Daniel Shapiro began the study of piano at the age of six. His teachers have inclu Leon Fleisher, John Perry, Joanna Graudan, and Reginald Stewart. He earned bachelor's degree, summa cum laude, from the University of Southern California master's and doctoral degrees in piano performance from the Peabody Conservatory

He has performed recitals across the United States, as well as in, Ireland, Spain, Fran and at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw. His concerto appearances include the Natio Symphony, the Sao Paulo State Symphony Orchestra, the Academy of London Orche and the Los Angeles Debut Orchestra.

Shapiro received the top prize in the William Kapell International Piano Competition addition to winning the American Pianists Association Beethoven Fellowship Award, Joanna Hodges International Piano Competition, the Young Musician's Foundation De Competition, and the International Piano Recording Competition.

As a chamber musician, he has won the Coleman Chamber Music Competition and participated at the Marlboro Music Festival, the Ravinia Festival, and Fellowship Progn at Tanglewood. He is a member of the Brandeis-Bardin Trio, whose compact disc released on the Harmonia Mundi label.

As a conductor, Shapiro has studied with Daniel Lewis, Victor Yampolsky, Fritz Zwe Gustav Meier and Sheldon Morgenstern. He made his conducting debut at Tanglewa at the age of sixteen, where, two summers later, he was given a special award foutstanding Achievement in Piano, Chamber Music, and Conducting.

Program Notes

a la luz de la luna llena is composed in a contemporary Spanish idiom. A slow introduction, marked "Darkly" proceeds freely unmetered in an improvisatory style. Hummed unisons occur as structural markers at the opening and closing of this section, while snap pizzicatos add a dramatic effect. Following is a Fantasia-like form in which the meter shifts in every bar, while keeping the eighth-note pulse constant. High and low registers of the guitar are explored as the music captures the magic experienced by the composer on nightly walks along the Delaware River.

Three for Guitar is a coloristic piece "delivered largely from ideas that were born at the guitar" as the composer notes. Meditative in character, the first movement opens with six-note theme that reoccurs in various transformations. Conceived in four sections, the second section features a steady stream of sixteen notes with ever changing metric and melodic figurations, utilizing a set of pitches: B, C#, D and E. The dynamic rise and fall wave-like in effect. A delicate triplet section marked pianissimo follows with syncopation of a six-pitch set. The opening motive appears again, this time as a transition into a more aggressive passage, then closes the movement gently. The second movement is in a declamatory style. In three-part form, the beginning "recitative" and parallel closing section features wide intervals, quick melodic flourishes and unmetered passages. The aria" by contrast begins as an arpeggiation of tonal harmonies and gives way to a longbreathed melody which is sequenced and leads back to the declamatory mood. It close softly, with an illusion to the arpeggio idea. Most highly dissonant is movement three in which compound melody abounds and favored intervals are major sevenths, and diminished and augmented octaves. The piece opens with an interaction of rhythmic groupings of triplets and quintuplets; and these two features seem to be the structural basis of the whole. Out of a rather abstract dialog, a triplet passage soon establishes itself, lending momentum. Syncopations are heard in the next section marked "funk" as sixteent notes come into the mix. Toward the end, the emotional spectrum shifts subtly to include the lyrical, grandiose and melancholy.

Another New Beginning II Was inspired by a poem of thee same name by Don Jorda (K'os Naahaabii). It takes shape in an ABCB type form. While the opening captures the images of the first stanza, musical gestures occur freely, with a clarity of timbre that set each one apart as a special, independent thought. The second section portrays the moot of the third stanza as the poet is elevated beyond the confines of earthly turmoil and is able to soar with the nighthawk. Flowing in triple meter, a beautiful melody emerges from the texture, passes through a pizzicato passage, then reasserts itself even more emotionally than before. Following is an improvisatory section, mirroring the sentiments of the second stanza. It is here that the composer makes a connection to the events of the Holocaust a documented in the film Schindler's List. As such, the "depressing thoughts" imply¹

remembrance of gun shots and people scurrying, heard on the guitar as golpes and pizzicato ad libitum interspersed. As this subsides, material from the opening reoccurs as a transition into an abridged repeat of the lyrical B section. The piece closes in the spirit of winged transcendence.

Another New Beginning

Elegy begins with a slow chordal introduction and proceeds into a triple meter Andante. The melody unfolds darkly in the bass, then becomes a somber in the middle register. The texture is at times monophonic, imparting a sacred quality similar to Gregorian chant; and is also contrapuntal in its two-part dialog. Throughout, accompaniment chords serve as quiet answers to the phrases. Toward the end, melodic interest shifts into the high register for a brief climax, then dies away in contemplation. In moderate triple meter, **Totentanz** feature staccato articulations that give it a perky and playful character. Opening with a mythmic motive of 4 eighth notes, this motive is subsequently marked with an embellished grace note and spun out in a Baroque fashion. This "single affection" pervades the entire fabric. Use of a motor rhythm sustains a great sense of momentum, until the ending where it winds down majestically.

Baltimore Sonata is composed in an attractive jazz style. The first movement opens with a descending arpeggio motive which is sequenced in the melody and later occurs as an accompaniment figure in the bass. A second theme, stepwise in character, distinguishes

a second main section. In an ABABCA type form, a repeat of the two sections is followed by a new section which develops the rhythmic aspect of the main theme. Theme two, is heard three times here, each time in a different octave. The opening material returns and an extended coda closes in high spirits. Movement two opens with a suave melody that floats above rich jazz sonorities. Interspersed into this framework, are the archetypal riffs that characterize jazz in its sly, smooth style. Metrically, the beat is relaxed into a languorous blues that wants to move in its own time. A return to the opening passage signals the closing which gives a comical wink and nod with the ending four harmonics. The third movement rondo makes use of another striking theme which reappears in an ABA'CA arrangement. In compound quadruple meter, the pulse never slackens, but a metric modulation occurs in the C section as the music moves into common time and back out again. After an extended return of A, serving in part as a coda, the work is brought to a lively close with two high chords.

PROGRAM NOTES

Estancia was commissioned in 1941 for the American Ballet Caravan, but the troupe subsequently disbanded and the work was not performed as a full ballet until 1952. In the meantime, Ginastera extracted the four-movement suite which was premiered by the Teatro Colon Orchestra in 1943. The work soon became well-known as an orchestra piece and also as a band transcription, played from manuscript by the U.S. Navy Band.

