Deadline For Next "Horizon" Set For April

Foreign Training Offered Students

American students of engineering, science, architecture, agriculture, and commerce may apply for foreign on-the-job training during the 1957 summer through the International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience.

During the 1957 summer, American engineering students will work abroad and American industry will accept foreign engineering students for training under the IAESTE program. Under this program college students in engineering and other technical fields are sent abroad for on-the-job training during their summer vacation for a period of eight weeks.

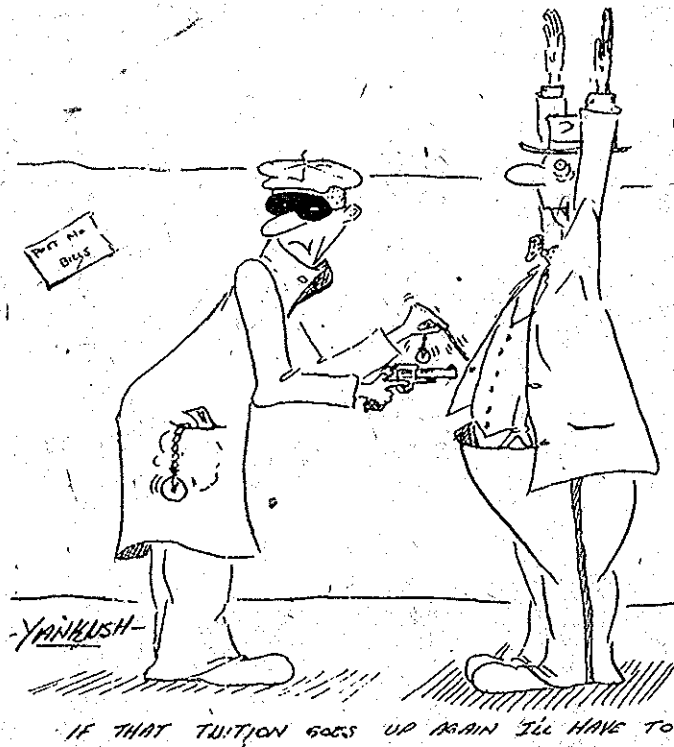
The Institute of International Education is coordinating U.S. participation in the IAESTE program.

Colleges Nominate

U.S. colleges have been asked to nominate qualified American students who wish practical training abroad. Candidates must be endorsed by the officials of their own schools.

In addition, each applicant must have completed his third year of engineering or scientific study, must have had practical experience in this country, and must be able to pay for his international travel.

Applicants may indicate their choice of country as well as their particular field of specialization. The deadline for receipt of applications is December 28, 1956. A fee of \$25 must accompany each application.

Pledging a fraternity is only a start. When you become active in your organization, don't be an active only in name, but be a good active and strive for the unity of brotherhood that is so essential today.

Former Student Completes Marine Officers Training

Recent Youngstown University student Marine Second Lieutenant Donald E. Robinson graduated from the Basic Course in ceremonies Oct. 1 at the "amphibious university." He was one of 281 lieutenants who completed the eight-month indoctrination course.

During the course, Lt. Robinson attended over 1102 hours of instruction at the 57,000 acre installation. The course covered principles of command, physical training and conditioning, leadership, infantry weapons supporting arms, communication, intelligence, statistics, supply, Marine Corps history and traditions, administration, and military law.

Its primary mission was to train newly commissioned officers in their new responsibilities as company grade officers, with particular emphasis on the duties of the small unit commander.

Lt. Robinson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin E. Robinson of Canfield, and the husband of the former Miss Donna M. Wiff of Youngstown.

