

## REORGANIZED COUNCIL ELECTS OFFICERS

### Enrollment Drops 400; Under 3000

The present Youngstown College enrollment as reported recently from the registrar's office stands at 2941 students, which is a decrease of about 400 students as compared to last year's fall semester.

This is not the first change in enrollment figures, however, for last year's total showed a similar decrease.

Of the total enrollment 600 students are veterans of World War II and approximately 75 are veterans of the Korean War.

#### Changes Small

No outstanding changes have occurred in student registration throughout the various schools of the college, except the Dana School of Music which has a 50% increase over last year's enrollment.

Change in enrollment is not the only change to be found on campus this year. For the first time women's physical education classes will be offered in the evenings due to the remodeling of the athletic building into a women's physical education center.

#### Has New Gym

The new building now houses a large gymnasium, lockers, shower rooms and physical education offices. The second floor also has a dance studio for college dance classes.

The new building will also enable neighboring colleges to come to Yoco for women's intercollegiate physical education activities.

### Student's Eligible For 'Who's Who' List

Eligible for listing in WHO'S WHO of American colleges, are thirty juniors, seniors and graduate students who expect to receive degrees.

Nominations are on the basis of honor points obtained from extra-curricular activities. These points and activities must be placed on a form which can be obtained from the Dean's office, Information desk, Registrar's office or Student Council office.

They must be returned to the Dean's office by Wednesday, Oct. 8.

### Crites Leads Industry Group In Basic Economics Course

Harold R. Crites, instructor in English and social science fields and advisor to the JAMBAR is serving as conference leader for a series of classes in basic economics being presented by the Industrial Information Institute.

This series is being held for key personnel of the 119 member companies.

Crites, who has been on the faculty at Youngstown College for the past six years, will continue his work here. He was selected by the institute because of his practical working experience in business and industry as well as for his teaching experiences.

### Classes Begin In New Library

Designed to give students convenience, the new million dollar library is now nearing completion. Modern in detail, the building is spacious and colorful.

It will seat about 600 students and will hold 250,000 books, including books from the engineering and law libraries and most of those from the music department.

The main floor will hold the reserve and circulation books, open book stacks, reference and reserve rooms and a large reading room which will be furnished with various sized tables as well as lounge chairs and sofas.

A return book opening and night depository will be found at the main entrance which faces the campus. This

entrance will have a terrazzo floor, stone benches and glass panel doors.

Overlooking the study area of the first floor is a balcony where a number of individual study carrels will be placed. Also on the second floor will be nine faculty offices, the processing room for new books, reading rooms, stack area, telephone booths and four exhibition cases.

On the nearly completed third floor will be the girls' lounge painted with a turquoise and mauve color scheme with furniture to match; faculty lounge, stack area, seminar room and a visual education room which will be used by different classes for films, records or various purposes. It is equipped as a small auditorium with projection booth, roll away screen, four spot lights and two 8 inch loud speakers.

#### Rooms Large

Also on the third floor will be a large smoker and browsing room. It will have a separate ventilation system and be equipped with tables and chairs, lounge chairs and sofas. Five of the nine sound proof typing booths will be found in this room to be at the disposal of YoCo students.

"We will be happy to be in the library," said James W. Pirie, director of libraries at Youngstown College, "To give the kind of service we'd like to see the students and faculty getting."

Completely separated from the library portion of the building are nine class rooms where classes are now being held. These carry out the colorful theme that follows throughout the library.

The basement of the classroom area has been equipped for the athletic department.

### Starts 2-Year Plan Schools Pick Members

A reorganized Student Council elected officers for the full term at its first meeting Wednesday, Sept. 27.

Jack Shea was elected president, Brooks Hurst, vice-president, Bill Williams, treasurer, and Virginia Gething, secretary.

Council was re-organized in an attempt to make representation more effective. Sections of the Constitution referring to voting have been suspended for a two year period, and membership will be kept at about 20 members.

Membership is now on the basis of schools. Each school voted last week for its own representatives. Dana voters elected Mrs. Mildred Hancock, the Business school elected Frances Adams, Cathy Nostich, and George Shinas.

#### 4 Engineers Elected

James Tisone and Harry Ritchey were elected from the Liberal Arts school, while Nick Leonelli, Bill Newell, James Ellsworth, and Dick Frank were elected from the Rayen School of Engineering.

