of his style which is very rhythmic with rapid articulations.

Praise the Lord in his sacred places, praise him in the firmament of his power.

Praise him for his mighty acts, praise him according to his excellent greatness.

Praise him with the sound of the trumpet, praise him with the psaltery and harp.

Praise him with the timbrel and the dance, praise him with strings and pipes.

Giovanni Gabrielli had the SATB choir sing on the main floor and the TTBB and SSAA choirs were heard antiphonally from higher chambers in the Basilica.

El Yivneh Hagalil is a Hebrew folk song which procleaims "God will build Galilee, Blessed is the building of Galilee." Interwoven within this folk melody are the first eight notes of the hymn Adon Olom (The Lord of the Universe). This hymn of God's omnipotence and providence was originally intended for evening prayer, however, it has been a part of the morning service since the 15th century.

Cantate Domino

Sing to the Lord a new song, Sing to the Lord all the earch. Sing to the Lord, bless his holy name: proclaim his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among all the nations, his wonders among all people.

Tania-Taniusha has been performed throughout the world and has become one of the most popular choral works in the Russian repertoire. Composer, Valery Kalistratov (b. 1942) currently lives in Moscow with his wife, Anna Litvinenko, who is one of Russia's finest singers. The percussion part for Russian wooden spoons is meant to imitate the tapping of the dancers' shoe heels.

Fair Tania with the rosy cheeks, Rosy-cheeked and dark-browned maiden, Dark-browed and dark-eyed girl:

She leads the dancers into the colonel's courtyard,
The colonel's son stands on the porch and gazes at Tania.
He gazes at Tania and utters sweet words.

How fair she is! How fair and rosy cheeked. How rosy-cheeked and dark-browed.

Michael Spiro is an internationally acclaimed percussionist, recording artist, and educator, known specifically for his work in the Latin music field. He has performed on hundreds of records, co-produced several instructional videos for Warner Bros. Publications (featuring such renowned artists as David Garibaldi, Changuito, Giovanni Hidalgo, and Ignacio Berroa), and produced seminal recordings in the Latin music genre, including, Orquesta Batachanga, Grupo Bata-Ketu, and Grupo Ilu-Ana.

Mr. Spiro's formal education includes a Bachelor's Degree with Honors in Latin American Studies from the University of California, and three and a half years of graduate work in ethnomusicology at the University of Washington. His practical education consists of a seven-year apprenticeship with Francisco Aguabella and extensive study throughout Latin America. He has studied in Cuba since 1984 with musicians such as Jose Luis Quintana "Changuito", Esteban Vega Bacallao, Daniel Diaz, and Juan Blanco of Orquesta Ritmo Oriental, Regino Jimenez, and Los Munequitos de Matansas. In addition, in 1986 he spent two months training at G.R.E.S. Portela, the famous Escola de Samba in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

As an educator, Mr. Spriro is extremely active. He has been a faculty member or artist in residence at the University of California at Berkeley, Stanford University, Mt. Holyoke, University of Massachusetts, Smith College, Wichita State University, Banff Center of the Arts, California State University at San Diego, and the Cornish Institute of the Arts, and has conducted clinics and master classes at numerous institutions throughout North America.

Mr. Spiro's recording and performing credits include such diverse artists as David Byrne, Dori Caymmi, Changuito, Alex DeGrassi, Ella Fitzgerald, David Garibaldi, Gilberto Gil, Giovanni Hidalgo, Toninho Horta, Bobby Hutcherson, Dr. John, Bobby McFerrin, Andy Narell, Ray Obiedo, Chico O'Farrill, Lazaro Ros, Carlos Santana, Shadowfax, Grace Slick, Clark Terry, McCoy Tyner, and Charlie Watts.

In addition, he has recorded soundtracks to such major motion pictures as Soapdish, Henry and June, True Stories, Walker, Eddie Macon's Run, and Dragon-The Life of Bruce Lee.

He currently resides in San Francisco, California where he is an integral part of the Bay area music scene. He maintains his position on the jazz faculty at the University of California, Berkeley, records and produces with groups throughout the West Coast, and is touring worldwide with his percussion trio "Talking Drums", which he co-leads with David Garibaldi and Jesus Diaz. In 1996 his own recording, Bata-Ketu was released on Bembe Records and is currently receiving international acclaim.

YSU Latin Percussion Group is directed by Dr. Glenn Schaft who is director of percussion studies at YSU. The Latin Percussion Group is an integral part of the percussion ensemble program at YSU, which also includes marimba ensembles and contemporary percussion groups.

YSU Latin Jazz Combo was founded in the fall of 1999 and is directed by Dr. Glenn Schaft. It is one of five jazz combos and three big bands which comprise the ensemble portion of the renowned YSU Jazz Studies Program The Latin Combo performs music by Latin jazz masters such as Dizzy Gillespie, Tito Puente, and Eddie Palmieri.

Introduction of the instruments

Erhu is a two-string fiddle. Another name of Erhu is Huqin which means Hun's instrument in Chinese. Chinese Han people learned this instrument from a Mongolian tribe during the 10th century. Now, as an important solo instrument for the recital hall, it is appropriate both for deep tragedy and for the momentum of an avalanche. Besides, it also assumes a central position in the modern Chinese orchestra, as well as in the accompaniment of singing and dancing.

