The Dana Artists series is being inaugurated for two purposes; to make available to the public performances of chamber music and choral works and to introduce to the public the teacher-artists who are members of the staff of the Dana School of Music.

The series represents an unusual bargain for the concert goer. A season ticket for all twelve concerts may be purchased for \$10. ROBERT ELLIOT HOPKINS is a native of North Carolina. He studied at the Eastman School of Music with Cecile Staub Genhart where he received his Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees. He has attended the Pablo Casals Summer Academy of Music in Zermatt, Switzerland, and was a Fulbright scholar at the Akademi fuer Musik und darstellende Kunst (1959-60) in Vienna where he studied with Wladyslaw Kedra. Dr. Hopkins holds the Eastman School of Music Performer's Certificate in Piano and the national first prize for high score in Associateship Examinations of the American Guild of Organists for 1962. He has appeared in recital in North Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Georgia, and New York, and with the Eastman-Rochester, North Carolina, and Asheville (North Carolina) Symphony Orchestras. Dr. Hopkins was appointed to the Dana faculty this year as chairman of the piano department.





Hear the birth of the Lord Jesus Christ, as for us the Evangelists' Holy Gospels have told it all.

And behold it came to pass in those same days that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus that all the world enroll for taxing, And this taxing was the first one and was made at the time when Cyrenius was Governor in Syria, and everyone went that he might be recorded. Each to the city where he dwelt. Then also there went up Joseph who went from Galilee up out of Nazareth to the city of David in Judea, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the lineage and house of David that there he might be enrolled along with Mary his beloved wife being great with child. And while they were staying there came the time that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her first born son and wrapped Him round in swaddling and laid the Baby in the manger. For there was that night no room in the inn for them. And there were some shepherds abiding in the field in that same country and softly keeping watch o'er their flocks by night. Behold then, the angel of the Lord came upon them and the glory of the Lord shone all around, and they were all sore afraid. And the angel said to them:

The Angel to the Shepherds in the Field

Be not afraid, be not afraid. See now, here I bring unto you tidings good of great joy. To all people I bring unto you tidings of great joy. This day to you the Saviour is born which is Christ the Lord. Born in the city of David. And this be a sign to you the little Babe ye shall find all wrapped round in swaddling and lying in a manger. Lo, I bring unto you tidings good of great joy.

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying:

Chorus of Angels

Glory to God in the highest. Peace on earth, peace and good will to all men.

And as the angels were gone into heaven from them there spoke the shepherds one to another:

The Shepherds in the Field

Let us go now to Bethlehem that we may see this wondrous thing which there is come to pass, that the Lord God hath made known to us.

Recitative — Evangelist

And they all came hurrying and found the two there, both Mary and Joseph, and found the Child in the manger lying. Then they made known what they themselves had witnessed, spreading the tidings abroad about the Babe born in Bethlehem. And all those that heard the word listened to it in wonder at all that was told to them by the shepherds. But Mary kept to herself all the words they said and remembered them to ponder in her heart. And the shepherds now to their flocks returned praising and glorifying God for all the things they had seen and all they had heard that day as it had been foretold to them. And when eight days were accomplished for the Infant's circumcision then was the name of the Child called Jesus, which name was given Him by the angel before the day He was conceived in his mother's womb. Now when Jesus was born in the city of Bethlehem, in the land of Judea, and in the reign of King Herod, lo, then, there came from the East three wise men going to Jerusalem and saying:

The Wise Men from the East

Where is the newborn King of Israel? For we have seen His star before us, and have journeyed but to adore Him.

Recitative — Evangelist

Now when King Herod was told these happenings he trembled, and with him trembled all of Jerusalem. And then he gathered all the scribes together and all the high priests unto himself, and required of them to tell him where the Christ child should have His birthplace, and they said to him:

The High Priests and Scribes

In the city of David in Bethlehem. For 'tis thus it was spoken by the prophet; And thou Bethlehem, thou city of David surely shalt not be the least of them among the Princes of Israel. For from thee there shall come forth a ruler and He shall be a governor o'er Israel.