The ten new members will join 11 left from last year. They are Ronald Galup, Andy Vargo, Rosemarie Buccieri, Elaine Casey, Joe Dannery, Dick Westerman, Virginia Gething and Bill Williams, all from the Liberal Arts school, and Brooks Hurst, Frank O'Connor and Jack Shea from the Business school. The number of representatives elected was determined by the number of full-time students enrolled during the previous semester, in proportion to the total enrollment.

Officers hope that the new system will stimulate interest in council activities by having more students vote. The goal is to "make student council the voice of the entire student body".

### YoCo Adds 3 Teachers To Faculty

Reverend Joseph Lucas, Stephen V. Fulkerson and Dr. Richard P. Gosselin are three new faculty members that have been added to the personnel of Youngstown College this semester.

Reverend Lucas, who has been on the faculty part time since September 1947, will now teach full time in the department of philosophy and religion. He recently returned from Italy where he attended the University of Rome and received the S.T.D. Angilicum degree. He also attended summer lectures at Oxford University in England.

#### Received Degrees

Reverend Lucas received his B.A. degree from University of Scranton in 1938, he also has the A.M., S.T.B., S.T.L. and Ph.D in philosophy from the University of Ottawa and the A.M. degree with a major in education from Kent State.

Fulkerson has filled the post vacated by Zeno E. Hawkinson in the history department. He received his B.A. degree from the University of California and his M.A. degree from the University of Chicago where he is completing requirements for his doctorate.

A member of the American Historical Association, he served in the army during World War II from 1942-45.

#### Taught in Chicago

Dr. Gosselin came to Youngstown College from the University of Chicago where he was a mathematician with the Institute for Automatic Weapons Research. He will be a full time member of the mathematics department. (Continued on Page 6)

### ROTC's Jones Gets Promotion

The Department of the Army has recently announced the promotion of Charles E.H. Jones, associate professor of military science at Youngstown College, to the rank of Major.

Major Jones, who has been with the staff here for two years, is a native of Virginia and a graduate of V.P.I. While attending V.P.I. he was very active in athletics, being a member of the football, boxing and basketball squads.

He received his commission in 1940 and became a First Lieutenant in 1943, a Captain in 1944. In the past he served in the European Theatre of war, which included Iceland and England.

Major Jones, who is a resident of the South Side, will be replaced here in June or July. He will be sent to service school or given overseas duty.

### Freshmen Breakfast At Mill Creek Wed.

Sam Drake and Hank Hendel were chosen co-chairmen of the Freshmen Breakfast at the first regular meeting of Student Council this semester.

The breakfast, which is an annual program in honor of Youngstown College freshmen, will be held Oct. 8, at Pioneer Pavilion in Millcreek Park. Classes will be excused from 12:00 to 5:00 for the affair.

A full program of events is planned including dancing, baseball and football. Bud Mayberry is chairman of the sports program and Alpha Pi Epsilon, service sorority, will take charge of refreshments.

Name tags will be available for all attending, with different name tags being given to freshmen so that they can be easily recognized.

### College Will Offer New Civil Engineering Course

A complete course in civil engineering leading to the degree of bachelor of engineering will be available in the evening for the first time this semester at the William Rayen School of Engineering of Youngstown College, according to Frank M. Ellis, dean of the school. While the course has been available to day students for the past several years, this is the first time it has been possible for evening students to secure all of the requirements for the degree in evening classes.

Question: Have the upperclassmen been friendly and helpful in your first weeks at YoCo?

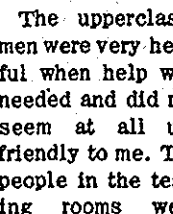

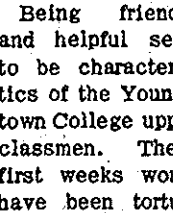

"Why of course, follow me. What is your name....."

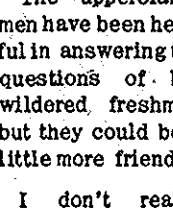

The upperclassmen at YoCo have been friendly in helping me find my way around the campus. This has been helpful as college is not nearly as centralized as high school.