Estancia is the Argentine word for ranch and the work reflects many aspects of Argentine ranch life. As the story unfolds, a city boy finds difficulty in winning a ranch girl who considers him a weakling and unable to compete with the athletic gauchos on the ranch. The city boy is finally successful in the courtship through a series of events in which he demonstrates that he can emerge victorious in the gaucho environment. The ballet suite *Estancia* contains music from four scenes: The Land Workers, Wheat Dance, The Cattlemen, and Final, "Malambo." The malambo is a lively, exciting, and often lengthy dance tournament between two gauchos.

Supplying his own program notes for the Four Scottish Dances, Arnold wrote:

These dances were composed early in 1957, and are dedicated to The BBC Light Music Festival. They are all based on original melodies but one, the melody of which was composed by Robert Burns.

The first dance is in the style of a slow strathspey--a slow Scottish dance in 4/4 meter-with many dotted notes, frequently in the inverted (reversed) arrangement of the "Scottish snap." The name was derived from the strath valley of Spey.

The second, a lively reel, begins in the key of E-flat and rises a semi-tone one each time it is played until the bassoon plays it, at a greatly reduced speed, in the key of G. The final statement of the dance is at the original speed in the home key of E-flat.

The third dance is in the style of a Hebridean Song, and attempts to give an impression of the sea and mountain scenery on a calm summer's day in the Hebrides.

The last dance is a lively fling, which makes a great deal of use of the open-string pitches of the violin.

The artistic wind ensemble transcription, made by John Paynter, has a transparency faithful to the original work.

The Armenian Dances, Parts I and II, constitute a four-movement suite for band based on authentic Armenian folk songs from the collected works of Gomidas Vartabed (1869-1935), the founder of Armenian classical music. Part I (first movement) is an extended symphonic rhapsody built upon five different songs, freely treated and developed in terms of the modern, integrated band or wind ensemble. Part II (second, third, and fourth movements) is built on three other Armenian folk songs. Although the composer has kept his treatment of the melodies within the general limits imposed by its vocal, folk-song nature, he has not hesitated to expand the melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic possibilities in keeping with the demands of a symphonic-instrumental performance. Reed hopes that the overall effect of the music will remain true to the spirit of Gomidas Vartabed and that this rhapsody will help to promote interest in the work of the brilliant Armenian composer-musicologist. Armenian Dances was dedicated to Harry Begian and premiered by the University of Illinois Symphonic Band at the CBDNA National Convention in 1972.

When Reinhold Gliere was born in Kiev in 1875, his father must have hoped that he would eventually join the family business, which a had been building brass instruments throughout Europe for a century. Instead, Gliere showed considerable talent as a violinist, and in 1894 entered the Moscow Conservatoire to study composition. Later, he was was a composition teacher for the eleven year old Prokofiev. After writing numerous works, the *Horn Concerto* was written for Valeri Polekh, solo horn player at the Bolshoi Theatre for forty years, and was first performed in Moscow in January 26, 1952.

The choice of the horn for a concerto was almost unprecedented among Russian musicians, and although Gliere had written four pieces for horn and piano as early as 1908, the concerto could only be modeled on isolated examples by composers like Goedicke and Shebalin. While the first movement is in conventional sonata form, the cadenza is in the same unusual position--just before the recapitulation--as in Mendelssohn's violin concerto. The *Andante*, an essentially ternary design, opens with a wistful passage for oboe which returns at the end of movement with an extremely delicate solo line taking the horn to its highest notes. The finale shows clear evidence of the research which Gliere had undertaken into Russian folk music in the 1920s and 30s, and its hectic climax is a fitting conclusion both to one of the last Romantic concertos and to Gliere's career.

First performed on December 28, 1944, the youthfully lively *On the Town* was extremely successful, receiving 463 performances. Bernstein scored a real hit with his hymn to the city "New York, New York." But, unlike the libretto, his music did not hark back to *Fancy Free*-there is not a single note from the earlier work in *On the Town*. In 1945 Bernstein created three dance episodes out the ballet sequences of the musical. In the first ("The Great Lover"), which occasionally recalls Stravinsky and Gershwin, Gabey, who has dozed off in the subway, dreams of winning "Miss Turnstiles" with his irresistible charm. The lyrical "Lonely Town" (Pas de deux) is based on the song with the same title and accompanies a scene in which Gabey sees in Central Park a hardboiled seaman fooling and around with an innocent young girl and then sending her packing. "Times Square," in which jazz type and symphonic passages alternate, reverts to the music of the Finale to the First Act of *On the Town*: the sailors and their girl friends meet in Times Square to enjoy themselves in the souvenir shops, dance halls and other establishments.

Karl King, a native of Canton, Ohio, wrote this march for the Barnum and Bailey Circus Band in 1913 at the request of its director, Ned Bill. King was 22 at the time and was preparing to join the band as a euphonium player. The euphonium part in this march (and in most of King's other marches) shows his love for the instrument-he liked to hear the euphonium "romping around." His use of the word "favorite" in the title was a good choice. It is still one of the most popular marches played--in or out of the circus.

ABOUT THE GUEST SOLOIST

WILLIAM B. SLOCUM received the Bachelor of Fine Arts and the Master of Music degrees from the University of New Mexico and earned an Artist's Diploma a Mr. Slocum has had extensive experience as a performer of chamber music for the horn. For four years he played simultaneously in the Kent Woodwind and Brass Quintets and the Cleveland Woodwind and Brass Quintets

Previously, Mr. Slocum was conductor of the Cheyenne, Wyoming Symphony Orchestra. He played principal horn of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra under Jose Krips, toured Japan under Leonard Bernstein, toured Europe and South America under Zubin Mehta with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, and toured Europe under George Szell while he was a member of the Cleveland Orchestra.

As a member of the faculty of the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University, he serves as the Music Director of the Dana Symphony Orchestra, Professor of French horn, and a member of the Dana Faculty Brass Quintet. Mr. Slocum has been active as a composer and his compositions have been performed at the Cleveland Institute of Music, The Cleveland Museum of Art and the Cleveland Music Settlement.

During the 1993-94 season, Mr. Slocum was conductor of the Wyoming All State Orchestra and the Kentucky All State Orchestra. Most recently, he and Professor Roman Rudnytsky collaborated their efforts as conductor and soloist for the Aquascalientes Symphony Orchestra in Mexico performing, "Nights in the Gardens of Spain." In addition to his accomplishments in the field of music, Mr. Slocum is extremely interested in art. He has been privileged to have his artwork exhibited in the Cleveland Art Museum's Annual May Show.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands and Assistant Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned the Doctor of Education in Music at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion from the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to this study he was, for three years, the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS), and was, for nine years, the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he directs the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, and co-directs the Marching Pride and the Concert Band. He also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting and music education courses.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has written a number of musical arrangements and compositions for concert band, jazz ensemble, and marching band and percussion, and has been published in the <u>Kansas Music Review Journal</u>. His many professional credits include serving as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor for All-State Sectional, Regional, and District concert bands throughout the Northeast and Midwea Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble performed at the 1996 College Band Directors National Association North Central Convention in Grean Bay, Wisconsin. His bands have also performed at All-State festivals in New York and Kansas.

