DR. BOWDEN DISCUSSES FUTURE
OF DRAMA

Youngstown College students who have an interest in the fine and venerable art of make-believe are due for the time of their lives during this and succeeding semesters if plans made by Dr. R. D. Bowden, who is in charge of college dramatics, materializes.

Dr. Bowden, who joined the college faculty in 1930, has besides his teaching experience, an interesting background as a lecturer and playwright.

He defines drama as the endeavor to express ourselves as we would like to be rather than as we are, and maintains that we all have within us, to a greater or lesser degree, a sense for and an appreciation of the dramatic element in life.

When asked what makes a successful drama, Dr. Bowden replied that a drama is composed of conflict, clever lines and attractive situations. "By attractive situations, I mean those that will awaken a response in the minds of the individual members of an audience. Unless a play touches in some way, each individual's life, it is a failure
