Thus far this year only one such speaker has been made available to the students is a poor record compared to the previous is a poor record compared to the previous
year. And it is poorer yet compared to other colleges in the nation. For example, Hofstra University in New York has listened to Nor man Lincoln Rockwell, leader of the Ameri can Nazi Party; Gus Hall, head of the Ameri can Communist Party, and Gov. Ross Barne of Mississippi, to name a few.
We aren't asking to have the University schedule such persons as Hall, Barnett, Rock cell, in his own right, but we are asking fo someone. Why not utilize our own facilities It could cost less, convocations could be hèld more frequently and the discussions probably could be more interesting.
Student Council, for example, could hold mock U.IV. session on world affairs; there are some 60 foreign students from 20 coun
tries attending the University; Council could ask students from Greece, Turkey and Cyprus to debate the turmoil now occurring in each of their homelands. A faculty member from the history or political science depart-
ment could be moderator.
Enlarging this idea, Council could reserv the Audio-Visual Room at a designated time to discuss ideas associated with their respective fields.
For instance: Dr. S. I. Roberts, history For instance: Dr. S. I. Roberts, history, could discuiss his book dealing with business-
men in Chicago at the turn of the century; Dr. Bruce T?. Riley, philosophy, could discuss the controversial trends of modern philoso phy; Prof. Karl Dykema, Dean of College of Arts and Sciences, could discuss the develop
ment of slang, and any of the economics in
structors could discuss the structors could discuss the new tax bill. In the city, Vindicator Political Editor nesidential and could be asked to discuss the members of both labor and managem could be invited to discuss unemployment or automation. Both lists are expandable. The benefits to the students is incalculable. The Jambar strongly urges Student Coun cil to appoint a committee to explore the possibility of such a program. The monetary cost will be neglizible and that-in timeworthwhile. The benefits will supercede both.