In addition to the teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; additionally, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter.

Jacek Sobieski, piano, holds a Master of Music from the State College of Music in Warsaw, Poland. He was born in Poznan, Poland, and is the fourth generation of a family of musicians and musicologists. He was the music director of the National Theater in Warsaw for almost two decades, with which he performed throughout Europe. He has composed music to ten productions staged by Polish theaters, including the National Theater. Jacek Sobieski has received the Award for Music for the score to <u>Dwor nad Narwia</u> at the Festival of Polish Drama Theaters in Torun, Poland. In 1977, he was awarded the honorary distinction, Man of Merit in Culture, by the Ministry of Culture and Art, Poland. Since 1988, he has resided in the United States, where he has performed as a soloist, accompanist, and in family concerts. He is a teacher of piano, accompanist, and voice coach at The Cleveland Music School Settlement, as well as voice coach and pianist for the opera workshop at the Dana School of Music, Youngstown State University. Since 1995, he has been the general and artistic director of Opera Circle.

Dorota Sobieska, soprano, is a doctoral candidate at Kent State University, writing her dissertation on British Romantic poetry, music, and aesthetics. She also holds the Artist Diploma in voice from the Fryderyk Chopin School of Music in Warsaw, Poland, as well as two master's degrees, from The University of Warsaw and from Kent State. As a solo recitalist, she performed in Poland, the United States, and Germany. Presently, she serves as the executive director of Opera Circle..

Wanda Sobieska, violin, was born in Warsaw, Poland, in 1979. She received her first violin lessons from her mother at the age of four, and after two years was admitted to the Primary School of Music in Warsaw. She came to the United States with her parents in 1988, and has continued her musical education in violin and composition at The Cleveland Music School Settlement, where she has been annually awarded scholarships in both areas of study. Most recently she won the competition for The Gingold-Majeske Scholarship in Cleveland, funding her violin lessons with Stephen Majeske. Her composition, Prelude in D Major for String Orchestra, was performed by the Davey Middle School orchestra in Kent in the spring of 1994. As sophomore at Roosevelt High School in Kent, she has joined The Kent State University Orchestra in the first violin section.

Clarinetist Robert D. Fitzer is well-known in the Youngstown area for his musical performances with Easy Street Productions, the Youngstown Playhouse, the Warren Chamber Orchestra, and the Greenville Symphony Orchestra. After graduating from Poland High School, he attended Northwestern University where he studied with Robert Marcellus, earning a degree in clarinet performance. He was also a long-time clarinet pupil of Carl Marks, Jr. Fitzer started his musical career in an auspicious way-performing for two years with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, where he played on four Grammy Award-winning recordings under Sir Georg Solti. He has also been a member of other major orchestras, including Mexico City, Rome, San Antonio, The American Waterways, and Graz, Austria, and has played several times in Carnegie Hall .

Fitzer has performed on numerous movie soundtracks in Hollywood (most recently, Charles Bronson's *Death Wish V*), and toured internationally with the Broadway show "42nd Street." He joined the YSU clarinet faculty this year, and has previously taught at Trinity University and Allegheny College. He is known for his musical productions for young audiences, and has a full studio of private clarinet and saxophone students.

Fitzer is also producer and co-host of the political affairs radio program "Commentary Cafe with Bill Binning and Bob Fitzer" (Thursdays at 7:00 p.m. on WYSU-FM 88.5), a member of the Mahoning County Democratic Party Executive Committee, Vice-President of the Citizens' League and serves on several other community boards. He is active in downtown Youngstown development and preservation (where he has served as a civic advisor to Mayor Patrick J. Ungaro), and has gained notoriety as a consultant and writer for Speed of Sound Magazine and as producer of the recent "Hollywood in the Valley" Film Festival. He is the son of the late J. Robert and Dolores Fitzer, who were both noted musicians and long-time members of the Dana faculty at YSU.

His formal education includes the Bachelor of Music degree in percussion performance from the Baldwin-Wallace College Conservatory of Music, the Master of Arts degree in percussion performance from Eastern Illinois University, and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in percussion performance and literature from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana.

This summer Glenn will teach at the newly founded YSU Summer Jazz Camp and the United States Percussion Camp at Eastern Illinois University.

PROGRAM NOTES

The American Overture for Band was written for the U.S. Army Field Band in 1956 and dedicated to its conductor at the time, Chester E. Whiting. The piece was written in a neo-modal style being flavored strongly with both Lydian and Mixolydian modes. Its musical architecture is a very free adaptation of sonata form. The musical material borders on the folk tune idiom although there are no direct quotes from any folk tunes. The work calls for near-virtuoso playing by several sections, especially the French horns, and is a favorite of advanced high school and university bands. Although American Overture was Jenkins' first band piece, it remains his most successful work, and in his words, he is "hard-pressed to duplicate its success."

The Candide Suite for concert band is made up of four numbers from the musical Candide, which premiered on Broadway in 1956. The satiric novella Candide by Voltaire was the basis for a political and musical satire with a libretto by Lillian Hellman and music by Leonard Bernstein. Candide as a musical has since had many reincarnations, but the sections of this Suite utilize musical numbers that have remained virtually unchanged from the original Broadway production.

1. The Best of All Possible Worlds: Doctor Pangloss, Voltaire's satirical portrait of the philosopher Gottfried von Leibnitz, tutors his Westphalian pupils (Candide and Cunegonede among them) in the finer points of optimism, refined by a classical education. The music alternately enjoins the pupil's responses with Pangloss's pedantic free-associative explanations that the ills of this world are somehow all for the best. The refrain is, of course, that this *is* the best of all possible worlds.

2. Westphalia Chorale and Battle Scene: The devout Westphalians sing a chorale praising the integrity of their homeland, after which they are massacred by the invading Bulgarian army. The Battle Scene adroitly juxtaposes major and minor modes of material familiar from the Overture.

3. *Auto-da-fe:* Candide and Doctor Pangloss find themselves in Lisbon, where, being free thinkers (and optimists), they are prosecuted as heretics by the Spanish Inquisition. The handing of heretics was meant to prevent earthquakes, and the joyous music depicts the happy crowd celebrating their deliverance. However, the earthquake happens anyway, and Candide and Doctor Pangloss escape.

