HONOR SYSTEM
Members of student council have brought to the
attention of the faculty, the fact that some Youngstown College examinations are anything but an accurate test of the information absorbed and orga-
nized during the semester. The college and its diplomas would be respected
much more by students and outsiders alike if this much more by students and outsiders alike if this
situation were remedied. Anyone who is attending college to gain an education or to prepare for spe-
cialized employment should be interested in the respect held for the degreês conferred by his school.
The poll currently being conducted may well proThe poll currently being conducted may well pro-
vide some opinion as to the most desirable method of correcting the "cheating" situation.

Top Students Must Take Lead If the proposed voluntary plan is put into opera-
tion, it will be up to the coutstanding students to
take the lead in laying the groundwork for the take the lead in laying the groundwork for the
efficient operation of the honor system. Only bet.
ter-than-average students could afford to sin the ter-than-average students could afford to sign the
"no-cheating" contract during the first semester or two that the proposal is in effect. Even "A" students might have a tough time.
It is the "A" student, though, that. would benefit
most by the initiation of such a plan. The card indicating the existing contract would save the conscientious student from the embarrassment of refusing fit the "cheater", who would not waste his precious moments seeking from the wrong person, something he should have sought weeks before.
During the interim in which only a part of each
class is pledged to the honor contract, students who class is pledged to the honor contract, students who
have signed will be competing with others who are "riding ponies". Average, or poor students would not
have a very good chance of passing exams during have a very good chance of passing exams during
this period. They would be competing with their
usual betters - the top of the cerve - and also usual betters - the top of the curve - and ald
with those of their equals who "had the scoop".

Insiructors Have Responsibility
Instructors must not view the new system as a
substitute for alertness on their part. Many present-
ly ly give examinations which are perfect "set-ups" for
cheating. Emphasis should be placed on making it impossible for copies of exams to be passed on from
section to section, from day to day, or even from year to year.

It is the duty of each instructor to see to it, as far as he is able, that his tests cannot be dodged by getting "tip-offs" from students who have already taken them. This is true at the present time,
as well as during the operation of any honor system plan.

## Off the Record

"All right boys, take it from the edge and this time let's kill it.-" No, it's not a gangster talking or a butcher
either. Just the leader of a band, telling the players to start the number at the very beginning and really play it nice.

Most of the time this bit of slang is heard in jazz combos and usually proves very effective. So now that we have provided a novel intro, let's get
Jazz, as you might or might-not Jazz, as you might or might-not
know, appeared on the American scene, rathere suddenly. It's a music
of remote origins and gradual deof remote origins and gradual de-
velopment. Two hundred and sifty velopment. Two hundred and sifty
years of Negro slave music, the years of Negro slave music, the
work-song brought over from
Africa, as well as a music developed here, the spiritual, the bal-
olad and finally, the blues-p.pelad and finally, the blues-pre-
ceeded this instrumental music. This musieal achievement began
around the Gold Coast of West Africa, then moved to the American South and up to the romantic
city of New Orleans. Even today, no other southern city has as much prominence, due to music,
as does. New Orleans. When you speak of Jazz, of the Brass Band, and, to be sure, of famous Basin Street, this city really is
place of American musi.
Great names have been associ-
ated with jazz, but today they are not its leaders. Mr. Jazz is none other than Paul Whiteman, while
men like Irving Berlin, George Gershwin and the immortal King
Oliver have left their mark. Paul Whiteman has been the
outstanding personality who clorified Jazz motives and presented them with inteteresting and exciting orchestral treatment in the na-
tion's concert halls. Yet we cantion's concert halls. Yet we can-
not forget that men like Benny Goodman, Woody Herman, and Duke Ellington have also contri-
"outed a great deal to develop jazz. Long Hair Element be limited to just the dance band element. In 1946 when Woody Herman give a concert in Carne-