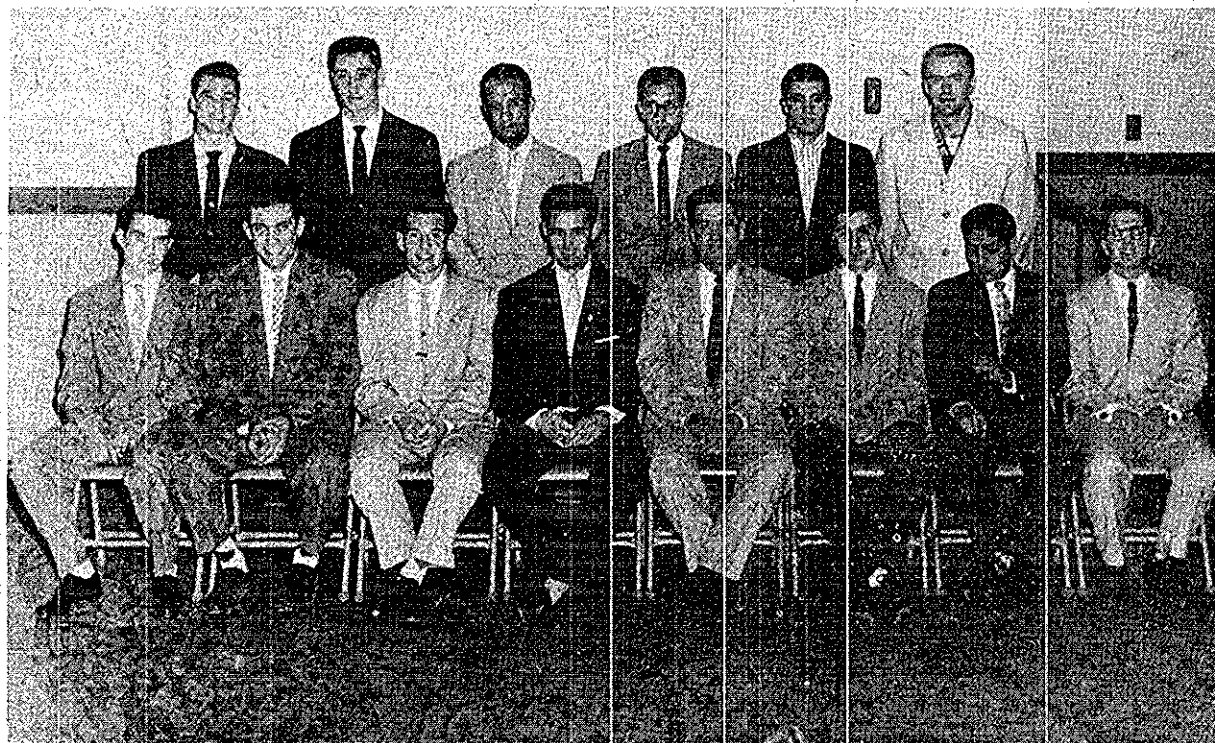

Warner, Beethoven Highlight Symphony Orchestra's Concert

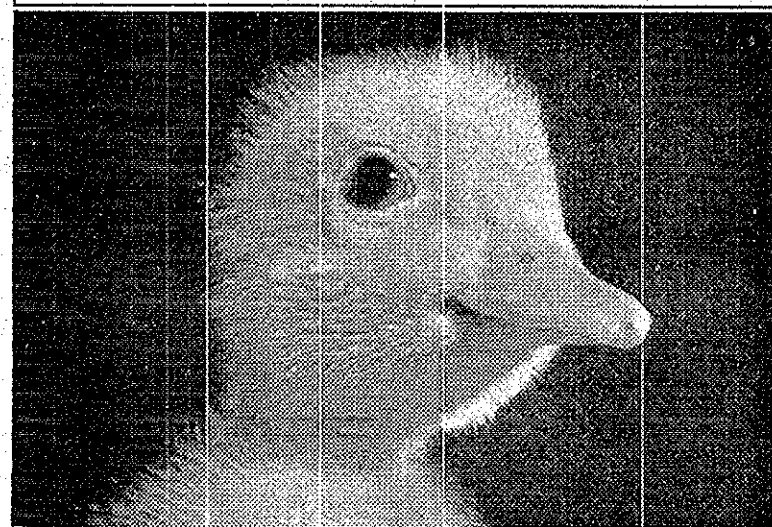

Iowa received assistance from the Michigan Wolverines in gaining their first conference championship since 1921. The Wolves stopped Ohio State

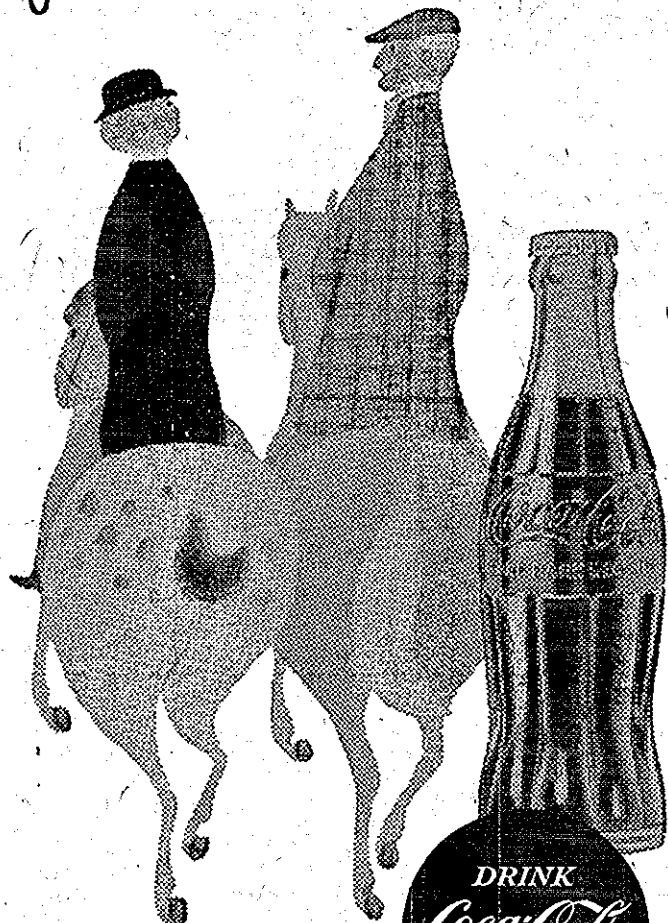
from gaining a tie for the title by tearing them apart in the last game of the year.