4. Glitter and Be Gay: Cunegonde, Candide's true love, has become the reigning madam in Paris, France. In a parody of "Jewel Songs," (such as that in Gounod's *Faust*), she sings of how she endeavors to maintain a brilliant, carefree exterior, while she may (or may not) be tortured inwardly by self-doubt.

Irish Tune from a Country Derry is based on a tune collected by a Miss J. Ross of New Town, Limavaday, County Derry, Ireland, and published in *The Petrie Collection of Ancient Music of Ireland* in 1885. Grainger's setting was written in 1909 and was dedicated to the memory of Edward Grieg. The "perfect" melody and the rich sonorities of the arrangement have kept the *Irish Tune* in a favored position for decades.

Heroes, Lost and Fallen is a tone poem for symphonic band based on the following poem by the composer:

Banish our thoughts From this grueling war. Let Suffering and Death Rule no more.

Resolve this conflict In hearts so sullen And bring eternal peace To the heroes, lost and fallen

The work opens with an air of mysteriousness on a sustained sonority by bowed vibraphone with marimba tremolo. There are interspersed motives suggesting trumpet calls and quotes from the Star Spangled Banner and the Vietnamese National Anthem. This beginning section reflects the uncertainty and instability before war. Following is a warm and consonant chorale in the low brass alluding to the world ideal of peace and serenity. This section segues into a sort of slow "march to war." Just as the realization of the inevitability of war increases, so does this section increase in dynamic and dissonant intensity. Climaxing the section are quotes from the Star Spangled Banner and Taps. The ensuing section expresses the war itself with driving rhythms, dense textures, chaotic accompanimental motives and sinister themes. Growing in intensity, the section culminates with haunting "trumpet calls" alternated between trumpets and homs followed by four hammered articulations of a tone cluster. A thunderous roll of drums then elides into the next section where the consonant chorale for "peace" reasserts itself, this time amidst the continuing conflict of war, suggesting that somehow "Good" emerges and a serene, yet powerful theme is stated, beginning in the horns. The theme grows to a glorious climax, diminishes and settles into C Major, the "key of the earth." A unison "C." with underlying tumultuous articulations by the drums, culminates the work. . . the drums reminding us that the threat of war will always be present.

Three years after Sousa was "knighted" in the Knights Templar of Washington, D.C., he dedicated this march to that organization. *The Thunderer* was Mrs. Sousa's favorite march and was chosen by Sousa as one of five to be featured by his Great Lakes Naval Training Station Band on their tour in behalf of the American Red Cross during World War I. The principal theme of the march trio is a bugle call taken from Sousa's *Trumpet and Drum* book which he had written in 1886. To this theme were added more and more counter melodies building to an exciting finale.

A Comfield in July and The River is the fifth and last song from William Penn's Garland Songs, a collection of songs for medium voice and piano based on the poetry and writings of Hamlin Garland. The version for medium voice and 25 performers was written for, and premiered and recorded by Gary Green and the University of Connecticut Wind Ensemble, with Robert Maher of the New York Metropolitan Opera as vocal soloist. Penn also wrote "Prairie Hearts," a 50-minute, 3-character folk opera, with lyrics and libretto by Craig Impink, based on the writings of Hamlin Garland.

A Comfield in July

A comfield in July is a sticky place. The soil is hot and dry; the wind comes across the lazily murmuring leaves laden with a warm sickening smell drawn from the rapidly growing, broad-flung banners of the corn. The sun, nearly vertical, drops a flood of dazzling light and heat upon the field over which the cool shadows run, only to make the heat seem more intense. [The sun's nearly vertical.]

During the hot days of summer the river came to be of greater value to those of us toiling in the hot corn rows, and trips for bathing and fishing were looked forward to with keenest longing, and remembered with deepest delight. Many of our sweetest recollections of nature were associated with these swimming excursions. To go from the dusty field of the prairie farms to the wood shadows and to the cool murmuring of water, to strip stark to the caressing winds, and to plunge in the deeps of the dappled pools, was like being born again.

The River

It comes from the meadow Where cool and deep, In the elm's dark shadow, In murmur of dream and of sleep, It drowsily eddied and swirled And curled Round the out-thrust knees Of the basswood trees.

It was there that the water-snake rippled across, Through the shimmering supple the leaves cast down, while the swamp-bird perched on the spongy moss In the shadow-side looked gravely on. 'Twas there the kingfishers swiftly flew, In the cool, sweet silence from tree to tree---All silence, save when the vagabond jay Flashed swiftly by with a sharp "Te-chee," Swaggering by in his elfish way--

And I, a bare-legged girl [boy] again, Can hear the low, sweet laugh of the river--See on the water the dapples a quiver, Feel on my knees the lippin lap Of the sunny ripples, and see the snake Slip silently into the sedgy brake, And hear the rising pickerel slap In a rushing leap Where the lilies sleep.

It drowsily eddied and swirled And curled Round the out-thrust knees of the basswood trees.

It comes from the meadow Where cool and deep, In the elm's dark shadow, In murmur of dream and of sleep

The "Pathfinder" of Sousa's title was not an individual but the Panama Canal itself. The march was composed in 1915 and was dedicated to the Panama Canal and the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco, where the Sousa Band played a nine week engagement. The Panama Canal shortened the voyage between San Francisco and New York by 8,000 miles and revolutionized both commercial shipping and travel for pleasure.

The Op. 24 by Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy (1809-47) was composed in July of 1824 for the court orchestra of Bad Doberan near Rostock, where the young musician was accompanying his father. Writing for the Boston Symphony, George Marke remarks, "Some artists develop their craft slowly, others seem to begin at the top. There is little difference between Mendelssohn's early and his mature works." The original score was lost but was recopied by Mendelssohn in July of 1826. These two scores were entitled *Noctumo* and were written for the instrumentation of one flute, two clarinets, two oboes, two bassoons, two horns, one trumpet and one English bass horn (a conical bore upright serpent in the shape of a bassoon.

In his correspondence to the publisher Simrock, Mendelssohn mentions his desire to have this eleven instrument version published, but apparently could not locate the score as he never mentions it again to Simrock after March 4, 1839. Mendelssohn did send Simrock an *Overture fur Harmoniemusik* (Overture for Wind Band) scored for 23 winds and percussion along with a four-hand piano score on November 30, 1838. The 1838 composition is a rescoring of the *Noctumo* for German Band of that era and was not published until 1852 following the death of Mendelssohn.