Gaohu's other name is Yuehu (Cantonese hu). It reveals the instrument's special position in the Cantonese ensemble. Developed in the 1920's, the Gaohu has the same basic construction as the erhu, with its somewhat smaller tubular Resonator. It is pitched a fourth or fifth higher in tuning. Its range can reach tow octaves. In performance it is held vertically with the lower part of the resonator supported between the knees to control the noisy tone. With its sweet and delicate tone, the Gaohu is often in the treble of the bowed strings of the modern Chinese orchestra. It is used in the ensemble and for accompaniment as well.

Dizi is a Chinese bamboo flute. It is the oldest instrument in China. Some bone flutes have been unearthed from a tomb of 8,000 years ago in Henan province. They are basically the same in construction as the modern bamboo type, only without the hole for a membrane. These bone instruments still can be played despite being 8,000 years old. The modern type is frequently wrapped with bands of silk of thread to prevent cracking. Its range is about two and one half octaves. Among many types, Bangdi and Qudi are the most common nowadays. The shorter type known as Bangdi, clear and bright in tone and the longer one known as Qudi has a more mellow tone.

Xiao is a notched flute. Xiao players can be seen among the pottery figurines of the Han dynasty(206 BC-220 AD) and in the tomb brick-wall painting of the Wei and Jin period (220-420AD). The modern type, often made from black bamboo with nine joints, has six finger holes, five at the front and one at the rear and 2-4 air holes at the lower end. The Xiao produces soft and delicate tones, suitable for solo and duets with Qin zither or used in the silk and bamboo chamber music.

Introduction of the teacher and the students

Du Yaxiong was born in Hebei, China, 1945. He studied ethnomusicology in Nanjing Arts University and was awarded an MA degree in 1981. He has been teaching in the Conservatory of China in Beijing for 20 years. Currently he is the professor of Chinese music at the Conservatory.

In 1986, he was conferred the title "Idquo; National Outstanding Expert of China" by the Chinese Ministry of Culture. From 1987-1988, he worked in Budapest at the Musicology Institute of Hungarian Academy of Science as a visiting scholar, and he received the Cultural Medal of the People's Republic of Hungary in 1989. From 1991-1992, he taught Chinese traditional Music and Ethnomusicology at the Folklore Institute, Indiana University (USA) and received the Fulbright Fellowship during that year. In 1995, he received the Rockefeller Foundation's Bellagio Residency Award.

He has published over 12 books and over 200 papers in English, Hungarian and Chinese. He is Vice President of the Association of Chinese Music Therapy, Vice President of the Association of World Music (China), Vice-chairperson of Minorities' Music Research Society of China, and Vice-director of the Musicology Committee of the Musicians Association of Beijing, China.

Kong Weijuan was born in 1978 at Jinan, Shangdong province. She started to study Erhu when she was 5. When she was 12, she won the first prize in the Teenager's division; Music Instrumental Competition of Shandong province. In 1991, she came to Beijing and entered the Affiliated Music School of the Conservatory of China.

She was the best Erhu student in the school and won first prize in the Teenager's division; Erhu Competition of China when she was 17. In 1997, she entered the Conservatory of China to further her study and she won the first prize in the Chinese Instrument Competition in 1998. Although she is a third year university student, she certainly is the one of the best Erhu players in China and in the whole world.

Miss Kong has visited Korea, Thailand and other Asian countries, and her talent was appreciated in those countries also. Sun Leduo was born in Beijing, 1979. She started to learn Zheng when she was 5, and her teacher was the most famous Zheng virtuoso, Mr.Qiu Dacheng. She entered the Affiliated Music School of the Conservatory of China in 1991 and she gave her debut in 1992 at Beijing Concert Hall. Miss Sun has been studying three years in the Conservatory of China and she is the best Zheng student in the school and gives performances all over China.

Chen Yue was born in Hangzhou, 1978. Her father is a famous Dizi player and she began to study Dizi when she was 7 from her father. When she was 13, she won the first prize in the Chinese Instrument Competition of Zhejiang Province, and she won the second price in the Chinese Instrument competition of East China in 1992.

She entered the Affiliated Music School of the Conservatory of China in 1993 and became a student at the Conservatory of China in 1996. She is the best Dizi student in the school and published several CDs and VCDs.

Miss Chen has visited Japan, Korea and other Asian countries and people love her playing very much.

Dave Bomstein, clarinet

Mr. Bomstein graduated in 1973 from the Dana School of Music. He was a student of Dr. John Alleman at Youngstown State, as well as at Indiana University in Bloomington.

While still in High School in Syracuse New York in 1961, Dave became the bass-clarinetist of the newly-formed Syracuse Symphony Orchestra, under former Symphony Orchestra associate conductor Karl Kritz. From 1967 to 1970 he served as a U.S. Army bandsman, which included a tour of duty in Vietnam as the first chair player of the U.S. Army Vietnam Headquarters Band stationed at Longh Bin, South Vietnam. In 1972 Mr. Bomstein attended the Ambler festival of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra as a full scholarship recipient. From 1973 to 1975 he taught at Onondaga Community College in Syracuse New York. Duties there included teaching clarinet and saxophone as well as conducting the wind ensemble. He played with the Apple Hill Chamber players of New York City for the summer of As a student of Louis Paul, principal clarinetist of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra from 1956 thru 1994, Dave completed his Masters Degree in Performance at Carnegie-Mellon University in 1979. From 1975 to 1979 he developed a large private-teaching practice in Pittsburgh, and for the 1978 and 1979 seasons played second clarinet with the PSO for operas, ballets and pop concerts. During that period of time he also played first clarinet with the Pennsylvania Opera Festival Orchestra conducted by Ralph Zitterbart. Since 1980 Dave has been a freelance musician, as well as a full-time information systems professional with various Pittsburgh corporations.

