


making an impact," she said.

"AWARENESS IS KEY" IN UKRAINE, ALUMNI **VOLUNTEERS SAY**

While



planning a trip to Germany earlier this past Spring for the wedding of a mutual friend, YSU alumni Ryan Beil and Josh Prest decided to use some of their free time to assist with Ukrainian aid efforts. Through Operation White Stork, the two packed suitcases with first aid kits, baby formula and blankets, and flew from Frankfurt, Germany, into Krakow, Poland, in May. They delivered the kits and later met with representatives from the Slavic Mission in Europe, attended a meeting of the Rotary Club of Krakow and stopped by the museum at the factory of Oskar Schindler, who saved hundreds of Jews during the Holocaust. They also witnessed a pro-Ukrainian demonstration in the square of Old Krakow that included a little girl singing the Ukrainian national anthem. "Operation White Stork asked us to spread the word and make people aware that the war is very real and is still going on," Prest and Beil said. "One of the biggest concerns is that the war is out of sight out of mind as the world is distracted with other events. Awareness is key." Prest earned a bachelor's degree in Political Science from YSU in 2013 and is currently the Northeast Field Representative for U.S. Sen. Rob Portman. He served as president of the Rotary Club of Youngstown for the 2021-22 year. Beil earned a bachelor's degree in Business Administration from YSU in 2012 and a master's degree in Cybersecurity from Tiffin University in 2021. He currently is a senior cybersecurity examiner for the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. He is active in the Rotary Club of Dallas and other organizations in the DFW area.




ETHICS BOWL SQUAD EARNS SIXTH REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

YSU has launched new programs to help address shortages in two critical professions – nursing and teaching. The YSU Centofanti School of Nursing starts a new two-year associate degree in Nursing program this Fall Semester. "We are pleased to help alleviate the nursing shortage and workforce issues in our community," said Nancy Wagner, director. Meanwhile, the Beeghly College of Liberal Arts, Social Sciences and Education

received a \$200,000 state grant to boost the number of people entering the teaching profession, especially special education. The College reports that, as of this past Spring, school districts in the Youngstown area alone had 26 unfilled special education positions. "These funds will spur innovative and collaborative approaches to addressing the educator shortage in Ohio," said Chancellor Randy Gardner of the Ohio Department of Higher Education.

STATEWIDE EXCELLENCE

The stars were shining across the YSU campus this Spring as the university received the Collegiate Purple Star, a STAR training center recognition and a four-star rating for initiatives involving the state Sunshine Law:

The Ohio Department of Higher
 Education designated YSU a
 Collegiate Purple Star
 (https://www.ohiohighered.org
 /purple-star) campus for supporting
 students with military backgrounds.



"YSU's dedication to military-connected students is a prime example of what a Collegiate Purple Star school should be," said Randy Gardner, ODHE chancellor, who joined Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine in making the designation. YSU opened the YSU Office of Veterans Affairs (https://ysu.edu/veterans-affairs) in 2009, located in the Carl A. Nunziato Veterans Resource Center on Wick Avenue. The office provides a variety of services for more than 300 military-connected students at YSU.

- Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost designated the YSU Police Academy a STAR Training Center, a distinction recognizing excellence in state law enforcement programs. Yost's office created the STAR Academy program last year in partnership with the Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission. Since opening in 2000, the YSU Academy has graduated nearly 1,200 cadets and implemented several innovative initiatives.
- Finally, YSU received the top rating – four stars – in the Ohio Auditor of State's Star Rating System for open and transparent government. "We



take seriously our role in ensuring that YSU is a transparent, open institution," said Holly Jacobs, YSU general counsel. The rating system measures the success of public institutions across Ohio in fulfilling public records requests under the state's Sunshine Law, including the Ohio Public Records Act and the Ohio Open Meetings Act. It's the second consecutive year YSU has scored four stars.

Donors to YSU continue to raise the bar, as the bar graph shows. YSU and the YSU Foundation received a record \$24.1 million in gifts in the 2021-22 fiscal year, the largest one-year total in the university's 114-year history. "Our donors are among the most generous and supportive anywhere in the nation," YSU President Jim Tressel said. The record year is the latest in a

string of fundraising successes. In fiscal year 2014, the year before Tressel was named president, YSU raised \$6.1 million. The next year, the total more than doubled to \$13.3 million, and then jumped to \$22.3 million in fiscal year 2016. In all, since Tressel's arrival, YSU has received \$150.3 million in gifts. "The combined efforts of President and First Lady Tressel, our donors, the campus community, and our talented and hardworking Foundation staff have helped raise tens of millions of dollars to make sure we provide the best possible opportunities to our students and the entire Mahoning Valley community," said Paul McFadden, YSU Foundation president. 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





A novel by **Christopher Barzak**, professor of English and World Languages, recently won another award, and also was made a target of a book-banning campaign. *Wonders of the Invisible World* was selected for the Human Rights Campaign Foundation's LGBTQ+ affirming booklist for young adults. Meanwhile, the 2015 novel, which won a Stonewall Book Award from the American Library Association, is also on a list of 850 books that a Texas state legislator is trying to get banned. Barzak said the fact that both he and the book's central characters are gay is the reason the book was put on the Texas list. In an article in *The Vindicator*, Barzak questioned if the legislator even read the book.

"I don't think they read a whole lot in general," he said.