It has been suggested by musicologists that the 1838 rescoring was an effort to imitate the orchestral color of Weber's *Preciosa* Overture. In Weber's overture, a gypsy melody is introduced by a small wind band with percussion accompaniment. At this time, however, Mendelssohn was also negotiating for the publication of the overture by Mori in London. It is quite possible that the rescoring was an attempt to acquire greater performance opportunities for his work by making it available in settings for British and German band along with a proposed edition for orchestra. Max Bruch, born Cologne, 6 January 1838; died Friednau, nr. Berlin 20 October 1920. He studied theory with H.C. Breidenstein in Bonn and, when he was only eleven, composed chamber music and an orchestral overture. In 1852 he wrote a symphony and that year won the Frankfurt Mozart Foundation Prize with a string quartet; he then went on with further study in composition and theory with Ferdinand Hiller and the piano with Reincke and Brenning in Cologne. He held many posts as a music director, and held the title of professor, a master class in composition at the Berlin Academy. The University of Cambridge granted him an honorary doctorate in 1893. *Kol Nidrei* (Oh! Day of God) Adagio for Violoncello and orchestra, on Hebrew melodies, op. 47 has always been a favorite of cellists and was composed in 1880-81. The work was transcribed by Makio Kimura for the Tokyo Kosei Windorchestra, Frederick Fennell, conductor in 1991.

Stravinsky had come to know Mussorgsky's works through his teacher Rimsky-Korsakov, and at first--as he later admitted in his conversations with Robert Craft--he unthinkingly repeated "what was usually said about Mussorgsky's 'big talent' and his 'poor musicianship,' and about the 'important services' rendered by Rimsky to his 'embarrassing' and 'unpresentable' scores." However, even before he revised this judgment, Stravinsky seems to have been instinctively drawn towards Mussorgsky's radical boldness rather than towards Rimsky's prim academicism.

The *Firebird* was Stravinsky's first independent score for Diaghilev following his collaboration with him on Chopin's ballet *Les Sylphides* (1909). Diaghilev's troupe gave the first performance of the *Firebird* on June 25, 1910 during their fifth "Saison russe" at the Paris Opera (Choreography: Michel Fokine; set design: Alexander Golovine; costumes: Leon Bakst; conductor: Gabriel Pierne). Without doubt, the work clearly betrays in the refined brilliance of its orchestration the influence of Rimsky-Korsakov, "Which I tried to outdo with sul ponticello, col legno, flautando, glissando and flutter tonguing effects;" but the true sources of the *Firebird* are revealed by the time we get to the wild *Danse infernale* of Kastchei the magician: Mussorgsky's boisterous original scores, which go against all rules of harmony and counterpoint, and "which always show infinitely more true musical value and genuine intuition than the 'perfection' of Rimsky's arrangements."

Not surprisingly, following the *Firebird* the predictable final break came between Rimsky and his all too "modern" pupil Stravinsky. After the first *Suite* of 19 movements (1911), Stravinsky put together a second *Suite* of five ballet movements in 1919, for Ansermet and his newly founded Orchestre de la Suisse Romande, slightly reducing the original number of players required. The arrangement to be performed this evening was done by Guy Duker in 1980 for the University of Illinois Symphonic Band.

The story concerns the Firebird, a beautiful ballerina with orange wings, and Ivan, a young prince who hunts for the Firebird, finally capturing her. She gives him a golden feather as ransom and disappears. Later Ivan is captured by the demon, Kastchei, but he waves the golden feather and the beautiful Firebird comes to his rescue. He is

taken to a metal box containing an egg which is the soul of Kastchei the Terrible. He smashes the egg, and the princess and nobles are forever freed of the spell of Kastchei and his followers.

Several generations of band members have developed their ability to play a sustained line, to listen for the moving part, and to improve their pitch accuracy while playing Erickson's *Air for Band*. The composition begins softly and in a minor key, and by gradually adding voices and increasing the dynamics and range, the climatic section is reached approximately halfway through the work. Erickson then uses the opening melody to create interesting rhythms and dialogues between sections on the way to a modulation to C major. Frank Erickson published nearly 200 compositions and was an icon in the concert band world. This performance is dedicated to Mr. Erickson, a fine composer, caring music educator, and great man whose presence will be sorely missed by all student musicians and band directors.

ABOUT THE SOLOISTS

DR. ALLAN MOSHER, baritone, joined the faculty of the Dana School of Music, Youngstown State University, in 1992. He is an active performer, having sung with numerous organizations, including the Buffalo and Rochester Philharmonic Orchestras, at Elmira Symphony, and the Manhattan Philharmonic in Lincoln Center's Avery Fisher Hall. He also appeared in Carnegie Hall under the baton of the noted British composer/conductor, John Rutter in J.S. Bach's *Magnificat*. For his efforts in the latter concert he was termed an "exemplary soloist" by the New York Daily News. Recently Dr. Mosher sang the role of the elder Germont in Verdi's *La Traviata* with the newly formed Greenville Lyric Opera. He also appeared in two recent concerts with the Ashtabula Symphony.

Dr. Mosher, who teaches voice and directs the opera program at Youngstown State University, holds four earned degrees: the first from San Francisco State University in theater Arts, the second a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music from the University of California at Berkeley, a Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music in voice, and a doctorate in Voice Performance from the University of Cincinnati's prestigious College-Conservatory of Music.

DONALD SINTA is widely recognized as one of the world's most gifted wind soloists, and has influenced the world of classical saxophone perhaps more than any other performer of his generation. His career spans from being a class room music instructor, to professor of saxophone at the University of Michigan School of Music in Ann Arbor.

After completing a three month tour of Russia with the University of Michigan Band as featured soloist in 1961, Sinta became a classroom music instructor in the East Detroit public schools. One year later, he became the first instructor of saxophone at the Ithaca College School of Music, and only four years later moved on to the Hartt School of Music in Connecticut, a position he held for five years. In 1974, he assumed the professorship of his long time teacher and friend, (widely known as the father of the

"American school of classical saxophone playing"), Larry Teal. Teal was the first professor of saxophone at any conservatory or school of music in the United States.

During this time Sinta has gained international respect from his peers both as a performer and a pedagogue in the wind instrument family. On the occasion of the first World Saxophone Congress in Chicago, Sinta was elected to be their first president. Having performed in nearly all of the fifty United States, he has commissioned over 30 works by the world's leading composers, including two Pulitzer Prize winners. His influence in the cultural environment of the 20th century is both permanent and lasting. His former students continue to make their mark in the new generation of musical leaders as performers, teachers, deans, administrators and composers alike. (Evidenced by the fact that nearly three quarters of the saxophonists listed in Musical America are past students, five former students hold deanships at university and college schools of music, and countless others have gone on to influence day-to-day musical life in band rooms throughout the United States.

The wide range of composers he has collaborated with on in commissioning projects includes such illustrious names as William Albright, Leslie Bassett, Warren Benson, William Bolcom, David Diamond, Ross Lee Finney, Karel Husa, John Anthony Lennon, Alec Wilder, and many others.

