The Peace Corps is in need of 10500 new trained Volunteers by the end of the summer. There are 46 countries presently being served by the Peace Corps. Six new countries will receive volunteers for the first time this year. However, because of a lack of volunteers 20 countries remain on the waiting list.

every year at this time. The rainbow and the pot of gold started because a rainbow led to the entrance of the bank Goldberg owned. It was well luminated in many beautiful colors to attract attention. 


