## Mrs. Frank Purnell

Mrs. Frank Purnell, widow of the late Frank Purnell, was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1954, the first woman in the history of the college to hold this position. Her husband, former president and chairman of the board of The Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company and prominent industrialist and philanthropist, was a trustee for many years until his death in April 1953.

Active in community service all her life, Mrs. Purnell has been a member of the women's board of the Youngstown Hospital Association for the past ten years, was on the board of Christ Mission Settlement for ten years, and served on the board of the Children's Service Bureau for a number of years. She is an active member of the Pilgrim Collegiate Church and a charter member of the Women's City Club.



**James L. Wick, Jr.**  
**Chairman**

James L. Wick has been Chairman of the Youngstown College Board of Trustees since the fall of 1931. Mr. Wick received his B. E. degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Mr. Wick is treasurer of the Mahoning Valley Historical Society, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Young Men's Christian Association and that of the Butler Art Institute. He is honorary secretary of the Youngstown district M.I.T. alumni.



## President

### Howard W. Jones

There are undoubtedly students and former students of Youngstown College who have never met our chief administrator, President Howard W. Jones. There are none, however, who have failed to meet his influence, for during the past twenty-two years he has come to be representative of Youngstown's highest educational traditions.

## Dean of the College

### Joseph E. Smith

Dr. Joseph E. Smith's first association with Youngstown College was as an evening instructor in 1921. He was appointed to the full-time faculty in 1937 as a professor of economics, and subsequently became Associate Director of the Division of Social Sciences and Dean of Students. In 1949 he assumed his present roles as Dean of the College and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Dr. Smith distinguished himself as an undergraduate and was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship. He received his B. A. degree from Oxford University, his A. M. from the University of Nebraska, and his Ph. D. from Wallas College, in London.

Possessing a keen understanding of the problems and aspirations of youth and men, our Dean provides a ready guide to ethical living. He is admired and respected by all who know him.

# Registrar

P. P. Buchanan

Many a student's first acquaintance with Youngstown College has been through its popular Registrar, Philip P. Buchanan. Previously a principal in the Struthers school system, where he had taught for eight and a half years, Mr. Buchanan became associated with the college in 1927 and has spent the years ever since in persuading prospective students throughout the Youngstown area of the values of a college education and the merits of Youngstown College in particular. His success may be judged from the fact that enrollments regularly exceed predictions — a feat for which he would be the first to give much of the credit to the assistance he receives from five field representatives and the Office of Public Relations.

His duties as Assistant Business Manager include the supervision and management of the office staff, veteran's enrollment advising, and other tasks associated with the operation of the Business Office. Keen business acumen and attention to detail make Mr. Nelson an invaluable member of the business staff.


# Faculty

### Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences

Dean Joseph E. Smith began his undergraduate work at the University of Nebraska. He completed it at Oxford University on a Rhodes Scholarship. His graduate study was at the University of Nebraska and Wallas College, London, where he completed his doctorate.

While a professor at Hiram College he taught extension courses at the Youngstown Y. M. C. A. Joining the Youngstown College faculty in 1937 as professor of economics, he became Dean of Students and is now Dean of the College, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and Associate Director of the Division of Social Sciences. In addition to a brief political foray in Washington, he served the government as area director for the War Manpower Commission during World War II.

Dr. Leonard T. Richardson, head of the Departments of Ancient Languages and Modern Languages, came to Youngstown College in 1930 as professor of foreign languages, in which he had previously been an instructor at Iowa State College. 


Dr. Clair Worley has been with Youngstown College as head of the biology department since September 1945. He also supervises geography, geology, and general science courses.





## Physics






## William Rayen School of Engineering


## Dana School of Music



# Our Coaches


### **Dominic Roselli**

Youngstown countered twice in the late stages of the game to down a favored Scranton eleven and extend their unblemished skein over two games.


The first half was a punting duel with the accent placed on the defense.

Defensive work was headed by Garcar who twice crashed through to recover fumbles.






Spotting the Maroons the lead three different times, the Penguins came roaring back each time to edge Eastern Kentucky in what looked like a renewal of the Civil War.

The Maroons ground out a score in the first period. But with Sveda, Guido and Ceremuga luggering the leather most of the way, the Penguins moved into scoring territory. **Youngstown 7      Baldwin Wallace 0**



Youngstown's depth proved the difference as the line wore down Carroll's defense allowing the Penguins to pick up vital yardage.







Although they finished on the short end of the won-lost column, the Penguin cagers turned in a record breaking performance, with a total of 12 won and 15 lost.

The first game of the season was a Youngstown victory and the 100th win under coach Dom Rosselli. After the fine start the team found it hard to win on the road and the season outlook was dark.

Creeping up on their won-lost record the Penguins were hard to beat on their home floor. Tony Knott, all-Ohio Selection, went on a scoring rampage and established two scoring records and stands a good chance to erase another mark before his college days are over.

Knott registered 50 points against Fenn College to set a new single game school record eclipsing the mark of 44 points set by Leo Mogus, an all-time Youngstown College basketballer, in 1942.

In scoring a total of 551 points for the season the high scoring Farrell, Pa. product smashed the record of 486 points set by Mike Magula in 1951-52. Mike was on hand at the home games to see the "sophomore sensation" rack up the new total.

The chances are that Tony can break the four year scoring mark posted by Leo Mogus, of 1400 points during the seasons of 1939-43.


The team as a whole set two big records. This year's team scored a total of 2016 points for a new school record and posted a scoring average of 74.7 points per game to best the mark of 71.1 points set by the 1950-51 Youngstown squad.

Injuries to key men kept the Penguins from being at full strength. Bob Mayberry, towering center and leading rebounder, missed the early part of the season with a twisted ankle, Ed Poplava, play maker and outstanding floor-man, missed the middle part of the season with an injured leg and Captain Bob Yuhas, offensive spark-plug, missed the latter part of the season with a charley horse.

Yuhas was forced to take over the pivot spot and in the stages of the season really "came on." Playing against taller defensive men he scored consistently with a jump-shot from the key-hole area. Rated one of the best team players he played a key part in the "feed offensive" and was a demon on the offensive backboards.

Percentagewise Yuhas was the leader in the field goal and free throw departments. Hitting 42% from the field and 81% at the line, "Yuhie" rated as one of the best percentage shooters among the small college players.






## *NU SIGMA RHO*

- (6) Social activities after regular RIL Fellowship meetings and seasonal parties, co-ed swims, skating parties, annual picnic and summer outings through June and July.