Critics around the country have been moved by Sinta's artistry and musicianship. Chicago critic John von Rhein said "that Sinta is no ordinary musician, but a virtuoso whose technique and musicianship are so highly developed that he can coax virtually any sound out of is saxophone and make it sound artful and beautiful. His tone is full and variegated as one could want, with no shrillness on top or loss of presence down below. His control, whether in long cantabile passages or rapid staccato figuration, is almost impeccable. There is moreover, a seamless quality to this legato, which a Sills or Sutherland might envy."

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

JONATHAN E. WILLIS is acting Associate Director of Bands at Youngstown State University (YSU). He is a 1984 graduate of Austintown-Fitch High School and he earned the Bachelor of Music in Performance from Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music in 1989. As a trombonist, Mr. Willis has studied with Michael Crist, Vern Kagarice, Glen Dodson, Ralph Sauer, and Greg Cox. While an undergraduate student at Dana, Mr. Willis attended the Chautauqua Institute of Music (1984), the Eastern Music Festival in Greensboro, North Carolina (1985-87), and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Institute Festival (1989); all on full scholarship.

Mr. Willis' professional performance experience includes 10 years with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, and five years with the Heritage Trombone Quartet, founded at the Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia, PA. He also performs regularly with the Warren Chamber Orchestra, the WD Packard Band, and many of the area's fine big bands. As an arranger/composer Mr. Willis has been the chief arranger of YSU's Marching Pride for four years, and his pieces have been performed by the Dana Trombone Ensemble and several of the region's high school marching bands. As an educator/conductor, Mr. Willis has worked with many of the area high schools, including the Canfield High School Trombone Choir, the Jackson-Milton High School Concert Band and Marching Band, and the Warren G. Harding High School Concert and Symphonic Bands. From 1993-95 Mr. Willis served as the Assistant Director of the Warren Jr. Military Band. He will complete the Master of Music in Performance Degree at YSU in March and is currently completing the requirements for teaching certification.

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands and Assistant Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned the Doctor of Education in Music at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion from the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to this study he was, for three years, the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS), and was, for nine years, the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he directs the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, and co-directs the Marching Pride and the Concert Band. He also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting and music education courses.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has written a number of musical arrangements and compositions for concert band, jazz ensemble, and marching band and percussion, and has been published in the <u>Kansas Music Review Journal</u> and the Ohio Music Educators Journal, <u>TRIAD</u>. His many professional credits include serving as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor for All-State Sectional, Regional, and District concert bands throughout the Northeast and Midwest. Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble performed at the 1996 College Band Directors National Association North Central Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. His bands have also performed at All-State festivals in New York and Kansas.

In addition to the teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; additionally, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter. His biography was listed in the fourth edition of *Who's Who in Teachers of America's Colleges and Universities*

DOUGLAS WALTER

Through his musicality and versatility Douglas Walter has established an outstanding international reputation as a marimba and vibraphone artist. As the only percussionist to win the Concert Artists Guild Award he has toured throughout the USA and Canada performing over 250 solo recitals and concertos. His solo performances at conventions of the Percussive Arts Society, International Association of Jazz Educators, and the Music Educators National Conference have garnered critical acclaim and enthusiastic applause. Mr. Walter's commissions of more than 50 new works have been supported by grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Canada Council for the Arts, the Concert Artist Guild, and several state arts agencies. He is creating a unique repertoire of great musical expressivity that includes new works, transcriptions, and jazz improvisations.

Mr. Walter's jazz works include the North Texas 1:00 o'clock Lab Band record "LAB 75" - the first university recording nominated for a Grammy. In addition he has done a weekly live radio show with the Lenny Wilson Quartet, and performed at clubs throughout the United States. His subtly expressive "chamber music" approach to jazz has resulted from his work in the Modest Jazz Trio and the Keystick Duo, while his studies with David Samuels, David Baker, and Curt Harmon have given him a broader feeling for the traditions of jazz.

An accomplished orchestral musician, Mr. Walter has performed with the Dallas, Fort Worth, Oregon, Santa Fe Opera, and Philadelphia Orchestras, among many others. His interest in ragtime music led to his perfoming as the solo xylophonist in the New American Ragtime Ensemble. He has taught percussion at the Oberlin Conservatory, the University of Montana, University of Oregon, Lewis and Clark College, Interlochen, Indiana State University, and is currently on the faculty of the University of Colorado. He has given clinics throughout the USA, Canada, and England. Mr. Walter's concert appearance is under the auspices of the Concert Artist Guild, New York City.

Mr. Walter is a Yamaha performing artist and clinician.







PROGRAM NOTES

Wiener Philharmonic Fanfare was written by Richard Strauss in 1924 for a special ball and concert given by the Vienna Philharmonic; the piece is dedicated to this wonderful orchestra. A master of orchestration, Strauss expressed in his tone poems the whole gamut of human emotions. His art songs also achieved fame and success. A highly successful conductor as well as composer, Strauss was also skillful in his business matters. He became one of Europe's composersmost affluent composers before he pased away at the age of 85.

Ranking high among Sousa's early achievements is the march, *The Rifle Regiment*, which derives its title from The Third Infantry, known also as "The Old Guard." Sousa dated the piano score, all that has survived, 31 December 1886. This has to be viewed as a curious time in his career. Although he was fully aware of the monetary value of his march properties, Sousa practically gave them away. He earned exactly \$35.00 per title -- a small fraction of the money subsequently earned by Harry Coleman, the enterprising publisher.

The Rifle Regiment provided appropriate music for the parade ground, long the principal purpose for the existence of the military band and those units of fifers, drummers, pipers, and buglers attached to it in military establishments throughout the world. Regimental review calls for a no-nonsense, solid one-two cadence undergirding simple tunes that are usually orchestrated in equally no-nonsense, blockbuster fashion. The object of the regimental march is to move lots of organized pairs of feet forward and at a pace and with a spirit that elevates the occasion to those moments of pride and purpose without which probably no unit can function as intended. (Frederick Fennell).

During the season of 1869-70, the director of the Imperial Theater of St. Petersburg conceived the idea of staging an elaborate opera ballet based on a subject from the Slavic mythology. For this work, to be known as *Mlada*, he commissioned music from the Russian school of composition. The project was never realized, however, and most of the music which the composers had written found its way into other of their works. Not until 20 years later did Rimsky-Korsakov decide to use the subject for an opera ballet of his own. His *Mlada*, from which *Procession of Nobles* is drawn, was begun in 1889 and produced at the Marinsky Theater in 1892.

