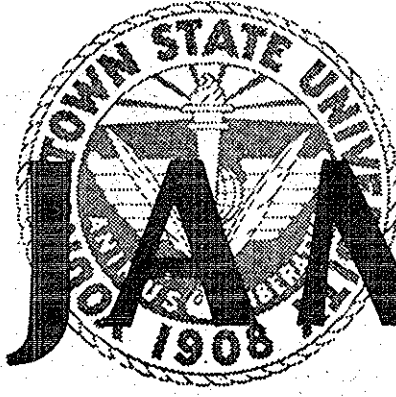

## 'Northern country' matriculation

An accumulation of up to 12 inches of snow in some areas caused students and professors to miss class yesterday. Forecasts say that the blanket will thicken by 2

inches this morning.

The snow-removal crew was scheduled to begin operations at midnight last night and expected to have the parking lots cleared

before the start of this morning's classes, Henry Garono, landscape supervisor, said last night.

Yesterday's snow came "unexpectedly and all at once," Mr.

Garono said, but the grounds department has enough good equipment that "things are now under control."

Although no classes were

officially cancelled, many students and professors were unable to commute to the uni-

## Dr. Hoops is named to CEC scholarship committee, other posts

Dr. M. Dean Hoops, associate professor of special education and chairman of that department at YSU has been appointed a member of the Scholarship Committee of the Mahoning Valley Chapter of the Council on Exceptional Children.

Dr. Hoops is presently developing plans for implementation of federal grant money and local chapter money which might be available to defray college expenses for students interested in working with handicapped children.

In conjunction with Dr. Charles L. Smith, associate professor of special education, Dr. Hoops has been appointed to the Local Management Committee of the Youngstown Public Schools. This committee is responsible for the development of a program

of evaluation and diagnostic procedures for placement of public school children in classes for the Educable Mentally Retarded Children in Youngstown Public Schools.

The committee is made up of representatives of parents, public school officials, and YSU personnel and local agencies associated with services for handicapped children.

Along with Dr. Jack D. Dunsing, associate professor of special education, Dr. Hoops has also been appointed to the Board of Governors of the Tri-County (Mahoning, Trumbull and Columbiana) Special Education Program and Planning Project.

A specialist in the areas of educational psychology and special education, Dr. Hoops re-

ceived a bachelor of science in education degree, cum laude, from Kent State University, and a master of science and his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan.

