

their function and importance. He explained the procedure used in accepting veterans for veteran hospitals.





From one end of the mill to the other, emphasis is placed on cleanliness and safety. It's really an example to any management group thinking of setting up a plant. The boys visited the preheating furnaces, the sheet finishing division, machine shop, and the electrolytic tin plating line. eW note, in passing, that the walls of the machine shop are finished in two-tone light green. What a place to work. The most interestng thing in the whole mill was the tin plating line. There, they plate sheet steel with tin, in a continuous strip, moving at a rate of 580 feet per minute. All in all, the trip was most instructive and interesting. May all the boys, once again, thank Mr. Thomas Brown of Carnegie for his help in arranging the trip. Various topics listed in the program include the place of the registrar in college administration, public relations, machine equipment in registrations, counseling, office procedures, records and their uses.







The team's undefeated record reaches back to the first game of the 1948 season. Under the expert instruction of Leo Mason, who shares

coaching duties with Dr. R. A. Beard, the team swept the entire '48 schedule, establishing a perfect record of 14 wins. Dr. Beard gives Mr. Mason credit for the amazing play of the team. "Leo Mason is tops", he said, "in handling beginners and in teaching the fundamentals of the game." Ranked by many with the better tennis players of the country, Mr. Mason won his first city championship in 1923 and his most recent one in 1947. He's not out of the picture yet by any means. Coaching the college varsity keps him in touch with the game and forces him to retain his form as an example to his players. In our opinion, he's still a great

competitor. Winning streaks in tennis, as in other less popular sports, are sometimes regarded with less respect than a string of baseball or football victories. In some circles, consecutive wins are thought to be characteristic of minor sports. On the contrary, however, it is just as remarkable for a tennis team to win 17 matches in a row as it is for any type of team to acvarieties of weather conditions, mention the various types of courts-influence all tennis players, improving their game one time, and fouling them up the tainment.

Ross and Bill Moore, both from New Castle, along with Hank Bolivar, a Greenville, Pa. resident, are the only players from outside the Youngstown district. In contrast to last year's team, the entire squad is made up of local, Mahoning Valley boys.

The 1949 season is just getting under way, and the varsity will have to be on their toes to keep their record unblemished. Dr. Beard reports that Baldwin-Wallace, a stiff competitor in any sport, will probably be the team's toughest opposition. All the team's home games are played at Volney complish a similar feat. 