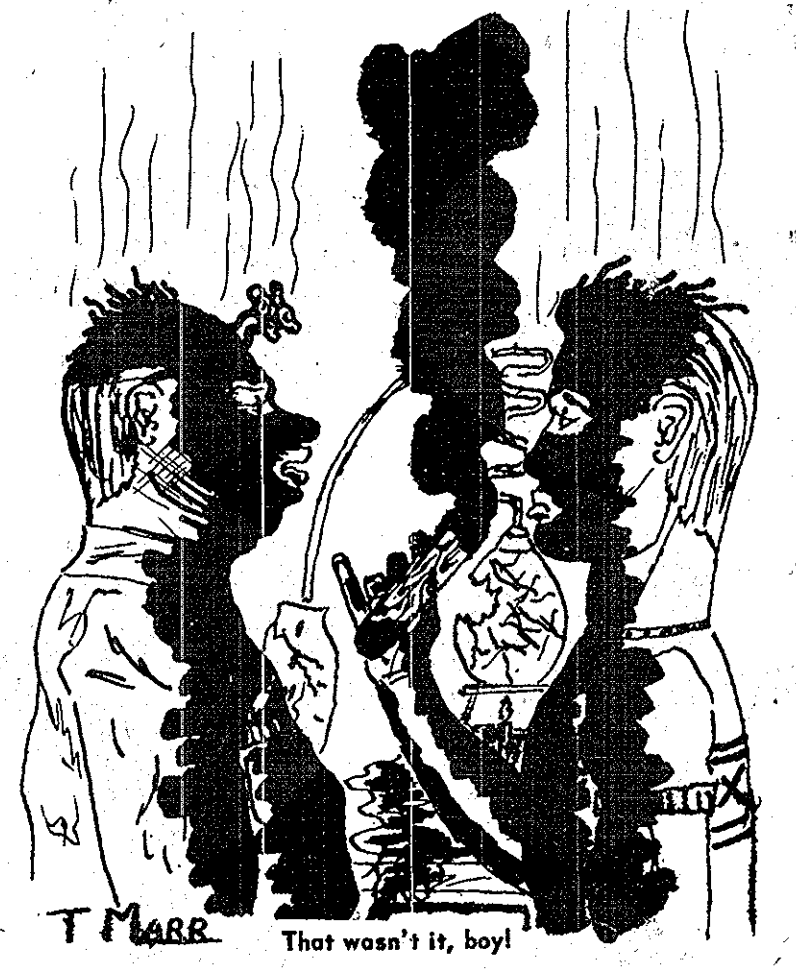
They have shown consideration and have taken time out to help us. I am sure that we freshmen have much to look forward to in our next few years at YoCo.

## ATTENTION P.L. 550 (KOREAN) VETERANS

At this writing only seven certificates of education and training (C.E.T. VA Form 7-1993) have been turned over to us by veterans who have applied for benefits under this law. Without this form you are not officially a P.L.550 veteran. The college does not get the certificates from the V.A. - you alone can get your C.E.T. from the V.A.

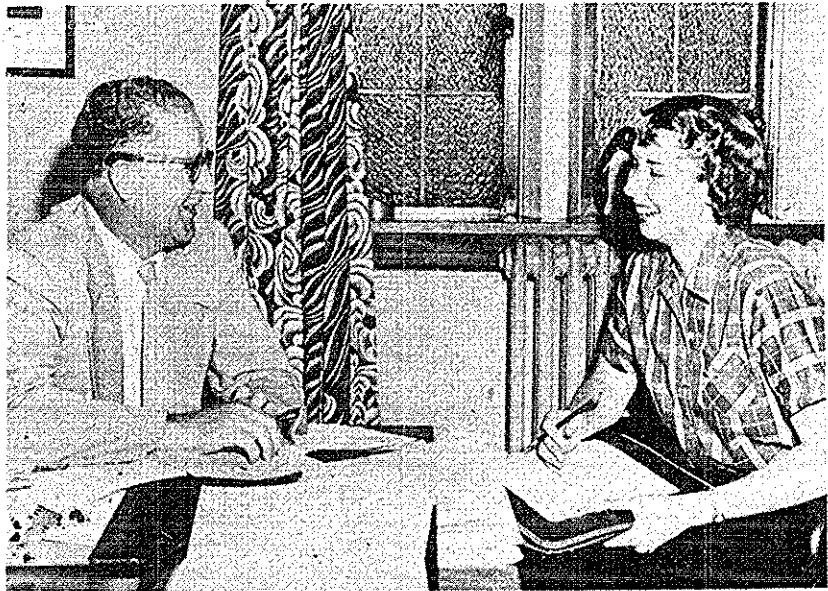
There are an estimated one hundred and twenty veterans awaiting V.A. approval. The V.A. in Cleveland states that these certificates are being rushed to the veterans who have sent in their applications on V.A. form 7-1990.