After finishing the S-MATRIX, Symphony #1 in 1988, a work which premiered during the North Carolina Symphony Orchestra's 1992 concert season, the *STORM* became a metaphor for "being alive." *STORMWORKS* is a collection of pieces dedicated to living and facing life. It has also become the name by which Melillo makes his music available to those who wish to perform it.

TIMESTORM A Dance of the Wu Li Master "Wu Li" has many meanings... one is *"patterns of Organic Energy,"* another is *"emptiness."* One of our greatest and most interesting storms is the one that dances in our imaginations as we instantly hurl ourselves through past, present and future thought. Here we were, there we are. . . somewhere is where we could be, and so runs the storm of time.

Before the STORM

Before the storm there is quiet, mystery, hopeful anticipation and uncertainty. This movement is the "eye" of the *STORMWORKS* trilogy. What is it like before the storm. . . before life?

Into the STORM!

In front of us, always raging, either obviously swirling or mysteriously quiet is a storm. That storm is within us. It is outside of us. This piece is about the heroic charging forward of the individual, the on-purpose clenching of fists and the determination to move in to that storm, facing life, good and not-so-good with head-on clarity. This is a theme for US, not for some movie here, but for the real and true-to-life individuals who embrace each day... storming. (Stephen Melillo).

The overture to La Gazza Ladra (The Thieving Magpie) begins in a military manner with three rolls on the snare drum. The full ensemble presents the main melody, a vigorous march which is briefly worked out. Drum rolls, a brief crescendo, and five chords end this part of the overture. The allegro section contains two basic melodies: a glistening and delicate theme for the clarinets and a piquant subject shared by the entire woodwind section. As with other Rossini overtures, an exciting culmination is realized with the "Rossini crescendo."

Serenade in Eb, Op. 7 was composed in 1881-82 when Strauss was only 17 years old. The composition brought Strauss to the attention of the great conductor Hans von Bulow who hired the young composer to be his assistant conductor with the Meiningen Orchestra, launching his well-known conducting career. The music is cast in one large movement embracing a short sonata form. Although one of his first works, reminiscent of the andantes of Mozart, all of the typical Straussian qualities are present--the long arching melodic lines, rich harmonic textures and instrumental virtuosity. The delightful nature of the melodies and Strauss' knowledgeable use of the instruments make this work a gem in the wind instrument literature. It was scored for pairs of flutes, oboes, clarinets, and bassoons plus four horns and a contrabassoon.

Short Ride on a Fast Machine is a brilliant and jubilant work commissioned for the opening concert of the Great Woods Festival in Mansfield, Massachusetts. It was first played on that occasion, June 13, 1986, by the Pittsburgh Symphony under the direction of Michael Tilson Thomas. This arrangement for winds and percussion was realized by Lawrence Odom. John Adams has harnessed the rhythmic energy of Minimalism to the harmonies and orchestral colors of late-Romanticism. Adams, who has likened *Short Ride* to running a "rhythmic gauntlet," has said of the title, "You know how it is when someone asks you to ride in a terrific sports car, and then you wish you hadn't?" A 1991 survey of major orchestras conducted by the American Symphony

Orchestra League found John Adams to be the most frequently-performed living American Composer.

Concerto for Euphonium and Wind Ensemble by Jan Bach was written in 1990 and commissioned by the Tubists Universal Brotherhood Association (TUBA), dedicated to each and every member. The piece is in three movements, each connected by a solo cadenza. The second movement, Burlesca, presented here tonight, is a quick Spanish-flavored work whose title means satire or parody. Piano, percussion, and tremolo effects help to establish and sustain the movment's character. The world premiere took place at the 1992 International Tuba-Euphonium Conference at the University of Kentucky in Lexington with Dr. Brian Bowman as euphonium soloist with the I.T.E.C. Festival Orchestra.

The Lord of the Rings-- J.R.R. Tolkien; music by Johan de Meij

Although it is difficult to summarize such an extensive and complex work as is this literary trilogy, the main outline is as follows: the central theme is the Ring, made by primeval forces that decide the safety or destruction of the World. For years it was the possesion of the creature Gollum, but when the Ring falls into the hands of the Hobbits the evil forces awake and the struggle for the Ring commences. There is but one solution to save the World from disaster: the Ring must be destroyed by the fire in which it was forged: Mount Doom in the heart of Mordor, the country of the evil Lord Sauron.

It is the Hobbit Frodo who is assigned to carry out this task, and to assist him a company, the Fellowship of the Ring, is formed under the leadership of Gandalf, the wizard, which includes the Hobbits Sam, Peregrin and Merin, the Dwarf Gimli, the Elf Legolas, Boromir and Aragorn, the later King. The Companions are secretly followed by Gollum, who does not shun any means, however perfidious, to recover his priceless Ring. However, the Companions soon fall apart, after many pernicious adventures and a surprising denouement Frodo and Sam can at last return to their familiar home, "The Shire."

I. "GANDALF" (The Wizard)

The first movement is a musical portrait of the wizard Gandalf, one of the principal characters of the trilogy. His wise and noble personality is expressed by a stately motive which is used in a different form in later movements. The sudden opening of the Allegro vivace is indicative of the unpredictability of the grey wizard, followed by a wild ride on his beautiful grey horse "Shadowfax."

IV. "JOURNEY IN THE DARK"

The fourth movement describes the laborious journey of the Fellowship of Ring, headed by the wizard Gandalf, through the dark tunnels of the Mines of Moria. The slow walking cadenza and the fear are clearly audible in the monotonous rhythm of the low brass, piano, and percussion. After a wild pursuit by hostile creatures, the Orks, Gandalf is engaged in battle with a horrible monster, the Balrog, and crashes from the subterranean bridge of Khazad-Dum in a fathomless abyss. To the melancholy tones of a funeral march, the bewildered Companions trudge on, looking for the only way out of the Mines, the East Gate of Moria.

V. "HOBBITS"

The fifth movement expresses the carefree and optimistic character of the Hobbits in a happy folk dance; the hymn that follows emanates the determination and nobleness of the hobbit folk. The symphony does not end on a exuberant note, but is concluded peacefully and resigned, in keeping with the symbolic mood of the last chapter "The Grey Havens" in which Frodo and Gandalf sail away in a white ship and disappear slowly beyond the horizon.

