FROM THE PRESIDENT'S PEN

DR. JACK COCHRAN, PRESIDENT OPGA

As I have become involved in the internal working of OPGA in the past year, I have had to address the nagging question, "Why does OPGA exist?" I can only come up with one reasonable answer-OPGA exists to serve the needs and wants of its members. My goal for this year is to do just that. Counselors in Ohio must get their act together and begin speaking with a strong unified voice if we are to survive and flourish in the times ahead.

A number of efforts have already been stated on this path. This Newsletter represents the first of what will be much more newsy and informative newsletters. We plan to let you know what is happening that affects you. We have set aside funds for the first time for a Legal Defense Fund. Joel Chermonte will be chairing a committee to establish guidelines for its implementation. Money from this fund. along with that from a comparable APGA fund, will be available to assist counselors in legal challenges. An Ethics Committee, with Dr. Susan Soden as chair. has been established to assist members in dealing with ethical problems and in helping counselors to monitor the ethical practices of their colleagues. Finally, OPGA has been very active in supporting legislation favorable to counselors. The Legislative Committee will be co-chaired this year by Dr. Al Lerch and Nancy Bancheek. Nancy is also putting together a communication network to facilitate our state and national communication with legislators. Efforts to license counselors will be proceeding at a very intense (Continued on page 7.)

1980 SPRING CONVENTION SET

Mark your calendars and make plans to attend the Spring OPGA Convention in Columbus on April 24 & 25. The theme will be "Professional Development: Knowledge and Skills for the 80'S."

The Convention will include experimental sessions, exhibits, discussions and speakers on a variety of counseling, guidance, mental health and student personnel topics. Also see the call for convention programs in this newsletter.

LICENSURE BILL INTRODUCED

A licensure bill aimed at protecting consumers of Ohio's counseling and social work services has been introduced in the Ohio General Assembly by Representative Dale Locker (D) of Anna, Ohio.

At a press conference at the State House, Representative Locker emphasized the need for quality services provided by counselors and social workers for all citizens. Presently, both groups are unregulated by state statute. Any person, qualified or not, can use the professional titles and offer services to the public. Need for regulation is recognized by legislators from both political parties who are joining together as sponsors of this bipartisan effort.

Representative Locker's bill sets qualifications for education and experience. It requires that persons who use the title social worker or counselor secure a license. The bill further protects the public by requiring the counselors and social workers to give clients

- 7. To get more counselors involved as members and participants.

ACTIVITIES:

1. Newsletter: An expanded newsletter will be sent to members five times a

2. Legislative Efforts: OPGA is coordinating efforts for counselors toward achieving licensing. This is currently being done through a coalition with social workers to establish an Ohio Behavior Sciences Board.

OPGA is coordinating a committee composed of OPGA, OSCA, and OACES members working toward mandatory ele-

mentary counseling.

3. Legal Defense Fund: A fund has been established to assist counselors with

legal problems.

4. Ethics Committee: A committee has been established to help members conform to ethical behavior.

5. Communications Network: A communications network is being established to keep counselors informed and to activate their assistance in legislative and other efforts.

6. Regional Workshops: Several regional workshops are planned for this year to help counselors update their training and to raise money for OPGA.

7. Executive Secretary: Preliminary study is being done to determine the value and feasibility of hiring an executive secretary.

DEAR COUNSELOR,

As you may know, we are presently involved in a major effort with social workers to establish a Behavioral Science Board to License counselors and social workers. In order to be successful we need additional financial support from counselors. As Ohio counselors, we will all benefit from the passage of HB 808.

OVA

The American and Ohio Vocational Associations are professional organizations whose aim is to promote vocational education. Within both the national and state groups is the Guidance Division made up of vocational counselors in many settings including schools, colleges, and agencies.

Under the legislation the professions will be regulated by a board composed of members of each group. Three voting members from the general public will also be appointed to this board to be sure that public opinion will be represented.

Ohio will not be the first state to license professional counselors or social workers, but it is unique in one respect. The proposed legislation is the result of a grass-roots coalition of social workers and counselors, the first in the nation. More than 18,000 individuals who currently offer services will be recognized under the proposed legislation and such action will insure that recipients of services provided by social workers and counselors receive quality care.

Counselors, under the leadership of Dr. Mel Witmer and Jane Bartlett, and with the financial support of OPGA, OSCA, and OACES have formed a coalition with social workers to introduce legislation creating a Behavioral Sciences Board to license counselors and social workers. In addition, Dr. Charlotte Huddle is heading a committee made up of representatives of OPGA, OSCA, and OACES working toward introducing legislation mandating elementary school counselors.

As you can see, we are off to a good start toward meeting some of your wants and needs; however, in order to continue to move ahead, we need your help. We need your ideas, your time and expertise, and your money. In order to get your ideas we have included an OPGA Survey in this Newsletter. We would also like the use of some of your time. We are all busy, but we set priorities. I would like to ask that you make OPGA a high priority this year. Some of the ways you might contribute time and expertise are: being a part of our communication network to contact legislators, being a member of one of our committees, attending and possibly presenting a program at our convention, sending stories to the <u>Newsletter</u>, volunteering to assist with your local chapter or running for office in one of the local or state OPGA affiliated organizations. If none of the above appeal to you, contack me and I may be able to find something else for you to do.

