Marine Officer Selection Team Visits University

Columbus, Ohio - The U.S. Marine Corps Officer Selection Team will visit Youngstown University on Dec. 12, 13 and 14 to interview those students interested in obtaining a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve.

Opportunities are currently available via the Platoon Leaders Class for ground or aviation duty, for undergraduates, and for seniors there is an opportunity to enroll in the Officer Candidate Course both ground and aviation.

In addition, the Marine Corps has recently established a Lawyer Program for those students attending, or planning to attend, law school and a Marine Aviation Cadet (MARCAD) Program for those men who have completed two years of college. During their stay on the campus, the Marine Corps representatives may be located in Strouss Auditorium, Main Bldg.

The probation will be in effect for the remainder of the current semester, but will be lifted during Christmas vacation permitting the fraternities to hold their regular parties and dances.

National Education Group Demands High Standards

On June 3, 1952, Eta XI Chapter of Kappa Delta Pi, a National Society in Education, was installed at Youngstown University. The purpose of Kappa Delta Pi is, and shall be, to encourage high professional, intellectual, and personal standards and to recognize outstanding contributions to education.

To this end it shall invite to membership such persons as exhibit commendable personal qualities, worthy educational ideals, and sound scholarship. It shall endeavor to maintain a high degree of professional fellowship among its members and to quicken professional growth by honoring achievement in educational work.

In order to be eligible for membership you must be working toward, and remain in the teaching profession. Membership entails a point average indicative of high scholastic achievement and endeavor. Candidates are chosen because of high scholarship record and because the members who selected you believe you have a professional attitude which will enable you to grow in the field of education.

Your personal attitudes toward life and teaching have been considered. You have been selected impartially because of the qualities which you possess without qualification of sex, religion, race, or color.

as a Society interested in the improvement of teaching service, it expects its members to obligate themselves to strive to improve the profession of teaching and to exhibit high standards of education and conduct.

One who has been elected to membership in Kappa Delta Pi remains a member for life providing sufficient cause, which is rare, provokes withdrawal. Those elected are paid the highest tribute in recognition of scholastic achievement by the Department of Education.

Positions are now open for writers, editors and investigators in Washington D.C. and various cities throughout the country.

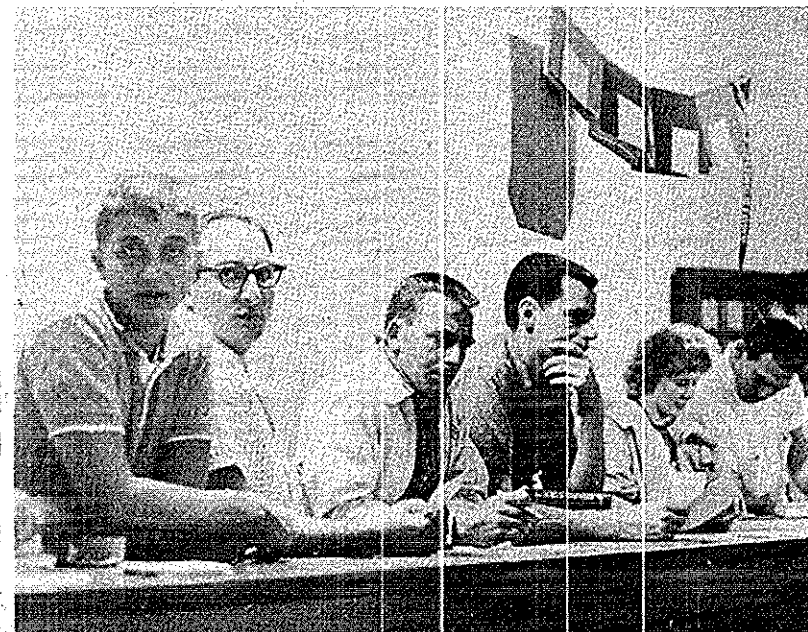

Another Rebuttal

Editor:

In reply to Mr. Buddle's letter appearing in The Jambar on Nov. 18, 1960.