Scott Burns, cello

Scott began studying cello at the age of nine. While in the Boardman High School orchestra under the direction of Carol Clark, he received numerous superior ratings at solo and ensemble contests, and held the position of principal cellist for two years.

In 1992 Scott continued his cello studies with Michael Gelfand at the Youngstown State University Dana School of Music. Before completing his Bachelor's Degree in cello performance, Scott won the 1995 Concerto/Aria competition, and performed the Saint-Saens Cello Concerto in A minor with the Dana Symphony Orchestra under William Slocum.

Currently Mr. Burns is a member of both the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and Warren Philharmonic Orchestra, and is alternate section cellist for the Columbus Symphony Orchestra. He is continuing his professional studies with both Michael Gelfand and Anne Martindale Williams, and also has an extensive private teaching practice at his studio.

Ralph Zitterbart, piano

"Indeed, the performance was so lyrical and so natural in its flow and effect that the instrument, the pianist, and the music seemed to go together", said the New York Times review of Ralph Zitterbart's performance of Schubert's B-flat Sonata. "Sensitive, colorful, creative and virtuosic" are the words used to describe his playing whether as a soloist or collaborator.

With such artists as Mildred Miller, Mimi Lerner, Daniel and Todd Phillips of the Orion String Quartet and many members of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, he has performed most of the standard vocal and chamber music literature. Ocean Records recently released his CD, "Piano Concerto" by Nancy Galbraith under the baton of Keith Lockhart with the Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra. Ralph has also recorded CDs of Nancy Galbraith's "Trio" and Hindemith's "Konzert Muzik".

As a conductor for the premier of Bruce Saylor's opera, "My Kinsman, Major Molineux", he received excellent reviews continuing a lifetime involvement with the theater. A performance in 1987 of Scarlatti's "Il trionfo dell'onore" received second place among the most important musical events in Pittsburgh. Of a Britten opera he conducted, a critic wrote, "Top musical honors go to Zitterbart's conducting". He was a musical director of a Summer opera program at C.W. Post for eight seasons where he premiered Gregory Sandow's "Frankenstein".

Mr. Zitterbart is an Associate Professor of Music at Carnegie-Mellon University.

Colleen Neubert, soprano, is well known to Pittsburgh area audiences as a classical concert and stage artist. Her credits include singing the roles of Mimi and Lucia in Lucca, Italy, as well as many roles in the United States. She has repeatedly appeared as featured soloist with the Westmoreland, Johnstown, and McKeesport Symphony Orchestras, and was soloist for the West Virginia Choral Institute production of Verdi's Requiem. In 1999, she presented a recital for the College Music Society at its International Convention in Kyotot, Japan. Ms. Neubert holds a Master in Vocal Performance degree from Duquesne University where she studied with under Ann Kopta of the New York City Opera. She continued her training at the Accademia Vocale di Lucca, Italy, and then was chosen as an in the Pittsburgh Opera Center. Currently, she is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts in Vocal Performance and Literature degree from West Virginia University. Ms. Neubert is President of the NATS Tri-State Chapter, and is Assistant Professor of Voice at Slippery Rock University.

Dr. Allan Mosher, baritone, joined the faculty of the Dana School of Music in 1992. He is Coordinator of the Voice Program at Youngstown State University and directs the Opera Program. He has performed with numerous organizations, including the Buffalo, Rochester and Corning Philharmonic Orchestras, the Manhattan Philharmonic at both Lincoln Center's Avery Fisher Hall and Carnegie Hall, and was recently invited back to one of his alma maters, the University of California at Berkeley, to sing Raphael and Adam in a bicentennial performance of Haydn's "Creation." Dr. Mosher was awarded the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Voice Performance by the University of Cincinnati, a Master of Music degree by the Eastman School of Music, and holds two Bachelor degrees: the first in Theatre Arts from San Francisco State University, and the second in Music from Cal. Dr. Mosher has sung the role of Giorgio Germont with the Valley Lyric Opera Company and the roles of Tonio in "Pagliacci," The Father in "Hansel & Gretel," (Humperdinck), and the Count in Bellini's "La Sonnambula" with the Opera Circle Company. He has directed approximately twentyfive operas. This May will see him do the role of Dulcamara in the Dana Opera Theater's production of Donizetti's delightful comedy, "L' Elisir d'Amore."

Synopsis of the scene between Violetta and Germont from Act II of Verdi's "La Traviata"

Violetta Valery, a former courtesan of Paris, is now living with her lover, Alfredo Germont, in a country house near Paris. Their idyll cannot last, however, as Alfredo's father, a wealthy and respectable gentleman from Provence, has found out about his son's scandalous liaison and comes to their house with the intention of putting a stop to it for the sake of his family's honor and standing in society. Giorgio Germont finds Violetta alone and is none too polite in his greeting. Violetta maintains such dignity, however, that he is soon charmed and abashed, especially when he learns that, far from being dependent upon Alfredo, she has sold her property to support him. Thus abandoning his former attitude, he throws himself wholly on her mercy. Alfredo has, it seems, a younger sister, whose marriage to will be jeopardized if this scandalous mesalliance continues in the Germont family. Violetta at first refuses to give up her lover, then, as the father continues to plead, she begins to realize that her union with Alfredo will ultimately react to his disadvantage. She finally yields, singing through her tears, "Dite alla giovine" ("Tell your daughter"), a moving song in which Violetta renounces all claim to Alfredo for the sake of his sister. Violetta continues, saying, "Now command me." Germont answers, "Say you do not love him." She replies, "He'll not believe me." Violetta thinks of a plan; but she is shaken with sobs and pleads for consolation; she will need courage in order to go through with her resolve. The father comforts her tenderly, then leaves.