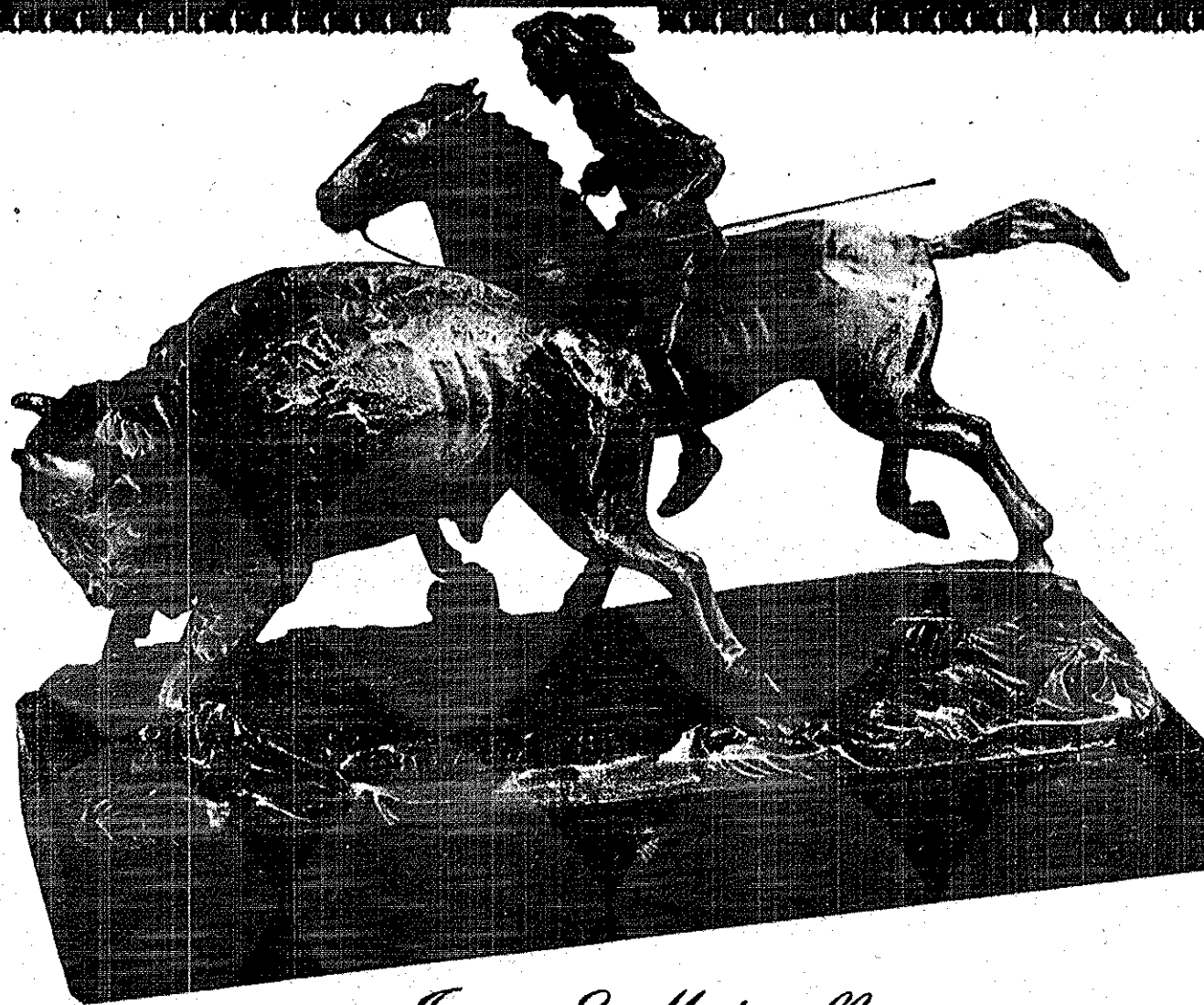

Day: a. Classes scheduled to meet five days a week at the same hour have an option of two exam periods at the instructor's discretion.

b. Courses that meet one day a week (but not evening) and all one-hour courses and seminars that require a final exam time will use W/1515-1715 or F/1515-1715 at the instructor's discretion.

Evening:

a. Classes beginning at non-standard times (i.e., other than the above) will use the above table for the first time shown following their starting time (i.e., M 1700 will use M 1715 which is M/1730-1930; T/1900 uses T/1940 which is T/2000-2200).

b. Classes scheduled only one evening a week (except Friday) will meet that day at the closest starting time: 1730, 1800, 2000, or 2030 (i.e., W 1830 (only) meets W/1800-2000, M 1700 (only) meets M/1730-1930).

Friday evening and Saturday classes will begin at their regular hour on that day for final exams.

Notes:

1. If a student has three or more examinations on one day he should attempt to re-schedule one (or more) of those examinations on another day when the teacher has an examination.
2. Examinations must be held at the hour scheduled because the classroom may not be available at other times.
3. Final examinations are not to be given before the final examination schedule period.
4. A fee of \$5 may be charged for a final examination taken at any time other than the scheduled time. A Late Examination Permit may be secured in the office of the appropriate academic dean.

Grades Due: Grade reports are due in your Dean's Office 48 hours after the final examination and the last grade reports are due in time for delivery to the Registrar's Office by 0900, Monday, December 13, 1971.

## Clothing trend at YSU gives surplus stores good business

If you are a YSU student, you have probably noticed the gradual predominant introduction of recycled wearing apparel within the last year or more.

The most prevalent of the recycled clothing is army shirts and jackets which have been with us for quite a while.

Probably first introduced by actual veterans, the clothing started as a fad, and also a protest, similar to the recent use of the U.S. flag in clothing.

Students then proceeded to swarm the army-navy stores which carry assorted quantities of such clothing.

The continued growth of the trend has developed the once fad into one of the predominant styles in the clothing of college students today.

Since the demand is still high, the prices for beat-up recycled clothing of all sorts are still on the rise. The profits flowing into

the army-navy stores has sent the more expensive stores scrambling for recycled merchandise. These stores now try to peddle this low-quality, but high close-up demand clothing at ridiculous prices.

An older style of recycled clothing would be the old work clothes, mostly shirts, that some YSU students wear. These clothes range from gas station pump-jockey uniforms to factory overalls, jackets, and shirts, and are made for army-navy and discount stores to be sold to this type of occupational employee.

After being recycled, these shirts are often thrown onto a pile, and because they are used and considerably beat-up, they are currently being sold in these stores for usually less than fifty cents.

Here again, the retailers are ready to capitalize on the used clothing fad. At least one of the

more expensive-better quality stores in the Southern Park Mall is prepared for a possible rise in the wearing of such apparel. Their price, of course, is over three dollars apiece if you include sales tax.

## Thanksgiving Experience at Newman

An Ecumenical Thanksgiving Experience will be held at midnight this Wednesday at Newman Chapel on the corner of Wick and Rayen Avenues the Reverend Father Raymond DiBlasio, associate Newman Chaplain, said yesterday.

The Experience, which is sponsored by Co-Operative Campus Ministry, will include a film strip, live music, and a gala Thanksgiving feast to be held later in the evening.