As far as prestige and defense superiority is concerned let the record and reports speak for themselves. If our prestige is at an all time high - as Vice President Nixon has said - Why didn't the Administration release the U.S.I.A. polls taken abroad in June of 1960? Senator Kennedy never said that the United States was weak. He said that we are the strongest nation in the world but that the balance of power was shifting in favor of the Soviet Union. The Gaither Committee report on defense, a study made by leading experts at the request of President Eisenhower, bore out this fact. The Rockefeller Report on the Problems of U.S. Defense in 1958 said: "Thus it appears that the U.S. is rapidly losing its lead over the U.S.S.R. in the military race ... Unless present trends are reversed, the world balance of power will shift in favor of the Soviet Bloc." All reports prepared and presented by Congressional, Presidential, and independent committees all warn that the balance of power is shifting in favor of the Soviet Union. Yet the Eisenhower-Nixon administration has contended that all is well and done nothing. We ask Mr. Buddle to tell the truth to the American people propaganda?

During the past eight years is when we have had "watered-down" foreign policy. This administration not the people have let a Communist satellite come to the door of the U.S. Cuba. Is this an example of the "dynamic" foreign policy of this administration? If it is then we do not want dynamic foreign policy! This is only one example of the leadership lacking in the White House.

People, especially workingmen, know that they do not get anything for nothing. Is there any common person of average means unwilling to pay a few dollars into Social Security each pay so that when he retires he and his wife can have a little pension? Is there any person unwilling to pay 1/2 of 1% of his earnings so that our older people can have medical care? We must treat our older people with Dignity not Paupers Oaths. The Republican party has not and never will propose and pass a piece of progressive social legislation that has benefited the common man. The truth is that the truth hurts so Mr. Buddle calls it propaganda.

Mr. Buddle's statement that "big cities ... people who can't beyond their own stomachs" is so stupid. That statement demonstrates his lack of knowledge. Four years ago these big cities voted for Ike and I am sure they were not thinking of their own stomachs.

In closing let us name a few accomplishments of the Democratic party. What the Democratic party has tried or has done for America.

- (1) Minimum wage of \$1.00. In the 30's 99% of the Republicans voted against it and they still oppose it.
- (2) Passed 2 Aid to Depressed Areas bills - Ike vetoed both of them.
- (3) Unemployment Benefits and S.U.B. - If it were not for these benefits Youngstown would be enjoying a depression.
- (4) Social Security - 99% of the Republicans voted against these bills in the 30's. Now they praise it as they do all social legislation previously passed.
- (5) National Defense Education Act - Many students at Y.U. are on this loan.

Cancer in the South

New Orleans School Strike Intimidates American Ideal

Last week, three federal judges removed all remaining obstacles to public school integration in the state of Louisiana. The judges, by declaring interposition "not a constitutional doctrine", foiled the attempts of the Louisiana State Legislature to stall the federal order to integrate.

Interposition is the theory that a state has the right to intervene between the federal government and the people of the state.

The federal judges handed down their ruling despite jeers and angry protests from die-hard segregationists. At the same time the federal court published its ruling, mobs of New Orleans housewives were gathered outside the home of a white Methodist minister preparing to take his young daughter to school. A school deserted except for four white children and a lone negro youngster.

THIS WAS THE SCENE last week in a section of a large American town in this, the land of equality.

Meanwhile, press reports were being released stating that some residents of the city of New Orleans were worried about the effect this violence would have on the home of the Mardi Gras' national prestige.

Their concern about the city's reputation for quaint French quarters, Creole brandies and Mardi Gras carnivals is commendable, however, they should be concerned less with the prestige of New Orleans and more with the reputation of the United States in the eyes of the rest of the world.

To quote a worn-out, but still significant bromide, "this is a critical period in our history" and one where we cannot afford to lose prestige as a nation.

THE DISGUSTING SITUATION in New Orleans causes one to reflect on the opinions of the various peoples of the world. For instance, the millions of orientals comprising one-third of the Earth's population, and at present the cause of many State Department ulcers. What do they think of the "democratic" treatment the four little six-year old Negro girls are receiving in this large American city? Let us not forget that in our country the oriental, like the Negro, is part of a minority group. Certainly, Communist China and leftist groups in other Far-Eastern nations are using this Yankee stupidity to strengthen their positions.