Paula Kubik has been Organist/Choir Director at St. John's Episcopal Church, Sharon, since 1978. She is also organist at Temple Beth Israel Sharon, and active in the Shenango Valley as a performer, accompanist and teacher. She received a Bachelor of Music degree (cum laude) from Youngstown State University and a Master of Music degree from Colorado State University both in Organ Performance. She holds certificates from the Summer Academy of Organists, Haarlem, The Netherlands, and the International Institute for Chamber Music, Munich, Germany. Special studies have included classes with Harald Vogel, Anton Heiller and Samuel Sanders. She is currently keyboardist with the Mercer County Historical Society Chamber Players, The Greenville Symphony and the Jeffrey Johns Trio. Her affiliations include the American Guild of Organists (AGO), The Association of Anglican Musicians (AAM), The Guild of Carilloneurs of North America (GCNA) and the National Guild of Piano Teachers.

PROGRAM NOTES

Although Sousa is remembered primarily for his marches, he wrote considerable nusic of other types, including several operettas. One of these, titled *The Free Lance*, concerned a goat herder who left his goats, hired himself out as a (free lance) mercenary leader of two rival armies, maneuvered his troops so that leither side could win, and declared himself emperor of both countries. Whether Sousa needed another new march for his band in 1906 (he wrote no other marches that year) or whether he realized the limited future of his operetta is not known, but he did piece several of the operetta tunes together in composing *The Free Lance March*. Sousa (along with Victor Herbert) devoted much time and energy in 1906 campaigning for composers' royalties on recorded music--a campaign which led to the passing of copyright laws still in effect. These laws protect the composer (another type of "free lance" artist) against infringement on the use of his product.

magine this. Imagine that you work in a law firm. You are not a partner nor are you an associate. In fact, you're not a lawyer. You are not a paralegal, a secretary, or even a typist. You work in the mailroom. Not that your job is inimportant (imagine what would happen if a crucial piece of mail was lelivered to the wrong place), but in the grand scheme of things, you are pretty much at the bottom of the firm's food chain.

Then imagine that you get a phone call from your firm's senior partner. He informs you that the Attorney General of the United States has contacted the firm and has requested you as his lead attorney in a landmark court decision. fact, he wants to meet with you tomorrow afternoon to discuss your strategies regarding the case.

Could something like this ever happen? It did in the musical world of 1954. did to Philip Catelinet, tubist with the London Symphony Orchestra, a talented and versatile musician, but, as with all professional tubists of the day, a musicial who was content to operate in a supporting role. Imagine his surprise and ever shock when he received a phone call from the manager of his orchestra informing him that Ralph Vaughan Williams, England's premier composer and one of the important musical voices of the twentieth-century, has written a tubic concerto. And that he wanted him to perform it on one of the orchestra's Jubilee Concerts. Furthermore, the music was being sent over today and Mr. Vaughan Williams would like to hear him play it tomorrow afternoon.

Mr. Catelinet did show up the following afternoon and with a pianist who was equally unfamiliar with the new concerto, dutifully presented its "first performance" in the living room of the 82-year-old composer. Vaughan Williams' wife and dog were the only others in the audience. With only minor modifications in articulations, and with the composer's admonitions "not to change a single note," the concerto, the first ever for the tuba, was premiered in June of 1954.

The reviews were anything but flattering. "A Tuba Concerto?" wrote one critic—"what's next a double bass concerto?" To this day, the genesis of Vaughan Williams' concerto remains a mystery. It was not the result of a commission of even a request from a "rouge" tubist. Nor was it composed (as Hindemith would do) to finish off a series of solo works for brass instruments. On the other hand, it should not come as a complete surprise. Vaughan Williams had always been interested in novel instrumental textures. Within his nine symphonies he made occasional solo use of the saxophone, the vibraphone, the flugelhorn, and other instruments which are not "regular members" of the standard symphony orchestra. Several years prior to writing the Tuba Concerto he had composed a "Romanza" for harmonica and orchestra. Surely, he regarded the writing of a solo concerto for the tuba as not only a challenge but also as a groundbreaking effort.

While the solo piece for harmonica is rarely heard today, the Tuba Concerto, due to the tremendous interest in the tuba during the past 30 years, has been performed by virtually every professional tubist and by virtually every symphony

rchestra in the world. It has been performed as many times in the ranscription for tuba and wind band. Whatever the reason for its creation, tubists the world over will be forever grateful for the fact that a major composer, a major composer at the height of his compositional skills, found ome reason to compose the first major work for their instrument.

Program notes by John Turk

After A Gentle Rain is a work in two contrasting movements--the first quiet, neditative and introverted and the second sparkling, dance-like and extroverted. The piece is dedicated to Dr. Max Plank and the Eastern Michigan University Symphonic Band and was recorded by the band for Gold Crest Records (ATH-1072).

