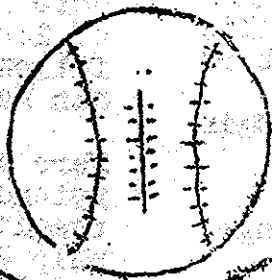


FROM BEHIND THE DESK
