1,000 JAM NEW EDUCATIONAL BUILDING FOR DEDICATION CEREMONIES

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CONTRACTOR PROMISES CHANGE  
AFTER LAV. PLATES CAUSE FURORE

CITY'S LEADING EDUCATORS LAUD  
WORK OF Y.M.C.A. SCHOOLS HERE

"Boys" and "Girls" Will Be-  
come "Men" and "Women"  
Next Week

Name plates on lavatories on all  
floors, which now read "Boys" and  
"Girls" will be changed to "Men"  
and "Women" by the contractor, Di-  
rector H. L. Nearpass assured mem-  
bers of The Janbar Staff.

Indignation had run high here in  
the first few days of school over  
the new plates. Students complained  
that they were "high-schoolish".

"It's the principle of the thing,"  
one representative student said. "I  
The attitude here is that we are  
college men and women. We resent  
this injury to our ego."

Mr. Nearpass explained that the  
contractor had a number of these  
plates on hand for use in schools.  
New plates will be installed soon.

More than 500 persons jammed  
the "Y" Tech auditorium here  
last night for the dedication  
ceremonies of the new education-  
al building. Besides this, the  
crowd which was estimated at  
over 1,000 overflowed into the  
halls of the three lower floors  
of the building where loud  
speakers had been installed for  
their convenience.

Members of the office force  
delighted the hearts of old  
timers with their gala appear-  
ance in formal dress.

Flowers were banded on the  
stage and in the executive of-  
fices of the building, giving  
the whole a festive appearance.

Visitors' cars lined Lincoln  
Ave. for blocks on both sides  
of the street. It was impossible  
to find space on Wick Ave. any-  
where near the college.