Recitative — Evangelist

Then King Herod called the three wise men privily and with diligence inquired of them when the star had shone before them, and bade them go and said:

Herod

Now go forth and seek Him, seek me out the Christ child. And when ye find Him, a message ye shall send me, that I may journey and adore him.

Recitative — Evangelist

When the wise men heard what the King commanded, forth they went. Behold then, the star which they had seen before them in the East went on just ahead until it came and stood up above them where the Christ child lay. When they beheld the Star they were exceedingly joyful and went in to the house, and saw there the Christ child and saw Mary His mother, and straightway fell down and worshiped on their knees and opened up their treasures there, and gave to Him incense and myrrh. And being warned of God in a dream that they should not return into the land of Herod, they departed and took another way back to their own land. And when the wise men were departed, lo, then, there appeared the angel of the Lord unto Joseph in a dream and said:

The Angel to Joseph

Get thee up and take the Child now and take His mother and fly into Egypt's land. And be thou there until I bring thee word. For it is upon thee that King Herod the Child is seeking and would dare destroy Him.

Recitative — Evangelist

Then he arose and took the Child and took the mother with him in the night, and fled into Egypt's land. And there he remained until the death of King Herod, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord in the Prophesy which hath said: Lo, in Egypt's land did I find my Son and called Him. Now when King Herod saw that the three wise men had mocked him and his commands he raged in fury. And he sent forth and had all the children of Bethlehem murdered and in all the coasts thereof all those that were two years old and under, all according to the time that he with diligence had learned from the wise men. Then there was fulfilled what had been spoken of by the prophet Jeremiah who hath said: High on the mountain there was heard a voice lamenting with sighing, weeping and mourning. Rachel who weepeth for all her children and will not let herself take comfort. Weeping because they are not. But when the death of King Herod came, lo, then there appeared the angel of the Lord to Joseph in a dream and said:

The Angel to Joseph

Get thee up, and take the Christ child and take His mother with thee and go forth into Israel. For they are all dead which before did seek to murder Jesus.

Recitative — Evangelist

And he arose and took the Christ child and took His mother with him, and came to the land of Israel. But when he had heard it told that Archelaus was King in the land of Israel in place of his father, King Herod, fear made him stop from going thither and in a dream he heard the command of God and turned then aside into the place of Galilee and came and made his abode in the town which is called Nazareth. And thus fulfilled the sayings which has been spoken by the prophet: He shall be called a Nazarene. Lo, then, the Child grew and was strong in spirit, filled with wisdom and on Him was the grace of God.

Conclusion

Now let us all thank Thee God, our Lord, Jesus Christ, who hath with His birth shone upon us. And hath redeemed His children by His passion from the fires of Hell. Him shall we all praise then with all His angels. Praise Him with music, singing praised be God in the highest.

The harmonized chorales from each part of the Passion will be played by the Dana Faculty Brass Ensemble of Youngstown University at 4:15 and 6:45 P.M. as preludial music.

PROGRAM NOTES

The Good Friday service at St. Thomas' Church, Leipzig, where Bach held the post of cantor from 1723 until his death in 1750, followed a liturgical format of long standing tradition. An extended concerted version of the Passion of Jesus Christ, as recounted in the Gospels had been inaugurated by the Leipzig town council in 1721. It was decreed that this service should become an annual occurrence alternately at the two chief churches, St. Thomas' and St. Nicholas'. A notebook by Johann Christoph Rost, the "custos" at St. Thomas' outlined this elaborate Good Friday ritual which must have required some five hours:

1:15 P.M.

The church bells were rung

1:45 P.M. Beginning of the service proper

Hymn: "When Jesus Hung on the Cross"

Part I of the Passion

Hymn: "O Lamb of God Most Holy"

Sermon

Part II of the Passion

Motet: "Ecce quomodo moritur justus"

by Jacob Handl

Passion Collect: "Deus qui nobis . . . "

Closing Hymn: "Now Thank We All Our God"

The accounts of the passion and death of Jesus as set forth in the synoptics and John have been an integral part of the Church since the 4th century, when, tradition tells us, the Passion story according to St. Matthew was recited on Palm Sunday, that of St. Luke on the Wednesday of Holy Week. In the 8th and 9th centuries, the Passion according to St. Mark was allotted to the Tuesday of Holy Week, while that of St. John was read on Good Friday. The passions came to be dramatized in the 13th century, the words of the Evangelist being sung in plainsong, the words of Jesus and cries of the people being rendered "characteristically." This type of delivery lasted until the beginning of the 16th century when the Netherlands school of composers began setting the Passion story to polyphonic music, the first example dating from c. 1500, a work by Jacobus Obrecht. From that point the history of the musical Passion gradually evolved and culminated in the work of J. S. Bach.