As to monthly certifications so that you can get paid, please stop into the Business Office at your earliest convenience (no later than October 6) and check our roster of P.L. 550 and potential P.L. 550 veterans and see if your name is included. At that time, even though your C.E.T. is not in, you must pick up the "P.L.550 Monthly Report." Read your directions, take it to all your instructors and upon turning it over to the Business Office in its completed form we will file it. In addition, if your C.E.T. is on file, you fill out V.A. form 7-1996a and if all facts and regulations are in order we will endorse the college portion of V.A. form 7-1996a and forward it to Cleveland. For those veterans whose C.E.T.'s are not in, V.A. form 7-1996a will be completed on the date you bring in your C.E.T. If your file of monthly reports and all other facts are in proper order, your V.A. form 7-1996a will be sent to Cleveland.

Remember to stop in the Business Office by October 6 and check our roster for your name.

## Europe Expects No War: Jones

Europeans' belief in the unlikelihood of World War III was one of the cheering thoughts brought back by President Jones after his seven week trip to Europe, where he toured the countries of England, France, Germany, Yugoslavia and Switzerland.

Although President Jones spent only a few days in Berlin (being flown in on the route of the famous airlift), he was much impressed with the spirit and determination of the west zone Germans to build and unite all of Germany.

### Don't Want War

He said the west zone Germans seemed to think the Communists did not want war immediately, but that they were ingenious at causing trouble. Many of us at YoCo can sympathize with the East Berlin students who commute across the Iron Curtain each day to attend school in the free sector of West Berlin.

Each country that President Jones visited apparently had its troubles. In England it was an unfavorable balance in trade and in France it was their war in Indo-China which was draining their manpower and finances.

### Brands Differ

In Yugoslavia Tito strongly maintained that his communism was not the Russian brand of Communism. He believes that each nation should have complete authority over its internal affairs.

Through the influence of President Fall of Hiram College, President Jones joined the Sherwood Eddy Seminar. He joined the group of fifty in London, England after flying from New York to Wales where he visited the home of his ancestors. The tours in Europe were supplemented by 81 lectures and introductions to notable dignitaries. President Jones returned on the Queen Mary and is happy to resume his duties at YoCo.

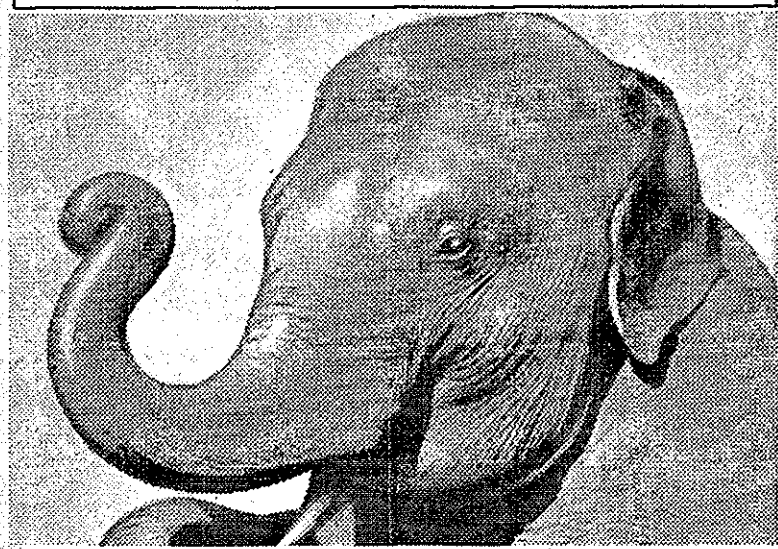


Students take a break between classes and at the same time enjoy one of the spacious views of the new library.



One of the modern classrooms in the Seminar wing of the library. Prof. E.B. Smith is conducting a history class.

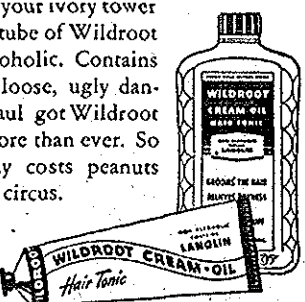

Public notice: found, one dignified senior answering to the name of Leo, madly clutching a football and running back and forth in the hall screaming at intervals, "What a practice field!