What of the struggling new nations in Africa, the ancestral home of the Negro? The nations that could shift the balance of power in the U.N. to the Communist bloc. Do they realize that the demonstrators are just a small group of people - many of whom left their stills overflowing down the mountain, gathered up their pamphlets denouncing Sherman's march to the sea, bought a pair of shoes and came into the big city to make trouble - or do they take this as an example of the American way of life.

The damage has been incurred - chalk another one up for the Communists.

Christmas Spirit Threatened

Shopping for Helpless Male Causes Loss of Good Will

Whether or not you feel good will toward men this Christmas may depend on how well they like your presents - which may depend, in turn, on your knowledge of male psychology. Even if you think you could write volumes on that subject, these footnotes may help:

Avoid the "reform project" gift. Don't present him with a watering can or soldering tool this Christmas! Men hate nagging - in any form. The same goes for giving him records and books he'll have to learn to like.

Almost every man sooner or later acquires a fetish he won't part with - a disreputable - looking bathrobe, say, or an old fishing pole that brings him luck. The only sensible thing to do is shrug your shoulders. And the only present that makes sense is the one which shows that you know and respect his preferences.

How about an "our song" present? For a husband or fiance, this may be something that recalls courtship days, a long-standing private joke, or an interest you both share. Maybe you really do have a song that's recently received a new treatment on an LP record. A girl trying to please dad, brother, uncle or boyfriend can also use this gambit. If he's taken you hiking, fishing or bowling, tried to interest you in football, jazz or Civil War battles, give him a gift relating to his special enthusiasms. You can almost see his ego expand.

If it's fragile - hands off! An ashtray or paperweight should be unbreakable - lest a butter-fingered man has cause to feel guilty one day over what happened to your gift. Ripped or frayed shirts, torn bathrobes, socks with holes are dismaying both to the bachelor living alone and to the man whose (overworked) wife or mother does his house-keeping - so be especially sure that clothing gifts meet rigid standards of durability.

Gingerbread is for the table. In selecting an item of clothing or jewelry, or an accessory for his den or desk, remember that men like clean, simple lines - they may even go for a perfectly useless item if it only looks functional - and abhor "gingerbread." If anything strikes you as "cute" or "darling," don't buy it! While shunning anything that smacks of feminine taste, buy with confidence any item that looks as if it has been designed especially for a man - a king-size ashtray or

coffee mug, or a pen made larger and heavier to fit the male grip.

Buy the tie that binds. Ties are such a popular gift that they deserve a heading of their own. Here the rule is to buy a color and pattern that reminds you of something he owns, but doesn't quite duplicate it. If you're not that familiar with his tie wardrobe, it's safest to avoid conspicuous colors and patterns. The truth is that men - despite recent trends toward a gayer plumage - are still basically conservative dressers, much less willing than women to experiment. Even at his loudest, a man will wear only certain types of tie designs, the types he's used to.

Be sure the size is accurate; mistakes can be embarrassing. Particularly if a man's build is unusual in any way - short, slight or heavy - he's apt to be sensitive about it and to resent mistakes in size. Or, whatever his build, he may feel - and with some justification - that you weren't sufficiently interested to take the trouble to find out his correct size.

Pick something he's sure to use. Is he wearing those old cufflinks because he hasn't gotten around to selecting another pair - or because he's so fond of them that a new set may never get worn? Some months ago, he may have mentioned yearning for a particular book or hobby item - but are you sure he hasn't acquired it in the meantime? There are four ways to play safe: (1) ask his nearest female relative (2) pick something like shirts, socks an umbrella or his pet brand of toiletries - sooner or later his supply runs out and he has to use your gift (3) listen for hints - they won't be subtle (4) work possible gift items into the conversation and see how he reacts. If you mention enough different ones, he'll be thoroughly confused - and you can preserve the element of Christmas surprise.

Be enthusiastic about the gifts he gives you. No matter how shrewdly selected and handsomely wrapped the present you gave him, it will lose all its luster if he senses that you don't like his gift. The male ego is a fragile thing. So wax enthusiastic even if you already have three brown handbags and can't return this one without his finding out. After all, this is the season for good will toward men!

except emotional drive. It seems to me, then, that the purpose of the Jambar is not that as mentioned in the editorial, namely "... to stimulate more students to vote..." and "... to inform and acquaint the independent student voter with the candidates..." but to raise an issue.