I have saved the financial contribution until last because I think it needs extra attention. Frankly, most of us derive a livelihood from our profession. I think it is important that we be willing to put something back into it. And, if you are going to put money into your profession, you want to put it where it will benefit you most. I think OPGA and its Divisions and Local Chapters will be of great help to you. OPGA dues have been raised to twelve dollars with three dollars of that being returned to local

chapters as your dues to that organization. The dues were increased so that the programs previously described in this column could be implemented. Each Board member will contribute many times that amount in expenses during the year to serve you. Is it too much to ask you to contribute twelve dollars in dues to the umbrella organization speaking for Ohio counselors? Remember, the OPGA leadership is made up of fellow counselors who are volunteering their ideas, time, expertise, and money to serve youtheir colleagues.

In addition to the money needed in dues, additional money is needed this year to finance counselor legislative efforts. The counselor-social worker coalition has launched a first-class effort to get the Behavioral Science Board licensing bill passed. This should be the year to get counselor licensing. Expenses this year include a paid staff. Social workers have agreed to assume a disproportionately large share of the expense. OPGA and OSCA have committed funds toward the effort, but additional funds must be raised from counselors. Dr. Gene Wysong at the University of Toledo is heading our legislative fund raising efforts. We desperately need your contributions.

As I said earlier, OPGA exists to serve the needs and wants of Ohio counselors. There are at least 6,000 potential members in Ohio. Let us know what you want from OPGA, join, get involved and help us achieve your goals.

SUMMARY OF THE SOCIAL WORKER AND COUNSELOR LICENSURE BILL

(113th Ohio General Assembly)

This is a joint bill to create a Board of Behavioral Sciences to license counselors and social workers by statutory code in the State of Ohio.

Definitions:

"Counseling" means engaging, under the title of "counselor" or any title that includes the word "counseling" or "counselor", for a fee, salary, or other consideration, in techniques for appraising aptitudes, abilities, achievement, interests, or attitudes in the use of informational and community resources for career, educational, personal, or social development, in techniques for facilitating problem solving and decision making by individuals, in referral and placement that serves to further the goals of counseling, or in any combination of these in accordance with counseling principles and methods and for the purpose of helping individuals and groups achieve self-understanding, behavioral change, or more effective interpersonal behavior.

"Social Work" means engaging in, for a fee, salary, or other consideration, case social work, group social work, community organization, psychosocial interventions, administration of a social work program, social work education, social work research, or any combination of these in accordance with social work principles and methods and for the purpose of helping individuals, families, groups, and communities prevent or resolve problems caused by social or emotional stress.

Board Structure:

Under the Department of Administrative Services the Board of Behavioral Sciences is created with a Counselors Professional Standards Committee and a Social Work Professional Standards Committee to make recommendations to the Board. The Board may establish rules for codes of ethical practice in counseling and social work. They will set continuing education requirements, provide examinations for counselors and social workers, and conduct investigations when Board rules are thought to be violated. It may refuse to issue or renew, or may

suspend or revoke, any license or registration applied for or issued if the person violates Board regulations. The Board consists of nine members: three counselors, two licensed and one registered; three social workers, one from each of the three levels being licensed; and three from the general public who are not licensed.

Licensing Levels:

Licensed Professional Counselor--Required to have a master's degree or doctorate in counseling or a closely related field; OR a unified program of graduate studies in counseling (not less than sixty quarter hours of credit or its equivalent in counselor training acceptable to the Board). Three years of supervised experience in counseling are required at the master's level and two years of supervised experience in counseling are required at the doctoral level.

Registered Counselor--Must have a minimum of two years of supervised experience in counseling and meet any education, experience, or examination requirements the Board establishes in designating the area of counseling being regulated.

There are three levels for licensure

of social work:

Independent Social Worker--Master's in social work required. Completion of two years of postmaster's degree social work experience under organizational auspices supervised by a licensed independent social worker.

Master Social Worker--Master's in social work required. Work under organizational auspices with or without super-

vision.

Social Worker--B.S.W. required. Work under organizational auspices and supervision as prescribed by the Board.

Grandparent Clause:

All applicants for licensed professional counselor have two years for waiver of the examination requirement. They must meet ONE of the following: (1) A doctorate or its equivalent in counseling or a closely related field and not less than one year of experience in counseling, supervision of counseling, direct involvement in counselor education, or the administration and policy division of counseling programs during the six

(2) A master's degree or its equivalent in counseling or a closely related field and not less than two years of experience in counseling, supervision or counseling, or direct involvement in the administration and policy division of a counseling program during the six years immediately preceding the date of application;

(3) A bachelor's degree or its equivalent and not less than three years of experience in counseling, supervision of counseling, or direct involvement in the administration and policy division of a counseling program during the seven years immediately preceding the date of application.

All applicants for social work must apply within one year for waiver of the examination requirements. The education requirement does not apply for a social worker if the person applies within one year of the effective date of the act and was engaged in social work on the effective date of this act. The education requirement does not apply for a master social worker if the person applies within one year of the effective date of this act, has completed a master's or doctoral program related to social work, and was engaged in social work on the effective date of this act.

Continuing Education—The Board is required to establish not less than forty clock hours or more than eighty hours of continuing education during the two-year period of licensure or registration as a condition for renewal. Courses not limited to universities or colleges.

Professional Disclosure--A consumer information statement is required to be furnished to the client or displayed at the place where the services are provided. This statement would include information such as name, title, address, and telephone number of the counselor or social worker; education, areas of competence, services he or she provides; financial arrangements; and the address and telephone number of the Board of Behavioral Sciences.

Fee for License--\$20 to \$40 every two years. Board has authority to adjust

fees to expenses.

Terms for Renewal—Renewal is required every two years. A license or registration can be suspended, revoked, or refused if the licensee is convicted of certain misdemeanors or felonies.