The Dark Green Glistens With Old Reflections. The first movement begins vith a gently rippling, arpeggiated figure that contains the main harmonic and melodic idea of the entire piece: two superimposed major triads. The figure subtly changes color as it migrates through various registers, spacings, and loublings. While the external shape of the sextuplet seems frozen, one can near an internal, textural progression of changing resonance qualities. Against this backdrop is painted a wide spectrum of both dark and bright mixtures of oft brass, reeds, and percussion. Those colorful mixtures constantly redefine he background and foreground of this introverted scenario.

The play on words in the title suggests images of light reflecting off moist green oliage in turn evoking reflections "off" old memories in a quiet, meditative context. Memories, images, and colors become bolder and more powerful, ulminate in a climax and gradually recede into the past with the same delicate fterglow of soft bell sounds heard in the opening measures.

2. Sparkling Air Bursts With Dancing Sunlight. Extroverted and dance-like in lature this movement gallops with the joy and freshness that seems to fill the air after a gentle rain. The cleansed air sparkles with a sense of rebirth and the celebration of life.

This arrangement of the Widor Toccata from his Symphony for Organ came about when Dr. Largent and Dr. Gage were attending a wedding of a Dana student a ew years ago. At the end of the wedding the organist played the Toccata, and the ensuing conversation, which acknowledged the potential of the Toccata to be arranged for wind ensemble, culminated with an agreement that Dr. Largent would arrange the Widor piece for the Dana Wind Ensemble, this at Dr. Gage's request. This performance of the Toccata is the world premiere.

Program notes by Edward J. Largent

Mood Swing is derived from the jazz idiom. The piece is based on the influences jazz and jazz musicians have had on me, especially my friend and jazz trumpeter, Sean Jones. It is not meant to be a strict interpretation of jazz, nor can it be titled "third stream." The improvisatory nature of jazz should be heard in sections, however actual improvisation is not to be found. The first section is dreamlike, with subtle solos and jazz chords setting the mood for the rest of the piece. The second section is my interpretation of a jazz combo. Most of the time the mood here is light and easy. The third section reflects the musicians warming up for a club gig, while the patrons assemble, happily conversing. The fourth section is the big band section. Fast and loud are the two words that come to mind here. Near the end, the lead trumpet and clarinet trade fours in the style of improvisation. My many thanks to Dr. Stephen Gage and the Youngstown State University Symphonic Wind Ensemble for commissioning and performing this piece.

Program notes by Brett Miller

Arutiunian's Concerto in Ab composed in 1949, opens with a short introduction. A dramatic tremolo in the low brass and woodwinds sets the stage for the entrance of the solo trumpet, which intones a declamatory chromatic melody rich in near-Eastern overtones and prepares the way for a happy uninhibited theme. A second theme, somewhat reminiscent of Borodin, is in vivid contrast, being highly romantic and expansive in nature. The two themes, together with the sinuous melody from the introduction, are developed at length. A middle section follows, featuring the solo trumpet-now muted-in a reflective mood. The two principal themes return against an accompaniment rich in displaced rhythmic accents, and the work comes to a brisk close following a virtuostic trumpet cadenza.

The three movements of Sea Drift, "Out of the Cradle, Endlessly Rocking," "On the Beach at Night," and "Song for All Seas," derive their titles and inspiration from three poems in the Walt Whitman collection entitled Sea Drift.

"Out of the Cradle, Endlessly Rocking": is a poem that blends extended metaphor with a variety of techniques to deal with a tripartition core: birth, life (love), and death (rebirth). The poem is in the form of a childhood reminiscence, told by the poet about an experience involving a mockingbird tha loses his mate, the sea, and the poet's self-discovery of his poetic voice.

Much of this poem and the first movement of Sea Drift implies an undulating, rocking quality with music that rises and falls or swells and ebbs. Peaks of

happiness plunge to troughs of despair, all against the background of the endlessly rocking cradle of life and death—the sea. The music of the first movement is filled with both the longing and the wave-like qualities suggested by Whitman's poem. The sad song of the mockingbird is fused with the song of the poet and the whispers of the sea to form a unity and reconciliation out of diversity and conflict. The poetic trio of bird-boy-sea is symbolized in the music by the timbres of flute/clarinet (oboe)/horn. The complete cycle of birth-life-death is suggested by an overall trajectory of cumulative and disintegrating textures, unfolding in music which is, by turn, lyrical/static, angular/dynamic/conflicting, and finally, song-like and static again.

The second movement, "On the Beach at Night," evokes a reflective scene in which a father and child are contemplating a sky of shimmering stars, some of which appear to be devoured by ravenous dark cloud masses. Out of this symbolic celestial conflict, several stars, some delicate, some radiant, emerge victoriously, intimating the poet's mystical intuition of the immortality of cosmic spirit. The music, marked sognando (dreaming), is built on interplay of resonant, ringing sonorities. These sonorities range from delicate and gentle treble like material heard earlier in the first movement. The third movement, "Song for All Seas," is marked Like wind over waves. This music, like that of novements one and two, is largely derived from the pitch materials first heard an the clarinet solo at the beginning of movement one. Here, however, these pitches are transformed into rhythmic and textural shapes that suggest the nercurial energy of the sea. Tranquil waves are quickly altered into aggressive surges of water and energy. The movement ends in climactic swells of colliding rhythmic figures, which culminate in a final burst on Bb.