The Passion According to St. John, Bach's earliest Passion setting, was composed during the winter of the years 1722-1723, while he was still at Coethen. It is generally assumed that the first performance of the work took place in 1724, at St. Nicholas', since Bach was not officially appointed to St. Thomas' until April 23, 1723. However, it seems more probable that the first performance took place at St. Thomas' in 1723 with Bach conducting. Even though the appointment was not yet actually his, the council, no doubt, asked the candidate to supply the concerted music. The work is scored for an orchestra of strings, flutes, oboes and bassoons, the organ and harpsichord serving as keyboard continuo instruments. Four soloists are employed for the arias and another group of "concertists" for the roles in the Passion narrative as recounted by the Evangelist. Imbued with a profound spiritual insight, Bach has probed deeply into the drama inherent in the lofty gospel account. The crux of the work is the series of meditative chorale verses which he himself chose and placed at specific intervals throughout the course of events. These reflective moments are without musical equal — the most dramatic and intense harmonizations to flow from his pen.

THE ENGLISH TRANSLATION

Possibly the greatest problem in modern performances of the Bach choral works is the availability of suitable English translations which preserve the spirit of the original German, the metrical rhyme scheme where that exists, correct word and musical accentuation, correct note values for corresponding syllables wherever at all possible, and, above all, singability. There are at least five principal English versions of the St. John Passion currently in print. None of them is completely satisfactory with regard to the above criteria but there is some merit in all of them. The inserted translation is my attempt to compile the best material available from the current principal sources. Where none of them achieved satisfactory translation, in my estimation, I have freely inserted new material. This text makes no claim whatsoever of being a new translation. Rather, it is only a re-working of the best of the available material, with the addition of some original ideas.

The spirit of the King James Version of the Holy Bible has been kept throughout the narrative because of its great poetic beauty. The translation of the Biblical narrative by Henry Drinker is a masterful job and has been retained almost word for word throughout. The greatest difficulty was encountered in the choice of suitable chorale translations. The masterful German poetry is virtually impossible to reproduce adequately in English. Five contemporary hymnal sources were scanned for source material besides the current English translations of the Passion. It was mostly in the chorales that I found it necessary to substitute original material.

This translation served as an appendix to "An Analytical Survey and Comparative Study of the J. S. Bach St. John and St. Matthew Passions," a master's thesis submitted by the writer in partial fulfillment of the requirements for the degree of Master of Sacred Music in the Union Theological Seminary, April 3, 1956. Since the time of writing changes of a more or less insignificant nature have been made in preparing a complete performance or isolated numbers at the suggestion of and in collaboration with friends and colleagues. Several more of these have occured since the printing of the enclosed and I wish especially to express my thanks to Mr. C. Wade Raridon for the new insights shared in preparing the part of the Evangelist for today's performance.

About The Artist

Born in Chicago, Theodore Lettvin started playing the piano at the age of four. At the age of twelve he appeared with the Chicago Symphony under the baton of the late Frederick Stock. At the age of fifteen he won a scholarship to the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia where he studied for the next seven years with two world-renowned artists, Horszowski and Rudolf Serkin. His career was interrupted for service with the United States Navy during World War II.

Lettvin has been the recipient of many national awards, among them the Naumburg and Michaels Memorial awards. He has appeared as soloist with the New York Philharmonic, Cleveland, Philadelphia, Washington National Symphony, Chicago, Baltimore, and Cincinnati orchestras. He has played in London, Amsterdam, Copenhagen, Vienna, Berlin, and Brussels, as well as many other European music centers.