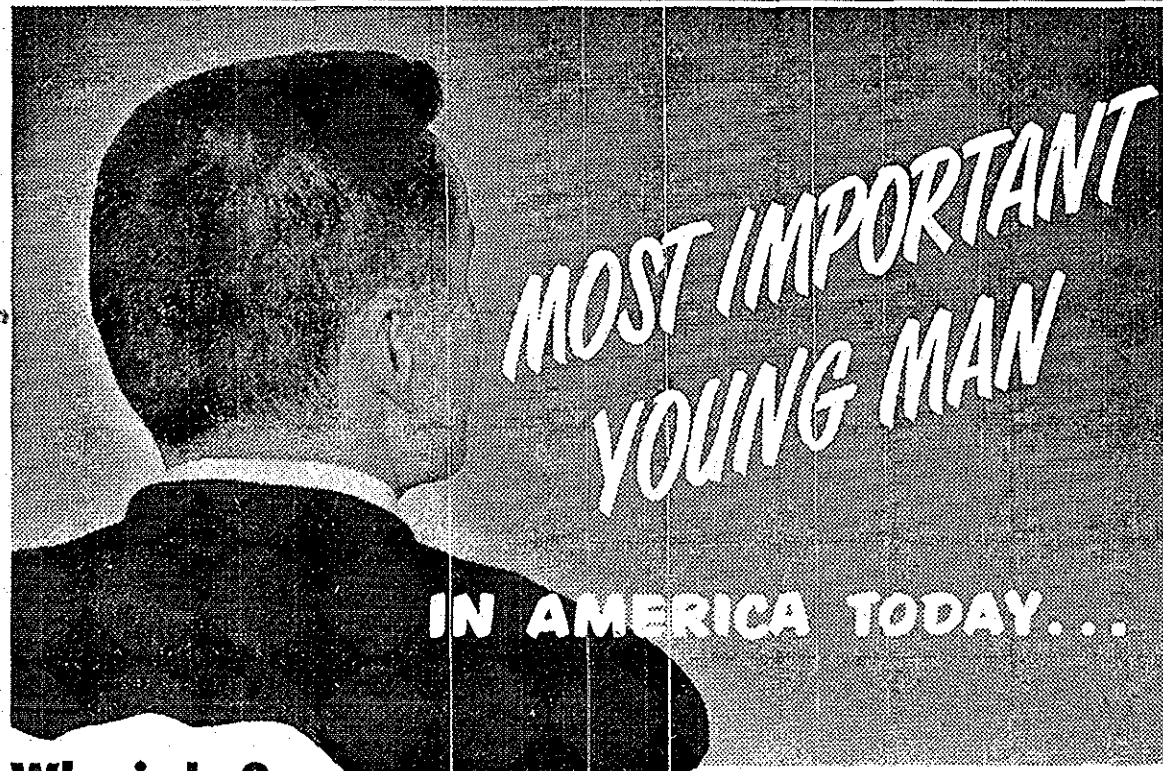

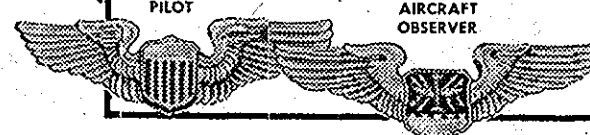

# Fast YoCo Squad Downs Gusties

The 1952 edition of the Youngstown College football squad demonstrated speed, power and determination in gaining their first victory of the season and their first victory over Gustavus Adolphus.

A strong defense and brilliant ball handling also were major reasons for the 13-12 victory. Youngstown, supposedly a two touchdown underdog, outclassed and outfought the bigger Gusties from start to finish.

Youngstown's first score came late in the second period with Bobo carrying the ball the final six yards after receiving a lateral pass from quarterback Dick Franko. The Gusties then took to the air. With only seconds remaining in the half, a screen pass good for thirty yards and a touchdown tied the game 6-6.

### Pass Brings Score

Midway in the third period a Franko to Cerenuga pass, coupled with a fine block by Angelo Pezzuolo, gave Youngstown its second score. Bob Lynn who had missed his first extra point attempt, then split the uprights with what proved to be the deciding tally.

Early in the fourth period the Golden Gusties drove forty yards to their second and final touchdown. The extra point attempt was wide and Youngstown, still led 13-12.

In gaining their initial victory of

the 1952 campaign, the Penguins displayed many new variations short punt formation. With Cerenuga and Bobo touring the ends, Villa crashing the middle, and Franko passing accurately the offensive backfield looked in midseason form. Fine blocking by Andres, Marsteller and Pezzuolo paved the way for the speedy YoCo backs. Roger Ottaway made several fine catches, of Franko passes, in the second period which were good for lengthy gains.

The defensive line showed skill and strength in stopping a much bigger Gustavus line from breaking their backfield men away. No one man can be singled out for his work on the defensive line, for the entire line kept thrushing in to repel and hold the hard ground attack of the Gusties.