According to Fr. DiBlasio, Wednesday night's program is unique in that it will be a blend of traditional and experimental elements, an experience in total involvement that will include all who are present in Newman's chapel in the round.

The traditional sermon will be replaced by dialogue between participants, multi-visual effects will embrace readings and representations, and those wishing to play

The booth previously stationed at the Kilcawley lot is now at the corner of Elm and Arlington. Together these constitute the only access to parking areas near the center of campus.

These central parking areas, including the Kilcawley lot, the Ward Beecher lot, the Tod Hall lot and the parking spaces along both Bryson and Arlington Streets, are restricted to faculty members with parking stickers.

According to Mr. Henry Butch, attendant at the Arlington entrance, "the only other way to get in here is with a visitor's permit" which must be signed by the attendant himself.

This "migration" has also affected the booth formerly situated on Arlington between Elm and Fifth. This building has been moved to Lincoln Ave. across from the Red Barn, to service the student parking lot where parking decks are now under construction.

The booth which was located at the east entrance of the Kilcawley lot is now being used at the entrance to the student parking lot on Grant Street.

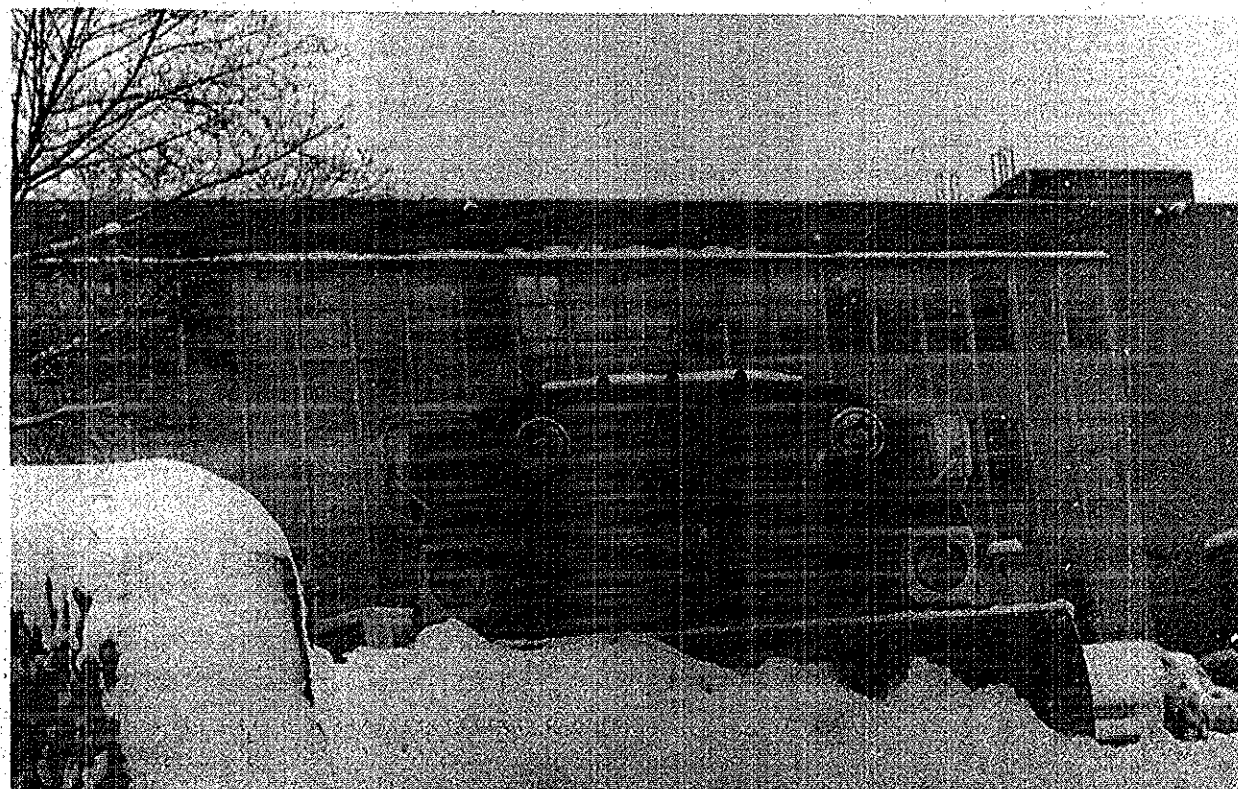

## Akron Zips zonk Penguins 7-0 in last fight; record ends 2-6

The Penguins were defeated by the Akron University Zips, 7-0, Saturday evening in the Akron Rubber Bowl before 4,202 fans to end the Penguins' 1971 gridiron schedule with a 2-6 record.

The contest saw 11 fumbles between the two teams with each losing two pieces in a rainy, soggy, and muddy field with 20 mile per hour winds.