Dimitri Shostakovich studied at the Leningrad Conservatory from 1919 to 1925. At the age of 19, he composed his *First Symphony, Op. 10* which subsequently became one of his most frequently performed works throughout the world. Like many Soviet composers, Shostakovich found himself constantly under pressure from restrictions imposed by the Soviet musical world with its concern for the moral and social rather than the purely aesthetic aspects of music--its wishes for works to be of immediate and practical value from the point of view of Soviet influence upon culture. The musical style of Shostakovich remains unbalanced with works containing crude parodies, programmatic devices, and conventional simplicity countered by works of originality, distinction, and significance. His compositional output was significant, and his Symphony No. 5 (1937), to which he gave the subtitle "A Soviet Artists Reply to Just Criticism," met with high approval in the Soviet Union and is probably his most well-known work. The Overture on Russian and Kirghiz Folk Songs is an exciting, but less well-known composition than the aforementioned works. Transcribed for the University of Illinois Symphonic Band for its 100th Anniversary Concert by former U of I Assistant Director, Guy Duker, this is a technically challenging but exhilarating composition. It is fraught with metric modulations and incorporates the Shostakovich compositional tendency to provide driving harmonic rhythms underneath beautiful lyric melodies.

W. Paris Chambers spent most of his youth in Newville, Pennsylvania, and it was there that he began to study music. His principal instrument was the cornet and, largely selftaught, he became a proficient performer in a relatively short time. He was also interested in conducting and became leader of the local band when he was 18. At 25 he assumed the position of conductor of the Captial City Band in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, where he also taught a large number of private students. As a result of his success as a conductor, as well as a cornet virtuoso, Chambers was offered, and accepted, a similar position with Great Southern Band in Baltimore, Maryland, in 1887.

Although recognized and praised as a conductor, Chamber's magnificent solo work with the cornet became even more admired. At one time, when he was touring through Colorado with his Baltimore band, he played a cornet solo on the summit of phenomenal range extended two octaves above high C, and he was able to use beautifully controlled lip trills in the upper range while playing a simple melody. Later, while managing the C.G. Conn store in New York City, he would occasionally

demonstrate his versatility for his friends by playing difficult solos with the instrument upside down, pushing the valves up with the back of his fingers. In 1905, he toured many cities in Europe and Africa playing cornet solos. While Chambers composed numerous cornet works, he was best known for his fine marches, including *Boys of the Old Brigade*.

ABOUT THE SOLOIST

CHRISTOPHER SHERMAN is a Graduate Student in Performance at YSU and will graduate in June. He holds a Bachelor of Music in Performance from Youngstown State University. Presently a graduate assistant at the Dana School of Music, he has worked for the Department of Bands under Dr. Gage with whom he has studied conducting. He has studied euphonium with YSU Professor John Turk, and has additional studies with Dr. Brian Bowman, former principal euphonium of the U.S. Air Force Band and current Professor of Music at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. While at Dana, Chris has performed as principal euphonium with the Symphonic Wind Ensemble; and he was a member of the Marching Pride, the Concert Band, the Dana Brass Players, the Dana Tuba Ensemble, the Dana Tuba-Euphonium Quartet, and Jazz Ensemble II. As a graduate assistant, Chris has conducted the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and Concert Band, and he served as an instructor with the Marching Pride, and co-directed the Basketball Pep Band. He has also performed with summer park bands in Boardman and in his hometown of Oswego, New York. After graduation, his plans are to continue working toward a career as a college professor.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

JONATHAN E. WILLIS is acting Associate Director of Bands at Youngstown State University (YSU). He is a 1984 graduate of Austintown-Fitch High School and he earned the Bachelor of Music in Performance from Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music in 1989. As a trombonist, Mr. Willis has studied with Michael Crist, Vern Kagarice, Glen Dodson, Ralph Sauer, and Greg Cox. While an undergraduate student at Dana, Mr. Willis attended the Chautauqua Institute of Music (1984), the Eastern Music Festival in Greensboro, North Carolina (1985-87), and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Institute Festival (1989), all on full scholarship.

Mr. Willis' professional performance experience includes 10 years with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, and five years with the Heritage Trombone Quartet, founded at the Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia, PA. He also performs regularly with the Warren Chamber Orchestra, the WD Packard Band, and many of the area's fine big bands. As an arranger/composer Mr. Willis has been the chief arranger of YSU's Marching Pride for four years, and his pieces have been performed by the Dana Trombone Ensemble and several of the region's high school marching bands. As an educator/conductor, Mr. Willis has worked with many of the area high schools, including the Canfield High School Trombone Choir, the Jackson-Milton High School Concert Band and Marching Band, the Ashtabula Harbor High School Band, and the Warren G. Harding High School Concert and Symphonic Bands. From 1993-95 Mr. Willis served as the Assistant Director of the Warren Jr. Military Band. He plans on completing the Master of Music in Performance Degree at YSU in June, and is finishing the requirements for Ohio teaching certification.

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands and Assistant Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned the Doctor of Education in Music at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion from the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to this study he was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS), for three years, and was, for nine years, the high school band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he directs the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, and co-directs the Marching Pride and the Concert Band. He also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting and music education courses.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has written a number of musical arrangements and compositions for concert band, jazz ensemble, and marching band and percussion, and has been published in the <u>Kansas Music Review Journal</u>, the <u>National Band</u> <u>Association Annual Newsletter</u>, and the Ohio Music Educators Journal, <u>TRIAD</u>. His many professional credits include serving as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor for All-State Sectional, Regional, and District concert bands throughout the Northeast and Midwest. Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble performed at the 1996 College Band Directors National Association North Central Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. His bands have also performed at All-State festivals in New York and Kansas.

In addition to the teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; additionally, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter. His biography was listed in the fourth edition of *Who's Who Among Teachers of America's Colleges and Universities*



Michael Abene is a composer, arranger, keyboard player, record producer, and clinician. Michael produced the Grammy winning projects "Digital Duke" featuring the Duke Ellington Orchestra, "The GRP All-Star Big Band" and "The GRP All-Star Big Band Live," and was nominated in the arranging category for all three big band records. Michael is the musical director for cabaret performer Karen Akers, and was the producer, arranger and pianist on her most recent recording, "Under Paris Skies" and her previously released "Unchained Melodies."

Other projects he has produced include "The GRP Christmas Collection" - Volumes 1, 2 and 3 (Volume 1 was awarded a gold record), "Happy Anniversary Charlie Brown", two projects for Billy Taylor, "...it's a matter of pride" and "Homage", plus projects for Billy Cobham, Eddie Daniels, and Dave Valentin. Additional artists that Michael has composed/arranged for include Buddy Rich, Dizzy Gillespie, the Mel Lewis Jazz Orchestra, Liza Minelli, Charles Aznavour, Michel Camilo, DIVA - the all female big band, and the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band. He was commissioned by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (NARAS) to compose for the Grammy All-American High School Jazz Band and Chorus. Michael has also produced and arranged for many singers, from pop artists Patti Austin, B.B. King and George Benson, to classic jazz artists Joe Williams, Chris Conner, New York Voices, Diane Schuur and Nnenna Freelon.