Program notes by Anthony Iannaccone

Dr. Lee Brooks, President of Concert Masters Recording Company in Canton, Ohio, was commissioned in the spring of 1998 by the Canton (OH) Community Band to write a march--Salute to the Chief, Concert March-- in honor of President William McKinley. Opening in Bb major and going to Eb major at the trio, this is an energetic, technically challenging, and musically gratifying work in traditional march form. The upper woodwind technical excerpts are calar in character and are characteristic of the Sousa and Fillmore march upper woodwind obligato lines. The percussion scoring is contemporary with a full compliment of battery instruments, timpani, and mallet percussion. A beautiful rio is followed by an exciting and poignant break strain and a compositionally clever two bar extension before the final strain. The last strain presents the upper woodwind choir the first time in a virtuostic obligato passage. The piece comes to a rousing conclusion on the final repeat of the last strain.

This march, written by a fine musician and friend to all bands and band directors, is certain to become a favorite of Ohio bands. This march is available from ConcertMasters Recording, Dr. Lee Brooks, as a desktop published world his phone number is 330-456-3916.

Ravel himself regarded the complete score of the ballet Daphnis and Chloe his choosever. His description of the work as a symphonic choreographique indicates that his view is that of a work "constructed symphonically, according to a strict plan of key sequences, out of a small number of themes, the development of which ensures the work's homogeneity." Having been commissioned in 1909 by Diaghilev to produce a work based on a story by Longus, he set about writing a "vast musical fresco in which I am less concerned with archaism than with reproducing faithfully the Greece of my dreams. . . very similar to that imagine and painted by French artists at the end of the 18th century."

As with Bolero the result did not jibe with that of Diaghilev (whose very Russia ideas were completely at variance with the composer's) and the impresario more than once threatened to cancel the whole project. Ravel remained unruffled and painstaking worked over a three-year period, producing a completed score in 1911. Rehearsals went badly, with Fokine (the choreographer) and Nijinsky, dancing the principal role of Daphnis at daggers drawn, resulting in Fokine's leaving the company permanently at the end of the season. To the end, the confide ballet experienced difficulties with the 5/4 rhythms in the General's Dance. Ravel came to their rescue by suggesting that they omit the customary counting of the measure, and substitute the syllables of Diaghilev's full name: Ser-gei-Dia-ghi-lev. And it worked!

From the completed score Ravel extracted two suites, the second of which will be performed this evening. It consists of the magical Daybreak--surely one of the most effective musical descriptions of nature ever created. Amid the murmuring of streamlets (flutes and clarinets alternating above slowly descending solemn chords) the song of the dawn emerges. Resembling a mighty tree with spreading branches, a superb theme broadens out in all its magnificent prodigality. Then Pantomime. Here the reunited lovers, in thankfulness for Chloe's deliverance from the pirates mime the love story of Pan and Syrinx. And to conclude, a General's Dance amalgamating the characteristic themes of all the protagonists in a brilliant tutti, involving the entire corps de ballet.

ABOUT THE GUEST COMPOSER/CONDUCTOR

ANTHONY IANNACCONE (born New York City, 1943) studied at the Manhattan School of Music and the Eastman School of Music. His principal

teachers were Vittorio Giannini, Aaron Copland, and David Diamond. During the 1960's, he supported himself as a part-time teacher (Manhattan School) and orchestral violinist. His catalogue of more than 50 published works includes three symphonies, as well as smaller works for orchestra, several large works for chorus and orchestra, numerous chamber pieces, a variety of works for wind ensemble, and several extended a capella choral compositions. His music is performed by major orchestras and professional chamber ensembles in the U.S. and abroad.

The composer has received many awards, commissions and grants from many organizations including the 1995 American Bandmasters Association/Ostwald Composition Competition for his work entitled Sea Drift. He is a frequent guest conductor of both instrumental and choral ensembles, particularly at college and university campuses across the country. Currently, Professor Iannaccone is serving as the resident composer/conductor for the Richmond Symphony Orchestra (VA). He teaches composition, orchestration, and arranging, and directs the Collegium Musicum at Eastern Michigan University. Professor Iannaccones appearance is made possible by the Dana New Music Society, Dr. Robert Rollin, Coordinator and the Dana Concert Series.

ABOUT THE ARRANGER

EDWARD J. LARGENT is Professor of Music in the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. Dr. Largent joined the Dana faculty in September 1970 after having taught at Western Kentucky University and The Ohio State University. He holds degrees from The Ohio State University (Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music, and Ph.D. in Music) and from the University of Illinois (Master of Music). His specialties include composition, analysis, accompanying at the piano and harpsichord, and computer-assisted instruction. He has taught all the music theory courses in the Dana inventory.

His compositions range from solo piano works to two piano concerti and a symphony based on Northern Indian folk melodies. He has written numerous hamber works including four woodwind quintets, sonatas for flute, oboe, clarinet, trombone, and tuba; and duos for flute and clarinet. More recently he has written 15 songs in German, French, and Italian, which were premiered at Dana over the past two years. He composed a choral work in 1994, which was part of the celebration of 125th anniversary of the founding of the Dana School of Music.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

IOHN E. VENESKEY joins the Dana School of Music as a full-time faculty nember after 10 years of teaching experience in the public schools. His

responsibilities at Dana include serving as Associate Director of Bands, directing the Marching Pride and Penguin Review Basketball Band, conducting the Concert Band and Fall Symphonic Band, teaching instrumental music education courses, supervising student teachers, and teaching studio trumpet.

