ROBERT ELLIOTT HOPKINS is a native of North Carolina. He studied at the Eastman School of Music with Cecile Staub Genhart where he received his Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees. He has attended the Pablo Casals Summer Academy of Music in Zermatt, Switzerland, and was a Fulbright scholar at the Akademie fuer Musik and darstellende Kunst (1959-60) in Vienna where he studied with Wladyslaw Kedra. Dr. Hopkins holds the Eastman School of Music Performer's Certificate in Piano and the national first prize for high score in Associateship Examinations of the American Guild of Organists for 1962. He has appeared in recital in North Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Georgia, and New York, and with the Eastman-Rochester, North Carolina, and Asheville (North Carolina) Symphony Orchestras. Dr. Hopkins was appointed to the Dana faculty in 1963 as chairman of the piano department, and is organist and choirmaster at the First Unitarian Church.

About The Artists

Guest artist ELEANOR PUDIL ANOP is presently a member of the voice faculty at Kent State University. She holds Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the Cleveland Institute of Music and has taught at the Cleveland Music School Settlement. She has performed as a recitalist and in oratorio in Ohio, Connecticut, New Jersey, New York City, and New York State. She has sung in orchestral performances under conductors Thor Johnson and Leopold Stowkowski.

JAMES ELSON is a graduate of the University of Tennessee and the Juilliard School of Music. He studied in Germany as a Fulbright scholar, and is presently chairman of the Dana voice faculty. He is director of the Dana Concert Choir and the Youngstown University Penguins, an entertainment group which will tour the Carribbean this winter under the sponsorship of the USO and Department of Defense.

DOLORES FITZER is a member of the Dana piano faculty. She was a pupil of the later Hermann Gruss, and has appeared frequently on the Dana Artists' Series and in the Youngstown area as an accompanist and soloist.

EARL KELLY is a member of the Kent State University piano faculty. He is a graduate of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and Kent State University and is active as an accompanist, recitalist, and composer.

Born in Vienna, THEO SALZMAN studied with the eminent Julius Klengel. Concertizing throughout the world, Salzman has played with the leading conductors of our times. He also held the post of solo cellist with the Vienna, Israel, and Pittsburgh orchestras.

At present, Salzman is on the faculty of the Fine Arts Division of the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh. He is a member of the Carnegie Fine Arts Quartet in residence and conductor of the chamber orchestra. He is one of the few selected faculty members of the International String Congress.

Theo Salzman's cello (built 1732) is an outstanding example of the great Italian master, Gofriller.

HARRY FRANKLIN is a chairman of the piano faculty of the College of Fine Arts of the Carnegie Institute of Technology and has been pianist for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra since 1943.



Die schoene Muellerin was composed by Franz Schubert in 1823, to poetry of Wilhem Mueller.

The story of the cycle concerns a boy who works as a miller, but who wishes to follow the millstream "to wander" and to seek adventure and work. Following the stream, the boy finds work at a prosperous mill, and also falls in love with the miller's daughter, "the lovely maid of the mill." The miller-boy's state of joy is interrupted by the appearance of a huntsman dressed in green, his love's favorite color. The miller-maid prefers the hunter, and the boy returns to the millstream, his source of adventure, joy, and consolation. The stream proves to be his final comfort, as in his grief the boy commits suicide by drowning himself in the stream. The cycle ends with the stream's quiet lullaby to the dead miller-boy.

Throughout the cycle, a recurring sixteenth-note figure in the piano part pictures the stream—at times babbling happily, again flowing placidly, yet again boiling with rage. Dramatically, rising action exists in the first eleven songs, through "Mein." Songs twelve and thirteen maintain a plateau of peaceful love, but with the appearance of the hunter, "Der Jaeger," falling action ensues to the tragic close of the work. The lullaby peacefully concludes a drama containing fascination, curiosity, frustration, love, joy, fear, rage, sorrow, total despair, and death.

About The Artist

Mr. Risenhoover's performances of twentieth century music are of special interest since his principal teachers were Gyorgy Sandor (a pupil of Bartok) and Alexander Uninsky (an associate of Prokofiev). Furthermore, he has coached with such pedagogues as Paul van Katwijk and Arthur Loesser.

SCHICKSALSLIED, Opus 54 (Song of Destiny)

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

Brahms was attracted to the Schicksalslied poem of Friedrich Hoelderlin as early as 1868, making sketches which he changed and revised several times before the final form was reached in May of 1871. The composer's principal difficulty, having been attracted to the poetry initially, seems to have been with his inability to accept the despairing conclusion with its pessimistic view of mankind, contrasted with the serene peace of the immortal souls set forth in the opening section. Reconciliation ultimately was reached in the luminous orchestral epilogue in C major, a repetition of the E flat major orchestral prelude, which unites both earthly and heavenly elements in unmistakeable mediation. The English translation employed for this concert is from the edition by H. Clough-Leighter published by E. C. Schirmer.

REQUIEM, Opus 9

Maurice Duruflé (1902-

One of the most popular modern French choral works, the Requiem of Maurice Duruflé was commissioned by the composer's publisher, Durand, at the close of World War II. Duruflé had been at work on a suite of organ music based upon the Gregorian Requiem, and these organ compositions became the nucleus for the ensuing choral work. A composer of almost excessive conscientiousness, Duruflé tends to re-work and revise each score before submitting a final form to his publisher. The Requiem, being no exception, eventually was given its first performance by the Paris Radio under the direction of Roger Desormière in November of 1947. The verbatim quotations from the original plainsong source will be obvious to those familiar with the Gregorian Mass for the Dead, and even in the original material the spirit of the chant is present. The masterful orchestration reflects the influence of Fauré, Debussy, Ravel and Dukas. Duruflé served as assistant organist to Charles Tournemire at St. Clotilde from 1919-1930. In 1930 he was appointed organist at St. Étienne-du-Mont, a post which he holds today. He is professor of harmony at the Paris Conservatoire.



THE STORY