Why is the word coalition such a dirty word? I believe that it is a healthy sign and a technique of the elections at Youngstown University that should be brought out into the light and developed into a multi-party system, where candidates are endorsed by the party, irregardless of fraternal or organizational affiliation. Granted that coalitions and alliances on this campus are dirty words because everything about them is so secretive and sub-rosa. But this can and should be, corrected.

The important part of the editorial is not the students who were endorsed by the Jambar. To me, the important part is the emotionally packed six paragraphs which precede the endorsements. The Jambar is right on the one hand - to propose that the system by which our student government is elected is shoddy - but by not giving any alternative proposal, they have left themselves open to some very justifiable criticism.

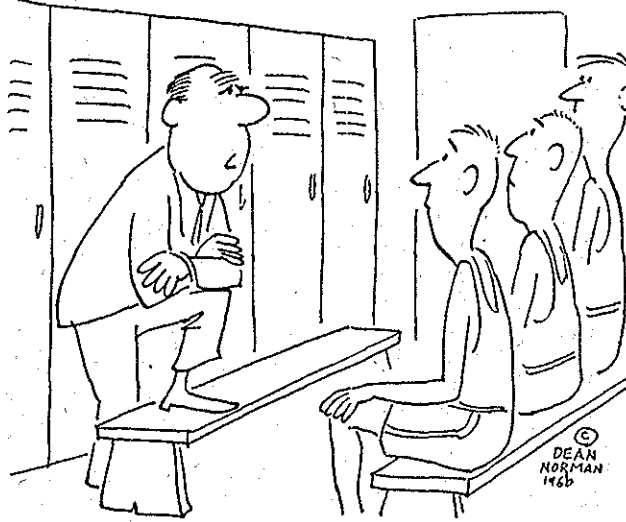

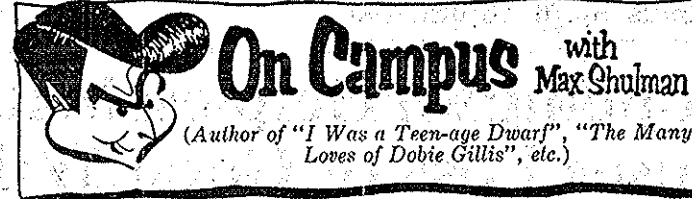

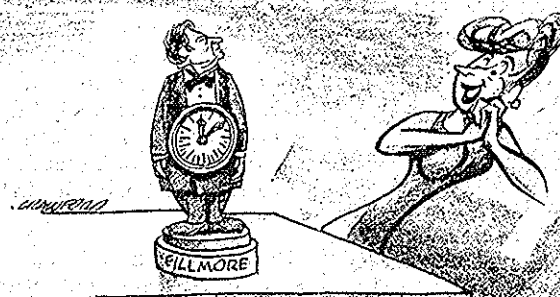

Considering the teams' inexperience we can look forward to a good season with a few surprises and certainly winning seasons to come.

