 New Routine io Be Followed in Enrolling Classes, Will Avoid Wailing in LineTo avoid waiting in line, a feature of recent registration procedure, the office of the registrar has announced a new routine to be followed in enrolling for second semester classes, Students now in school should secure from the information desk in the main office a copy of the directions for regista advisory form to his adviser whe will assist in the selection of courses of study to be followed next semester. The adviser will see that the form is completed, signed,' approved by the appropriate dean for overloads, and returned to the informa n desk via the student. At this point the student will then he given a definite appointment
for completing his registration,
filling out his cards etc This latfilling out his cards, etc. This lat-
ter step will be completed the appropriate time in the east rome second floor, annex I. Seniors need to see their ad-
visors before Dec. 6 , juniors to see their advosors before Dec. 15, sophomores and freshmen their

I. S. N. S. A. was born. This idea entually led to the holding of the constitutional convention for the U. S. N. S. A. in early Septem356 leading colleges, representing $1,389,000$ students (Youngstown College was represented by Mike iswan, Ray Martz and Oliver Davis) gathered on the campus of
the University of Wisconsin and adopted a national constitution, elected national officers and mem-