Mr. Veneskey holds a Master of Music degree from the Dana School of Music, a Bachelor of Music degree from Bowling Green State University, and a teacher's certification from YSU. He is currently pursuing the PhD. in Music Education at Kent State University. His professional affiliations include The International Association of Jazz Educators, College Band Directors National Conference, National Band Association, Music Educator's National Conference/OMEA, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Kappa Psi, and the International Trumpet Guild.

In addition to his teaching duties, Mr. Veneskey maintains a professional performing schedule. He is currently associated with Special Productions in Cleveland, First Class Productions in Youngstown, as well as the Western Reserve Brass Quintet. His other performance credits include: The Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, The Ohio Chamber Brass, WD Packard Band, Toledo Opera Orchestra, Toledo Jazz Orchestra, The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus, Shrine Circus, Clark Terry, Phil Woods, Zoot Sims, Henry Mancini, and Maureen McGovern, among others. Mr. Veneskey resides in North Lima with his wife, Dana, and sons, Matthew and Michael.

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands, Instrumental Music Coordinator, and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned a doctorate at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, a masters degree at the Eastman School of Music, and a bachelors degree and Performer's Certificate in Percussion at the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and he was the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and assists with the Marching Pride; he also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has been published in the Kansas Music Review Journal, in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, TRLAD; and in the National Band Association (NBA) Journal and in the NBA Newsletter. He has been a member of the NBA School Reform Committee and currently serves as the Chair of the NBA North Central Division. His many professional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all state,

sectional, regional, and district concert bands and orchestras throughout the United States and Canada. Dr. Gage has also guest conducted the U.S. Army Jand: Pershing's Own and the U.S. Army Field Band.

Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra performed at the 1998 and 2000 Dhio Music Educators Convention. In 1996 the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble was a feature performer at the College Band Directors National Association Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The Symphonic Wind Ensemble released its first produced compact disc, Lions and Jesters and Dragons, Oh My! in the fall of 1998, the ensemble is currently in production for a second CD, which will be released late in the fall of 2000. Gage's bands have also verformed at all-state music education festivals in New York and Kansas. He serves on the Board of Advisors for the St. Patrick's Day Band Festival in Dublin, Ireland, and in May 1999 he was selected as Distinguished Professor at ISU.

Dr. Gage's biography was twice listed in the Who's Who Among America's Feachers. In addition to his teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has berformed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; additionally, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter.

His professional affiliations include a March 1999 induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association. Dr. Gage also is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, National Band Association, Ohio Music Educators Association/MENC, Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Au National Band Fraternity, and Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society. Dr. Gage aves in Poland, Ohio with his wife Stephanie, daughter, Claudia, and sons, Matthew and Brendan.

Program Notes

Chamade Suite: for snare drum quartet - Igor Lesnik

Chamade is an old French military expression for a drum (or trumpet) signal indicating a ceasefire. Retraite and Diane could be translated from French to English as "Taps" and "Morning Call." This suite is in fact a concert version of a series of drum signal

composed for the Croatian Army.

Igor Lesnik (b. 1956 in Zagreb, Croatia) studied percussion in Macedonia, Bulgaria, and Germany. He has performed many years with the Croatian Radio Orchestra and the Zagreb Philharmonic, and is now active as a soloist, with recording of contemporary works on various labels. He is professor of percussion at the Music Academy in Zagreb, and is founder and director of the Bach Percussion Seminar. He is also the founder and leader of the contemporary music and jazz ensembles Seupercussion and Jazzbina. He is currently involved in a project of research and recording 20th century French percussion concerti in cooperation with the Institute Francais de Zagreb.

Third Construction - John Cage

Third Construction (1941) is the pinnacle of Cage's innovative percussion ensemble writing. It is his final work in this medium, and perhaps his most complex and mature. Many Mexican, Central American, and Native Indian instruments are required, including quijadas, cricket callers, conch shell, and rattles. Other unusual instruments such as graduated tin cans and lion's roar contribute to the unique timbral quality. Both the rhythmic shape and the overall structure of the piece are related to Cage's "square-root theory," in which components of various relationships within a piece reflect the numeric proportions of the square root. In Third Construction there are twenty-four sections, each in turn divided into twenty-four measures. In addition, there is a twenty-four measure introduction. Cage extends this elaborate proportionate writing by his use of polyrhythmic relationships among the individual parts. Each section builds in complexity towards its end, where up to four rhythmic sub-divisions of 3, 5, 7, and 9 are played simultaneously.

Manuel de Falla (1876-1946) From the Italian Peninsula the Dana Symphony Orchestra will be playing the magnificent Fountains of Rome by Ottorino Respighi. The Fountains of Rome give us the Italian version of musical impressionism which is closely associated with the French composers Debussy and Ravel. These musical impressions which are performed as one continuously evolving musical composition evoke the beauty of Rome's extraordinary fountains and Respighi further enhances the composition by portraying each fountain at a different time of day.

The importance of French Impressionism is further extended to the final composition of the concert, which is demonstrated in the title itself, Nights in the Gardens of Spain by Manuel de Falla. His music is Spanish through and through, but influenced by his several years of study in Paris at the height of the Impressionistic Period. In this beautiful composition, which may be viewed on one hand as a concerto for piano and orchestra, it is also a musical evocation of three of the beautiful gardens to be found in Spain experienced during the evening hours.