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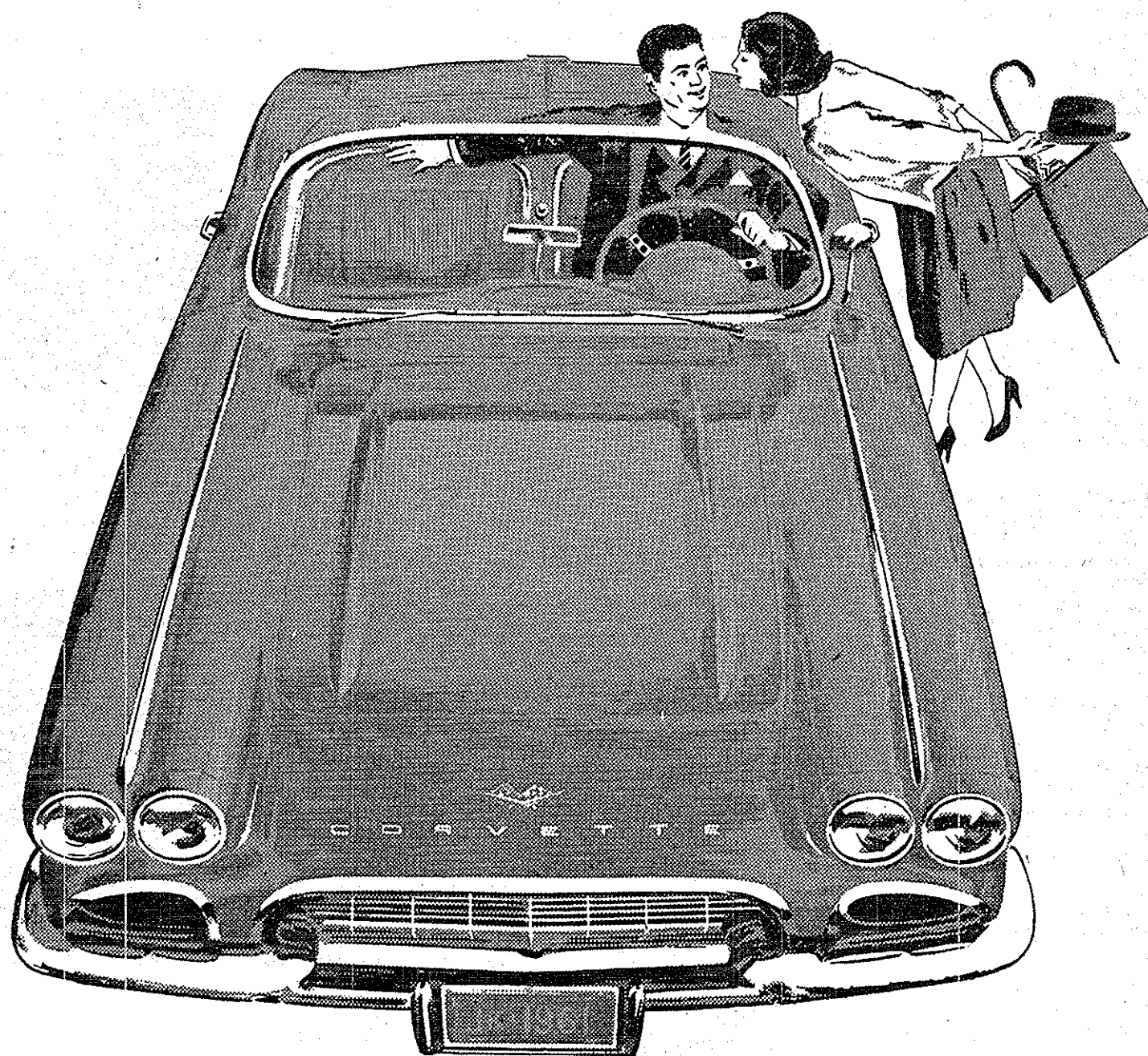

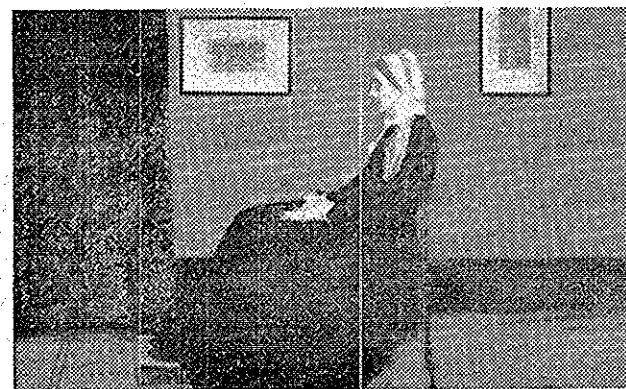

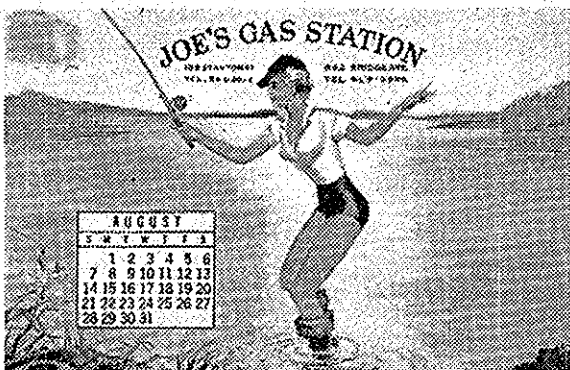