The play that would have put YSU back in the ball game was nullified by a clipping penalty in the last two minutes of play in the fourth quarter. First down, ten yards to go on the YSU 30, quarterback Ron Jaworski threw a screen pass to tailback Rosie Blackwell who went to the right side of the line.

Blackwell shot against the grain and back again avoiding the Zip secondary with the help of over-eager blocking. Heading for the sidelines, the senior tailback made it into the end zone for an apparent score. But disaster struck as clipping was called on the fired-up Pens. Blackwell's touchdown was erased and the penalty was marched off from the YSU 48. The Pens told the officials what they thought of the

### Dr. Pfau expects no drastic change in English Dept.

There is no prospect of drastic change in the English department's structure despite possible faculty cutbacks throughout the university, Dr. Margaret I. Pfau, English department chairman reported at the department's meeting last Friday.

Although there is talk of reducing the number of limited service faculty at YSU, the English department will require the continuation of faculty hired on that basis, Dr. Pfau pointed out.

One foreseeable problem, Dr. Pfau said, is that if members of the full-service English faculty resign, their positions may not be filled.

The department passed a motion to authorize a committee to select the films to be purchased through Media Center for use in English classes.

The next meeting of the English department and their student representatives will be at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 7.

The Penguins logged a 2-6 record compared to last year's 0-9 results.

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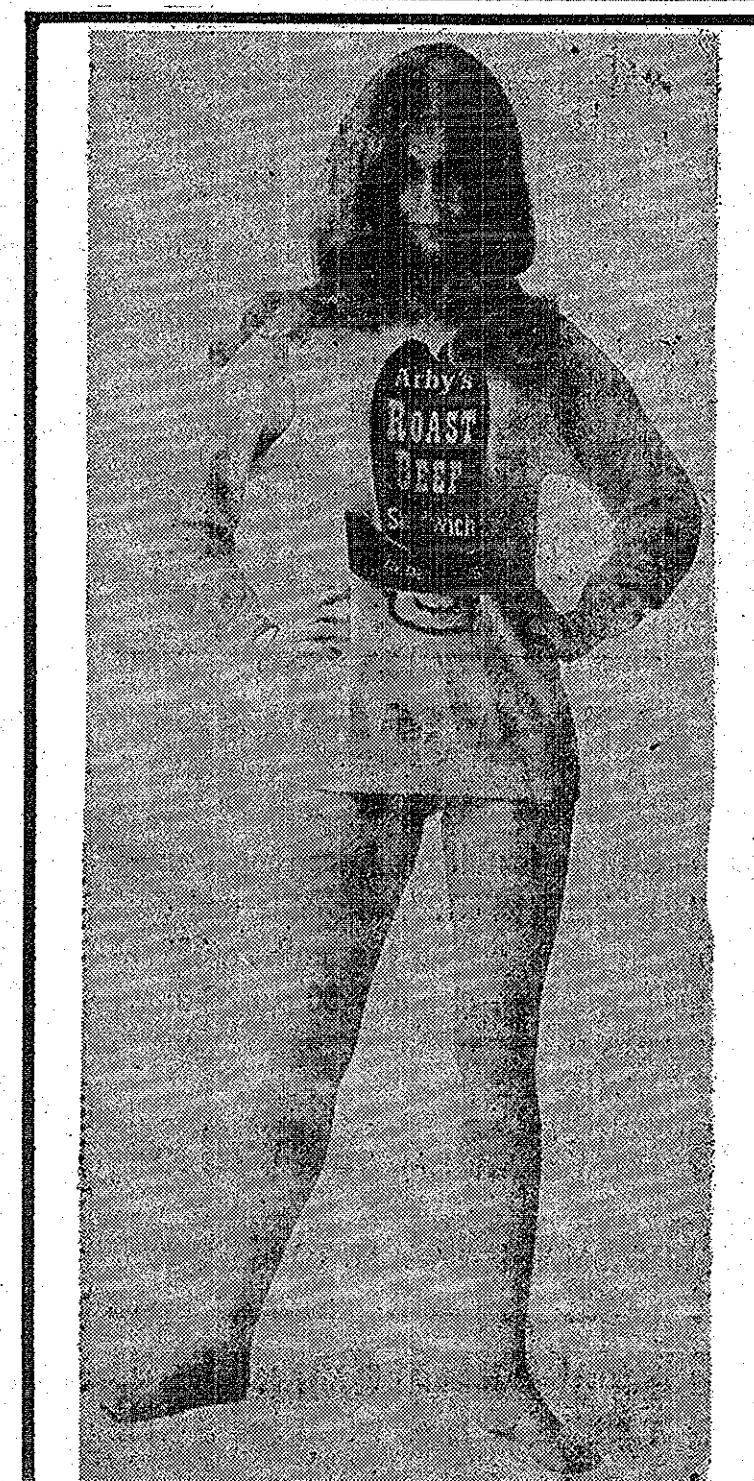
