# Everybody Knows By Now

We cannot publish the results of the May Queen election in this issue of the JAMBAR. We cannot do it because our printing schedule always stays the same but the election dates did not.

Student Council member Frank Foster announced the results of the May Queen election last Friday at the regular Council meeting. The result - as everybody knows by now - two more ballots were counted over the total number of ballots cast by voters whose names were checked off on the roster of eligible voters.

Council Vice-President Jack Chugden, acting in the absence of President Noreen Bennett, immediately decreed that new elections would have to be held. The date set for such elections was this past Tuesday and Wednesday.

The persons hardest hit by this turn of events were the four girls who were candidates for May Queen, Arlene Barnes, Catherine Nosich, Louise Sarville and Aurora Vona.

No one can honestly state that these two extra ballots were cast with dishonest motives. It could have been an accident. But the point is that two extra votes were cast. If there had been a tie between two candidates (and such an occurrence is not impossible) those two ballots would have swayed the election.

Student Council, as well as the student body in general, should be deeply concerned by what happened. Once again we faced with the old question. "Is it all necessary?" or "Are Queen elections a waste of time?" We believe they are worth the effort.

Student Council members should see that future elections are carefully scrutinized to assure that only one vote is cast by each eligible voter. Campaigning methods in this election were, on the whole, conducted on a high level. But there were some cases, small in number but big in terms of significance, of flagrant violation of the rules of fair campaigning.

These elections can be conducted on a clean sportsmanlike basis. In such cases as this it is an extremely dangerous action to name names or to point an accusing finger at any one particular person or sorority or fraternity.

We want our college to stay the great college it already is. The student body must be united if we are to advance forward in fellowship. Vigilance is ever needed to protect this unity.



The average large steam turbine-generator costs \$3,000,000 and takes two years to build. It is one of the biggest pieces of electrical equipment made. Yet its thousands of parts are put together as carefully as a fine watch. Even a small change in design can affect the stresses and vibration of the turbine, and the way it performs. 