Roman Rudnytsky, associate professor of piano, will be the featured soloist for Nights in the Gardens of Spain. Rudnytsky is an internationally active concert pianist of Ukrainian background whose frequent performances take him all over the world.

Rudnytsky has made record albums and CD's in the U.S., Australia, and Poland, including a two-record album in the last-named of the Liszt 12 Transcendental Etudes. He is prizewinner of several important piano competitions including second prize in both the International Leventritt Competition in New York (1965) and the International J. S. Bach Competition in Washington (1960), as well as the Laureate of both the "F. Busoni" and "A. Casagrande" International Piano Competitions in Italy (1967 and 1971, respectively).

Since 1984, he has given concerts and conducted master classes in 18 countries. He has been a faculty member at Dana since 1972 and previously served on the faculties at Indiana School of Music in Bloomington, IN and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory. He has received the Distinguished Professor Award in 1990 in recognition of his international concert activities. He is listed in a number of music references, including the International Who's Who of Music.

This concert is free and open to the public.

YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY'S DANA SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA TO PERFORM FINAL CONCERT FOR NEW MUSIC FESTIVAL'S CELEBRATION OF MUSIC OF THE MEDITERRANEAN

The Dana Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of William Slocum, professor of music, will offer a program of three major masterpieces of orchestral music written by composers from the Mediterranean region on Wednesday, May 31, at 8:00 p.m., at Powers Auditorium, Youngstown. This is the final concert for the Dana New Music Festival XVI.

The first piece on the program is one of the most famous and most frequently performed works in the standard symphonic literature, the Concierto de Aranjuez by Joaquin Rodrigo. Rodrigo lived for most of the 20th century having been born in 1902 and living until 1999. From the age of three, Rodrigo was blind and he stated on a number of occasions that his blindness was probably a deciding factor in his becoming a musician.

James Boyce, guitar, will be the featured soloist on the Concierto de Aranjuez. Boyce began his music education at Duquesne University where he studied classical guitar and earned a Bachelor of Music degree and Master of Music degree. During this time, he was the first guitarist to win a music scholarship in the Women's Advisory Board Competition.

Boyce has presented concerts as a soloist throughout the United States and has taught at various workshops and seminars. He has performed recitals as a guest artist with the Pittsburgh Classical Guitar Society, premiered a piece at the 1996 New Music Festival in Florida, and he worked with the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble.

Boyce was selected to study with Eliot Fisk and Pepe Romero in Cordoba, Spain at the annual Festival International de la Guitarra during the summer of 1997. He has studied with Aaron Shearer at North Carolina School of the Arts and has performed in master classes with Ricardo Cobo, Carlos Barbosa-Lima and Manuel Barreuco.

Recently Boyce completed his Doctor of Music Studies at Florida State University where he studied with Bruce Holzman. He has returned to Pittsburgh to join the faculty at Duquesne University and the Dana School of Music as an adjunct professor of classical guitar.

The Concierto de Aranjuez is his crowning masterpiece, the piece that made him an internationally famous composer. It is a delightful expression of the sunny Iberian Peninsula with the exception of the second, slow movement, which is elegiac and was an artistic expression of the grief that he experienced at the death of his son.

Tomas Luis de Victoria (1548-1611)

The art of vocal polyphony reached a height of perfection in the 16th century that was without equal in history. The music of Palestrina, Lassus, and Victoria, among others, is characterized by long beautiful lines intertwining in elaborate ways to form a seamless unity. They achieved a wonderful harmonic balance that was particularly appropriate to express religious faith. These masters excelled in setting the words of the Mass, and also wrote literally thousands of motets, shorter religious works for four, five, or six voices on Latin texts.

Victoria was a Spanish composer who spent many years in Rome, where he probably studied with Palestrina, the greatest church composer of the time. The present motet is from his first printed book of motets, published in 1572, when the composer was only 24 years old.

The Storm

Franz Joseph Haydn (1732-1809)

Haydn wrote this short "madrigal" as he called it, for chorus and orchestra during his stay in England in 1792. When he first arrived there from his native Austria a year earlier, he spoke no English at all; however, he soon learned enough not only to converse with his hosts but also to write music to English words. The poet he honored with his choice was one John Wolcot, who used the pen name Peter Pindar. The contrast of the raging storm and the wished-for calm weather gave Haydn an attractive compositional task. He evoked the high winds and the flashes of lightning by using harsh dissonances, sudden accents and syncopated rhythms. Then, for the calm sections, he switched from minor to major and slowed down the tempo for a wonderfully lyrical, soothing melody.

Epitaph For Moonlight R. Murray Schafer Canadian composer, R. Murray Schafer, wrote Epitaph for Moonlight, in 1968 as a study piece for youth choir. The listener might think of the calm following Haydn's storm as the choir takes you on a contemporary musical journey to express the beauty of the moonlight.

The text of the composition includes synonyms for the word "moonlight" that were invented by one of Mr. Schafer's grade 7 music classes. You will hear their "moonlight" synonyms throughout the performance.

Las Agachadas (The Shake-down Song)

Aaron Copland (1900-1990)

American composer, Aaron Copland wrote Las Agachadas in 1942 as a posthumous tribute to renowned ethnomusicologist Kurt Schindler. The simple strains of this song offer a humorous glimpse into the religious life of Spanish monks, comparing the pious act of genuflection to a folkdance. The accompanying chorus emulates the percussive strumming of a Flamenco guitar, capturing the atmosphere and rhythmic drive of a Spanish dance.