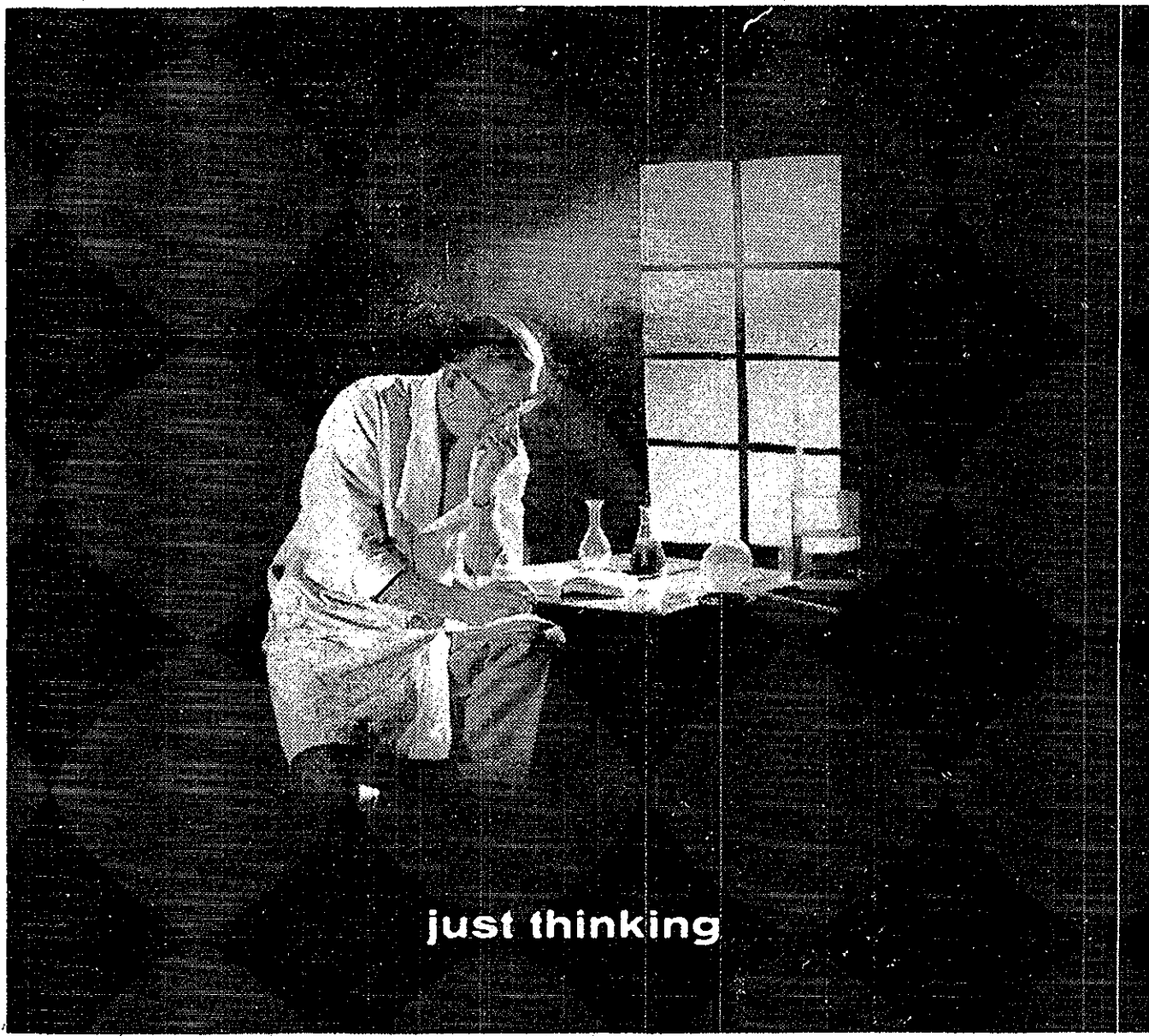
Well, just as happened soon after the baseball season ended, when managerial posts were juggled around like oranges, football coaches around the nation are getting the ax or dropping out of sight.
