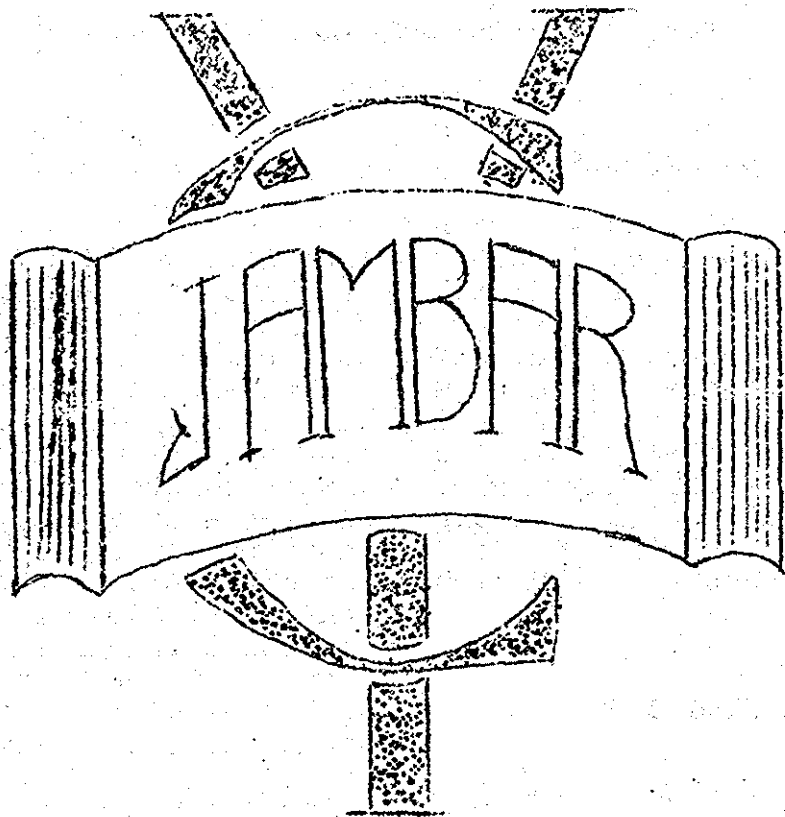

SAM SIDMAN, ACTOR, SPEAKS
TO STUDENTS

The Dramatic and Public Speaking Classes were fortunate in hearing Mr. Sam Sidman, a very prominent actor of the stage, Thursday, April 23.

His address was interesting and constructive. The information rendered, concerning the stage, should prove of great value to the students in the Dramatic Class.

Mr. Sidman spoke both from observation and from experience, since he spent fifty-one years on the stage and several months in the movies. "The drama is nil", he said, "the talking picture gave it a quick death. Amateur productions cannot be properly staged without the necessary properties and stage facilities, and the proper casting of the characters." He added that the theater will, without a doubt, always be with us in some form or other, but that the talking picture is a cheap metallic imitation that has neither personal contact nor the power to sway an audience, that is characteristic of a stage production.
